I have twenty three grandchildren and so I have visited a lot of school here and abroad and all are quite nice but this school is my absolute favorite.

(We know that these children) are being well-educated. But beyond the “schooling” as it were, they are learning to be independent yet aware of others. Self-reliant yet able to accept help. And grounded in the three virtues, they are ready to meet and accept life’s challenges.
