








- They lay the foundation for a child's attitude about and towards school

- They establish and set expectations for their child that aids them in becoming successful














Convery a LOVE of LEARNING


- Your child prioritizes what you prioritize
 - football or baseball teams
- Activities you do with your child communicates to them your values
- Read with your child DAILY to show that you value literacy and learning











- Be predictable
 - Have a daily routine with homework/study time built in
- Be consistent
 - Don't stray from the routine unless necessary
- Have appropriate expectations
 - Ensure that the expectations for your child are age-appropriate
 - Model what you expect from your child











Children NEED for YOU to set their routines

• The brain of a child matures daily, but the parts of the brain used for decision-making and planning are not mature until around age 23.

• You set routines for your child from birth (eating, napping, quiet time, bedtime, etc.) so they need for you to set routines for them

Routines are predictable and let them know exactly what to expect and how

each day will be











- Sleeping
 - 8-10 hours of sleep nightly so set a bedtime and wake up time that meets these needs
- Eating
 - balanced diet to have attention span and energy
- Exercising
- Electronics
 - limit amount of time children are watching TV, on devices, etc.
- Homework and study time
 - monitor homework and study time







Studying and Homework Routine

- Help your child choose a study spot
 - Place:
 - Choose a place where he/she is able to write neatly and stay alert.
 - Study in the same place every day.
 - Light:
 - Use good overhead lighting that is not too dim but not so bright that he/she must squint.
 - Sound:
 - Find a quiet place where he/she aren't interrupted by others, the radio or TV, pets, siblings, or other noises.
 - Temperature:
 - Find a comfortable spot where you are not too hot or too cold.









Studying and Homework Routine

- Help your child organize his/her study spot
 - Try to have all materials/supplies needed in that area so he/she won't have to walk around (could distract them)
- Monitor your child, BUT DO NOT do the work for him/her
 - Even if your child cannot get the answer-send a message to the teacher-DO NOT do it for him/her--this will teach them develop independence skills such as how to follow directions, begin and complete a task, manage time.
 - Help him/her with time management studying
 - Discuss steps that are necessary for longer assignments
- Don't stay up late trying to cram-review nightly with your child for big tests
- Give practice tests









More helpful hints for helping your child study:

- Talk with your child about how to take a test.
 - · Read instructions carefully
 - Keep track of time
 - Do easy ones first
 - Don't spend too much time on one question
- Talk about assignments.
 - Do they understand what to do?
 - Do they need help in understanding the assignment?
 - Do they have everything needed for assignment?
 - Does the answer make sense?
- Watch for frustration but be sure they're not just trying to avoid doing work.
- Give constructive criticism.
- Praise and encourage!!


