LCHS has had more semifinalists and finalists for the National Merit Scholar than any other school in SW Iowa and more than all other schools in SW Iowa combined in the last three years.

#### ACT Scores

Since 2010, LCHS has had a 46% increase in students scoring a 30 or higher on the ACT and we have doubled the number of students scoring a 25 or higher over the past three years.

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In the State Large Group Contest, Division I Superior Ratings were earned by Symphonic Band, Chamber Choir Men's Choir, Chamber Choir Women's Choir, and Chamber Choir Mixed Choir. The Singcopation Jazz Choir earned a Division II Excellent Rating at the State Contest. At the Solo/Small Ensemble Contest, Lewis Central earned 18 Division I Superior Ratings for Instrumental and 8 Division I Superior Ratings for Vocal. Lauren Fenwick



and Kate Kavars performed in the Outstanding Performance Showcase Recital in Ames called the Best of Center. At the State Contest, both Corporation and Company Show Choirs earned Division I Superior Ratings. Lewis Central students were represented in four honor choirs at Doane University, Morningside, Southwest Iowa Choral Directors Association, and the University of Nebraska - Omaha.

### **Illuminating Excellence**

#### How do teachers know what to teach? How do they know if the students have learned it?

The Department of Education Iowa Core Standards guide what teachers are supposed to teach students to ensure their success beyond high school. The Lewis Central School District is fortunate to also have a standards-based assessment and reporting system platform for teachers to use. Through Illuminate Education, teachers can assess standards, including pre-assessing student understanding before instruction, as well as after, to determine how to best meet student learning needs and tailor instruction accordingly.

One example is how the Language Arts Department suspected that students were

struggling with making inferences as they read. The teachers used an assessment from Illuminate to verify that suspicion and then determined ways to instruct in light of the students' struggles.

In order to help all teachers utilize Illuminate, the instructional coaches held short workshops after school, providing lessons in uploading assessments, creating assessments, using reports, and accessing student data. From there, teachers were able to conference with students about their data and provide supports to those students to help them achieve at higher levels. As a result, student motivation has increased as they watch their growth between pre- and post-assessments. Teacher teams, such as Social Studies, have been able to target shared instructional goals, reflect on data across classrooms, and learn from each other. Imagine being able to replicate success in one classroom to another, through the use of data and sharing what is working; teachers can do that with Illuminate.

In addition to enhancing teacher collaboration, Illuminate has helped teachers to reflect on the rigor and alignment of their instruction to Iowa Core Standards. For example, the Math Department recently increased the rigor of their courses and assessments. This work is extremely important as standardized school assessments, the ACT, and college demands increase. How will we know if we are preparing students to succeed at higher and higher levels of mastery? Illuminate can help us do this.
