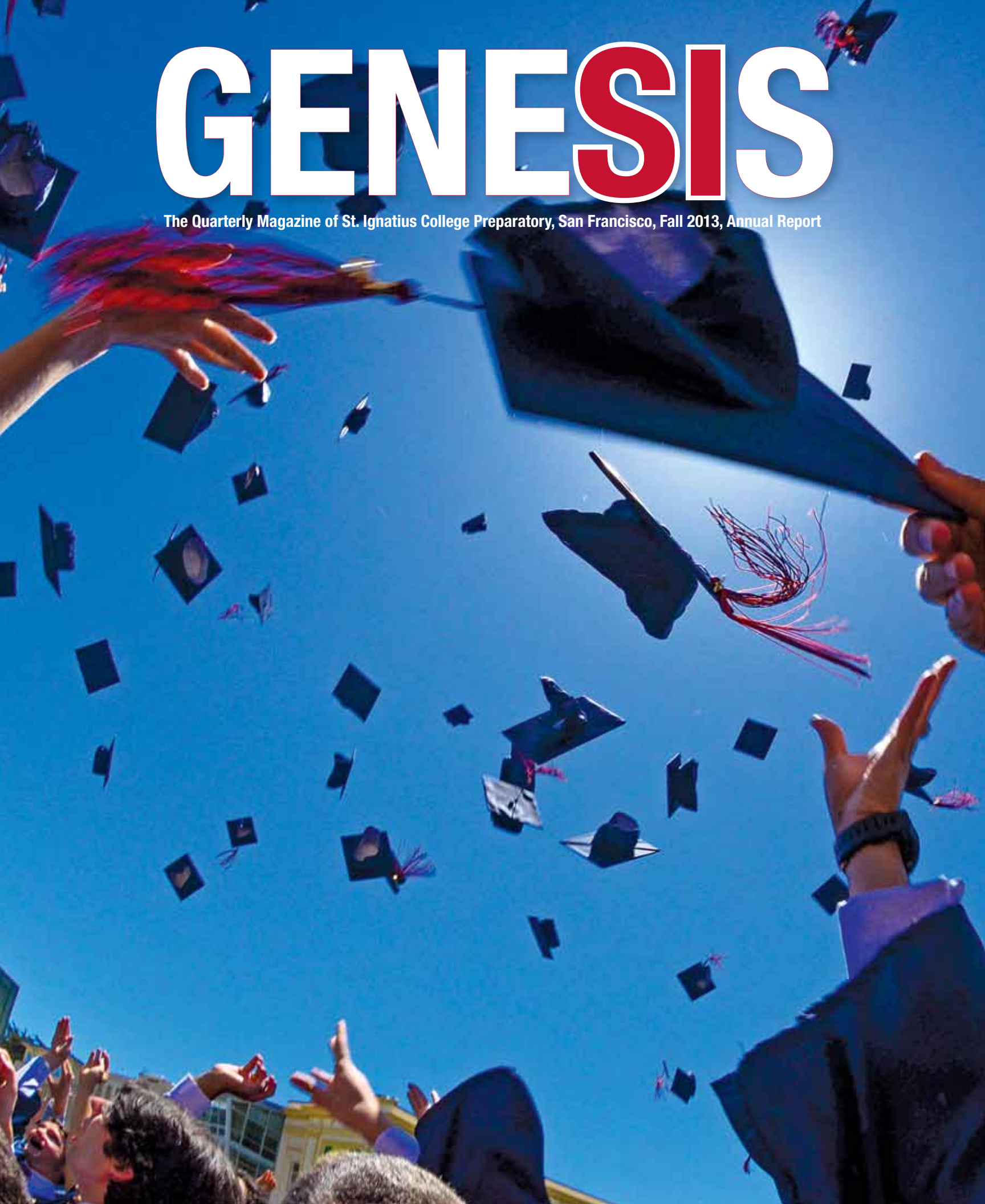

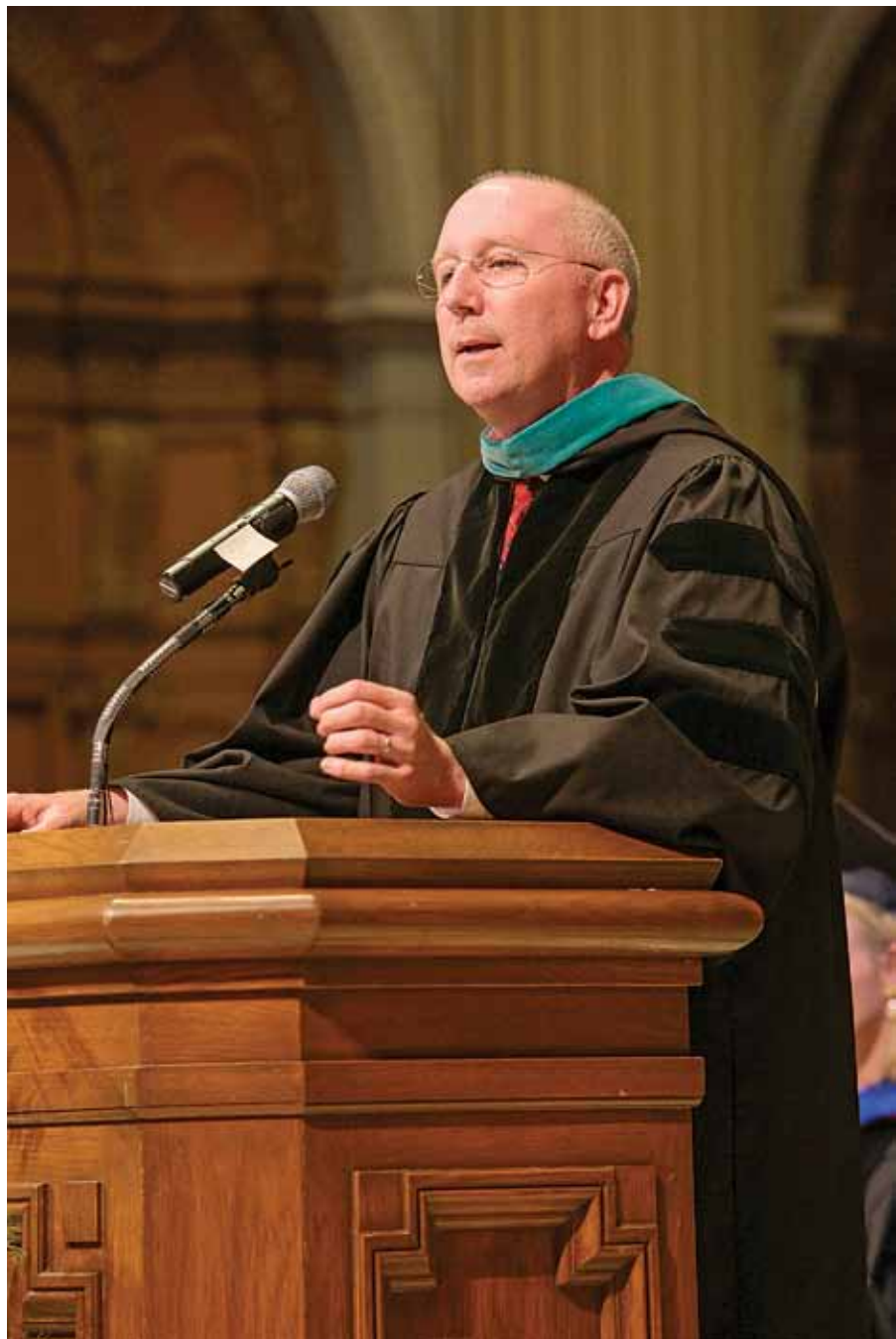

## Contributions Report

### PARTNERSHIP

The centerpiece of my annual summer re-creation is lying on the hot granite rocks amidst the North Fork of the Stanislaus River that runs through Calaveras County's Big Trees State Park off of Highway 4 en route to Bear Valley.

My routine is to submerge in the Sierra snow-fed, clear granite-bottom river before collapsing upon a favorite hot rock to unwind, think about the previous school year and "fill the tank" for this. Call it a cheap spa treatment.

It dawned on me this summer that the heat from those rocks that warms my bones, and somehow stays with me throughout the year, does not actually come from the stones themselves. Though their warmth is real – a healing kind of warmth – the rocks don't generate the heat; rather, they reflect the hot Sierra sun.

So, too, we are called not to be the source of light but to reflect the grace and light of the Spirit. Indeed, one of the secrets to SI's success as a Jesuit school for almost 160 years is that our teachers, staff, administration, coaches, directors, moderators and board members aren't the original source of light and inspiration for our young Ignatians; rather, they reflect the light and grace of the Spirit as it works through them.

Our sole purpose – our *raison d'être* – is not merely to educate young men and women but to transform them by setting their souls on fire. The theme for our school year, *Ignite the Fire Within*, echoes this objective.

Our central challenge is, likewise, to teach SI's students to reflect the gifts and grace they have received from our Creator. In the words of St. Ignatius himself, our purpose is to "praise, reverence and serve God."

We could not do this work without your support; it is vital to our mission and purpose. This past year, more of you supported SI than any year in our history. Thank you!

We are grateful to our alumni, friends and parents past and present who appreciate the work we do and who partner with us as we carry the flame of Ignatius and Christ from the old world to the new and from one generation to the next.

### AP TESTS

SI has one of the largest and most successful Advanced Placement programs in the country. In 2013, 638 students took 1,478 tests with an 79.3 percent pass rate. Also, students scored more than 700 4s and 5s on these tests. This performance ranks SI among the top 150 schools (the top two-thirds of 1 percent) in the nation. Our pass rate is also 24 points higher than the average for all test-takers.

#### NOVEMBER 3 OPEN HOUSE

Families may visit our campus for all or part of the scheduled 2 hours from 1–3 p.m.

#### NOVEMBER 15 APPLICATION PRIORITY FILING DATE

Application Filing Fee is \$85. Applications will be accepted after the Priority Filing Date, but the application filing fee will be increased to handle and process applications received after this date; after 11/15/13, the filing fee will be increased to \$110; after 12/10/13, the filing fee will be increased to \$135.

#### JANUARY 11, 2014, ENTRANCE EXAM

8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. The applicant indicates the exam location and date on the Entrance Exam Reservation Form included as part of the online application to SI.

#### MARCH 14, 2014, NOTIFICATION DATE

Applicants and parents are notified of admissions decisions and financial aid awards.

#### MARCH 21, 2014, REGISTRATION DEADLINE

A non-refundable deposit (which is applied towards the student's tuition) reserves a place in the Class of 2018.

#### ADMISSIONS CRITERIA

In general, an 8th grade applicant should have the following qualifications:

- Should perform well above grade level on standardized tests taken in the seventh and eighth grade at his or her present school.
- Should be progressing in academic subjects commensurate with ability.
- Should receive a favorable recommendation from the principal, teacher or counselor of the school the student now attends. (Note: This recommendation will be solicited by the Admissions Office.)
- Should perform well enough on the entrance examination to indicate that he or she is capable of achievement in a rigorous college preparatory course of study.
- The student and parents should be committed to the student's active participation in the religious and extracurricular activities of the community he or she seeks to join. This includes a genuine interest in after-school activities, liturgies, retreats and community service.



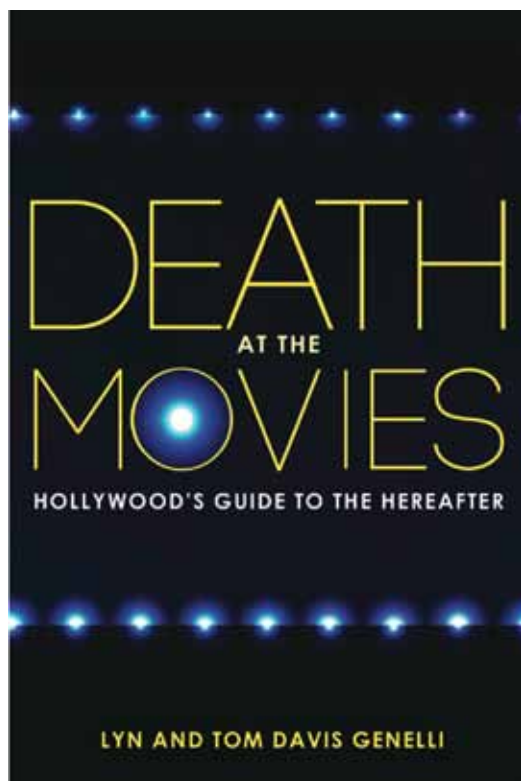

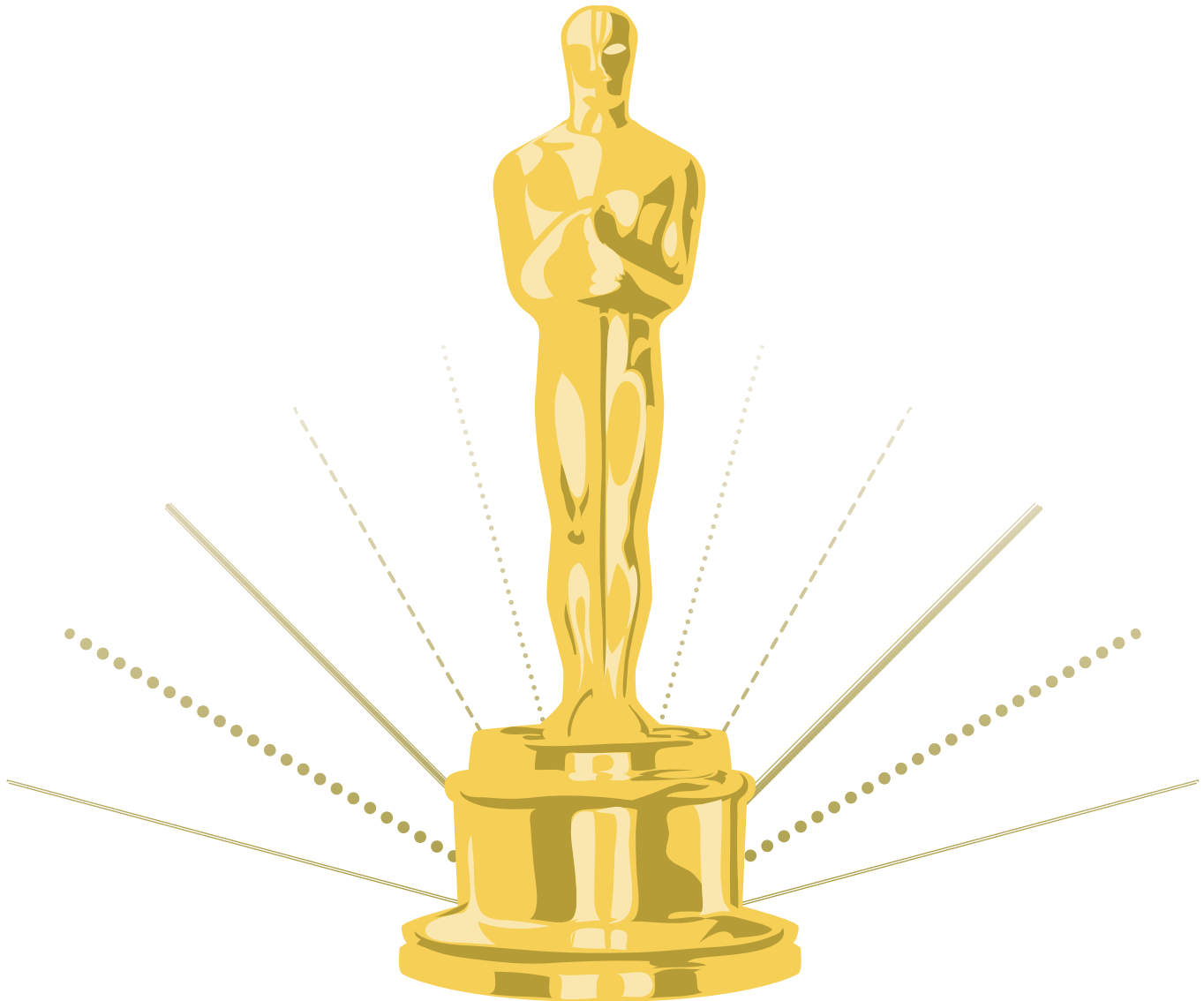
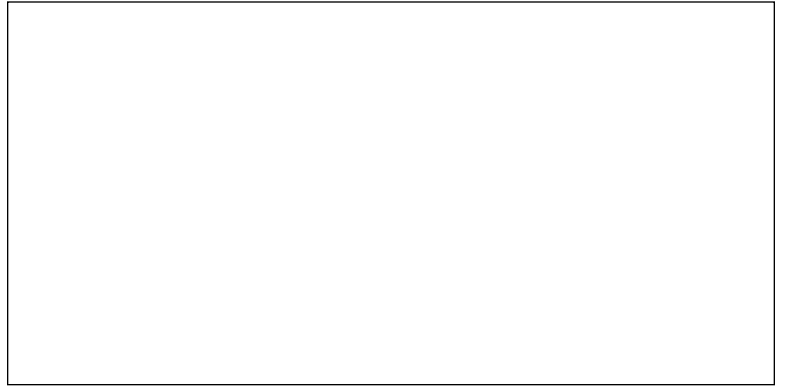
