

INTRODUCTION

To Students

You will soon be ending your time at Key Stage 3 and moving onto Key Stage 4 otherwise known as Years 10 and 11. In Years 10 and 11 you do not study all of the same subjects you do at the moment, although some are the same. You will have to choose which optional subjects you study and that decision is one of the most important you will ever make. The option choices you make now could affect the rest of your life so it is essential that you get it right, for you. This booklet is designed to give you as much information as possible about the choices you are about to make but if there is anything you do not understand then it is important you ask. When making your option choices it is vital to take a lot of things into consideration including what you are good at, what you enjoy and what you want to do when you finish Key Stage 4. Do not make your choices because your friends have chosen them or because you like a particular teacher. What may be right for your friend, may not be right for you.




To Parents

Your son or daughter will soon be choosing the option subjects they will be taking in Key Stage 4 (Years 10 and 11). It is important that they make informed decisions through consultation with the school and with you. This booklet is designed to contain as much information about the options process as possible. However, should you have any questions, please do not hesitate to contact the school. At the back of this booklet are the contact details of the Curriculum Leader for specific subject related issues as well as for Mr Bhatti (Head of Year 9) and for Mr Thatcher (Deputy Headteacher) who oversees the options process.

The Options Process at Slough and Eton

At Key Stage 4 students are required to take English Language, English Literature, Mathematics, Science, RE, PSHE, and Core PE. The remaining subjects students choose as their options. The options are arranged into 3 separate blocks and consist of 3 (50 minute) periods across the week. They could consist of a double and a single lesson. The students have been given information about individual option subjects during a week of assemblies earlier this month. The Options Evening for parents and students is an event that should be seen as an opportunity to gather as much information as possible. Year 9 students and parents will meet with a member of the Senior Leadership Team to discuss their options. The Options Form will be handed out and should be completed in the meetings with SLT on Tuesday 26th March. The final deadline will be Thursday 28th March. Following this, the option subjects will be allocated and individual students will be spoken to, if there is an issue with their option choices. Final option decisions will be made by the end of May.

DIFFERENT TYPES OF COURSES

There are a large range of optional subjects on offer at Slough and Eton. Option subjects may be examined in different ways and be awarded a different qualification. This can be very confusing for students and parents alike so below is a short piece about each of the qualifications our students can study.



GCSEs

GCSE stands for General Certificate of Secondary Education. Most students will study for GCSEs in the core subjects and many of the option subjects are also examined by taking a GCSE. In some subjects, there are two different 'tiers' of examination offered:


- \Rightarrow Higher, where students can achieve grades 4-9 (old C to A*)
- ⇒ Foundation, where they can achieve grades 1-5 (old G to C/B)


Most GCSE subjects are examined by a mixture of timed exam papers, coursework and in-class controlled assessment.


Grading System

- ⇒ A grading scale of 9 to 1 will be used, with 9 being the top grade. This will allow greater differentiation between students and will help distinguish the new GCSEs from previous versions.
- ⇒ Assessment is mainly by exam, with other types of assessment used only where they are needed to test essential skills.
- \Rightarrow There is new, more demanding content which has been developed by government and the exam boards.
- ⇒ Courses are designed for two years of study they are no longer be divided into different modules and students will take all their exams in one period at the end of their course.
- ⇒ When your son or daughter sits their examinations at the end of Year 11 all subjects will be graded under the new framework.

Vocational Courses



Business and Technology Education Council qualifications are undertaken mainly in vocational subjects. They are equivalent to other qualifications such as the GCSE (levels 1 to 2), A Level (level 3) and university degrees (levels 4 to 6) but one difference is that they tend to be more heavily weighted towards practical work or coursework rather than timed examinations, although they do incorporate this element after a recent change to their structure nationally. Students in Key Stage 4 will be taking BTEC Level 1 and 2 qualifications.

v.certs

V Certs are technical alternative qualifications to GCSEs at Key Stage 4. V Certs are appropriate for students aged 14-16 who are motivated and challenged by learning through hands-on experiences and through content which is concrete and directly related to those experiences. They offer equivalent levels of rigour and challenge to a GCSE with clear progression routes and career pathways.




Cambridge Nationals are vocationally-related qualifications which were officially launched by the OCR Exam Board in September 2004. These qualifications are designed to meet the needs of those seeking vocational education in place of the traditional, theory-intensive, academic route Cambridge Nationals are equivalent to GCSEs depending on the level reached.

Considerations When Choosing Options

Progression

As students progress through their education they have different choices to make at the beginning of each Key Stage. Now they have to make very important decisions regarding Key Stage 4 options and it is important to understand where these decisions lie in context. Below is a diagram showing the progression through secondary school Key Stages and the options that can be taken.




Why Are Options and Exams So Important?

GCSE qualifications (and their equivalents) are the currency all students need for the next stage of their lives. The grades that they receive at the end of Year 11 could lead to a place at Sixth Form or college, an apprenticeship, employment with training or, further in the future, Higher Education. Whilst grades at English and Maths are a staple of most application processes, some courses at university demand evidence of successful studies in certain option subjects, so this must be considered too.



Good and Bad Reasons for Choosing Options

There are many reasons why you may choose a certain option and it is important that you choose an option for the right reasons. You will have to study this subject for 2 years; you should not base your choice on things that may change.
