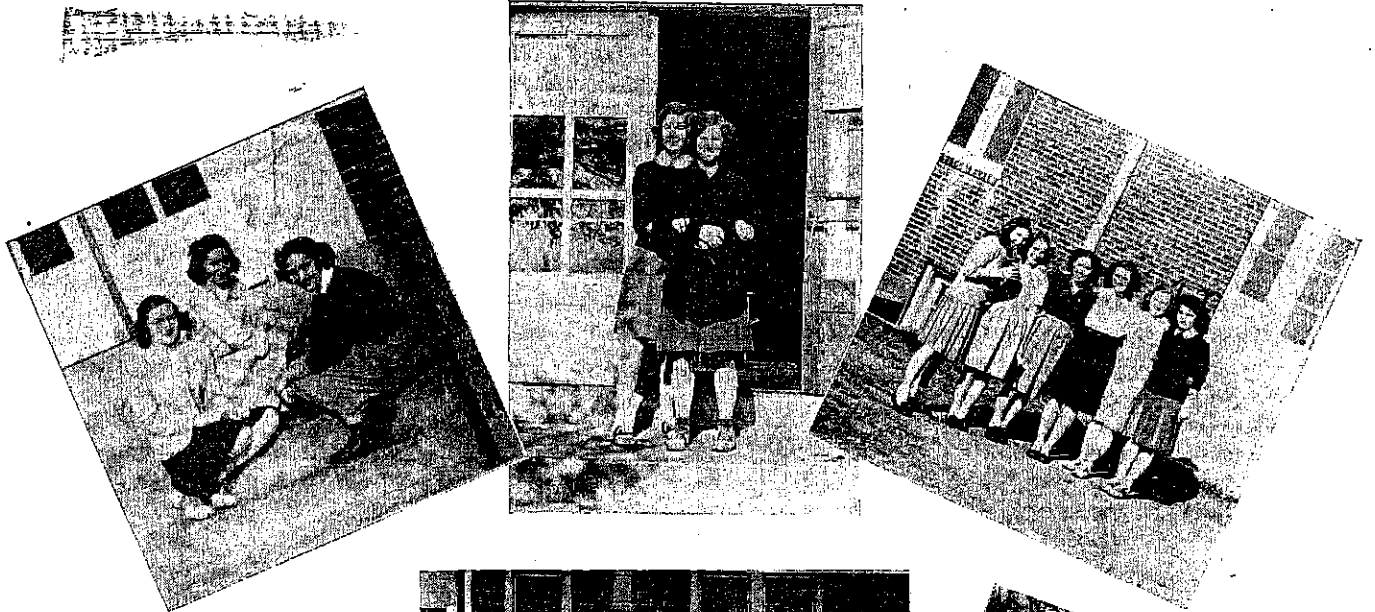
The Senior Mixed Chorus, under the direction of Miss Derrick, sang several selections.
