


Enjoy Spring Break week, and we'll see everyone back rested and ready to begin Quarter 4 on Monday, April 4!

Habitual truant means a child under the age of 17 years who is absent from attendance at school without lawful excuse for seven full school days. If the child is in elementary school for one or more class periods on seven school days. If the child is in middle school, junior high school, or high school, or the child is 17 years old and has not lawfully withdrawn from school.




SOCIAL STUDIES with Ms. Reeck



SCIENCE with Ms. Werth

Included are some examples the students created.









SOCIAL STUDIES with Ms. Wilts





A Bald Eagle and Peregrine Falcon came as educational ambassadors.


Students asked several questions and learned about interesting facts. They also shared information about bioaccumulation in DDT. Students enjoyed learning about their successes. It was a fun day!





For about 2 weeks, 8th grade students were "travelling" through Europe while researching, planning, and budgeting for a 6-day road trip through Europe. Students also had to create a detailed journal/diary of their trip, and some students even made physical scrap books!

This week, students switched regions and started learning about North Africa and Southwest Asia. Over the next few weeks they will learn about the physical geography of the region, a little bit of ancient civilization history, and also cover modern issues like the scarcity of freshwater and crude oil.
