





Student Loans are Available to Stark County Students

The Canton Student Loan Foundation recently held its 93RD Annual Meeting Thursday, October 22, 2015, at Brookside Country Club.

The Foundation is celebrating 93 years of assisting Stark County students in obtaining post high school education and training. The Foundation provides low interest student loans to graduates of Stark County High Schools. Since 1922, the Foundation has provided over \$31 million while maintaining a loan repayment rate of 99.8%. This revolving pool of funds has helped more than 5,300 students obtain advanced education and training with two thirds of these students returning to live and work in the Stark County community.

School Facility Update



Monday, October 5, we conducted our **Construction Manager at Risk** (CMR) interviews. The CMR will be responsible for completing construction of our new school buildings. Three firms presented their proposals and were scored by the school and OSFC personnel, then submitted to OFCC. Participating team members from Lake included **David** VanderKaay, Nicole Nichols, John McAllister, Mike Cassetty, Brian Taylor, Jeff Wendorf, Chris Eliopoulos, Brian Koch, and Chuck Evans. Representing Sol Harris Day were Domenic Ferrante, Melinda Scalfaro, and Lee King, and staff from OSFC included Bill Prenosil, Karen Little, Ramsey Najjar, and Lupe Love. The OFCC selected Hammond Construction as CMR during the week of October 12, 2015.

Tuesday, October 6, a team of staff and administrators from Lake visited New Albany Plain Local School's new grades 2-8 Student Learning Center, located outside Columbus. This was of great help to us as we consider our design options for our new buildings.

Thursday, October 8, 2015, we conducted interviews for our **Commissioning Agent**, and **Brewer-Garrett** was selected. The company will provide quality control as new construction is completed, and oversight on behalf of the district and OSFC in areas of design, engineering, and construction. They will ensure that our new school buildings are a reflection of what all parties agreed upon.

Friday, October 9, our Facilities Design Team met for the first time. This group will meet twice monthly during the length of the construction project. Community members serving on the team include Brian Koch, Mark Fedor, Mike Cassetty, Brian Taylor, Heather Kelley, and Chuck Evans. Other members on the team represent the district and our architect, SoL Harris Day.



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

The Force is with Our Second Graders

Hartville Elementary second graders have been studying the relationship between forces and motion. Students have learned forces are needed to change the movement of an object. Some forces may act when an object is in contact with another object, like pushing or pulling. Other forces may act when objects are not in contact with each other, like magnetic or gravitational. Students have been excited about the different hands-on activities they have been doing to learn about these concepts. Soda Bottle Bowling, making a marble run, and marshmallow launchers are just a few experiments that students have enjoyed when learning about forces and motion.

Self-Portraits in ART

Second grade artists in Mrs. Susa's and Miss Stegner's art classes created larger than life-sized self-portraits that are now on display throughout our halls. After reviewing and practicing proper proportions (proportion refers to the relative size and scale of the various elements in artwork) students acted as fashion designers, by adding original design motifs to their sunglasses to enhance the overall "snazzy look" of their self-portrait. Students also reviewed art-specific vocabulary terms: enlargement, scale, and overlap.

Students generated ideas from their daily experiences and the environment by utilizing the "popular" and fashionable style of sunglasses within an artistic self-portrait. Artists first drew their self-portrait, painted them in tempera paints, added unique details in hair, and enhanced their sunglasses with repeating patterns, shapes and lines. Our self-portraits were inspired by our love of the ever-fading fast summer.

Third Grade

We had our oil spill experiment at the end of September and it was a great success! Students also listened to guest speaker Bob Smith explain crude oil and how his company cleans up oil spills. He demonstrated by using an absorbent pad supplied by his company to absorb crude oil. It was amazing how efficient his cleanup was and how quickly it worked. The students read about the value of oil and how it is used in everyday life. The goal of the unit is to understand how we use oil and come up with strategies for preventing oil spills in the future.

During the month of October we will begin our Forces and Motion unit. We

will gather information regarding friction, speed, incline, and measuring. The students will race their jeeps down ramps and measure how far each will roll depending on the surface. We will also begin our Inquiry Unit about John Muir and Rachel Carson. We will visit the park and use our observational and listening skills. We will create a journal to record information, and then reflect on it.

Multiplication has started and the students need to practice nightly. Each night at home they can go on IXL or any of the sites on Portaportal to practice.

Welcome back to school! Second grade teachers are excited about the school year. Recently our second graders turned into scientists, learning about experiments and the scientific method.



They are learning about making a hypothesis, collecting data, and drawing conclusions. Also in science, the students are learning about forces and motion, friction, and gravity. Each class worked on several experiments and hands-on activities allowing them to defy gravity, design boats that would float once weighted down, and discover how friction plays a role in motion. They are enjoying science!

Recently the PTO hosted the first annual Olympics Day where the entire building had the chance to participate in games that promoted movement and exercise. Thank you so much for planning fun activities for our students!

The Fauves Fifth Grade Art Class

Fifth grade art students in Miss Stegner and Mrs. Susa's art classes drew inspiration for colorful selfportraits from



artist Henri Matisse's vibrant and joyful paintings! Matisse's style of painting earned the nickname Fauvism, which is French for "beast." This nickname reflects Mattise's wild use of unrestrained bright colors. Using joyful, vibrant, colors and happy subject matter, Matisse made a big impact on the art world by breaking the "normal" painting rules. He painted using multiple colors from the color spectrum, sometimes even eight or more colors on one single face! Students examined the color wheel's scientific properties as a compliment to the art curriculum. During this project, students also studied the techniques of interesting composition, cropping, and enlarging of subject matter in their self-portraits, then colored and blended chalk pastels with attention to color theory and the color wheel.

Pinwheels for Peace

In today's world, peace needs to become more than just a word. In September, Lake Elementary School took part in an International art and literacy project, Pinwheels for Peace, by "planting" pinwheels with messages of peace in front of our school.

Pinwheels for Peace is an art installation project started in 2005 by two art teachers, Ann Ayers and Ellen McMillan, of Coconut Creek, Florida, as a way for students to express their feelings about what's going on in the world and in their lives. In the first year, groups in over 1,325 locations throughout the world were spinning approximately



500,000 pinwheels throughout the world. Last year in 2014 (year 10), more than 4.5 million pinwheels were spinning in over 3,500 locations, including the United States, Europe, Asia, Australia, Canada, the Middle East, Africa and South America.

This project is non-political – peace doesn't necessarily have to be associated with the conflict of war, it can be related to violence/intolerance in our daily lives, and to peace of mind. To each of us, peace can take on a different meaning, but, in the end, it all comes down to a simple definition: "a state of calm and serenity, with no anxiety, the absence of violence, freedom from conflict or disagreement among people or groups of people."



Lake Elementary students focused on how they can promote peace in their school through this project.

Students volunteered to give up one recess period to create pinwheels. As part of the creation process, the students wrote their thoughts about peace on one side of their pinwheel. On the other side, they drew symbols to visually express their feelings. On September 21, International Day of Peace, these pinwheels were displayed outside of our school. Lake students, teachers, and administrators have been grateful recipients of donated organs during that time. Middle school health students discussed how one organ donor can positively affect more than 50 possible donor recipients in need. Modern medical technology improves every year, and so does the ability to help people who may use organs to extend their life and benefit others. All sixth graders had the opportunity to take part in the presentation that was both fun and informative.

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Six Invaluable Lessons All Marching Band Directors Teach Their Students

Teenage America is often misrepresented – coined lazy or clueless. But that's not so on the marching band field. Standing in uniform, our kids are focused, driven, and continually learning essential life lessons that will go on to assist them in every walk of life. And they have their marching band directors to thank for that.

1. Early is on time; on time is late.

Many musicians know all too well the harrowing eyes of their director when they walk into practice right on time. Players need time to prep on their own prior to rehearsal, which is good practice for any college class and any future meeting.

2. Time management is everything.

Marching band students practice for countless hours, both during the summer and the fall. As a result, they must learn to set aside time for homework, for personal practice hours, and, of course, their family and friends. In a way, they're learning to juggle – and this will follow them into an ever-chaotic adulthood.

3. Kindness and generosity go far.

Band directors teach that there's no room for selfishness in the marching world. Each band applauds the others as they finish. Giving respect and kindness – saying "good job" in a world that's too often self-centered – is far more valuable than any trophy.

4. Teamwork makes the dream work.

Unlike many sports, marching band involves a team of hundreds of players, all performing individual parts that add up to a greater and more beautiful whole. They don't have "five starters" or a "varsity line-up." Rather, bandmates rely on each other for the final result – win or lose.

5. Criticism is a natural part of life.

People aren't always going to like what you do on the field, at work, in your relationships, everywhere. And thus, when judges give critical feedback, directors teach students to use that information to make them better and more creative. In the future, marching students will face harsh words from bosses, from professors, from peers. It's up to them to use this criticism to better themselves.

6. Shortcuts get you nowhere.

Striving for excellence is the central theme for every marching band. This means percussionists must know a paradiddle from a stroke roll, flutists mustn't "fake" their fingerings, the trumpets have to hit those high notes with consistency. Many shortcuts create a sloppy show – one without trophies, one the students won't be proud of.

And this, of course, applies to life. Shortcuts get us nowhere – away from the best jobs, the most satisfying relationships, the greatest happiness. But marching band directors do so much to instill this love of excellence in their students – pushing them to realize their potential in this world.

Band Students Selected for Local Enrichment Ensembles

Lake Band seniors, **Gianna Corsi**, and **Alex and Jacob Prokop**, were selected by the Ohio Music Education Association to become members of the 2016 All State Band and Orchestra. Approximately 1000 students from across the state of Ohio submitted required recordings last May for consideration and only 120 were selected to participate. Gianna was selected to be a member of the All State Band on Contra Bass Clarinet and Alex and Jacob were selected to be members of the All State Orchestra on trumpet and trombone, respectively. Gianna, Alex and Jacob will travel to Cincinnati in January to join the students from across the state who were selected to participate to rehearse and perform a concert as part of the Ohio Music Education Association Professional Development Conference. It is quite an honor and accomplishment to be selected to participate in these All State ensembles and we are extremely proud of these students for their talent and hard work!

Junior **Connor Taylor** (bassoon), and freshmen **Callum Amacher** (trombone) and **Derek Gullett** (trombone), were accepted to participate in the Canton Youth Symphony Advanced Orchestra for the 2015-16 concert season. Acceptance to participate in this select enrichment ensemble is based on audition.

Senior **Jacob Prokop** (trombone) has once again been accepted by audition to participate in the Cleveland Orchestra Youth Orchestra for the 2015-16 concert season. This will be Jacob's second year of participating in this select enrichment ensemble.

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

Fall Sports Recap

The student-athletes at Lake High School are winding down another highly successful fall season, with almost all of our teams competing for Federal League championships and preparing for the upcoming OHSAA tournaments.

The **boys' soccer** team under Head Coach John Meszaros has had a tremendous season. Season highlights included league victories over McKinley, Perry, and GlenOak, and a thrilling 1-1 tie against an undefeated team from Green High School. The boys will begin tournament play the week of October 19, and will most likely play their first postseason games in Blue Streak Stadium.

Our first year **girls' soccer** coach, Dan Sears, has led his team to a fantastic overall record. Impressive wins over Dover, Perry, and Green and a challenging league schedule have helped to prepare our Lady Streaks for a very competitive District Tournament.

The **girls' tennis** team finished a very successful 10-9 season against a formidable schedule under first year coach Katie Burgett. Mixing some veterans with several newcomers, the Lady Streaks finished in fourth place in the Federal League before being eliminated in the Sectional Tournament.

Head Coach Dan DeGeorge and our **football team** started the season with three straight victories over Akron Garfield, Dover, and Akron East before heading into week 7 with a very respectable 4-2 record. Blue Streaks will no doubt be fighting for a playoff game at the conclusion of the regular season. The football team will finish its regular season with three games on the road against GlenOak, Central Catholic, and Green.

The **volleyball team** and Head Coach Josh Morckel battled back from a 1-4 start to get their record to 11-9 before playing final matches against Jackson and North Canton. The girls were extremely competitive throughout the season with some of the best teams in the area. Winning two out of three matches in both the Lake Volleyball Invitational and the Lake Quad while sweeping both matches against McKinley, Perry, and Green, the volleyball team had momentum entering into postseason play.

After winning the Preseason Federal League Tournament, the **boys' golf** team narrowly missed capturing the league championship, finishing a half point behind Green. With Head Coach Thom Grubb leading the way, the boys played in six tournaments this season and had a strong showing at the Sectional Tournament to qualify for the OHSAA Districts at Pine Hills Golf Course the week of October 12. The **girls' golf** team and Head Coach Michael Yoder finished in fourth place in the always-tough Federal League. Although the team did not make it out of the sectionals, they were able to finish with a winning record against a challenging schedule while seeing each individual player demonstrate tremendous growth and improvement.

The **girls' cross country** team under Head Coach Chris Wise has participated in numerous meets as of this writing, with several girls significantly lowering their personal record times each week. The girls will compete in the Federal League Championship meet at Jackson Middle School, before heading to the District Meet at Malone University the following week.

The **boys' cross country** team and Coach Jeff Wertman are looking forward to competing for their second straight Federal League Championship. The boys won the Claymont Invitational Championship and finished second at Dover before having strong showings the remaining weeks of the season. After finishing in fourth place in the state in Division I last season, our runners are hoping to once again peak in the post season.

A huge thank you to our Lake cheerleaders and Head Coach Samantha Riordan for all they do to support and encourage ALL our sports teams. From decorating to treat bags to cheers and routines, our cheerleaders are some of our best representatives of Lake High School. Blue Streak fans should also watch our Dance Team with first year Head Coach Lisa Henderson as they perform at home games, pep rallies, and other community events. Our cheerleaders and dance team student-athletes make year-round commitments to our teams. They will be entering their competition seasons beginning in November. Good luck to our dancers and cheerleaders!

Looking Ahead

Our annual **Fall Sports Recognition Night** will be Tuesday, Nov. 10, at Lake High School. Refreshments will be served at 6:30 p.m. in the cafeteria followed by the main program in the Main Gym at 7 p.m. The evening will conclude with each fall sport going to "break out" sessions for their own individual recognition ceremony.

As we wind down the fall season, we are now preparing for our upcoming winter seasons in girls and boys basketball, bowling, and swimming, and wrestling. Student-athletes interested in participating in any Lake athletic activity are required to have a current physical, and have a completed parent signoff form, emergency medical authorization form, and parent concussion review form. All forms are available at the Lake Athletic Office.



Activity Fees

Students and parents are reminded that the Lake Local Board of Education has established an Activity Fee for all students hoping to compete in interscholastic athletics for the 2015-16 school year. High school students pay a once-per-year fee of \$125 to participate in sports, while a middle school student is required to pay \$75. There is a three-student fee cap for those families with more than three students participating. Parents can pay on line at <u>www.payforit.net</u>, or in the Athletic Office at Lake High School.

Lake Athletic Passes

The Lake Athletic Department offers two different passes for our Blue Streak fans. The Senior Citizen pass is available to any Lake Township resident who is 65 or over and provides free admission to any Lake Middle School or high school home athletic event, not including tournaments or OHSAA contests. Any person who meets this criteria should contact the Lake Athletic Office at (330) 877-4288 to order the pass. Proof of age and residency may be requested upon pick-up. We also offer a "Fantastic Pass" to supporters of any age. Those who purchase the "Fantastic Pass" for \$40 will get \$50 of general admissions to Lake home events that are not tournaments or OHSAA contests. These passes never expire and can be used only at the gate on game nights.
