“Transitory” Inflation Still Lingers

As inflation hit an all-time high of 6.2% last November, the effects were felt across the nation, as prices from commodities to energy and housing each saw a massive increase in price, following a slow closure of the COVID-19 pandemic. The Bureau of Labor Statistics reported the inflation rate, some of the highest the nation has ever seen since the 90's. While prices continue to rise, U.S. citizens are left with a gaping hole in their wallets, after their weekly grocery runs. Earlier this year, the rise in prices was driven by a few outliers, such as used car prices, which surged when automakers were unable to get key computer chips to make new cars. While the increase in the price of used cars has ebbed somewhat, other items, such as food and energy are now driving overall prices higher, and continuing to rise.

The inflation, by some economists, has been labelled as “transitory,” which is, defined from transitory as “not permanent,” though, transitory does not necessarily mean short-lasting, either. Tim Smart of US News in an article titled ‘Inflation Continued Ugly Rise in October,’ cited a group of economic strategists when he said, “Inflation upside catalysts are clearly



materializing and look unlikely to fade in the near-term.” The problem is, after six months of increased inflation, many are beginning to ask, ‘How long will temporary really be?’

Several factors come into play. From trade halts and primarily the closed ports outside of major shipment areas, such as Long Beach, LA, prices of goods have spiked. In addition, with many workers changing professions or quitting their jobs over quarantine, with the stimulus checks providing financial compensation, many services find themselves in high demand for labor. Upland High’s Government and Economics teacher, Daniel Carrasco provided insight on the situation, when he said, “The first thing that I think needs to be done, which is easier said than done - part of the reason for the supply shock is that it is too full. One, there are labor shortages. There are a load of people working who should probably be working in the near future. The unemployment benefits are going to expire, whether it was unemployment benefits or stimulus checks, that money is going to run out. It’s going to be a matter of time for people, particularly adults, if they hadn’t been working [before], they’re going to have to go back to work at some point.”

Carrasco explained his next point when he said, “The second factor, which is much harder to fix, is that I’ve read that the bottleneck at the border and even at ports, have lines being a lot longer to get into companies transporting goods from, say, Mexico. It is very difficult to get into the States because people are doing checks, particularly for COVID. If you have that bottle-necking, where it takes you a lot longer to go through a line to get across the border, then there’s clearly going to be a delay for everything. There are huge transportation delays right now. Our biggest port on the West Coast is at Long



Beach and it’s a combination of not having enough workers and the government making sure that people, who are coming into this country, aren’t sick. If COVID begins to trend down, I can see the government relaxing their restrictions. But if COVID rates go up because of flu season, then we might see an uphill trend.”

As inflation continues to rise and the future looks to continue the bullish trend, a second question arises of “How can it be stopped?” Historically, the government fights inflation by increasing the supply of goods and services, while simultaneously reducing money incomes; the opposite of the current U.S. situation. A new, common idea to fight inflation is to raise the minimum wage, as with more money to spend, the more affordable and less drastic the increasing prices become.

In theory, it sounds fine, though Carrasco and other economic officials oppose this idea. Carrasco said, “In California, we’ve done a pretty good job at increasing the minimum wage compared to the

national average. In California we have \$14.00 an hour and nationally, it’s something like seven. I don’t know if that’s going to solve the inflation, as typically with inflation it’s a direct result of the demand for goods being sky-high and there isn’t a lot of supply.” A better solution, as Carrasco explained, would be to, “[Address] the problem with COVID and the pandemic, and the labor shortage first.”

Carrasco’s perspective holds that in agreement to the transitory state, as the future of the economic inflation ultimately falls within the U.S. population’s urge and reason to return to work, as well as to combat COVID-19 and the current quarantine. Carrasco said, “People need to understand that we can’t have it both ways. We’re in a pandemic, and there should be strong mask mandates, and if you want things to open up, that’s great. But you need to understand that it is a mask mandate that we have to wear, is inconvenient, and nobody likes, is there for a reason.”

Gun Rights Reach Supreme Court

Currently the long clash on states’ rights and federal power is making its way to the Supreme Court in a case regarding gun rights. Autonomy is the overall concern of the case, which aligns itself with another issue reaching the court: abortion rights. Keying in on the clashes and sides of gun rights, it is considerable the polarization the issue holds, especially in the current political climate of two central parties, within our nation. The stakes are high with the centermost part being the central pillars of “life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness.”

As New York’s “Proper Clause Act” is probed within the highest court of America, the dispute focus-

es on gun carriership outside of the home, in specific regards to the state. It tends to hold more limitations and safeguards under the reason for the

need for public safety. On the other hand, the right of the second amendment in autonomy and property is questioned.

Exploring different issues through curriculum, McGee, a Language and Composition teacher said, “There had been a lot of mass shootings in the past years, obviously things with our government can be very polarized, which causes gridlock. One side is really extreme as the same is to

the other. But if we look at the data, although I don’t know in particular, I think most Americans are in favor of some sort of progress being made in gun control. I think there is a healthy middle ground, where people who are pro-second amendment will be happy

and also people who want to make sure of protection are happy”

Human behavior and the rights the government holds are another representative clash within the case. It dates back to a loose and strict interpretation of the Constitution as well as environmental issues. McGee said, “Government, in my personal opinion, if you’re trying to change human behavior, can control in a huge way. When you think about recycling for instance, people can recycle all they want, but it’s not until the government creates certain laws, such as the plastic bag one and no plastic straws or the government comes on to big corporations, that mentality changes. Tying back into gun rights, if you live in a state where limitations are lesser, then the second amendment is interpretive of the people who live there. In the states where it’s strict, it’s in the view of their perspective, creating subcultures within the nation. Now, it can be hard for a Californian and Texan to have a discussion, due to different governmental regulations and such.”

Tones and attitudes held towards a gun can be reflected in the mentality of its owner. Mc-

Gee said, “Interesting enough, Snoop Dogg, as asked about guns and if he still processed guns, as of my memory said he stopped carrying a gun and it felt as if it changed his mentality. It seemed as he got into more altercations and as he stopped carrying, it seemed as if such left him. But I wouldn’t know if it changes one’s mentality, as I don’t carry or own a gun.”

McGee continued and said, the Constitution is a, “Living, breathing document.” It will change and be amended, as Democracy grows. A question and considerable wonder lie in the true identity, as well as definition of America and what it strives to be. Freedom is open ended for much interpretation and as such, the Supreme Court has always relied on Constitutional values, but the states have been regarded in their autonomy, alongside the people with strong public opinion.

In the ABC News 10 online article, "Investigating causes of the ongoing 'labor shortage'," by Lauren Brill, it said, "Things have changed drastically since COVID-19 hit. One reason is there were a lot of jobs that were lost, but also people have readjusted their preferences, what would they accept in terms of benefits. Not just starting bonuses, but even the benefits the jobs provide, which is why I think there are certain industries that are having a hard time hiring."

With the pandemic taking such a large toll on the world's mental health, it affected the way society views their lives and future. Several people made changes and went through different experiences during this time, which impacted their economic decisions. When certain events happen they can, "almost literally rewire our brain," said Ulrike Malmendier, from National Public Radio's online article, "Why are so many Americans quitting their jobs?" Malmendier cites research from neuroscience explaining how. "Evidence

While the pandemic influenced many of people's life decisions, it also impacted businesses and their hourly pay. Many businesses overworked their employees. USA Today's online article, "Staffing shortage? Bring in the teenagers," by Jordan Schmitt said, "Teenagers have become one of the largest segments of the working population." Plenty of teens picked up a job over quarantine, since almost every place was hiring, but were faced with the difficulty of balancing work, school, and a social life.

Junior, Destani Garcia, had to face the challenge of working during the pandemic. She recently quit her job and said, "It was too much for me. I had no time for school work, nor time for myself." Garcia can speak for lots of teens who felt this way about school going back to in-person this year. She also explained that her job overworked her, while not paying enough and not even meeting minimum wage. Garcia became overwhelmed and stressed with so much on her plate that she eventually became too tired and chose to seek her peace and sanity. When asked if she thinks she would like to step back into another job, she expressed that she has been on the hunt for a new job that will not interfere with school and her future.

quit their jobs in September as labor market tumult continued" said, "The September data came during a period when coronavirus cases were spiking, creating child-care and safety pressures for many employees as they rethought their daily routines."

As the cases continued to rise, more

Rosenberg said, "A strong stock market combined with stimulus checks and other benefits have helped pad workers' savings, making it easier for them to cut loose or retire, rather than hold on to a job they no longer want."

Americans are taking the easy way out, not knowing the damage they are



and more Americans became hesitant to work. Rosenberg said, "The number of people quitting in September constituted three percent of the workforce, according to a monthly Bureau of Labor Statistics survey released Friday. That number is up from the previous record, set in August, when 4.3 million people quit their jobs — about 2.9 percent of the workforce."

Businesses continue to seek employees and continue to suffer. Alexander W. Bartik's online article from pnas.org, "The Impact of COVID-19 On Small Business Outcomes and Expectations," said, "Over the entire sample, the number of full-time employees had fallen by 32% between January 31 and late March 2020. The number of part-time employees was 57% lower than at the end of January. Overall employment declined significantly, totaling a 39% reduction from January headcount. These results include businesses that had temporarily closed. If we look only at businesses that were still operating, we find that the number of total full-time employees had fallen by 17.3%. The number of part-time employees declined by 34%."

The people who quit their jobs are finding other ways to bring in money.

doing to their economy. Small businesses and workplaces continue to struggle to survive. Rosenberg said, "Industries with the highest percentages of workers quitting include trade, transportation and utilities, retail, and leisure and hospitality, including those who work in arts and entertainment, at hotels and in restaurants." Businesses that require workers to come in contact with other people are the ones that are having people quit. A lot of workers are worried for their own health.

In the CNBC article, "Hiring for these jobs is on the rise in 2021, according to LinkedIn," by Jennifer Liu, it said, "In a shift from recent years that have seen tech jobs as one of the most prominent fields for opportunity, the past year showed the rise of human-centric roles to cater to new and urgent needs brought on by the pandemic."

The economic crisis is real and businesses will continue to struggle to survive. With workers now seeking job opportunities in other sectors and not willing to place themselves in roles where they may be exposed, no one is sure how long the crisis will continue. Perhaps, it may just be the beginning of a whole new era.

While the science behind the Aurora Borealis is interesting in its own way, the experience one receives from watching the lights can change one's entire perspective on the beauty created.

The Northern Lights come in many different colors, such as red violet, red, green, pink, yellow and blue. According to the online article, "Northern Lights," from northernlightscentre.ca it explains that the different colors are caused by the collision between gaseous particles in the atmosphere, with charged particles from the sun. Northernlightscentre.ca explained the way the chemical reactions make our earth's poles so beautiful when it said, "The temperature above the surface of the sun is millions of degrees Celsius. At this temperature, collisions between gas molecules are frequent and explosive. Free electrons and protons are thrown from the sun's atmosphere by the rotation of the sun and escape through holes in the magnetic field. Blown towards the earth by the solar wind, the charged particles are largely deflected by the earth's magnetic field. However, the earth's magnetic field is weaker at either pole and therefore some particles enter the earth's atmosphere and collide with gas particles. These collisions emit light that we perceive as the dancing lights of the north (and the south)."

The Aurora Borealis appears in many

tales and folklore around the world. The online article, "Northern Lights," from northernlightscentre.ca, explained the legend of the lights as, "The lights of the northern hemisphere, means 'dawn of the north'. 'Aurora Australis' means 'dawn of the south'. In Roman myths, Aurora was the goddess of the dawn. In medieval times, the occurrences of auroral displays were seen as harbingers of war or famine."

When asked about the Northern Lights, Mrs. Nyguen, a chemistry teacher, said, "I desperately want to see them and I think they're majestic and magical. 


on."



The most common story told about St Lucia is that she would secretly bring food to the persecuted Christians in Rome, who lived in hiding in the catacombs under the city. 


try out an iPhone for the first time.


down from the previous model, as Grunin said, "But its photo and video quality aren't nearly as good as the Sony A6000's."

The T6 isn't all that great for shooting fast moving stuff as Grunin said,


"But it's not really satisfying for shooting subjects in motion, especially fast-moving kids or pets." The T6 succeeds in some areas, such as


Cobra Kai is also (finally) launching on Netflix on December 31st! Fans
