

Preserving History and Safety **Addressed**

The Strasburg Board Education is happy to report that the Historical Arch has been repaired. Alan Yoder

of Sugarcreek, who originally finished the arch when the building was demolished, has completed the repair. Mr. Yoder created a cap to cover the top of the arch to prevent water from seeping down through the arch.

Mike Wolfe of Wolfe's Lawn and Landscape has addressed the safety concerns citizens had raised regarding the use of the walkway connecting Bodmer and the school parking lot. Mike built and installed eight pillars with lights, up-lighting under the trees, as well as lighting around the circular area near the arch. Aesthetically, the walkway looks fantastic at night. Not only is the walkway now well-lit for safety and security, but it also provides a beautiful setting for the entrance to our school.



Since its inception in 2006, the Tiger Foundation has awarded scholarships totaling over \$62,500. 





Strasburg Tiger Marching Band Uniform Campaign

The Strasburg Tiger Marching Band is a vibrant part of the Strasburg community, proudly representing our school through local band shows, parades and football games. The marching band's purpose is to continue inspiring school spirit, enhancing community image and augmenting student learning.

The current band uniforms were purchased approximately 20 years ago through public and corporate donations, as well as fundraisers held by the band. The average lifespan for band uniforms is 12 years. While the uniforms may look fine from a distance, many are beyond repair because of broken zippers and years of mending and cleaning. After several years, over 150 football games, countless parades and public performances, it is time to replace the current band uniforms.

The new uniforms cost approximately \$500 each. In order to provide a proper fit for all students and to prepare for future growth, we will be purchasing 70 uniforms

Each new uniform includes a hat, coat, plume, pants, garment bag and hat box. Our goal is to raise \$35,000 by January 2020 to ensure delivery of the new uniforms in time for the 2020 football season!
