The Fenton Charter Public Schools, along with traditional and charter schools across the state of California, transitioned to distance learning on March 16, 2020. At the time, we envisioned school would reopen for in-person instruction after Spring break on April 7, 2020. Throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, the Charter School has been committed to ensure we meet the needs of our students during this global crisis. We have continued to serve meals to any child under the age of 18, regardless of where the child attended school. All Fenton students have been offered an iPad. Students that do not have access to the internet received a mobile WiFi Hotspot. The Fenton Charter Public Schools developed a Task Force that meet throughout the summer to gather and collect feedback from a variety of stakeholders includes parents, students, teachers, and staff. The collection of resources put together from the FCPS Task Force are available for public viewing at <https://sites.google.com/fentoncharter.net/fcpstaskforce/home>. This website contains video recordings of all meetings along with agendas, presentations, and a wide array of resources collected by the team. The Task Force was composed of over 80 members across the five Fenton schools.

The Charter School has provided many opportunities during the 2020-2021 school year to obtain feedback to inform the development of the Expanded Learning Opportunities Grant Plan (ELO) and the Local Control Accountability Plan (LCAP). The extensive feedback from the ELO

Grant Plan and LCAP was used in the development of this ESSER III expenditure plan. In addition, the Charter School has held a number of Council Meetings at the beginning of the 2021-2022 school year to obtain stakeholder feedback. Community engagement opportunities throughout the 2020-2021 and 2021-2022 school year targeted the following stakeholder groups: students, parents/guardians, school and district administrators, teachers, support staff, ELAC, SSC, and the parents/guardians of students with disabilities, students experiencing homelessness, students in foster care, and military-dependent students. The following are meeting dates of engagement sessions with certificated and classified staff from July through September to develop the ESSER III plan.

The Charter School engaged in meaningful consultation with individuals and/or advocates representing the interests of students with disabilities, English learners, students experiencing homelessness, students in foster care, migratory students, students who are incarcerated, military-dependent students, and other underserved students. The Charter School sent out surveys and video recordings to staff, students and families to gather input on items to meet the unique needs of their children. Information sent to parents was translated into Spanish and made available on a number of platforms including Zoom, YouTube, Facebook, Instagram, and Twitter. Surveys were sent out to families through email and text messages to ensure families were able to access the content. In addition, staff was available at the Charter School for parents that preferred to meet in-person following social distancing norms outside of the building.

The ESSER III plan was influenced by meaningful consultation with the community, reflective of a variety of perspectives and insights related to the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic. The comprehensive strategic planning utilized these perspectives and insights to determine the most effective strategies and interventions to address these needs through the programs and services the Charter School implements with ESSER III funds.

Specifically, the Charter School engaged in meaningful consultation with the following groups:

- Tribes;
- Civil rights organizations, including disability rights organizations (e.g. the American Association of People with Disabilities, the American Civil Liberties Union, National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, etc.); and
- Individuals or advocates representing the interests of children with disabilities, English learners, homeless students, foster youth, migratory students, children who are incarcerated, and other underserved students.

Feedback received formally and informally were shared with administrators, certificated staff, and classified staff. Feedback received from all stakeholders (community, staff, parents, students) was included in the ESSER III plan. - Identify/revise essential standards for each grade/course;
- Ensure all students have access to grade-level essential standards;
- Identify students who need additional support to mitigate pupil learning loss;
- Schedule additional instructional time for students experiencing pupil learning loss;
- Provide students with mental health services and supports;
- Students were provided with 10 additional school days;
- Offer students comprehensive afterschool programs;
- Ensure all students have access to summer learning or summer enrichment opportunities;
- Ensure weekly COVID-19 testing continues throughout the year;
- Class Size Reduction;
- Technology Enhancement;
- Professional development to address learning loss among students, including low-income students, students with disabilities, English learners, racial and ethnic minorities, students experiencing homelessness, and children in foster care, of the Charter School.

ESSER III Expenditure Plan Instructions

Introduction

School districts, county offices of education (COEs), or charter schools, collectively known as local educational agencies (LEAs), that receive Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) funds under the American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act, referred to as ESSER III funds, are required to develop a plan for how they will use ESSER III funds to, at a minimum, address students' academic, social, emotional, and mental health needs, as well as the opportunity gaps that existed before, and were exacerbated by, the COVID-19 pandemic.

The plan must be adopted by the local governing board or body of the LEA at a public meeting on or before October 29, 2021 and must be submitted for review and approval within five days of adoption. A school district must submit its ESSER III Expenditure Plan to its COE for review and approval; a COE must submit its plan to the California Department of Education for review and approval. A charter school must submit its plan to its chartering authority for review and to the COE of the county in which the charter school operates for review and approval.

In addition, consistent with the requirements of the ARP, Volume 86, *Federal Register*, page 21201, April 22, 2021, the ESSER III Expenditure Plan must be:

- Written in an understandable and uniform format;
- Written in a language that parents can understand, to the extent practicable;
 - If it is not practicable to provide written translations to a parent with limited English proficiency, the plan must be orally translated for parents
- Provided in an alternative format to a parent who is an individual with a disability as defined by the Americans with Disabilities Act, upon request; and
- Be made publicly available on the LEA's website.
