

We provide **personal attention** by being actively present and attentive to students and responding with appropriate compassion and encouragement as they go through adolescence.

We establish a demanding curriculum, provide captivating lessons and adapt methodologies to meet the changing needs of our students and our world. OUR HISTORY

For 127 years, Catholic High School (CHS) has set the standard for excellence in education in the Baton Rouge area. Founded in 1894 by the Brothers of the Sacred Heart, CHS is an all-male college preparatory school for grades 8-12, dedicated to providing opportunities for the development of the spiritual, moral, intellectual, social, and physical growth of each student.

Catholic High School's holistic approach to education builds a community spirit that is characterized by Christian values, an orderly and disciplined atmosphere, a personal approach to education and a commitment to academic excellence.





CHRISTIAN VALUES

Catholic High School's overall program of faith formation is designed to form young men to live their lives for others in the spirit of the Gospel. An important element involved in this effort is service to others, not only at school, but also in the wider community.

THE CHS SPIRITUAL GROWTH PROGRAM INCLUDES:

• Daily Religious Education and Classroom Prayer

Because of the essential role of prayer in the formation of a personal relationship with God, students participate in varied and regular experiences of prayer through daily school-wide prayer, classroom prayer, and retreats.

• Eucharistic Liturgies and the Sacrament of Reconciliation

Eucharistic liturgies are held monthly on the CHS campus. Involvement of many school groups in planning liturgies helps make the celebrations more meaningful to students. Students are strongly encouraged to participate in the Sacrament of Reconciliation, which is offered at school each semester. Active involvement at the parish level is recommended as an excellent introduction to the greater Church.

• Student Ministry Team

The Student Ministry Team is composed of juniors and seniors who serve as mentors to the 8th and 9th graders. Once a month, student ministers meet with 8th and 9th graders in their religion classes to discuss life issues relevant to high school students in a Catholic school.

• Yearly Class Retreats

Each October, seniors participate in an overnight retreat which provides them the opportunity to grow closer to God and to one another. Students in grades 8, 9, 10 and 11 participate in a full day retreat, with special attention given to the needs of each age group.

• Service Requirements

Serving others is an essential part of our call to follow Jesus Christ. Thus, the CHS service program is an integral part of religion courses within each student's curriculum. Students are required to perform a designated number and type of service hours each year.

• School-Wide Projects/Extracurricular Service

Catholic High participates in several school-wide projects designed to help the poor. In connection with Catholic High's extracurricular program, students are involved in community activities such as blood drives, toy drives, food collection and Operation Rice Bowl, Habitat for Humanity, and Mission Amatongas.

• Honor Code

The Honor Code and the Honor Board at Catholic High School were created and installed in 1997 as a result of a student initiative. All members of the Board are elected by students. The Honor Code is a commitment from each student to uphold the ideals of Catholic High School and the Brothers of the Sacred Heart.



200 YEARS OF THE BROTHERS OF THE SACRED HEART




Father André Coindre, filled with compassion for the suffering young people of his time, established a religious institute in 1821 to serve their needs and provide for their well-being. A group of men, initially 10 in number, took vows in the Institute of the Brothers of the Sacred Hearts of Jesus and Mary, and dedicated their community to these young people. Today, Coindre's charism thrives in the eleven Brothers of the Sacred Heart schools in the Province of the United States.

Though separated geographically and culturally and serving locales with different needs and challenges, these schools share a common vision of education: the evangelization of young people. As genuine partners in mission, the Brothers and lay men and women who work in these schools strive to embody Coindre's charism in various educational settings while recognizing that local circumstances demand creative adaptation, not mere imitation.

2021 is a special year for the Brothers of the Sacred Heart and all of the partners in mission as we celebrate the 200th anniversary of the founding of the Brothers in Lyon, France. The bicentennial celebration at Catholic High on September 30, 2021, honored Fr. Andre Coindre's wisdom, sacrifice, compassion, and vision in his founding of the Brothers of the Sacred Heart and paid tribute to the Brothers who have responded to the call to carry out his mission over the past two centuries. Catholic High School strives to be a sanctuary for the young men on our campus, dedicated to teaching gospel values in an environment of academic excellence according to the Catholic tradition and the spirit of the Brothers of the Sacred Heart.





ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

Through its philosophy, admission policies, curriculum and facilities, Catholic High School strives to create an atmosphere for learning and growth. Such an atmosphere provides each student an opportunity to realize his potential and to develop healthy attitudes and responsible behavior that will permit him to pursue continued studies and to assume his place in society as a concerned Christian gentleman.

Catholic High School conducts an eighth grade program and a four-year high school program. Students must complete four years of high school studies in order to graduate.

At CHS, technology is utilized as a tool to enhance instruction. Since proficiency with various technologies is, and will continue to be, an essential college and workplace skill, we provide each student with a pen and touch-enabled laptop computer so he can build an effective skill base.

COUNSELING CENTER

It is the goal of the Counseling Center to conduct individual meetings with students in addition to group/classroom meetings. These meetings are intended to guide the student academically, socially, and vocationally, as well as to evaluate his progress in school and to guide in college planning. It is hoped that through his years at Catholic High School, each student learns how to make wise personal choices, recognizes and achieves his full potential, develops moral values, and adapts to life and its pressures, while being convinced of God's love for him.

If a student encounters difficulty in the classroom or at home, whether it involves poor grades, personal conflicts, or some problem he wishes to discuss, all eight counselors in the Counseling Center are available for assistance, with specific counselors responsible for each grade level. Through student conferences, student-parent conferences, or student-parent-teacher conferences, the counselor tries to help the student handle various situations and learn from the experience.

“The underlying principle of our guidance and counseling programs is the belief that each student is a child of God who is loved and loving, who possesses a unique dignity, and who has a positive contribution to make in building the reign of God. Through individual and group work, guidance counselors help students accept and live out this empowering truth. Because every experience affects an individual's understanding of who he or she is, counselors assist students by addressing academic, disciplinary, personal, social, and family concerns.

STUDENT RESOURCES

STUDENT MENTORING PROGRAM

In the 2020-2021 school year, CHS initiated the Student Mentoring Program in order to add one more dimension of personal attention at Catholic High School. In this mentoring program, each student is assigned a faculty member who serves as that student's mentor throughout his time at CHS. Mentors meet monthly with their group of students as well as individually during the school year. Designed to be one additional support service at CHS, we believe this mentoring program increases opportunities for students to have a significant adult in their lives beyond their teachers, coaches, club moderators, and counselors. The mentoring program is not a replacement for our Counseling Center or academic support initiatives, but is meant to give every student one more adult on campus who can address their needs and serve as an advocate for that student.



STANDARDIZED TEST PREP

Catholic High School includes a standardized test preparation program as part of its basic curriculum for all students. Prior to standardized testing in both the spring and fall, students attend a total of five sessions each semester taught by CHS teachers. Designed to provide students with the skills and strategies necessary to maximize their results, these test prep sessions are in addition to our standard college preparatory curriculum.



SUMMER READING BOOK CLUB

Catholic High School revamped its summer reading assignment to a book club approach. After selecting preferences from a list of over 50 titles, students are assigned one of their choices to read over the summer. Upon the return to school in August, students participate in discussions, offering an opportunity for engagement with their selected book, with peers, and with a faculty facilitator.

The mission of the CHS Summer Reading Program is to encourage a love of reading by providing selections that not only have literary merit but are engaging and relatable as well, to foster the critical thinking and writing skills our students need to be successful, and to teach students to engage in constructive dialogue that is respectful, honest, and mature.





IN KEEPING WITH THE EDUCATIONAL TRADITION of the Brothers of the Sacred Heart, no student is refused admission or asked to leave Catholic High School solely because of his family's inability to pay tuition.

FINANCIAL INFORMATION

- Tuition and new student registration for 2020-2021 is \$12,335.
- Installment tuition payments are interest-free and require no bank financing.
- Tuition can be paid monthly, semi-annually or annually. All payments are made through electronic drafts of checking, savings, credit or debit card accounts.
- Tuition assistance is available for students whose families have financial need.

Catholic High School admits students of any race, color, national or ethnic origin, or religious preference. In admitting students, we look for young people who can profit from and contribute to the religious and educational mission of the school. While accepting the fact that there is a limit to what any one institution can do, we believe that the school is to serve a broad cross section of students with regard to both academic ability and socioeconomic status. Promoting and maintaining a diversity of students within the school community is a positive value consistent with the tradition of the Brothers of the Sacred Heart. Therefore, in the admission of students, high priority is given to those whose families have supported our schools and Catholic schools in general, and great care is taken to ensure that the school does not become available only to the social, academic or athletic elite.
