Q: You have told students that you have traveled across the country extensively. Why did you travel to 49 out of the 50 states?

A: The U.S. is such a vast and diverse country, I have always enjoyed traveling and seeing what life is like in each state. There are so many amazing landscapes and biomes you can visit. The U.S. National Park system is also a great treasure to the public. Most of the states I have visited on road trips. In 2015 I lived out of a Jeep for a winter skiing out west and in Canada. In 2018 I spent the summer living out of my truck and surfing in the Pacific Northwest. Alaska is the only state I have not visited, but I have plans to journey there in the near future.

Background information about Paige - Paige Bueckers was born on the 20th of October in 2001 in Edina, Minnesota. Paige is currently 20 years old. Bob Bueckers is the father of Paige who use to be a point guard just like his daughter Paige. Her Mother Amy Bueckers was into sports as well, she competed in track and field. Since childhood, Paige was very athletic and played baseball and soccer. She started playing basketball because she was inspired by her father. Her dad, Bob was the one who coached her till she was in seventh grade.

About Paige's Big Injury Paige went down with a non-contact knee injury. This kind of injury is when you put too much force on your ACL joint on your knee. This injury occurred on Sunday, December 5th, 2021 against Notre Dame. She went to make a move and her knee just buckled underneath her while playing. UConn is saying the recovery should take about 6-8 weeks. The head coach Geno Auriemma said he was more concerned with what's best for Paige long-term rather than how fast she can get back to playing with the team. Here is a quote from the head coach. "Obviously, we're all extremely disappointed for Paige and that she suffered this injury, We've had players get injured in the past and my philosophy here is, I'm not interested in how fast we can get someone back; I'm interested in what's best for her long term."

The 2022 Beijing Winter Olympics are almost here! Almost everyone is hoping for their country to win. However, there is one thing that might be stopping the Winter Olympics, the boycotts. The U.S, Australia, the U.K and Canada are partaking in a diplomatic boycott. A diplomatic boycott is defined as when only government officials are restricted from going to the Olympics, so the athletes have a choice in whether they want to participate in the events or not.

This brings us to the question at hand: Why are they boycotting the 2022 Beijing Winter Olympics? The main reason is due to their host, Beijing. Beijing has been accused for "genocide and crimes against humanity," as White House Press Secretary Jen Psaki states. In fact, they're doing something that's similar to what Hitler did in the 1940's. Genocide means the destruction of an entire ethnic group. In this case, the ethnic group is the Uyghurs. By participating in the Beijing Olympics, we could be turning a blind eye to the abuse that Beijing has taken part in. On the contrary, this could weaken our alliance with China, and since the U.S is one of its biggest consumers, this could take a toll on the economy. Not to mention, China has made a statement saying that the U.S will "pay a price" for not attending the Winter Olympics.

I interviewed a friend of mine. Maria Bueno, who is a member of the debate team at MMS and is also participating in a debate tournament on Saturday. She believes it was a good idea to boycott the Winter Olympics. "In making this decision, it shows that the US doesn't support the genocide and human rights issues in China. If we as a country do not stand against these problems, it could result in worse conflicts." She states a good point; strengthening our alliance with China by going to the Winter Olympics could worsen our alliance with other countries. I also asked her if she thinks that boycotting the Olympics is a good approach to the situation. She said yes, arguing that it would make a bigger impact the more countries participate. because now that Canada, Australia, and Britain have joined the US in a diplomatic boycott, we can make a major impact." The more countries who partake in the boycott, the more the impact we will see.

There have been boycotts against the Olympic games before. This includes the boycott against Russia for the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan. China even participated in the boycott, but now four decades later, they are the subject of an olympic boycott movement. Let's just say China is not taking this well and has been criticizing us for politicizing sports. But with all the recent accusations, it's hard not to take politics into account. After all, what kind of message would other countries be sending if they ignored China's brazen disregard for human rights. Let's not forget just a few months ago when tennis star Peng Shuai made an assault allegation against a politician then mysteriously went missing, only to reappear when her disappearance became heavily publicized. This in turn The Women's Tennis Association decided to suspend all tournaments in China, due to their suspicion that Ms. Shuai was being silenced.

In conclusion, China isn't doing much to clear their name. They aren't taking these boycotts as a way to change their ways, they just appear to be really frustrated. However, that isn't doing any good for them.

As we drove through the villages I looked out at the hundreds of houses speckled along the Antiguan hillside, each and everyone of them a different color. There were roofs made of tin, concrete slabs, and scrap wood shingles. Men, women, and children sat outside soaking in the morning sun and enjoying their winter break. As we passed the local school I could see the teacher setting up her classroom and brushing away the fallen leaves in the school courtyard. Large churches made of concrete and stone, one even being pink, were scattered all over the village of Liberta. Small shacks of fresh fruit and vegetables aka supermarkets were on every road filled with the finest Caribbean produce. This was Antigua. The land of sun, sea, and sand.

Pink Panther Safari Tour

We started out our trip with a jeep tour, the Pink Panther Safari, to serve as a somewhat introduction to the island and its culture. Our tour guide, a local on the island, taught us about the culture and lifestyle of the native Antiguans. They prioritized school and discipline which led to an extremely low crime rate. She also talked about the amount of pride and value the people have in everyday things, such as a banana or leaf from a tree as I later learned.

My sister attracted a coughing cold (NOT COVID) a few days before we left and our guide even noticed that she was coughing a bit. She told us about how her grandmother and her grandmother's grandmother had taught her the local healing techniques as a child and she was kind enough to share them with us. She pulled small yellow berries and leaves off a tree and gave them to us. She said they would heal her cough and release all bad energies and sicknesses from the body. They tasted of a sweet ginger with a small pit in the center.



She brought us to Gallion Beach, a stunning beach with crystal clear water and perfect snorkeling conditions and reefs. Devils bridge, a historic rock structure looking out into the Atlantic with haunting history regarding the islands past filled with slavery. She also took us to Shirley Heights, a look out 400 feet in the air overlooking the island and our next stop, Nelson's Dockyard. There were colorful fish and eels swimming around us and through the wreck. We even managed to spot a baby speckled eagle ray, a rare marine creature on the island. Overall, this trip was a very enjoyable and memory making experience and there are no words to express the amount of fun I had that day.

Rainforest Ziplining

For our second to last excursion, we took a trip on Fig Tree Drive, into the Antiguan Rainforests. The lush foliage and vibrant colored flowers attacked us as we drove through the inner island. We finally arrived at the excursion and while I was quite excited, I was scared for my life. We checked in and began trekking up to the first zipline point. 30 feet in the air and 30 feet long, we went flying through the rainforest at unimaginable speeds. However, the moment I feared was soon to arrive.

The highest and longest zipline on the course. 350 feet in the air with a zipline that sagged down at the bottom and pulled you up at the top, that is *if you are heavy enough*. I was behind about 4 kids my age, height, and what looked to be weight. As each of them jumped off the platform, I watched as one by one every single one of them got stuck.

As we drove, our taxi driver offered the rest of his breakfast to us, three antiguan bananas. Of course my mom, my sister, my brother, and I had to indulge in the local produce. The bananas were small and fat with greenish colored skin, similar to a plantain. They tasted like a normal banana, just not as sweet with a bit of a fresher taste. You could tell it had come straight from the bunch. As we drove through, we saw many different churches. One was made of old different color stones and stained glass



with oak doors that looked like they came from a Captains quarters. We also saw the famous pink church, Our Lady of Perpetual Hope.

Once we arrived in St. Johns, we visited the piers where we saw massive yachts and cruise ships parked along the docks while their passengers visited the local shops just as we did. We bought several souvenirs from the markets and made our way to a local restaurant. After eating sandwiches and fish, we made our way back to the taxi. Overall this experience was extremely captivating as it reminded me of a Caribbean Los Angeles with the hustle and bustle of our nearby New York City.

Conclusion

All things considered this trip was one I will never forget. The pride and value the Antiguans see in absolutely everything forces me to appreciate everything I have. Luxuries such as a paved road, and grocery markets that aren't shacks. Things that seem normal to us, that we don't appreciate, aren't even on the island. We have created such a small world for ourselves we don't even begin to realize how many luxuries we have. Be appreciative of absolutely everything you have, because somewhere else in the world there might be someone, somewhere, dreaming of whatever it is. Family, health, food, simple things like backpacks, everything. Value everything as if you didn't have it. Value everything.

The Life of Marsha P. Johnson

"How many years has it taken people to realize that we are all brothers and sisters and human beings in the human race?" -Marsha P. Johnson. Marsha "Pay it No Mind"

Marsha P. Johnson was a black trans woman who is a key figure in the gay rights movement. Born on August 24th, 1945 and identified male at birth, Marsha grew up in Elizabeth, New Jersey with her six siblings and father. Malcolm Micheals Sr. Johnson was harassed as a child for wearing dresses and clothes that were feminine. After graduating from Edison High School in 1963 Johnson left for New York City with \$15 and a bag of Homeless. Johnson clothes. turned prostitution to survive. soon finding community with a like-mind.

Johnson had struggles finding a name but ultimately deciding on Marsha P. Johnson, "Johnson" from an eatery she enjoyed going to, and "P" which purposely stands for "Pay it No Mind" a catchphrase Johnson liked to use.

On June 28th, 1969 the starting day of the Stonewall riots, Marsha became one of the faces of the queer revelution.

The Stonewall riots began when New York City police raided a gay club called the Stonewall Inn. This act would lead to 6 days of protest and would serve as a catalyst for the gay rights movement in the United States and around the world.

This uprising would cause the first gay pride marches around the country in 1970. In the same year, Johnson and her friend Sylvia Rivera would found the Street Transvestite Action Revolutionaries (STAR), which would feed, house, clothe, and advocate for transgender youth.

Much of Marsha's life was spent helping and advocating for others, even while struggling with her own demons. Mental illness, arrests, and psychiatric hospitals never stopped her fromm fighting for gay civil rights. She was an ACT UP member and an AIDS activist, she was also a victim of the disease announcing that she had been diagnosed as H.I.V. positive in 1990. On July 6th, 1992, Marsha's body was found floating in the Hudson River. The police ruled her death a suicide but many people strongly disagreed. In 2012 the NYPD reopened the case but it still is unsolved. In 2019, New York City announced that a statue of Marsha and Sylvia would be the first monument to honor trans women in the city.















How Martin Luther King Jr. Changed the World

Over the past couple hundred years, we have seen some truly impactful and remarkable leaders make their mark in our world. Malala; fighting for women's rights, Gandhi; expressing his feelings through peaceful protests, Cesar Chavez; pursuing the job of a labor leader and a civil rights activist. And finally, someone who fought until their assassination, someone who continuously proved what a great speaker he was, that someone was Dr. Martin Luther King Jr, who we honored on January 16th of this year.



Important Achievements:

In 1955, Dr. King was chosen as a speaker for the Montgomery Bus Boycott, a campaign led by the African-American community of Montgomery, Alabama, to try and get the city's bus lines to be better. The U.S Supreme Court found that racial discrimination in transportation was illegal after 381 days of everyone participating in the act, and many had to walk miles to work every day as a result.

Martin was elected president of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference in 1957, a club created to add new leaders to the civil rights movement, which was then in its early stages. He led the SCLC until he died in 1968, being their main leader.

King had become the youngest person to win the Nobel Peace Prize in 1964, at the age of 35. Many people believe his acceptance speech is one of the most impactful ever made at the event in Oslo, ending with the words, "I hope that unarmed truth and unconditional love will have the ultimate word in reality. This is why evil triumphant is temporarily stronger than justice temporarily defeated."

Also in 1964, Congress approved the Civil Rights Act, finally ending racial segregation in the United States. Discrimination against blacks or other groups was banned in jobs, public institutions, education, transportation, etc.

When Martin was arrested because of a protest on Good Friday of 1963, he wrote a letter to 8 white Alabama clergymen, who are male religious leaders, who thought his actions were "untimely". The following phrases are from a part of the letter in which King explains the hardships that he and fellow black members faced during this awful period of segregation.

"" Wait." But when you have seen vicious mobs lynch your mothers and fathers at will and drown your sisters and brothers at whim; when you have seen hate policemen curse, kick and even kill your black brothers and sisters; when you see the vast majority of your twenty million Negro brothers smothering in an airtight cage of poverty in the midst of an affluent society; ...; when you are forever fighting a degenerating sense of "nobodiness"--then you will understand why we find it difficult to wait"

This quote shows the eight clergymen on MLK's side how racially separated people could no longer wait. The black community had previously been unfairly treated and had done little in comparison to how others discriminated against them. According to nps.gov "MLK is largely considered as America's leading proponent of nonviolence and one of the world's finest nonviolent leaders."

Resolution of MLK

Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. led the Civil Rights Movement for a little less than 13 years, from December 1955 to April 4, 1968. During this time African Americans made more progress toward more racial equality in America than in the previous 350 years.

Family involved Resolutions:


Be nicer to your sibling. I know it can be hard to always get along with sisters and brothers but, it wouldn't hurt to try to be a little nicer.

A History of Hanukkah

In 200 B.C., Judea, or the Land of Israel, came under the control of someone named Antiochus III, he was the Seleucid King of Syria, and allowed the Jews to practice their religion. But his ancestor, Antiochus IV Epiphanes, was less kind, he forced the Jews to worship the Greek gods, and outlawed the Jewish religion.

In 168 B.C., he and his soldiers went down to Jerusalem, the capital of Israel, and massacred thousands and thousands of Jews; and desecrated the city's holy Second Temple and placed a statue of the Greek King-of-gods Zeus. After he erected the statue of Zeus, he sacrificed a lot of pigs to his god inside the sacred city's walls.

After the massacre, the Jewish priest Mattathias and his five sons started a large rebellion against Antiochus IV and the Selucid monarchy. In 166 B.C., his son, Judah, also known as Judah Maccabee ("The Hammer"), took over his father's job.

After 2 years, the Jews finally drove the Syrians out of Jerusalem, Judah called on all of his followers to clean the Second Temple of the "corruption" of the invaders, rebuild it's altar, then light the golden candelabrum (the menorah) with the seven branches. Each of the seven branches represented creation and knowledge, the candelabrum also had to be kept lit every night. Hence candelabrum is the icon of the Hanukkah is the seven-branched candelabrum.

In the Talmud, one of Judaism's most important texts, Judah and his followers found just enough "untainted" olive oil to keep the menorah burning for only a single night and day. But through a miracle, the menorah stayed alight for eight days and nights, enough for Judah and his followers to find more to keep the menorah alight for longer; which inspired the Jewish priests to celebrate a yearly eight-day festival!

The eight-day festival is now called Hanukkah, and is still celebrated yearly, lighting a candle each day after the first day in reference to the seven branches staying alight for eight days. Though, it is not the end of the story of Hanukkah.

Other interpretations of the story of Hanukkah were that Jerusalem under Antiochus IV erupted into a civil war of sorts between the two sides of Jews. One side adopted Greek and Syrian customs, and made a kind of mesh between the religions. The other side were purely Jewish with no other religions mixed in, or traditionalists. Led by Judah's brother and descendents. traditionalists won out in the end, and took control of Jerusalem by force. Making Jerusalem an independent city dominated by only one religion, which they made a celebration for taking control of the city.

There are many other interpretations of the history of Hanukkah, and there are lots of disputes about what happened.
