Projects Along Far Hills Avenue

CenterPoint Gas Line Improvements on Far Hills Avenue

As part of CenterPoint's (formerly Vectren) final two years of replacing the natural gas distribution pipes and home service lines in Oakwood, work will take place this year along Far Hills Avenue from East Drive to Beverly Place. The scope of work is similar to other CenterPoint projects previously completed in Oakwood, but Far Hills Avenue has much heavier traffic requiring lane restrictions to accommodate the work. Motorists should anticipate delays during construction. The work will require many excavations into the roadway (and subsequent roadway patches) and many excavations into green spaces adjacent to the road. As explained below, the entire 2.2 miles of Far Hills Avenue in Oakwood is scheduled for resurfacing in 2024.

Far Hills Avenue Stormwater Inlet Repair and Concrete Curb Replacement

This year, the City will repair a series of stormwater inlets along the east and west sides of Far Hills Avenue, and will replace numerous sections of concrete roadway curbing, mostly between East Drive and Patterson Road. This project is being completed in advance of the 2024 Far Hills Avenue resurfacing.

Far Hills Business District Timber Wall Repairs

Repairs, including some top rail replacements, sealing and painting will be performed to the timber wall along both sides of the Far Hills Business District. The wall is nearly 50 years old, yet has been maintained over the years and is still serving its intended purpose.

Far Hills Storm Sewer Reconstruction (in the Dellwood, Greenmount, Forrer and Devereux areas)

An engineering study of the existing storm sewer in this area of Far Hills Avenue found several storm sewers that are reaching the end of their useful life, and are no longer able to fully accommodate intense rainfall events. Design work will begin this year on a replacement storm sewer system crossing Far Hills Avenue at Greenmount Boulevard; on Dellwood Avenue from Far Hills to East Schantz; Forrer Boulevard from Far Hills to East Schantz; and along a section of Devereux Drive north of Forrer Road. Construction plans will be completed in 2022 with construction of the new storm sewer in 2023.

2024 Far Hills Asphalt Mill and Overlay

As work from multiple projects leaves Far Hills Avenue with many patches, 2024 will include the removal and replacement of the entire asphalt roadway surface from the south to the north corporation lines in the city of Oakwood. The Ohio Department of Transportation Urban Paving Program will provide a majority of the funding for this resurfacing project. This roadway was last resurfaced in 2011.

Projects In Other Areas Of Oakwood

CenterPoint Gas Line Improvements

CenterPoint (formerly Vectren) continues replacing underground gas distribution pipes and home service lines in Oakwood neighborhoods. The maps on page 3 identify work programmed for 2022. In all work areas, CenterPoint is installing new polyethylene pipes in place of old steel and cast iron pipes and is moving indoor gas meters to outside wall locations. This is the continuation of a multi-year CenterPoint infrastructure replacement project in Oakwood scheduled to be completed in 2023. Oakwood residents personally affected by the work will receive detailed information from CenterPoint. The city website has a map showing gas line work completed to date, and the work planned for the final two years of the city-wide project. 
Concrete Street Repairs

Repairs will be made to several concrete streets around Oakwood. Details about the 2022 project will be included in the April/May *Oakwood Scene* newsletter.


Annual Sidewalk, Curb and Driveway Apron Repair Project

The 2022 Sidewalk, Curb and Driveway Apron Repair Project will take place on the west side of the City, including all areas of Oakwood west of Far Hills Avenue. The purpose of the project is to maintain the concrete structures located within the City rights-of-way in a good, safe condition. City staff will inspect the areas and mark sections of concrete requiring repairs. Residents affected by the work will receive personal notification regarding their responsibilities. Please call Public Works Foreman David Shuey at (937) 298-0777 if you have any questions. For those who choose to do the repair work themselves, please remember to obtain a permit in advance and that all work must be inspected and completed by the date in the notification. This annual project will occur again in 2023 and 2024 in the southeast and south central sections of Oakwood.


PROPOSED 2022 CENTERPOINT (VECTREN) GAS LINE REPLACEMENT PROJECT **AREAA**




PROPOSED 2022 CENTERPOINT (VECTREN) GAS LINE REPLACEMENT PROJECT AREA C

Point Broadband City-wide Fiber Installation Project

Point Broadband, a private internet and telecommunications company, announced their arrival to the region as a new utility provider that will offer fiber-to-the-home service. Construction has already commenced in Springboro, and Point Broadband has advised that Oakwood is their next target market, with plans to soon begin construction here. The City will share information about the project as it progresses via the City website, Facebook page, and at public meetings. After city permits are issued, residents can expect to see construction crews identifying underground utilities and marking their location with temporary paint and flags. Point Broadband work will take place in the public right-of-way (including curb lawns) and in some utility easements as they install utility cabinets and pedestals, as well as the fiber optic cable. Point Broadband will announce when construction will begin in neighborhoods via a series of messages which may include letters, postcards, and yard markers. City staff will work with Point Broadband to ensure restoration and screening are completed as required by city code. Point Broadband will conduct open house events to provide information about the project in advance of starting work. The dates and times of these open houses will be announced on the City's website and Facebook pages. Construction is expected to take place on every Oakwood street and will include installation of underground fiber lines, and various above ground appurtenances as shown below:

Gardner Pool Deck Replacement

In the fall of 2022, after the pool closes, the Department of Leisure Services will be working with a pool contractor on the demolition and replacement of the entire Gardner Pool deck. The existing deck is over 40 years old and in need of replacement. The scope of the work will include demolition and replacement of the deck, installation of fencing around the zero depth wading pool (children's pool), and installing new pool lifeguard stands and diving boards.


Presidents Day Trash Pickup

Safety Department Announces Promotions

On January 3, 2022, Public Safety Officer Justin Slone was promoted to the rank of Lieutenant. Lieutenant Slone serves as the Crew 2 supervisor. Prior to joining the Oakwood Public Safety Department in January 2018, Lieutenant Slone was a firefighter/paramedic with the city of Fairborn.

On January 31, 2022, Lieutenant Mike Tanner was promoted to the rank of Captain. Captain Tanner serves as the Operations Captain. Prior to joining the Oakwood Public Safety Department in March 2010, Captain Tanner was a firefighter / paramedic with the city of Middletown.

2022 Capital Improvement Budget

The 2022 Budget appropriates \$2,277,750 for capital improvements and capital equipment. We make significant investments each year in our public infrastructure and capital equipment. This is critically important to maintaining our city and comprehensive public services. Major 2022 capital expenses include the following:

- Asphalt and Concrete Street Repaying Program: \$550,000
- Sidewalk, Curb and Driveway Apron Repair Program: \$175,000
- Gardner Pool Improvements: \$316,750
- Front-end Loader Replacement: \$90,000
- Backhoe Replacement: \$100,000
- Far Hills Stormwater Inlet and Curb Repairs: \$130,000
- Leaf Vacuum Replacement: \$75,000



Summer Employment Opportunities

2022 City Budget

On December 13, 2021, Oakwood City Council approved a 2022 budget that provides the financial resources needed to continue providing comprehensive city services and maintain the City public infrastructure. The budget was prepared with review, input and endorsement of the 35-member citizen budget committee and is accessible on the City website (search: 2022 Budget). Near the beginning of the document is the City Manager's Budget Message. It provides a summary of the budget and explains how the budget is structured within the five major categories shown below:

- General City Services
- Refuse Program
- Water Service
- Sanitary Sewer Service
- · Stormwater Management

2021 Oakwood Income Tax Returns Due April 18

The city of Oakwood has a mandatory filing requirement for all residents. Every individual, 18 years of age or older, who resides in Oakwood, must file an Oakwood City income tax return, whether or not there is any taxable income to report. Retired residents who have income derived exclusively from non-taxable sources (interest, dividend, social security and/or pension income, etc.) must first file a final return in order to be exempt from the filing requirement.


If you have filed for an extension of time to file your federal return, you will automatically receive an Oakwood extension. You should attach a copy of your federal extension to your return when filing so that you will not be charged a late filing penalty. Your extended return is due the same date as your extended federal return — October 17, 2022. If you do not have a federal extension, you may still obtain an Oakwood extension. Simply complete an extension request form, located on the City's web site, and submit your request by April 18, 2022. As always, an extension of time to file your returns does not extend the time to pay your taxes. All taxes paid after April 18, 2022 will be subject to a 15% late payment penalty and interest.

The 2021 Oakwood income tax return is available on the City's web site at www.oakwoodohio.gov. If you do not have internet access, forms will be made available at the City administrative offices, Wright Memorial Public Library and the Oakwood Community Center.

Full-year residents with W-2 wage income only will be able to file their 2021 City of Oakwood income tax return online. Visit the City's website for additional information.

Important Note for Remote Workers: Remote work (also known as work from home or telecommuting) is a type of flexible working arrangement that allows an employee to work from a remote location outside of corporate offices. Due to the coronavirus pandemic, this arrangement has become increasingly popular. If you were working at home during all or part of 2021, yet your form W-2 shows that your wages were withheld for another municipality (your employer's office location), you are entitled to a refund for the taxes withheld to that city and will shift your tax dollars to Oakwood; you may also be able to reduce your overall local tax liability. You are only subject to the other city's income tax for the time actually worked in that city.

If you need assistance with the preparation of your Oakwood return, please contact the Tax Department at (937) 298-0531 to schedule an appointment. Normal business hours for the tax office are from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday. Extended hours will be provided April 13-15, when the office will be open until 6:00 p.m.

Discover the Art, History and Joys of Maple Sugaring





Cardboard Recycling

For over three decades, the city has offered two ways to recycle cardboard. One is through the single stream process where the cardboard is comingled with other recyclables (glass, plastics, metal cans, newspaper, etc.) and picked up with the weekly city refuse removal. The second is through the single product cardboard drop-off at the city's yard debris and recycling drop-off facility located at the entrance to the J.D. Foell Public Works Center, 210 Shafor Boulevard. The preferred method for cardboard recycling is for Oakwood residents to bring their cardboard to the single product drop-off containers at the recycling facility. As a single product, it has the most value and is most efficiently recycled. The graph below shows a 10-year history of cardboard volumes dropped off by Oakwood residents. The graph illustrates how cardboard volumes have increased demonstrating the community's growing interest in and commitment to recycling.

- The Children's Terrace. The French doors in the new children's area not only bring natural light into the lower level, they also open to a gated Children's Terrace. The Children's Terrace connects the library to the beauty of Katharine Wright Park, offering space for reading, exploring, and community programs. Its terraced steps provide a spot to sit and enjoy the outdoors.
- **2. Historical integrity.** Wright Library is on the National Register of Historic Buildings, which makes historic integrity an important part of any project. As you walk through the building, notice the refinished wood tables and chairs, original from 1939 as well as a few donated pieces. The wood finishes throughout the renovated spaces match the original woodwork in the Main level reading rooms.
- **3. New and old stained glass.** The library installed two stained glass windows from the former children's room into the new children's space, and added a new piece. Thanks to the generosity of a patron, donated stained glass was used to create a new piece in the children's area. All three are backlit to bring more light into the room.
- **4. Better access.** Making the library more accessible to all was a critical goal of the project. As you enter the building, notice the new lower park entrance, improved walkways, ADA-accessible and family parking spaces, and larger restroom on the Main level. You'll also find improved access to meeting spaces, including the new Community Room and new small conference room, both easily accessible from the Main Level entrance.
- **5. Separate spaces for adults and youth.** The lower level teen area features computers, booths, and seating for teens. Upstairs, adult patrons will find their own computer section. By creating these separate spaces, the library is better suited to meet the needs of various age groups.
