WHY CAREER EXPLORATION IS SO IMPORTANT

Studies of high school students have shown:

- Those who have career goals are more likely to engage in meaningful planning related to those goals
- Those who have an interest in specific occupations tend to have higher expectations for themselves and more positive work-related attitudes.
- Students who choose college majors that are a good fit based on their interests have higher GPA's, are less likely to change their major and are more likely to persist in college and complete their degrees in a timely manner.

Think **EEPI**


E: What classes or activities have you **Excelled** at?

E: What activities do you Enjoy doing the most?

P: What are you **Passionate** about?

I: What do you have an **Interest** in learning more about or doing?

Record what first comes to mind when answering; don't overthink! Ask a family member or a friend to answer these questions about YOU. Compare notes. Are the answers similar or different? Discuss.



HOLLAND'S THEORY

John Holland's Theory of Career Choice (RIASEC) maintains that in choosing a career, people prefer jobs where they can be around others who are like them. They search for environments that will let them use their skills and abilities, and express their attitudes and values, while taking on enjoyable problems and roles.

A NOTE ABOUT SALARY...

Try not to get too focused on starting salaries or make decisions on career choices based primarily on the salary. While financial independence is an important goal, remember there is a wide range of opportunities and advancements within career choices. Some careers may initially start off with a high salary, but offer little room for future income growth. Some careers may require many more years of schooling or training and expenses up front. Location, travel requirements, benefits and more can all be factors not initially apparent when looking at starting salary

OPTIONS TO LEARN MORE ABOUT CAREERS

The Career Exploration Program at Stevenson High School can provide other ways for you to learn more about careers These include:

- Job Shadowing: Students can participate in a half-day or full-day job shadow
- Career Presentations: Look for presentations about different careers throughout the year.
- Mentorships: Students are paired up with a mentor in their career interest area for 1 on 1 discussions.
- Summer Job Fair: Having a part-time job is a great way to gain experience in many different areas. The annual Summer Job Fair is held in early spring.
- Mock interviews: In conjunction with FBLA and the community, we host sessions where students can practice their communication and interview skills.
- Career Exploration Summer Courses.: Offered in June/July. 2 week courses to explore careers in healthcare, STEM, business and law.

CONNECTING INTERESTS TO COLLEGE MAJORS

Once you have done research on your interests and have gained some insight through experiences and other methods, it time to look at the requirements and education you need to succeed in a particular career. You can do a search in Naviance to look for colleges and universities that offer your desired major. Coing to the college website and learning more about the specifics of a particular major and the classes and requirements for that major is a great way to prepare.
