MESSAGE FROM SUPERVISORY UNION

As I write to you with my first report as your Superintendent, we have just begun the second half of a school year that has been unlike any we have ever experienced. The global pandemic has upended and disrupted our learning, our work, and our home lives in ways that no one could imagine two years ago! Yet, despite all of this, I can assure you that our schools are stepping up in a heroic way every day to provide the rock solid education the children of Barre have expected for generations.

You are about to read an Annual Report that will outline the celebrations and challenges our schools are experiencing now and will face in the years ahead. And there is so much to celebrate! 
SPREADING TIDE PRIDE

Tide athletes have multiple missions to not only support their teammates and win games, but also combat childhood cancer.





Madame Marineau of the World Languages Department & Mr. Crawford Stempel from the Science Department understand the value of being a global leader, so much so, they ache for the past...

In the Spring of 2020, their programming for overseas travel to either Quebec City or Costa Rica ceased due to the pandemic emerging in the United States. Like many across the nation and worldwide, individual safety and health was on the forefront of everyone's mind, so all programming for cultural immersion ceased.

This clearly was upsetting to not only them, but several French and Marine Biology students because both Madame Marineau and Mr. Crawford Stempel have a wonderful reputation of providing their students with enriching experiences, along with fostering the skills needed on how to navigate different cultures.

For Madame Marineau, her goal is "to expose and educate students" with experiential learning opportunities that enable them to practice their linguistic skills whether it be engaging in conversation in French, playing a game, reading a passage, and/or practicing conjugations. Understanding The Ballot When You Vote

BALLOT

Shall the voters of the Barre Unified Union School District approve the school board to expend \$53,254,319, which is the amount the school board has determined to be necessary for the ensuing fiscal year? It is estimated that this proposed budget, if approved, will result in education spending of \$16,252 per equalized pupil. This projected spending per equalized pupil is 5.99% higher than spending for the current year.

\$53,254,319 includes approximately \$6,000,000 of grant funding. This funding operates two elementary and middle schools, a high school, an alternative school, and a central office. This value provides economical and quality education for approximately 2,300 students.

When calculating spending per student, Vermont uses "equalized pupils" rather than an actual headcount. The formula gives less weight to pre-kindergarten pupils and extra weight to students in secondary schools, those from economically deprived backgrounds, and those whose first language is not English. The principle behind the weighting is that it costs more to educate students in certain categories.

Your educational taxes are **not** going up **5.99%**. 5.99% is the percentage increase in spending per student from FY 2022. Our expenses are only increasing by **1.95%**, but because of lower tax rates, **educational taxes** are actually going down, as you can see below.
