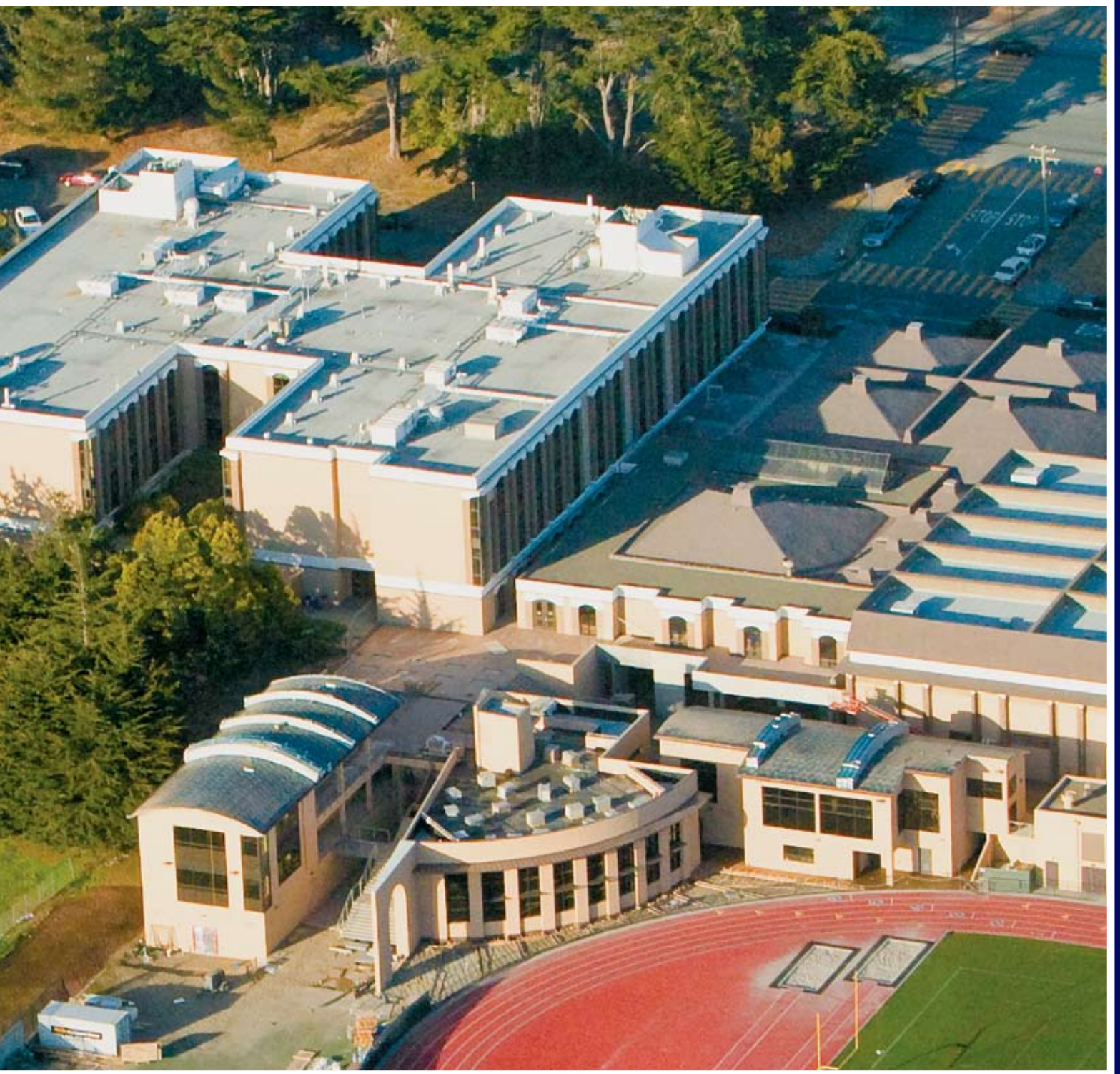

Dear Members & Friends of the SI Community,

EVEN WITH 152 YEARS UNDER OUR BELT, IT IS AMAZING THE WAY SI also looks and feels new. Last summer almost all of the classrooms underwent their first major facelift since the school opened in the fall of 1969. Given continual advances in technology, the classrooms certainly needed a technological update. In addition to state-of-the-art tech and media hookups in each classroom, we installed new energy-efficient lighting and new ceilings, carpets, desks and wallboards to post students' work, visuals and art. The effect is as though the classrooms are new, and it has been a thrill for students and teachers alike. Ironically, SI only logged about 40 years at 222 Stanyan Street. Yet as we are approaching the same number of years at 2001 37th Avenue, the campus feels renewed and fresh, not old and tired.

This past year also witnessed the noise and disruption that come from the construction of a new building. The inconvenience was a small burden to bear in comparison to the many benefits that will come to SI when the Mary Ann and Jack Gibbons Hall of Music, four new classrooms, a new weight/workout room, new batting cages, and the Columbus Piazza for outdoor gatherings opens in the early fall. Finally, our outstanding choral music program will have a permanent home and performance space as well. Moreover, the new classrooms will help ease the overcrowding in the school building, since each classroom is used every period of the day except during the lunch periods. Yes, there are yet-to-be-imagined benefits from all that is new, and valuable programs will find a home.

Hopefully, a home is what we endeavor to provide here at SI: a home for learning, a home for creativity, a home for the arts, a home for athletics and a home for Jesuit education. This is our common cause and our shared commitment: to ensure that Jesuit college prep education is thriving and advancing here at St. Ignatius for the glory of God and the service of the City and the Bay Area. We could not provide these new resources, the financial aid scholarships, or such a remarkable educational experience without your help and support. Thank you for your commitment to SI and our students. Thank you as well for your support and appreciation of the Jesuit ministry of education still thriving after 152 years at SI.

In light of our common commitment, it is my pleasure to introduce this year's *Annual Report*. We are truly in your debt, and I pray that God may bless and reward you for your generosity and charity. With the prayers and Masses of the Jesuits for you and your loved ones, I am

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The following are scholarships at Saint Ignatius College Preparatory, both perpetually and partially endowed. All scholarships listed in the first section are perpetually endowed. To meet current tuition needs, a new scholarship can be perpetually endowed at \$100,000. A corpus of \$25,000 is required to have a partial scholarship. The proceeds of the endowments are given annually to deserving and academically qualified SI students in accordance with the provisions of the scholarship. Anyone interested in establishing a perpetual memorial or commemorative scholarship should contact the Development Office.

(All scholarships started prior to July 2006 will be forever recognized as a perpetually endowed scholarship at the prior threshold of \$50,000, and as a partial scholarship at the prior threshold of \$12,500.)

INVESTING IN EXCELLENCE

ALUMNI, PARENTS AND FRIENDS GIVE TO ST. IGNATIUS BECAUSE it has strived unabashedly for excellence for more than 150 years. It is ingrained into the philosophy of Jesuit education in the Latin term *magis*. Every first-year teacher at SI receives a faculty handbook where *magis* is clearly defined:

Magis — a thirst for the more, for the greater good, for the most courageous response to the challenge of our time. The Jesuit school in its faculty and curriculum must foster the frontier spirit, encouraging its students to seek always to transcend the boundaries and limits.

There are those who argue that excellence is a relative term that requires open and commensurate competition. Others posit that excellence is a personal quest, immune from competition or public recognition. At SI, as in the world of real human endeavors, excellence is both.

A student may steadily improve his or her “personal best” at putting the shot, but if the shot is still not getting beyond the putting ring, common sense dictates that the student may consider becoming a miler.

Ours is a competitive world, and to be effective agents of change, our students must be prepared to engage the world realistically and enthusiastically. With a challenging academic curriculum, with 60 clubs and with 65 interscholastic teams, SI gives every student an opportunity to shine. And when they do shine, we should applaud them.

Yet excellence can be too simply measured if the only yardstick is a scoreboard, entrance exam or rank in class. It is not just a function of raw ability or a highly-honed talent. Some are destined to be taller or faster than others, but none is destined to be more excellent. Excellence is the persistent application of that unique combination of individual talents that make each of us more fully human today than we were yesterday.

For our faculty, excellence cannot be taught unless it is lived. It is the stand that each teacher, coach, counselor and administrator at SI must take individually and collectively to inspire our students to surpass yesterday's limits and gain a foothold on higher ground.

Our governing boards, administration, faculty and students are most grateful for your continued and most generous support — this past year more than \$7 million! In return, we promise you a school where excellence is not marginalized but mainstream. ❖

Come Join SI's First Ever **Bike Tour**

Tim Leonoudakis '72 admits there's a bit of irony in his coming up with the idea for the Oct. 28 Tour di Sant' Ignazio.

He is, after all, the CEO of CityPark, which offers spaces for 9,000 cars in its 65 garages located throughout San Francisco.

He adds, however, that the bike tour fits perfectly with his company's philosophy, and with that of his father, the founder of CityPark and the former head of the Golden Gate Bridge District, who did much to encourage mass transit while holding that position.

"We're a transportation company," said Leonoudakis. "Our company has a bus division, and we're working with the San Francisco Bike Coalition to offer free bicycle parking in all of our garages."

Leonoudakis, an avid bicyclist who spends many weekends on 100-mile rides, has organized tours both in San Francisco and in Marin to benefit the American Lung Association. As chairman of the Breathe Easy Ride in Marin, he helped raise \$145,000 from last June's tour alone.

As a student at SI, he biked to school from his home near St. Brendan's, in part to improve his asthma. He now bikes to work from his Marin home to his job in San Francisco, most days riding alongside fellow Wildcat Don Tarantino '80, whose SI ties include his father, Sal '50, and son Taylor '11, who is a classmate with Leonoudakis' daughter, Kalyca '11.

Both men serve on the board of the SI

Alumni Association, and after attending his first meetings, Leonoudakis was impressed with "how everyone was stepping up to do good things for SI. I knew how wonderful the Breathe Easy Rides were, and thought a bike tour would be a great thing for SI. It would bring together the community, promote health and benefit a good cause."

He suggested the idea to Tarantino, who loved it and agreed both to serve as co-chairman of this new SI Alumni Association-sponsored event and to offer the support of Gallagher-Tarantino Insurance Brokers.

(Tarantino, with roots in the Fisherman's Wharf family, recently sold his insurance company to Arthur J. Gallagher & Co. Insurance Brokers.)

"Our company has long committed itself to serving the Catholic community in the U.S.," said Tarantino, who works with Greg Campbell '74, the branch executive officer for the firm, and with Dennis O'Hara, a Loyola High School grad and an area executive VP.

Tarantino, who also sits on the Agency Advisory Board at Fireman's Fund Insurance Company, was able to enlist additional help from that firm, which is co-sponsoring the tour. Fireman's Fund, based in Novato, was founded in 1863 with a heritage of community involvement, dedicating a portion of its profits to the families of fallen San Francisco firefighters.

Fireman's Fund offers property and casualty insurance for businesses and individuals, specializing in commercial niche markets that include green and historic real estate, hotels and restaurants, as well as in high-value homes, autos, yachts and art and jewelry collections. The company's community commitment continues today through the Fireman's

Fund HeritageSM program, through which it gives millions of dollars in grants annually to support fire departments throughout the country. Greg Burns '81, field vice president for commercial underwriting at Fireman's Fund, said the company is "thrilled to support this worthy cause right here in our own backyard."

"Both Fireman's Fund and Gallagher-Tarantino have committed resources and funds to make the community safer," added Tarantino.

"We also like to zero in on the causes we believe in," said Campbell.

Others on the tour committee include Alumni Board President Jeff Columbini '79, Alumni Board Member John Barbieri '80 and Alumni Director John Ring '86.

Representatives from both insurance companies will take part in the ride, and they will be joined by parents, alumni and students from the SI community, members of the Olympic Club, riders from many teams sponsored by city bike shops and members of SI's bicycle club.

In all, about 250 people are expected to come for this first annual tour, which offers either a family-friendly 12-mile loop down the Great Highway and around Lake Merced or a more vigorous 40-mile tour from SI to the Marin Headlands and back.

The event costs \$25 for students and \$50 for adults and will feature both a breakfast and lunch as well as entertainment. Most of the money raised will benefit SI's scholarship fund with a portion going to the American Lung Association.

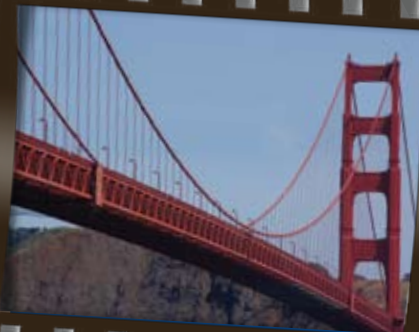

Anny Medina, 79, among first female faculty

Anny Vilar Medina, one of the first full-time women on the SI faculty, died Nov. 19, 2006 after a long illness. She was 79.

"Madam Medina was one of the pioneer female faculty members," said SI Principal Charles Dullea. "She was always elegant and brought a heretofore unknown feminine quality to the faculty room."

Fr. Mario Prietto, S.J., former SI Principal, noted that "as the first full time woman faculty member, Anny disistinguished herself by her energy, enthusiasm and professionalism. Nobody was more supportive of our change to coeducation. She will be sorely missed."

Born on Aug. 19, 1927, in Spain, she worked in banking before meeting Adolfo Medina, and the two married in 1950.

After immigrating to the U.S. in 1962, Mrs. Medina taught Spanish and French at Notre Dame de Nemur High School in San Francisco.

In 1973 she began her career at SI, also teaching Spanish and French as well as moderating several clubs and CLCs.

She wasn't the first woman to teach at SI — Marjorie Buley, who taught biology for the 1965–66 academic year, holds that distinction. Nor was she the first woman to be hired in the 1970s, as Susan Johnson taught Afro-American literature for the 1972–73 year. Mrs. Medina, however, was the first longtime female faculty member, as she taught at SI for nearly 20 years, retiring in June 1991.

As dean of the faculty women, Mrs. Medina earned the respect of her colleagues, who loved her sense of humor and professionalism. She was also accorded a place of honor, as when she sat on stage with Fr. Peter-Hans Kolvenbach, S.J., the Jesuit Superior General, during his 1989 visit to SI.

She gained the love and respect of thousands of students in her long career, including many who kept in touch with her after her retirement.

"They appreciated her because she was a born teacher," recalls her daughter, Teresa. "She felt she was placed on this earth to teach, and she did this with a combination of great love for her students and stern discipline. She would sometimes slap her yardstick on the desk to get her students' atten-

tion. She stood five feet tall and would sometimes stare down students who towered over her. She was an old-fashioned 'pull-your-ear' kind of teacher."

At one point, a student asked permission to attend a family vacation in Panama. "She said he could go as long as turned in a 50-page report upon his return," said Teresa. "He respected the fact that she didn't let him off easily. And she was so impressed by his paper that she developed a passion to visit the Panama Canal."

Mrs. Medina was on hand for the first two years of coeducation. "But she loved the boys more than the girls," said Teresa. "She said there was less drama with them than with her students at Notre Dame."

She also loved being one of the few women on the faculty. "My father wasn't too happy, however, as he was a jealous man," added Teresa.



After her retirement, Mrs. Medina would often watch her granddaughter, a student at St. Francis High School, play basketball there. "She made it known to my daughter that whenever St. Francis played against SI, she wouldn't root against her old school. To the end, she was loyal to SI."

Mrs. Medina was diagnosed with terminal breast cancer in November 2004, the same month her husband died. "She never had time to mourn my father," said Teresa. "Instead of mourning, we celebrated life. Six months before my mother died, we finally made it to the Panama Canal."

After her death, many former students came to pay their respects. "I was amazed by the outpouring of emotion," said Teresa. "So many told me that Anny was the hardest and best teacher they had ever had."

She is survived by her daughters, Teresa Campisi and Yolanda Rutherford; her son, Al Medina; her sister, Esperanza Ponce; her brother, Manolo Vilar; and five grandchildren. ♦

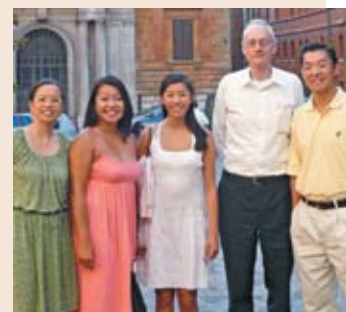

Charles Paganini '30, Member of SI's First Board of Regents

Charles E. Paganini '30, a longtime SI supporter, died Aug. 4 at the age of 96 in San Rafael after a short illness. He was surrounded by his family and faithful dog, Freckles.

"Charlie was on the first board of regents of the school when Fr. Carlin was beginning the fundraising for the Sunset District campus," recalled SI's Vice President Steve Lovette '63. "Fr. Carlin didn't have a closer friend or confidant than Charlie, who was very supportive of our program and school."

The SI Jesuits also enjoyed their annual house picnic at Mr. Paganini's house in Peacock Gap in Marin County. "Charlie was very kind and always welcomed our community," said Fr. Sauer, who attended many of those events as a scholastic at SI in the 1960s.

Mr. Paganini was born June 21, 1911, in San Francisco and spent his early years in San Anselmo graduating from Ross Grammar School. He attended SCU after graduating from SI.

Mr. Paganini enjoyed boating, skiing, hunting and fishing; he often hunted in the Marin County hills with longtime friends.

During WWII, he served in the U.S. Navy as a lieutenant commander in the South Pacific. After the war, he worked as an executive for Security Lithograph Co., then Diamond International.

After retiring, he enjoyed traveling all over the world with his wife, mostly by freighter. They enjoyed the South Pacific as well as other exotic ports. He spent recent years sharing stories with friends and family at his home overlooking San Francisco Bay, which he considered the "very best place in the universe."

He was a longtime member of the Sonoma County Trailblazers and the oldest charter member of the Marin Yacht Club.

Mr. Paganini was predeceased by his wife, Dorothy Godfrey Paganini, of 51 years, and he is survived by his daughters Patti Momii, Dorrie Miskimen and Nancy McNeil, by his sons Charles and Paul and by numerous nieces and nephews, including Max Oliva, S.J., who taught at SI as a scholastic in the 1960s. ❖

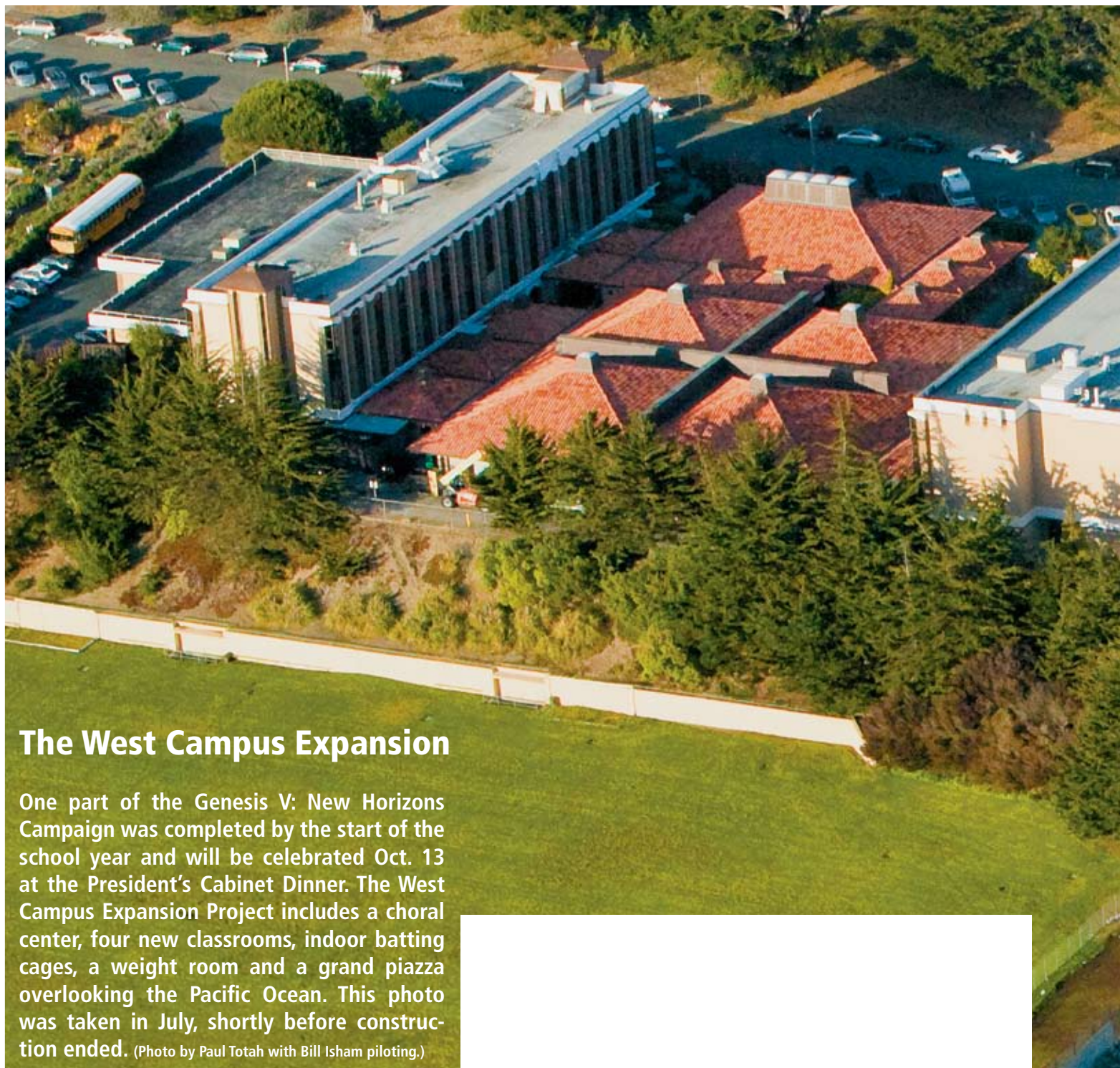
