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



A worthwhile commute

On an average day—before COVID-19 changed everything—Windia Ire-Newman woke up at 4:30 a.m. to travel from her home in Calumet Heights to school at Josephinum Academy.


"It's a long process, getting on multiple buses," the JA senior said. "It's an hour and 45 minutes. Two hours if traffic is bad."

It's a long commute—but one that Windia never questioned. Since she first learned about Josephinum Academy during a presentation at her middle school, she decided, "Yeah, I'm going to go there. I liked how they would talk about the sports and activities and stuff like that. And they seemed like they had a connection, like, teacher and student connection."

These days, Windia is involved in multiple clubs and activities—but it's the people that make the two-hour bus ride worth it.

"I'm really cool with all my teachers," she shared. "We can make jokes and have a good time in class, but also, like, get down to business."

"The girls that gravitate toward this school are really cool." Windia added. "So like everybody, I mean, everybody is really fun, cool, and funny... It's a great environment to create friends, and it gives a lot of good opportunities."



During a difficult year, Windia has continued to dream big about her future. "It was kinda hard at the beginning," she said. "I was really just like, this is going to be the worst year ever, but as it went on, it became easier."

She is looking forward to attending an HBCU, but hasn't decided what to major in yet. She's considering starting a business. And she plans to go to cosmetology school, too, either during or after college.

"There's not one thing I want to set my mind to," she said. She wants to do and try so many things, just like she has learned to do at The Jo—and she has no plans to start imposing limits now!



When Marlen Gonzalez started at Josephinum Academy, she was struggling to succeed.

"I came into Josephinum with a 2.7 GPA, but I knew that I wanted to do better. And I knew that I wanted to have a bright future."

Marlen always dreamt of being on television. "When I was little, I used to lock myself in the bathroom and play in front of the mirror," she shared. "I was so dramatic!"

At Josephinum Academy, her aspirations started to feel possible for the very first time. She took drama courses and joined The Jo's theater program, while also remaining active in NHS, the Ambassadors Club, and soccer.

"Once I was here, I got the initial exposure to the industry that I always loved. I learned how to be disciplined. I learned how to manage my time," she shared.

Now working in the media industry, Marlen reflects on the lasting impact The Jo had on her career and her confidence.

"I found out that I was really smart, and I didn't think that before."

"I know I still have so much to learn, but Josephinum set the foundation."

Her counselor nominated Marlen for a scholarship, and Marlen received an award to attend Cornell University after she graduated from Josephinum Academy in 2015.

"Because of that opportunity, because of my scholarship, I have a degree that I could only have dreamed of. I knew I had crazy dreams, but the scholarship gave me the opportunity to really think of the world as my oyster—to really go for it."

Now, with a college degree and a job she loves, Marlen looks back at her time at The Jo with gratitude.

The power of an arts education

When David Fehr directed his first theater production at Josephinum Academy in 2010, it was like lightening had struck.

"The work we were doing was transformative for everything else. We saw huge jumps in participation—grades increased across the board."

David, who is himself a professional actor and director, has grown the arts program from that single show more than a decade ago to the robust department it is today. Building on the legacy and foundation laid by educators who came before him, he has opened countless doors for the girls at Josephinum Academy to explore their own creative expression.

"We ask the question, 'What does it mean to be an artist?' And we ask the question because we are genuinely interested in the answer."

Regardless of the academic or career path they choose, David's students are well-equipped for success. Their ability to listen, work together, understand themselves, move in relation to others, and communicate with clarity crosses industries and disciplines.

"Acting is vocational and essential to creative collaboration. You use your talents with technique to make everything else more filled, more complete, better."

The fine arts department was growing, students were thriving, and David was continually introducing new opportunities for discovery and expression. Then COVID-19 disrupted everything.

For teachers like David, the pandemic brought a set of challenges they never could have anticipated. How do you continue creative exploration from home? How do you foster collaboration in the midst of isolation? And how do you ensure equity— of access, of resources, and of opportunity?

He and his fellow educators got

creative—and got to work. They distributed supplies to students, rewrote curricula, and introduced new methods for students to engage from home. They pivoted, and pivoted, and pivoted again.

Through it all, David returned, over and over, to one key lesson: his students are people first, and learners second.

"Before we worry about education, we first need to meet our needs as humans. We need to take care of us—as a school, as a community. As students, as faculty, as staff."

This personalized care has always been at the heart of Josephinum Academy—and it is core to each of the teachers who invest in our young women.

"The Jo is a joyful anomaly. Here, we ignite students' curiosity. We encourage questions. And we help each student go as far as they can, with joy, encouragement, serious educational edge, and technique."

Learning to prioritize mental health

The Jo is defined by our tight-knit community—one that supports and stands with students as they overcome challenges. In a year of separation and isolation, these hurdles were bigger than ever-and students like Natalie Venegas were faced with compounding crises.

"Last year was really difficult mentally for me," Natalie shared. "There was a lot of stuff going on in my personal life and I wasn't really sure how to handle it..."

"On top of that, I'm a student with ADHD," she added. "So I get distracted easily in my own household."

Natalie, who shares her home with 7 other people, had to learn to focus in the midst of endless distractions, while also taking care of her own mental health. She remembers long days trying to focus on school while her siblings were logged into their own classes, her mom worked from home, and her youngest sister participated in virtual kindergarten.

"All day we were trying to not interfere with each other or talk over each other. We were trying to stay quiet and respect each other's individual spaces."

"It was hard for me to focus, but the teachers did make a really good transition into the online learning platform," she said. "They helped keep us accountable by tracking our progress. And they were very accommodating to the students and their needs."

Outside the (virtual) classroom, helping students through this difficult time was a top priority for The Jo. The school provided support groups and other

resources-like a weekly stress and anxiety management group Natalie attended.

Students who participated were able to talk about their feelings and practice new coping skills with school counselors. "They're active listeners," Natalie said. "They're paying attention, and you can tell, and I feel like it's very important that people feel heard and seen."

The group was a safe space for students. "What was said in the group stayed in the group," affirmed Natalie.

Throughout the many challenges of the last year, Natalie has continued to grow. With the support of Josephinum Academy at her back, she's coming out of these difficult months with new tools for achieving her dreams.

"It helped me develop my own autonomy and independence," she shared. "And with being my own advocate ... I feel like this is a very important skill to have."





When asked to describe how she's changed during her time at Josephinum Academy, Lyric Robinson has a lot to say. The senior has grown significantly in the last four years, but she also recognizes how much she's learned in the last two years throughout the COVID-19 pandemic.

Before The Jo "I was really hard-headed. I was really disrespectful," admits Lyric.

"Sometimes I don't think I've grown up," says Lyric. "Then, everybody has come to me and been like, 'You have grown up so much!'"

She credits a lot of that change to her favorite part of The Jo: community.

"I just love the whole family dynamic," Lyric shares. "It helps everybody grow all around you."

And this family at The Jo has noticed how much she has grown.

"That's what a lot of the teachers love about me: how much I have changed and how much I have grown up," she shares with a smile. During the pandemic, Lyric got sick with COVID-19. "It was really hard," she says.


It was also hard to focus on online classes, but Lyric persevered. She relied on her family—both at home and at The Jo—to help her keep going.

"My mom, she helped me a lot, and some of my teachers," said Lyric. "I'm a really outgoing person, so they know when something's wrong. Ms. Schrantz was on me a lot, and she's the principal. She was like, 'Lyric, come on. I know it's hard, but we gotta get it done."

Now, as Lyric considers colleges—primarily HBCUs—and dreams of becoming a speech-language pathologist, she's thankful for the wide range of activities she experienced here.

She knows she'll take the lessons she has learned at The Jo—and the family she has built here—with her throughout her life.




The Josephinum Academy sisterhood
