







MAKING THE RIGHT CHOICES


There are two kinds of plagiarism: one that is committed with the intent to deceive (intentional plagiarism) and one resulting from the disregard for proper scholarly procedures (unintentional plagiarism).

BOTH ARE BAD.




INTENTIONAL PLAGIARISM

Intentional plagiarism is claiming sole authorship of a work that you know to have been produced largely by someone else.



EXAMPLES OF INTENTIONAL PLAGIARISM


- ✘ Purchasing or downloading a pre-written paper.
- ✘ Letting someone else write part or all of a paper for you.
- ✘ Paying or trading with someone else to write part or all of a paper for you.
- ✘ Submitting as your own someone else's work either with or without permission.
- ✘ Submitting as your own, work done jointly by a group in which you may have participated.
- ✘ Submitting work done by you, but for another class or another purpose without documenting that it was previously used.
- ✘ Creating phony citations



NEGLIGENT PLAGIARISM


This is plagiarism that results from the disregard for proper scholarly procedures.

You know how to do these things, and you know that you should, but you don't.



EXAMPLES OF UNINTENTIONAL PLAGIARISM

- ✘ Failure to cite a source that is not common knowledge.
- ✘ Failure to "quote" author's exact words, even if cited.
- ✘ Failure to cite a paraphrase in your own words.
- ✘ Neglecting to include a Works Cited page in your submissions.






SCHOLARLY PROCEDURES

There are three common ways of borrowing material from someone else and using it in your own writing:

- ✘ Quotation
- ✘ Paraphrase
- ✘ Summary

In ALL of these cases, you must cite the work.






QUESTION 1: YOU SUBMIT A PAPER THAT YOU WROTE


Yes. Your work should be original to the course, unless you specifically cite the prior work. If you want to build on prior work, discuss this with your professor prior to submitting your paper.




Yes. By eliminating data, you are making a dishonest and false statement.










Yes. This is cheating. Both you and your friend are guilty of misrepresenting the work of another person as your own.

Yes. You have facilitated an act of academic dishonesty.








No. Paraphrasing the content of an article is acceptable, however, you are guilty of plagiarism if you do not properly acknowledge the source of the information.

The Types and Severity of Plagiarism Violations





WHAT'S BETTER THAN A FLOWCHART?

ASK YOUR TEACHERS.
ASK YOUR LIBRARIAN.

- If you're not sure if it's plagiarism, ask.
- If you're not sure if it's cited correctly, ask.
- If you're not sure if it's an integrity violation, **ASK.**

OUR POLICY:


- Students are responsible for ensuring that all work submitted is authentic - that is, their own.
- Students will utilize MLA style guidelines to credit the work and ideas of others.
- When directed, students will submit work to our online plagiarism checker (Turnitin, Google Classroom Checker) for review.
 - Students will correct and amend any flagged passages before final submission.

OUR POLICY:





All students are expected to demonstrate academic integrity...All work submitted for credit in any class is expected to be produced by and be the original work of the student submitting it. Students who allow their work to be copied will receive the same or equal penalties to those who do the copying.

- *Consequences may include:*
 - *redoing the assignment*
 - *completing a new assignment*
 - *loss of credit for the assignment/s*
 - *loss of credit for the course*
 - *removal from the course*
 - *suspension from school*


