LETTER FROM THE HEAD OF SCHOOL >

Dear Viewpoint Community,

Like a strand of DNA, there is a thread that runs through the life of a school, connecting its identity back through the School's history to its origin and founding. Just as our students grow and change—so they are profoundly different and yet recognizably the same people at graduation as when they were in Kindergarten—so does our School preserve its essence, its values and culture, through its chapters of growth. What we preserve, and what we change, like the two roads diverging in the poet Robert Frost's woods, makes all the difference.

This school year we mark Viewpoint's Diamond Jubilee, the 60th anniversary of our founding in 1961. Earlier this year, I shared with our students how different the world was then, when a group of dedicated parents got together to create Viewpoint, wanting the best education to prepare their children for an uncertain future. One simple measure: in 1961, the average human life expectancy was 51 years worldwide (and 73 years in developed countries). Today, it is 70 years worldwide, and 79 in developed countries. In the sixty years since Viewpoint's founding, we have added almost 20 years to the average human lifespan—and at the same time we have miraculously narrowed the gap between the developed world and the rest by over a dozen years. In the face of so many challenges today, this is a simple marker of progress, representing years of life, of contribution and time with loved ones.

Viewpoint's progress in these 60 years has also been nothing short of miraculous, as the School persisted through early struggles, finding a permanent home in Calabasas, extending our education through twelfth grade, acquiring the school next door to more than double in size and impact, continually innovating and improving the education we provide our students. These pages capture some of the stories of these six decades of contribution to the community, tracing the threads of our School's values from 1961 to the present day, setting the stage for our next chapter.

So much has changed since our founding, and Viewpoint reflects more diversity and more depth, offering unrivaled educational opportunities that prepare today's students to be "world ready." Today, our Viewpoint's focus on each individual student supports each student in finding their unique viewpoint. Yet there is a thread connecting back to our founding—not only in our commitment to excellence, but to all our values—the love in our community and our love of learning, our devotion to honor and character, our imagination for the future and our can-do optimism, that grounds our education in the value of service. Just as our founders believed education was essential to inoculate students against uncertainty, so today we create, in the words of our mission, "exceptional readiness for extraordinary futures."

This Annual Report also commemorates an exceptional year in school history, a year when the challenges of a global pandemic shook our community and our School, moving our education into the virtual world of remote education for most of our students, most of the year. Distanced in our homes, we worked to stay connected to education and to one another, learning to cherish learning and community like never before. I will never forget the profound joy of that day in late March when we were finally able to return students in all grades to in-person learning. And just as I am grateful for the way our School stands on the shoulders of the past sixty years of heroic effort, I am humbled by the dedication, ingenuity, and hard work of our teachers, staff, and leaders who created school each week through the many changes of the year, adapting to constantly shifting conditions and public guidance. Our values, our people, and our excellence shone through.

In the unity of our Viewpoint community, we found strength. Our unified efforts—of Board of Trustees and leadership, of faculty and staff, of students and families—provided a solid basis for endurance and growth. As a result, we emerge from pandemic stronger than before. In the last year, we embraced a refreshed Mission, Vision, and Values that reflects our values and culture and challenges us into the future. We adopted a new daily schedule, embraced a critical focus on wellness, and reflected anew on all our programs to project what we learned from these challenges into the future. Our community rallied to hold together and to maintain the generous support for our School and for fellow families in need. And we created a new board task force on diversity and inclusion, working to ensure our School reflects the sense of belonging that is a human need and that we seek for each student and family.

Sixty years since our founding, we can take pride in how far we have come—and we can take courage in facing the future ahead. There is a boldness in Viewpoint's vision, in the optimistic creation of a School that stands out for our values, commitments, and our people. Throughout our history you see our essential difference in its impact on our students. I hope that like me, as you see the threads of our history, you take inspiration from our past to envision and create our future.

We felt confident when sending our children to Viewpoint that they would be surrounded by teachers and other families who all wanted them to have the best education possible, in a supportive environment that also emphasized morals and values. 

From a financial perspective, Viewpoint met the financial pressures created by the pandemic with careful planning and conservative management. Our Board carefully charted our course through these unprecedented times, guided by our values and beliefs. We made several important financial decisions that helped us weather the storm:

- > We elected to hold tuition for the 2021-22 school year to the same amounts originally announced for 2020-21.
- > We carefully controlled our expenses as we returned to in-person learning, including postponing offering salary increases to our faculty and staff until we assured ourselves it was financially viable.
- > We carefully and strategically allocated the CARES Act Payroll Protected Program funds we received.

These and other financial-management steps not only helped us avoid many more drastic steps, but they also put us in a strong financial position as we begin to emerge from the pandemic.

This year, we look forward to building on that strong foundation by focusing on our School's two key economic drivers: enrollment and fundraising. Enrollment drives our tuition revenue and fundraising makes up the delta between tuition revenue and what it costs to run the School. Our Board has always been committed to ensuring that our children have the opportunity to find their passion by supporting the dozens of amazing programs Viewpoint offers. Though the last couple of years have proven more challenging than most, our commitment to that goal has never wavered and we hope to emerge from the pandemic stronger than we went in.

LETTER FROM THE ASSISTANT HEAD OF SCHOOL >

As we reflect on the last school year and six decades of history and achievement at Viewpoint School, we are bridging legacy and destiny.

Last spring, I joined Viewpoint School as the Assistant Head of School for External Affairs. This timing coincided with bringing children back to in-person learning and with a need for a sense of community and traditions that was stronger than ever. I quickly began getting out among our families, meeting parents, trustees, grandparents, students, and alumni, and immediately realized that the core to our vision is the commitment to a school where tradition connects us and innovation propels us.

On behalf of our Advancement Chair, Halé Behzadi, and my colleague, Amy Maentz, Interim Assistant Head for Advancement, I am proud to share that we reached our FY21 Viewpoint Fund goal and raised \$2.1 million from 1,071 individuals and also launched new initiatives including the Class of 2021 Fund and Gratitude Challenge. In addition, more than 60 families also donated their time and served as Viewpoint Fund and Benefit volunteers.

Now, with an eye on our world-ready promise, we are reimagining philanthropy at Viewpoint. Mark McKee has prioritized creating a growth-oriented faculty culture that led to the creation of a teacher-driven growth model, robust support for professional development, and upgrades to the technology infrastructure — all in the service of supporting teachers and enhancing the student experience. When there is stellar leadership and momentum, fundraising — especially from Viewpoint parents who value innovation and impact — is straightforward. For the first time in our School's history, we're providing an opportunity for designated giving to the Viewpoint Fund to bolster the arts, athletics, financial aid, faculty professional development, and STEM programs. Early response to designated giving has been overwhelmingly positive as members of our community want to honor the part of the Viewpoint experience that is most meaningful to them.

When parents, grandparents, alumni, and parents of alumni give, they provide the margin of excellence that allows Viewpoint to create exceptional readiness for extraordinary futures. It's important for our community to understand that tuition and fees cover less than 90% of the cost of a student's education at Viewpoint School. To bridge this gap, our operating budget depends on philanthropy by generous alumni, staff, parents, grandparents, friends, and trustees. We're proud to report that 100% of our staff and Board of Trustees have once again participated in the FY21 Viewpoint Fund and have already committed to the FY22 Viewpoint Fund.

We hope you can join us at our 60th Anniversary Diamond Jubilee on Saturday, May 7, 2022 at The Ronald Reagan Presidential Library. Proceeds from the Benefit will fund Viewpoint's 60th Anniversary Wellness Campaign including the renovation of the Peak Performance Center.

We pride ourselves on a strong tradition of participation and philanthropy, and thank you for your support and vote of confidence in a Viewpoint education.





ENDOWMENT FUNDS >

Market Values > As of June 30, 2021

Endowment Funds are financial assets that generate income through the School's wise investment of the principal. The investment of all Endowment and Reserve Funds is managed by the CFO/Treasurer based on a Board of Trustees-approved Investment Policy Statement and under the oversight of the Board's Finance Committee. Portions of Endowment income may help to fund the operating budget or be directed toward donor-designated purposes. The Endowment also serves as a permanent savings account and helps to ensure Viewpoint's financial strength and stability. Donors may make contributions to existing funds, or establish new funds with a major gift. Endowment funds are frequently established to honor or memorialize someone of significance to the School. We are especially grateful that these donors chose to support the Endowment because they are helping to ensure a sound financial foundation for Viewpoint School's future.

\$76,003

program. The School's long-term goal is to substantively enlarge this Endowment, as well as Viewpoint's resources for financial aid, thus ensuring that the School can attract and enroll qualified applicants from a wide range of backgrounds, thereby broadening the socioeconomic diversity of our School.

The Edward E. Ford Endowment is governed by a specific document of the donor. The corpus of the Endowment must remain untouched. The annual investment income in any given year is used for faculty professional development of the Upper School's teachers.

General Endowment Fund*

The General Endowment Fund is not governed by a specific document. The Board of Trustees may use the Fund at its discretion. Annual investment income is directed to support the operating budget.

The Board of Trustees established the Viewpoint Excellence in Teaching Endowment with the purpose of directing its annual distribution to award prizes on an annual basis to two members of the Viewpoint faculty for their excellence in teaching. The School's long-term goal is to grow this endowment in order to increase the number of prizes and/or to establish more endowed chairs.

***Note on Endowment Earnings and Distribution**

The Board of Trustees maintains a comprehensive Endowment Spending Policy based on the advice of the Finance Committee and its Investment Subcommittee. The goal of the policy is to provide predictable, regular disbursement of annual interest earnings and to moderate the cyclical nature of actual market performance. Currently the Board has a standing spending rate of up to 4% of the previous 12 quarters rolling average in each endowment account. In years where earnings exceed 4%, the excess earnings shall remain in the fund to support distributions in years of low or negative earnings and to grow the balance of the fund to maintain purchasing power against inflation.

Viewpoint Patriot Scholar-Athlete Endowment*

\$378,966

Established in 2013 by **Mr. Keith** and **Mrs. Nanette Leonard**, this endowment will provide annual tuition assistance at the School for an academically qualified scholar-athlete in the Upper School (Grades Nine-Twelve), who has demonstrated a genuine curiosity for learning. 




When I first joined the Board, they were 100% focused on cementing the School's future with a new master plan and a campus for the long term. It took many years to do this, because after acquiring Meadow Oaks we had to obtain extensive approvals from the City of Calabassas, which didn't come easily. Once we had the approvals there was a big push to start construction of the 1st Phase. A capital campaign ensued to raise the funds required. There was a great deal of expertise spread throughout the Board and that was amazing. The Board stepped up, they all wanted to contribute financially as well as provide expertise, which ensured the project's success. Keith Zimmet and others helped guide the Board through a bond offering that was necessary to complement the fundraising and achieve the capital structure necessary to get the buildings built. Charlotte and I were very pleased to contribute to the library and we felt really terrific about that. The budget was very tight and we didn't have adequate funds to complete everything we wanted, including the interior of the auditorium, so Steve and Leslie Carlson provided capital to build it out, including seats and interior finishes. Several other board members, including Dirk and Tina Gates, came up with funds that allowed the project to move forward. The Board pulled together for many years and kept the project steered in the right direction, which allowed us to achieve our goal.”
