The Board leads, directs, and supervises the affairs of the District through policy development and accountability. The Board serves and is accountable to the community primarily by ensuring the district achieves the results described in the Board's Student Achievement Results Policies and that it operates according to the values expressed in the Board's Operational Expectations Policies.

The Board will govern lawfully and ethically with a primary focus on:

- · Setting the vision and direction rather than internal preoccupation
- Strategic leadership more than management detail
- · Future rather than past or present
- Clear distinction of Board and Superintendent roles
- Encouraging all voices be heard, especially the community whom we serve and represent
- Building trusting and respectful relationships
- And most importantly student achievement

The Board's primary mission is to set the direction for the School District. The Superintendent's primary mission is to ensure that the School District takes us there.

We encourage you to attend a School Board meeting, watch the meetings on KSUN, follow the District on social media, and reach out anytime. We are here to serve our community, our 1,300 staff members, and the 8,400 children in the Sun Prairie Area School District.

The **Big Move** is the moving of instructional materials in preparation for the realigned grade levels starting in 2022–2023 school year. The project is very detailed and includes an inventory of textbooks and learning materials.



- % of materials will move from Central Heights to Prairie View and Patrick Marsh (grade 8).
- Grades 6-7 materials from both Prairie View and Patrick Marsh will move to Central Heights.
- 100% of 9th grade materials will move to two comprehensive high schools.
- 100% of Prairie Phoenix Academy materials will move to their new site.
- About 50% of textbooks and instructional materials will move to Sun Prairie West from Sun Prairie East.

The **BIG TRANSITION** 🕿

We are reassigning teachers from our 6th-8th grade teaching community to all three of our 6th–8th grade middle schools in order to create similar staffing levels of new and established staff at each school (e.g., Patrick Marsh Middle School staff may remain at Patrick Marsh, be reassigned to Central Heights, or be reassigned to Prairie View). Similarly, our 9th-12th grade teaching community will be equitably distributed and reassigned across our two comprehensive 9th-12th grade high schools, and in some instances, shifting to teach middle school. For those positions that are more operationally building specific (e.g., secretarial, custodial, school nutrition), the reassignment process will be less extensive and will occur in the coming months.

An Update on Student Behavior & Discipline

It's no secret that schools across the nation are supporting dysregulated students as we come out of isolation due to mitigation strategies from the pandemic. Schools across the nation and across Wisconsin are supporting a complex set of student needs while also responding to increased student behavioral infractions.

Some things we are doing in Sun Prairie to address these problems:

- Creating strong adult-student relationships
- Hiring Social Workers, Deans of Students, and Youth Advocates
- Implementing Positive Behavior Interventions and Support
- Teaching Social Emotional Learning (SEL) curriculum
- Implementing an anti-bullying and digital citizenship curriculum
- Utilizing Equity Teams in all of our schools
- Revising handbooks
- Creating behavior response charts

- Expanding Community Schools
- Providing students with mental health support, including on-site therapy with licensed mental health clinicians
- Ensuring behavioral interventions are being utilized
- Creating explicit guidelines related to disciplinary action



Course Changes

Beginning in the 2022–2023 school year, our District's middle schools will consist of students in grades 6–8, and our high schools will consist of students in grades 9–12. This reconfiguration required a reexamination of all courses offered in our secondary schools. As a result, we have created new courses and revised current course offerings for middle and high school students. **District staff and leadership spent over 1,000 hours creating course guides for our middle and high schools that capture all the changes for 2022–2023,** ensuring that students will have the opportunity to take a wide array of courses and explore their many interests. This change will benefit all students, especially 9th grade students, as they will now be able to take more advanced placement and elective courses, allowing them to earn additional college credits and further prepare for the workforce. It will also bring many more opportunities for science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) courses into our middle schools.

Department of Systemic Equity & Inclusion Community Cabinet

Our District leaders and our Equity team continue improving in the area of establishing and building strong relationships with marginalized populations. We recently created the **Department of Systemic Equity & Inclusion Community Cabinet** (DSEICC).

The DSEICC will bring a diverse voice that represents parents and caregivers. Director of Systemic Equity & Inclusion **Michael Morgan** will meet with the DSEICC monthly to focus on matters related to diversity, equity, and inclusion across the District. DSEICC members will be invited to share their experiences, triumphs, and concerns and are encouraged to ask questions and provide feedback on the five identified priorities of focus and other equity-related matters for the 2021–2022 school year.

FIVE PRIORITIES FOR THE 2021-2022 SCHOOL YEAR

Build relational trust among community members with a focus on historically marginalized populations.

Increase the presence of culturally responsive teaching and learning through the Ready for Rigor Adult Learning Framework (R4R ALF), the SPASD Instructional Framework, and the Curriculum Renewal and Design Process.

Collaborate with the Human Resources Department to recruit and retain diverse staff.

Facilitate and coach Race and Equity Teams as they address identified problems of practice related to race and equity.

Focus on the celebration of Black Excellence through Black History Month, Black Student Unions, and beyond.

"I am excited about impacting systems. Unhoused folks can, unfortunately, face many barriers when they're trying to get help, and it's cool to think that we can use their expertise to improve services, in education and beyond. Currently, I support the Dane County Youth Action Board, which is a group of young people ages 14-24 with lived experience of homelessness. These young leaders work with providers like Briarpatch and have a direct say in how youth services are delivered, because they are the experts!"

"When you are unhoused, things like internet access, employment, food, clean clothing, or a good night's sleep can be out of reach. We don't always know who is experiencing homelessness in our community oftentimes, there is a lot more to the story!"

Staff Wellness

This past year, the Wellness Program worked to increase the engagement and utilization of the **District's Employee Wellness Clinic,** an SSM Health clinic that offers free or low-cost appointments and over 20 services to District employees and their families. It also offers a wide variety of motivating wellness challenges and

Stay Interviews

Stay interviews are a Human Resources strategy this year, focused on retention and employee engagement. The purpose of a stay interview is to understand why an employee stays in their position and what the employee believes should be improved within their organization. The stay interview is a strategy that is more proactive than exit interviews as it focuses on improving employee retention. We will continue to provide exit interviews when someone does leave our organization, however, we want to dig deeper to find out why people stay. A small number of employees will participate in these interviews.

Committee Work

Our Communications team is in the process of developing a two-year Communications plan with the help of a committee. The committee includes staff, students, administrators, School Board members, and caregivers. The new plan will incorporate best practices in communication and successful communication efforts for the District.



Our District created an Instructional Framework Design Team to engage the

community in helping to create an instructional framework for our District. This framework is a set of systems and expectations that guide curriculum, instruction, assessment, and learning climate. Some of the goals of this team include engaging stakeholder voices and feedback, with a focus on historically silenced voices, and identifying themes related to learning experiences from student/community voices.

We have restarted the work of the **Ritual, Ceremony & Traditions Committee** as a part of our secondary transition planning work. The goals of this committee include creating a suite of traditions, rituals, and events of ceremony that will promote a sense of community pride, mutual support, and unity honoring the students of the SPASD. The committee plans to meet throughout the winter and early spring and will present their work to the Board with recommendations in late spring.





The **Parent Leadership Council** is made up of the officers (President, Vice President, Secretary, and Treasurer) from each school's SCO (School Community Organization). This group meets monthly to learn from one another and find collaboration opportunities among our schools. Every month, they meet with the Peloton Consulting Group to identify Equity in Practices for SCOs.



Several times a year, Superintendent Saron meets with community members so that they can ask him questions and learn about what is happening in the District.

A Community School is the hub of its neighborhood, uniting educators, community partners, and families to provide all students with top-quality academics, enrichment, health and social services, and opportunities to learn and thrive. Our mission is to inspire people to act to create equity and a sense of pride for all community members. We have five Community School sites in Sun Prairie: Westside Elementary, C. H. Bird Elementary, Northside Elementary, Patrick Marsh Middle School, and Prairie Phoenix Academy.

This past summer, Sun Prairie Community Schools teamed up with ten community partners to create an opportunity for Community Conversations on Race, Equity, and Inclusion. These conversations were facilitated by Courageous Conversation Global Foundation and brought together over 100 residents.

All Community Schools sites support out-of-school-time learning for students and adults. After-school programs at three sites (Westside, C. H. Bird, and PPA) are funded by the 21st Century Community Learning Center grants. Students at Northside participate in a Walking School Bus five days a week to ensure they walk safely from Northside to the Boys & Girls Club for after-school programs.

Every Community School site also has a school-based food pantry to support the school community. These sites operate in partnership with the Sun Prairie Emergency Food Pantry to provide a neighborhood-based, short-term support system for those in need. Community Schools, in partnership with Second Harvest, the Sun Prairie Emergency Food Pantry, the YMCA, and the Boys & Girls Club, provides weekend food for students across the District. This is made possible through funding from the City of Sun Prairie ARPA funds.

In 2022, Community Schools will be starting a **scale-up plan** that will take place over the next three years. Creekside will be the first Community School site added, followed by Prairie View and Central Heights in the 2022–2023 school year.

The exterior of Sun Prairie West High School is complete, and the school is on schedule to open this fall! We have begun purchasing technology for the school. Interactive flat panels (large-format touchscreen displays) have been selected for the school. Installation will begin in mid-March and will be completed by mid-April. We have also purchased desktop computers for offices, as well as phones, networking equipment, and Mac computers for art and graphic design classes.

Central Heights Office Area Renovations

This summer, work will continue on Cardinal Heights as it transitions to Central Heights, our third 6th–8th grade middle school. We have been working with Bray Architects and the Cardinal Heights administrative team to renovate the Central Heights office area. Because the Employee Wellness Clinic will occupy the current student



services area, the large main office space will serve administrative and student services functions this fall. We have also reviewed interior finishes, as this will provide an opportunity to create a welcoming middle school office and main entrance, which will include the new "Huskies" branding colors.
