As we progress through the winter months I'd like to bring the Covington community up to speed on what our 7-12 students have been up to recently.

In late December, prior to Christmas break, the High School Student Council sponsored a "Door Decorating Contest" for first period classes. Congratulations to Miss Rauch's class for winning this contest. The High School Student Council sang Christmas carols at the Stillwater Nursing and Rehabilitation Center on December 21. The Covington High School National Honor Society canned food drive collected approximately 1,200 cans of food to donate to area residents in need. Thank you to Mrs. Schmitz and Mrs. Groppi for organizing this event.

At the Jr. High level the Student Council and BUCC Club sang Christmas carols at Piqua Manor on December 21. The JH BUCC Club helped move books and materials back to the JR Clarke Library on December 7.

The 6th grade band, 8th grade choir, JH Band, HS Band, and HS Choir held a Christmas Concert on December 16. This concert was very well attended by parents and family members. Mrs. Moore and our music students continue to produce quality musical performances for our community.

Athletically, the Covington Buccs wrestling team won the inaugural Three Rivers Conference Championship on January 15. Also, congratulations to Connor Sindelir and Jensen Wagoner who both earned their 100th career win during the season. The Lady Buccs basketball team traveled to the "Hoosier Gym" in Knightstown, Indiana on January 22. Along with defeating Versailles at this historic venue, Claudia Harrington scored her 1,000th career point!

On January 25, the Covington HS Business Professionals of America qualified 18 students in a variety of events and competitions to the State BPA Contest that will be held in March. The 18 qualifiers are an all-time high for the Covington HS BPA chapter.

As you can tell, our students continue to achieve at a high level. Our staff appreciates all of the support that our community provides to our students.

Kindergarten Registration 2022/2023

Covington Elementary School is in the process of planning for 2022-2023 kindergarten registration. Any child who will be five on or before August 1, 2022, is eligible to attend kindergarten. Our kindergarten screenings will be held on May 4 and 5.

Step One – Complete the online registration forms in Final Forms. This is available starting the week of February 14. Go to the district website and look for the kindergarten registration link located under school news. You will follow the instructions and complete all of the forms online.

Step Two – Once you have completed the online forms, you will receive an email with a link to sign up online for a screening time for your child. These appointment times on May 4 and 5, are an hour and a half long. You will need to bring the following required documentation to the screening:

- Birth Certificate
- Proof of Residency, lease or deed, or utility bill
- Immunization Records
- All special education records/504 documents, if applicable
- Drivers license for identification
- Custody papers (if applicable)

Please Note: A parent or legal guardian must be present during the entire kindergarten screening process.

FFA Invitational Public Speaking Contest by Jessica Helsinger

The Covington FFA participated in the Bloom Carroll FFA "Drop the Mic" Public Speaking Invitational on January 24. The Covington FFA had four members compete in the virtual public speaking contest. They were Lainee McMacken, Mic Barhorst, Kori Moore, and Kara Stephan. Kori Moore and Kara Stephan participated in the Beginning Prepared category. Beginning Prepared participants have to write and present a speech that is between five to seven minutes. Lainee McMacken participated in the Advanced Prepared category. Advanced Prepared students have to write and present a speech that is between six to eight minutes. Mic Barhorst participated in an extemporaneous speech category. Contestants in that contest had to draw three topics from a hat, select one, then write a four to six minute speech in thirty minutes. The Finalists then advanced to an in-person contest on January 29. Lainee McMaken, Kori Moore, and Mic Barhorst were named finalists. Lainee McMacken placed 6th overall in Advanced Prepared Public Speaking. Kori Moore placed 3rd overall in Beginning Prepared Public Speaking and won a \$20 gift card. Mic Barhorst placed 3rd overall In Extemporaneous Public Speaking and won a \$20 gift card. Congratulations to each of these outstanding FFA students.

Miami County Public Speaking Competition by Jessica Helsinger

On February 1, the Covington FFA chapter also competed in the Miami County Public Speaking competition held in the Upper Valley Career Center in Piqua. Freshman Elizabeth Coblentz competed in the FFA Creed division, where students memorized and presented the FFA creed and answered questions following the presentation. Elizabeth placed 4th in the county. Sophomores Kara Stephan and Kori Moore competed in the Beginning Prepared division, where students wrote and presented their own four to six minute speech. Kara placed 3rd with her speech about Stereotypes in the Agricultural Industry. Kori won the division with her speech about Disabilities in Agriculture and will be moving on to the district competition. Junior Lainee McMaken competed in the Advanced Prepared division, where students wrote and presented their own six to eight minute speech. Lainee placed 2nd in the division with her speech about Advocating for Agriculture and will also be moving on to the district competition. Junior Mic Barhorst again competed in the Extemporaneous division in which students drew a topic and had thirty minutes to write and present their own speech. Mic won the division and will be moving on to the district competition.
