# Inside Our Classrooms

**The Hive** have been exploring organs of the body. We have focussed on the lungs and heart and even made a pair of inflatable lungs from balloons. We have explored the effects of exercise on our bodies and have recorded our results. We have worked hard on our independent targets and are starting to look at division. Most excitingly we have been welcoming a new member to our gang!

**Thinkers** have been police detectives, trying to find Lanky Len and Hefty Hugh this week. The children have made WANTED posters, writing descriptions of the robbers to help find them. They also practised taking finger prints with their buddies. In maths they have been learning about doubles, using ladybird spots to practise.

Inventors This week Inventors have been doing some amazing gymnastics. They are learning how to safely use the apparatus and gymnastics mats. Inventors are very eager to learn and are now confident at pointing, stepping, feet together. This week, children moved on to spinning or jumping 180 degrees at the end of the apparatus and were brilliant at showing they are finished, by raising both hands up. In Maths this week, Inventors have been focusing on learning the tricky strategy of adding by making 10 first. They have worked really hard to solve additions to 20, by creating 10 first. Understanding their number bonds to 10 has really helped to support their learning!

**Explorers** have continued to learn about Australia. We have been focusing on Traditional Dreamtime stories told by indigenous Australians and had a go at creating our own story endings for Tiddalick the Frog. In maths we have been excelling at multiplication, learning how to add equal groups and write multiplication sentences from pictures. Last week we enjoyed a dance and drama workshop from company 'West End in Schools' and performed the classic story 'Where the Wild Things Are'. **Warriors** have been super busy over the last two weeks

becoming journalists to write a newspaper article about Vesuvius

erupting; experts in time by learning the months and days in each month; volcanologists looking at how volcanoes are formed and how they affect people; historians looking at the legacy of Romans on Britain as well as learning to play forehand shots in tennis! It's been a busy, busy fortnight (Year 3 should be able to tell you how many days that is!)

Ground-breakers had a brilliant trip to Butser Ancient Farm on Tuesday 15th March. We timed it perfectly in terms of the weather and our journey into the past was bathed in glorious spring sunshine. The children were very excited to see the replica buildings at Butser, with the real fires burning in the middle of the dwellings, ancient tools and weapons on display and secret floorboards hiding valuable treasure! The children made chalk carvings, fashioned jewellery from metal wire, constructed fences from hazel branches and carried out their own archaeological dig.

Innovators have blown Mrs Allen away with their writing this week. They have written phenomenal character descriptions of their own fairies that would fit into Midsummer Night's Dream, using amazing similes and parenthesis. In Maths, they are persevering with fractions, even when things get tricky. They have shown determination and are now adding and taking away fractions with different denominators. We have also been planning our next holidays by dreaming of warmer (or colder) climates whilst learning about the climate zones across the world. Creating fantastic motifs based on British Values in Dance has topped off a very busy fortnight.

**Trailblazers** have been trying to decide who is most to blame for the loss of life aboard Titanic. They have been considering the evidence for and against the main contenders. We also began to ponder the legacy of Titanic, and how safety laws changed for the better after she sank. In maths they have been busy calculating all things area, perimeter and volume. Trailblazers proved to be 'ace' tennis players and 'love' the sport, but they do make quite a 'racket'.

#### Clicker8

As you may know, we have recently introduced Clicker8 in school and we have been using it to support our writing with some fantastic results. What we really love is that the children are also able to use the same software at home through the unique code that was sent home.

We know that more people would like to know a little more about the word processing software package and Mr. Luckhurst has kindly offered to host a parent workshop in school. This will take place on Thursday 7th April. Mr. Luckhurst is also planning to release a video covering the main points to support the use of Clicker8 at home.

### A Wheelie Good Idea

Thinkers class are offering you the chance to create a bit more space in your homes if you are having a bit of a spring clean! The tricycles that the children love to ride around are in need of a service. If you have a trike at home that has reached the end of its use, but you would be willing to pass it on to the school, then the reception children will be very grateful.
