Each group numbers from twenty to thirty members. Our club program does not exist to satisfy the interest of a teacher but to help to develop the student.

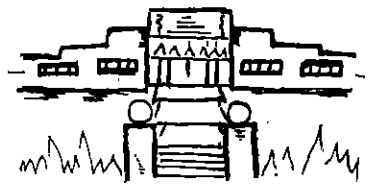
