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Teaching and Learning Update:

Essential Action 1: Strong Leadership & Planning

Optimizing Outcomes: CFB will once again offer Optimizing Outcomes as a two-day option for staff to gain professional learning to make up for the November exchange days. The conference will be held on August 1st and 2nd of 2022. Excellent, top-named speakers have been obtained for this conference, and the line-up is as follows:

Monday, August 1st - Dr. Adam Saenz Topic: *The EQ-uipped Educator*

Tuesday, August 2nd - Jan Chappuis Topic: *7 Strategies of Assessment for Learning.*

Social Studies: As part of social studies Instructional Leverage, the Social Studies Team designed a new [checklist](#) to give specific feedback to teachers on strengths and areas for growth. Implemented during round two, the checklist provided feedback on best practices. The team attended the Texas Council for Social Studies Conference in Round Rock, bringing back new ideas for curriculum and instruction.


Science Planning: Training for 6th grade science and chemistry teachers in Argument-Driven Instruction (ADI) was to occur in January but has been rescheduled to February. ADI provides investigations or design challenges that give students a chance to learn how to use core science ideas and practices of one or more STEM disciplines to figure out how or why something happens and to develop a solution to the problem. This program gives students an authentic and meaningful context to develop disciplinary-based literacy skills as they read to obtain and evaluate information, communicate ideas and write to share what they have learned.

Special Education: The Educational Diagnosticians and Licensed Specialists in School Psychology (LSSPs) are participating in a four-part series this school year with the author of Core-Selective Evaluation Process (C-SEP), a method for identifying Specific Learning Disabilities. Dr. Ed Schultz is a wealth of knowledge as the team transitions with new TEA requirements regarding Specific Learning Disabilities (SLD) and Dyslexia identification. C-SEP is an efficient and comprehensive approach used to identify students with SLD by determining a pattern of strengths and weaknesses using the core tests of the Woodcock-Johnson (WJ) IV, Wechsler, or Kaufman Batteries with additional "selective" testing conducted as needed. Each assessment contains a "core" set of tests that provides a representative survey of abilities measured by the battery. Examiners can selectively administer additional tests to provide a greater breadth of measurement in an area of cognition or linguistic competency or in a domain of achievement.

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Elementary ELA: Principals and Assistant Principals brought student running records to the latest meeting and practiced analyzing them for strengths and next steps. They will encourage the same work with their teachers at Professional Learning Community meetings.



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Essential Action 2: Effective, Well-Supported Teachers

TAGT GiftED: Advanced Academics Specialists along with 32 ACE and IDS teachers attended Texas Association for Gifted & Talented to participate in a two-day conference discussing the challenges and needs of Advanced Learners in today's schools.

Social Studies: After the first and second rounds of Instructional Leverage observations, Social Studies Specialists developed and facilitated training around campus needs.

Elementary Science Cadres: Elementary Science Specialists have conducted two rounds of PLC's for each grade level during the Monday science cadre sessions for first semester.

Secondary Science Professional Development Sessions: Professional development was conducted with all high school biology teachers to show them how to implement MAP testing and then analyze results.

Support for Bilingual/ESL Certification: The Bilingual/ESL Department continued to offer Bilingual and ESL certification preparation classes including covering substitutes and reimbursement for test fees.

Support for Teachers of Emergent Bilinguals:

As part of Project Success, in collaboration with UNT, the Bilingual/ESL Department offered professional development to teachers of emergent bilingual students. Third through fifth-grade teachers attended professional development to learn more about bridging languages. The 5th and 6th grade content teachers participated in professional development on Sheltered Instruction.




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Amplio for Dyslexia Intervention: The Dyslexia Interventionists (formerly Instructional Facilitators) spent time learning how to use the Amplio platform in order to make their lessons interactive for students in the classroom and for students who access lessons remotely. In addition, the Amplio platform provides access to the resources of the Multisensory Teaching Approach (MTA) program so that they are readily available to teachers and students. Another feature of the Amplio platform is its ability to monitor the progress of students, making the data easily accessible to teachers.

Support for Dyslexia Teachers: During the month of November, Nancy Disterlic, Region 10 Dyslexia Consultant, challenged the Dyslexia Interventionists to use their knowledge and expertise to enhance their instruction. With the growing body of research about dyslexia, Nancy shared resources that will strengthen the knowledge and skills of the teachers so that they can do a more effective job of knowing students by name and by need. More importantly, Nancy focused on how to help struggling readers not only learn how to read but also to enjoy reading, one of the life skills that support all content areas.

Texas Reading Academies: All of CFBISD's participating educators are over halfway through the Texas Reading Academies modules! The Reading Academies have two major artifacts that educators must complete and the first one was completed in December. For this artifact, educators created a video that demonstrated how to directly teach, model, and provide guided practice for phonological awareness skills (in English or Spanish).



Assessment & Accountability - Utilizing Eduphoria Aware for Short Cycle Assessment: The Assessment Team visited Carrollton Elementary and Thompson Elementary on the January 4th in-service day to provide training and direction on how to effectively utilize Eduphoria Aware as a short cycle assessment tool. These training sessions align with previously ongoing efforts and training that focus on building teacher capacity around using data to drive instruction as well as preparing students for online testing.

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Support for TELPAS Coordinators:

Campus TELPAS Coordinators received required annual training. They learned about the new testing platform and updates for the upcoming TELPAS testing window.

Make It Happen: CFB Content Coaches/Specialists and Digital Literacy Specialists participated in a two-day training with Chris Jakicic, one of the authors of *Make It Happen: Coaching Collaborative Teams in a PLC* in December. The training focused on how these individuals can best support Professional Learning Communities on each campus. Participants had opportunities to work with others to determine how to move from working with individual teachers to working with collaborative teams. The session also centered around how to help teams focus on the four guiding questions of a PLC. These questions are:

What do we want students to know and be able to do?

How will we know when they know it?

What will we do if they didn't learn it?

What will we do if they already know it?

Essential Action 3: Positive Culture

Social Studies: The Social Studies Team delivered a much-appreciated thank you to secondary social studies teachers in the district.



Secondary Dual Language and ESL: The Bilingual/ESL Department delivered a small token of appreciation to the teachers by sending additional assistance out to help with newcomers. The support worked with these newcomers to ensure they were enrolled in the appropriate courses.

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Partnership with Latino Families: As part of Project Success, in collaboration with UNT, McLaughlin-Strickland and Blanton Elementary teachers spent a day preparing for the implementation of the Latino Literacy Night. CFB teachers will work also with UNT pre-service teachers on how to build lasting relationships with parents around relevant Latino literature.




Campus Spelling Bees: Seventeen elementary and middle school campuses submitted the names of their spelling bee champions so that they can compete in the district spelling bee. This year's competition will use the Scripps Online Testing Platform. The top four spellers will advance to the Dallas County Spelling Bee, which will include spelling and vocabulary words administered on the Scripps Online Testing Platform.

Essential Action 4: High-Quality Curriculum

Social Studies: After collaborating with colleagues on Region 10's Ethnic Studies Cohort, the Social Studies Team is organizing the first cohort of district teachers to develop CFB's African American Studies and Mexican American Studies courses.

Social Studies - Elementary: Elementary Specialist Daniel Derasaugh is designing a Mobile Museum curriculum. The Civil War Banner Series will bring primary sources into the classroom in a tangible and engaging lesson. Photography, soldiers' letters, and other physical artifacts are presented in a way that transforms a classroom into a Civil War museum where students will, using the provided activity guide, move from station to station reading and analyzing primary sources displayed on four banners, and accompanying artifacts from Civil War battlefields. Teachers will have the option to check out these museum sets as an alternative to the lesson covering the Civil War for a more hands-on, active learning experience.

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Pre-Kindergarten Curriculum: Pre-Kindergarten teachers are diving into the newly adopted curriculum resource: *Three Cheers for Pre-K/Uno, dos, tres: ¡PreKínder!* This new curriculum resource facilitates skills-based experiences and purposeful play structured around high-quality children's literature.



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Essential Action 5: Effective Instruction

Social Studies: The Social Studies Department continued with the second round of Instructional Leverage observations. Focusing on campus selected [disciplinary literacy goals](#) and best practices in the social studies classroom, campus leaders and district administrators saw growth and improved classroom practices since the beginning of the school year.

Science Support: The Science Team has been supporting new science teachers at all grade levels. The new 5th-grade science teachers have been able to attend two full-day training sessions to help them to prepare for the upcoming units of study.

Math Mondays: Kindergarten through 5th-grade math teachers were invited to participate in various Math Mondays during the second nine weeks of school. Grades 3-5 focused on unpacking essential standards for their grade level to ensure student success on district assessments. Grades K-2 studied the Number Corner curriculum and collaborated on how to best support learners each day with a spiral review of key concepts.

McCoy LEAP: Elementary LEAP teachers met with trainers from the Smithsonian to receive training and write a curriculum to support elementary LEAP students.

Elementary ELA: Teachers were encouraged to share their expertise with their colleagues at the latest first-grade LA Monday. The goal is to build capacity in our teachers!

Assessment & Accountability - Progress

Monitoring: The Assessment Team collaborated with Field Middle School as work focused on monitoring campus and student progress towards the Campus Improvement Plan goals. During this time, administrators and teachers collaborated to evaluate their goals and monitored current progress towards achieving these goals. Each grade and content area evaluated and compared student performance on STAAR, NWEA MAP, and DCFA (District Common Formative Assessments).



Secondary Math: The Secondary Math Team delivered training to 6th grade through Algebra I teachers during the second quarter. The first training was followed with small group instruction where teachers practiced the task they designed with their teams. This included practice on how to question and group students. These sessions were recorded for teachers who could not make the training. Teachers have access to all of the videos and resources that were used. In addition, the specialists have been meeting with their teams as well as working with teachers on their goals for their students.

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Update from Athletics:

November started off with a playoff run by the Creekview Mustangs football team as they competed in the Bi-District Round of the State Football Playoffs against Wichita Falls Riders. The 'Stangs gave it a great fight, however, ended their playoff appearance as Bi-District Finalist. This is the first time in seven years that this football team has made the playoffs!




In swimming, the Creekview swimmers have been breaking records all over the Metroplex. During the December TISCA Invitational, Creekview became the 2021 TISCA Champions for the boys. Anthony Paculba has been leading the team with breaking records all season and will go back to State Swim Meet in February to compete for the gold a second time. 


She placed very high in the first violin section, which means she has an excellent chance to lead the section after the re-chair audition. 

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Career & Technology Education (CTE) Update:

Creekview Mock Trial Results:

Creekview Mock Trial competed in the Region 10 Tournament, which is the qualifying event for the Dallas Bar Association's Texas Mock Trial State Tournament in March. The State champion will then go on to Nationals which is hosted by the Michigan Bar Association this year.

The team advanced to single-elimination rounds, which will take place in February. Additionally, Shemaiah Dejorge qualified for Top Advocate and Sophina Boychenko qualified for Top Witness.



This year's case is a civil case involving a dispute between an art museum and its insurer over the theft of a Rothko painting. Creekview is represented by attorneys Brandon Fantine, Shemaiah Dejorge, and Emma Hill; witnesses Danae Anderson, Sungjae "Brian" Kang, Leslie Plata, and Sophina Boychenko; paralegal Nicholas Pesqueda; and courtroom artist Alessia Chavez. We are still awaiting the results of the courtroom artist competition, but Alessia produced a phenomenal submission this year (see below). The courtroom artist competition takes place in real time during a single Mock Trial round and competitors may only submit what they are able to produce during that round. The competition is judged separately from Mock Trial.



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High School Planning Parent Nights:



The CTE and Counseling Team's met with 8th grade parents at all CFBISD middle schools to prepare students, and their families, for their transition to high school. The presentation focused on the personal graduation plan (PGP) process, how the choices that students make now affect their four-year planning process in the future, as well as the CTE programs of study and the opportunities within those pathways. The presentation also showcased the other Programs of Choice that CFBISD offers, including Athletics, Fine Arts, World Languages and AVID.




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Heartwarming News from AVID Classrooms:



Grounds Department:



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


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Additionally, our team striped a new running track at DeWitt Perry Middle School for our students! This track goes around their temporary portables while their brand-new campus is being built.



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Update for the Technology Department:

Digital Learning Department:

The Digital Learning Team and Library Services have teamed up to expand digital citizenship exposure to teachers, students, and parents. In addition to librarians reviewing digital citizenship lessons with their classes, they are also working to get every school in the district Common Sense Media Certifications. The group is also sending monthly ParentSquare tips for families, building a website and developing parent education sessions for PTA meetings or other family events.

The Digital Learning Team held a #gratitudesnaps social media challenge in November before Thanksgiving break.



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The Digital Learning Team held a #12DaysOfHolidayHacks challenge for teachers in December. Each day, they posted technology integration tips for teachers to try in their classrooms. Awards were given to teachers who posted on Twitter or Instagram evidence of using the day's tip. The Digital Learning Team and K-12 Coding Coordinator are in the middle of the International Hour of Code. The team built a site of teacher resources, and activities for students, and parents to complete one hour of coding between Dec. 5, 2021 and Feb. 22, 2022. 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Technology Services Team:

Network upgrades complete at Davis, Kent, Blair, Service Center, Central, Ranchview, Landry, Carrollton, McLaughlin-Strickland, Early College, La Villita, Freeman, and Blanton. Riverchase and Thompson are being completed the week of Jan 24th to close out Q2.

Incident IQ - Team continues to work diligently to stand up new Service Management and Asset Management System.

Construction - continue to ensure Technology is at the forefront of CFBISD construction schools.

Interstate 35 construction - this will affect our district-owned fiber. The fiber will need to be moved at I-35 and Valley View, as well as I-35 and Valwood. Working with TxDOT and district legal counsel on the contract. Fulcrum will be contracted to work on behalf of CFBISD to facilitate the fiber move, the cost of which will be reimbursed by TxDOT.

Enterprise Systems Team:

Student Information worked through PEIMS Fall Submission and Resubmission timelines contacting various departments across the district including Finance, Special Education, Student Nutrition, and campus level administration for review of data elements submitted to the State. Final Submission and Resubmission were completed on time and “Fatal Free”. Notes were taken throughout both timelines to remind the team of areas of improvement for next year and will be threshed out in an upcoming meeting.

Closing out the fall semester for campuses included attendance and grade reviews, moving grades to transcripts, and calculating GPA/Rank for the secondary schools. All campuses had completed the process by January 24 - an improvement from last year by almost two full weeks.

Processes for Online Registration and timelines for the Signature Programs and Programs of Study were planned and discussed interdepartmentally including Student Information, Student Services, Counseling, CTE, and Communications. Plans are underway for updating the forms and documents used in Online Registration. Program of Study selection for rising 9th-grade students is live on the web with updated selection counts sent weekly to CTE and Counseling departments. Other Signature Programs are in queue to be opened in the coming weeks.

Work with CCMR and Counseling departments toward seamless course selection through Xello and/or TEAMS continues.

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Initial New Year Rollover processes have begun. The District Course Catalog was updated by the end of January to include new CTE and Language courses for 2023 as well as the removal of courses no longer in use. Campus Calendars for each campus are being created and steps to set up student self-scheduling and master scheduling are next on the action items list.

Collaboration with Assessment & Accountability is ongoing. New reports and tables have been created to generate necessary data for decision-making around TIA as well as assessment registrations.

<p>Parent Responsibilities During a School Emergency and Reunification After a School Emergency</p> <p>In a school emergency, the first instinct as a parent is to pick up the telephone and start calling the school or to rush up to the school and get your child/children. The truth is, this only complicates matters from a safety and security standpoint.</p> <p>Parents too close to an incident often hinder the rescue attempts of first responders on the scene. The best action parents can take in an emergency is to stay close to their phone/text and to monitor the district website for regular updates.</p> <p>How can you help?</p> <p>Ensure that your child's emergency contact information is accurate and current. The district primarily uses ParentSquare for immediate emergency notifications to parents. The district may also use the district website, phone calls and social media to notify parents. Become familiar with your school's emergency communication procedures. Each school is committed to providing accurate and timely information in the event of an emergency.</p>	<p>In Case of a School Emergency</p> <p>Although your first reaction might be to call or rush to your child's school, please follow the tips listed below:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ✔ DO monitor the district website and your phone for ParentSquare alerts. ✔ DO limit only official communication from school or public safety officials. ✔ DO monitor for information regarding reunification with your child. ✘ DO NOT rush to your child's school. Your presence could interfere with emergency responders. ✘ DO NOT call your child or school. Staff and students are discouraged from using cell phones until they are safe.

District Acquired Navigate 360 Products:

The first is the Emergency Management Suite, which unifies existing plans and system into a comprehensive safety technology with a holistic and reliable system to manage safety and security compliance along with emergency operations plans with enhanced efficiency and connectivity. The second platform is the Behavioral Threat Assessment and Student Case Manager that serves as a state-of-the-art database and resource collaborative for maximizing the efficiency of mental, behavioral, and crisis counseling services including all District Behavioral Threat Assessments.

McLaughlin-Strickland ES Crosswalk Safety:

The CFBISD Safety & Security Department is collaboratively working with the Farmers Branch Transportation Division to address the safety concern of the crosswalk on Fyke Street and support their respective implantations of any other preventative traffic measures to ensure the safety of McLoughlin-Strickland students. The City of Farmers Branch anticipates the installation of a new light pole in the area in an effort to illuminate the area for both pedestrians and drivers.

Twelve staff members were certified in CPR, AED, First Aid and Stop the Bleed.



CFBISD Families and Staff,

It has been great to see students and staff back in person after the winter break. With the ever evolving situation regarding COVID-19, we wanted to give you an update. As you may be aware, CFBISD, along with most school districts in the state and nation, is experiencing a spike in positive COVID-19 cases reported daily as the highly transmissible Omicron variant has rapidly spread. With this increase in cases, the normal school day may be affected.

Per health guidelines, elementary classes or grade levels must be quarantined for 10 days when 15% of the students/staff test positive for the Coronavirus. Secondary campuses will follow the recommendation from Dallas County Health and Human Services and Denton County Public Health when it comes to closures. Secondary campus quarantines are based on varying factors and not a percentage. At this time, there are not any plans for school-wide or district-wide closures.

Additionally, the challenge with keeping schools open is having enough staff members to cover all classrooms and bus routes safely. Principals, teachers, and staff are doing everything they can to find coverage, but it is possible that students and families will be impacted by a shortage of bus drivers, teachers and substitutes. We will communicate that information with those impacted as soon as possible when the situation arises.

We are asking for your continued support to self-check your student each day and to keep your student home from school if they are sick or exhibiting signs of COVID-19. While we are still operating under the Governor's Order and cannot require masks, we do strongly encourage the use of masks by students, staff, and visitors within district facilities. Please know our number one goal is safety and to keep our schools open for in-person learning.

Please be assured that CFBISD will continue to follow Dallas County Health and Human Services, Denton County Public Health, and state guidelines. CFBISD also maintains daily protocols for the vigilant mitigation of COVID-19 through cleaning, sanitizing and disinfecting our facilities and buses. We remain committed to ensuring the health, safety, and well-being of our children and staff. We will continue to monitor the evolving pandemic and keep you updated and informed of any changes.

Dear CFB Families,

CFBISD is committed to providing a safe and secure learning environment for our students. Please take time to review and become familiar with the following safety terms and procedures. In the event of an emergency at your child's school, it is important to know these terms.

Thank you for partnering with our schools as we work together to ensure a culture of safety, security, and emergency preparedness in our district. For more information visit <https://www.cfbisd.edu/departments/safety-and-security>.



A school crisis can take on a number of forms including an environmental event, such as a chemical spill or gas leak; a weather emergency, such as a tornado warning; or an intruder in or near the school. The nature of a school crisis dictates whether school officials will put in place a secure, lockdown, shelter, evacuation or any combination of these protocols, as a means to ensure the safety and well-being of students and staff.

Safety Terms and Procedures In the event of an emergency at your child's school, it is important to know these terms:

-  **SECURE "Get Inside. Lock Outside Doors."**
This occurs when there is criminal activity in the community or an unsafe situation outside of the school. Staff will secure the exterior doors and monitor the situation, preventing any unauthorized visitors into the school. Students will continue with school activities and will not be permitted outside until the all-clear announcement is made.
-  **LOCKDOWN "Locks, Lights, Out of Sight"**
A lockdown takes place if an internal threat is identified at the school. All school doors are locked, and students are confined to classrooms. No entry into or exit from the school will be allowed until an all-clear announcement is made. For their safety, students will NOT be released during a lockdown.
-  **EVACUATE "To _____"**
In the event of certain building emergencies, students will be relocated to an evacuation assembly area.
-  **SHELTER "For a Hazard Using a Safety Strategy"**
Students take shelter in designated areas to protect themselves from hazardous materials or severe weather.
-  **REUNIFICATION**
The district will follow established procedures when releasing students to any parent/guardian. Students will only be released to a parent/guardian who presents a valid government issued photo identification.

How will I be reunited with my child?

Parents and/or guardians will be directed by school or public officials to their child's specific location via the district website or ParentSquare alerts. Students will be released ONLY to parents and/or guardians who are documented as emergency contacts and who present a valid government issued picture ID. The reunification process can be time-consuming so parents are urged to be patient.



CFBISD Educational Foundation Innovative Grants:





Customer Service Tip of the Month:

November



There are times in providing customer service where we are expected to solve a problem that's beyond our control. Here are six steps to get through these challenges with customers and co-workers.

1. Stay calm. Don't take the situation personally—focus on solving the problem and put your feelings aside.
2. Listen with intent to understand.
3. Repeat the concerns and acknowledge negative emotions before they escalate.
4. Show understanding, even apologize about the situation; For example, "I am sorry this hasn't been resolved. I would be frustrated too."
5. Offer a solution and provide an explanation.
6. Follow up to be sure the relationship and the situation is repaired.

Recover exceptional service by repairing and retaining relationships. The heart of service recovery is to pursue the reconciliation of the relationship, not just the resolution of the issue.

Poor service will occasionally happen, even when we strive for perfect service delivery. Human beings are not perfect, and we will make mistakes. One small mistake could lead to a more significant issue.

So what now? Consider the following:

- Service recovery is about salvaging a potentially damaged relationship, which means we must honestly believe that the person is more important than the issue itself.
- Imagine what service recovery would look like if everyone approached service issues and processes with the following statement: "It's not our fault, but it IS our problem."

Remember: Most people care more about how they are treated than about the outcome itself.

"Most of us spend our days looking forward to those rare moments when everything goes right. Imagine how much leverage you would have if you spend your time maximizing those common moments when it doesn't."

- Discounted Advanced Placement, SAT, and ACT test fees, and free college application fees

Impact on our community



School accountability ratings can have a significant impact on home prices in our community. Therefore it is important for our families to understand that a school may receive a lower rating because economically disadvantaged students were not considered properly in test results which could affect the entire neighborhood.

As you can see, the benefits of free and reduced qualification do not only apply to receiving school meals free or at a reduced rate, but provide many other discounts and benefits to our families and to the District overall.

It is important that every family is aware of these benefits and encourage other families to apply for the benefits that they may be eligible to receive.

• Discounted ONRamps UT College credit sources

• Qualifying for free or reduced meals in 2021-2022 will ensure 30 days (or until a new eligibility is determined) of free or reduced meals at the beginning of 2022-2023 when meals are no longer free to all

Impact on CFBISD:

1. The District receives 20% more funding per student that qualifies for free and reduced status. Increasing our percentage can add millions in state revenue to the District.
2. The District can take advantage of more grant opportunities based on these counts.
3. The District's ratings for accountability, fiscal effectiveness and other measures are impacted by our percentage of free and reduced students.
4. The District realizes higher reimbursement rates for federal technology subsidies.
5. General fund money used in the past to cover cafeteria balances can be used elsewhere.





Enrollment Marketing Timeline:





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CFBISD Parent Education Videos Online:

The CFBISD Parent Education Department's Betsy McKinney gathers input from parents and staff in interdepartmental, PTA, and other committees and meetings to determine topics for videos to create and share online in both English and Spanish. In November, Ms. McKinney filmed at Blanton Elementary to share how parents can help their children learn responsibility through making choices. On October 8th, the Parent Education Department held English and Spanish Facebook Live sessions sharing tips for dealing with anxiety, featuring Employee Assistance Specialist Tina Smith in English and Elementary Counselor Christy Fox in Spanish. During Red Ribbon Week, Monica Belen, CFBISD's new Substance Use Counselor, presented a Facebook Live session for parents' drug awareness, and our community partner, Safety Net, presented in Spanish.



Parent Education worked with our Special Education Department to explain the transition from high school to postsecondary, for parents of students served by special education. The video is currently being edited and will be posted on the CFBISD Parent Education page soon.

On March 4th, Parent Education will work with team members in occupational therapy in CFBISD to film tips on early childhood motor skills, so that parents will understand how working on pencil grip and other school readiness skills can be supported at home. On March 7th, we will interview CFBISD's Director of Elementary Math, Whitney Hartman, to showcase early childhood math skills parents can support at home. Both videos will be sent to principals to share with families directly in time for kindergarten roundup activities and will post later to the CFBISD Parent Education webpage.

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Mental Health Update:

CFB's Employee Assistance Specialist arranged special visits to several elementary campuses with Pet Partners. Pet Partners was formed based on research which indicates that the human-animal bond is a mutually beneficial and dynamic relationship, positively influencing the well-being of both. Community volunteers enjoyed visiting campuses and sharing their precious pets with our eager students and staff



Here is what one principal shared following their Pet Partners visit for staff members:

“As soon as our staff knew we had dogs coming for a visit, they got excited and were watching the doors for their arrival. Teachers reported the time spent with our furry friends made them smile and helped to reduce stress as they prepared for students. It was also nice to have groups of teachers sharing pictures and stories about their own furry friends as they loved on the dogs. They want them to come back again!”

Counseling Department Update:

Building Connections:

The CCMR Team is focusing on how to build more relevant connections between students and parents to the college, career, and military readiness information they receive. Building those connections to help our students graduate more prepared for postsecondary success requires a tremendous amount of information to be shared between CFB staff, IHE partners, students, and parents.

For our youngest students, postsecondary education can be hard to connect and visualize. Bulletin boards displaying where campus staff attended college have started popping up at elementary campuses to help students make a personal and geographic connection to higher education.

For our secondary students, there has been a wide range of changes to postsecondary admissions policies over the last few years that can be difficult to navigate. Working directly with IHE partners to understand the latest policy updates is critical to making sure that students receive the most up-to-date guidance possible.

For our parents, it can be an exciting time for both their graduating students and for them. We are thrilled to be able to help interested parents complete applications for the Parent Promise, an extension of the Dallas County Promise that provides the opportunity for parents of graduating students from Promise campuses to receive tuition coverage at Dallas College to earn credentials in specific high-demand fields and broaden their career options.



CFBSD has one of the highest beginning teacher salaries in Dallas and Denton counties.



Increases District Contribution for TIS Health Insurance Premium

For 2021-22, CFBSD increased the district's contribution for employee TIS monthly health insurance premium from \$275 to \$300.



COVID-19 Sick Leave

For 2021-22, the School Board approved modification of guidelines to permit COVID-19 leave using the sick leave bank for CFB employees retroactive to July 1, 2020.



Teacher Incentive Allowance (TIA)

CFBSD has been placed for consideration in Cohort 2 for TIA funded by the State of Texas for eligible teachers to receive supplemental pay based on teacher performance and effectiveness.



2% Raise for Employees in 2021-22

For 2021-22, the School Board approved a 2% raise for employees at the June School Board meeting.



Increased Stipends

For 2021-22, CFBSD increased annual stipends including an increase for bilingual teachers from \$4,000 to \$4,500.



Technology Support

The district purchased new technology equipment for teachers and students such as Promethean Boards, ViewSonic Viewboards, headsets, document cameras, laptops, and more.



Employee Child Care Center

CFBSD offers the CFBSD Development Academy, a diploma, for CFBSD employed children only. The Academy provides each child with age appropriate activities and learning experiences.




Human Resources received a grant from the CFBISD Education Foundation in January. Needless to say, we were pleased to see administrators, Board members, as well as Foundation Board members deliver the news personally. We are excited to begin implementing the grant to assist our current teachers in obtaining a special education certification. For selected personnel, the grant will pay for the successful passing of the special education test for endorsement as well as the cost to have the endorsement placed on the educator's certificate.



Additionally, Dr. Davis presented to HR folks on employee retention, outlining efforts CFBISD is making in reducing our turnover amidst the “Great Resignation”. Having the opportunity to present to colleagues from around the country not only solidifies our relationships as HR professionals, but also gives us a glimpse into the pains in other states.

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What is Your Story? Is your story consistent with facts, or conjectures? Mr. Jerry Martinez and Dr. Randy Davis presented at a national American Association of Personnel Administrators Boot Camp in January on having crucial conversations. The presentation room was packed and the content was well-received by the HR administrators in attendance. This presentation will be replicated within our district for administrators in the near future. While the topic of conversations is understood by most all who engage in them, we often fail to obtain the facts and deliver the facts in a comprehensible manner. The presentation is an introduction to *Crucial Conversations*, by Patterson, et.al.



HR is in its final phase of the rollout of the new applicant tracking system. Our intent is to provide our candidates with a user experience one would expect from the top school district in the DFW metroplex. The experience will be more familiar to the candidates and provide a seamless process for completing the initial application for employment. Phase 2 for the department is to integrate our required forms into the software, allowing candidates to complete the “busy work” of filling out required forms at home, while allowing our department to monitor progress in real time and nudge those who delay the processes. Directors Martha Werner and Gail Prince, along with Coordinator Paige Acevedo have been working with our staff and Frontline staff to create the processes.

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Purchasing Department Update:

Free and Reduced Lunch Application Drawings:

As a continuing effort to maximize revenue, CFBISD launched a campaign to provide incentives for families that qualify to participate in the free and reduced lunch program to apply. Each student whose family applies was eligible to participate in a drawing for one of three grand prizes. Additionally, one student from each campus was selected to win a bicycle. Prizes were purchased through the Purchasing Department and made available to the winners. The three Grand prizes included: Sony PlayStation 5 Bundle Gaming system, a Samsung 65" QLED flat screen TV and a stainless steel four burner Monument grill.



The Purchasing and Distribution Center staff delivered the grand prizes to the recipients prior to the Christmas break. Winners of the bicycles were awarded a certificate to present to the Walmart on Trinity Mills Road to claim their bike. In 2020-2021 the District received 5,065 free and reduced lunch applications, while in 2021-2022, 6,304 were received, which is an increase of 1,243 applications!

While it is not determined the impact on the number of applications had on the free and reduced lunch program, needless to say, there were a lot of happy students and families that benefited from these prizes.



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Texas Political Subdivision Cooperative Advisory Board:

CFBISD Director of Purchasing, Gary Kerbow, was asked to serve on the Board of a new Purchasing Cooperative created to provide an additional automobile insurance cooperative. The purpose of the cooperative is to introduce a large pool of government entities to generate more competitive auto insurance rates. The lead agency for this cooperative is the Texas Political Subdivision (TPS), and the awarded insurance underwrites is Liberty Mutual Insurance. This is the third year CFBISD has participated in this cooperative and the first year an advisory Board has been created to oversee the actions of this cooperative.



Purchasing Operation:

Improvements continue to be made to the Distribution Center operation. In addition to procedural changes, under the leadership of Supervisor, Alixx Johnson-Hubbard, a complete review and reduction of aging inventory is underway. Inventory levels continue to be reviewed and managed based on actual usage and district forecasted needs. Many items have been declared obsolete and stock levels reduced to make room for new inventory items and surplus furniture, equipment and other items. Additionally, the Distribution Center is home to many of our textbooks and instructional materials currently in adoption.

Facility improvements to the Distribution Center include replacement of outdated lighting for LED energy efficient lighting. With much improved lighting, labels are easily read, resulting in fewer errors in order fulfillment.

Along with the lighting improvements, upgrades to the two-decades old overhead doors have been made in order to provide a safer and better operation. This allows drivers and warehouse workers to open the doors remotely without having to utilize the old chain driven system, creating a much safer working environment.

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Finally, the aging rack system for many of the bulk inventory items continues to deteriorate over time, therefore, a systematic process of replacing failing racks with newer ones is underway. Ten racks, which allows for a total of 1,200 square feet, up to three levels of vertical storage, create an efficient way to store bulk items, such as paper towels, trash bags, and copy paper, making it accessible with any of the fleet of forklifts or pallet jacks in use in the Distribution Center. Additionally, pallet racks were fortified with steel mesh shelving which makes the rack systems more stable and able to increase the total weight from 3,200 lbs. to 5,600 lbs. The plan is to eventually replace all bulk racks in the Distribution Center with newer racks as funds allow.


While more improvements are in the planning stages, these changes are a good start to a leaner Distribution Center operation!

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Student Nutrition Update:

Free Meals for All Students in 2021-2022:

CFBISD Student Nutrition Services is utilizing a Seamless Summer Option waiver to feed all students at no charge in school year 2021-2022. It is the department's goal to ensure that all CFBISD students have access to nutritious meals during the school day. Eliminating the cost of meals makes them more accessible to all students regardless of their socioeconomic status. Participation has trended upward throughout the fall semester. Student meal participation has more than doubled from last year at this time. From August 2021 through December 2021, CFB students have enjoyed 343,280 breakfast meals, 1,273,687 lunch meals, and 75,950 snacks.



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Overcoming Pandemic-Related Obstacles:

CFBISD Student Nutrition Services has struggled with many pandemic-related challenges including but not limited to supply chain disruptions and labor shortages. At this time, 68 of the 240 departmental positions are vacant. Despite these challenges, the cafeteria staff members at all 34 campuses have worked hard to find creative ways to continue to provide more than 1.6 million meals to CFBISD students in the fall semester. On average, the remaining 172 staff members produce 4,113 breakfast meals, 15,158 lunch meals, and 892 snacks per day. This means that employees are producing 15.7 meals per labor hour worked.



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Business Support Services Update:

Superior Rating: Schools FIRST (Financial Integrity Rating System of Texas) Accountability rating system is designed to encourage Texas public schools to manage their financial resources better to provide the maximum allocation possible for direct instructional purposes. This report creates transparency and discloses the quality of the management and decision-making processes of school districts when it involves resources.

Carrollton-Farmers Branch ISD annually prepares and distributes an annual financial management report, and a public hearing is also provided for community comment on the report. This is a very rigorous process and to achieve a superior rating is difficult. Proudly, CFBISD has achieved the rating of “Superior” scoring a perfect 100 for 20 consecutive years.
