The Clinton County Middle School Y-Club won 1st place Global Village at the Kentucky YMCA United Nations Assembly (KUNA) conference on March 8th. The Kentucky United Nations Assembly (KUNA) is a 3-day experiential learning conference in which students participate directly in simulated

international diplomacy. KUNA offers students the opportunity to experience the richness of cultures from around the world, develop empathy, and hone their critical thinking skills while engaging with a wide variety of perspectives and global issues. As Ambassadors emulating the culture and diverse interests of UN member countries from around the world, students dive deeply into the culture of another nation and are encouraged to re-examine the world from a new perspective. Students develop solutions for international issues by writing, presenting, debating, and voting on UN Resolutions. Students also celebrate cultural diversity by representing aspects of their

country's culture and traditions with a Booth in the Global Village, Country Signs & Flags during the Parade of Nations, Cultural Attire from their respective nations, and cultural performances on the International Stage.

This year Clinton County Middle School students in grades 6-8 represented the country

of Kenya. The students dressed in their native attire, created and performed an international dance, designed a global village, and debated resolutions dealing with nations around the world. Abbi Young, Christian Derryberry, and Jaden Mullins were recognized for the passage of their resolution in summit. Resolution

#24 called for a ban on the sale of ivory to prevent the killing of African elephants. Out with the Old...In with the New

The arrival of 260 new Chromebooks at Clinton County Middle School is the first mass deployment of individual technology devices in the school district. The Chromebooks will stock ten mobile carts that will be available for student use in classrooms. Each grade level will maintain the use of two carts on a permanent basis, and two additional carts will be available purchased using GEAR UP and KETS matching student and teacher at CCMS has a GAFE

funds. With the deployment of the Chromebooks, CCMS has become a GAFE school. Google Apps for Education (GAFE) is a core suite of communication and collaboration applications that allows students to work from any device on documents and projects. The apps include Gmail, Calendar, Drive, Docs, and Sites. A GAFE account will unlock these and for flexible scheduling. The Chromebooks were many other tools supported by Google, and each

account. All of the applications exist completely online (in the cloud), which means that creations can be accessed through any device with an Internet connection. As a result, students can continue work started on their Chromebook at school by logging in at home. Many teachers are in the process of setting up their own Google classrooms, which will allow them to make assignments and conduct assessments through GAFE.









CCMS Gets Chromebooks!

District Technology Coordinator Sid Scott has been integral to this process. While assisting with the preparation of the Chromebook carts, he expressed his excitement about this new development, saying, "We're meeting the students where they learn best, and that's with their own devices in the classrooms." He contrasted this more efficient and relevant method with the "old way" of doing things, in which teachers moved an entire classroom of

students to a computer lab in order to access technology. Mr. Scott is obviously thrilled about this step forward. CCMS Principal Teresa Scott is also overjoyed about the addition now starting to educate them using the of the new technology. She stated, "Our teachers and students are showing signs of excitement about a new way of teaching and learning at the middle school. Teachers are sharing ideas and students who have experience working with Chromebooks are offering what

they know. It's a beautiful thing to see us moving in this direction. Instead of students being educated the same way we were, we are technology they have grown up with. There may be some role changes between students and teachers since kids are more savvy than many adults. I'm proud of the way our staff has embraced the technology push!"










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CCMS PRIDE Club Takes Out the Trash

Clinton County Middle School has received a PRIDE Environmental Education grant in the amount of \$500.00. The purpose of the proposed project is to teach students at Clinton County Middle School the importance of environmental protection by expanding the efforts of the CCMS student PRIDE Club. Funds will be used to expand the nonfiction section of the school library to include environmental education books and to revitalize the outdoor classroom with plants native to Kentucky, planted by students. These projects are planned to occur in March and April, to celebrate Earth Day.





The State Organization on Arts and Disability

Clinton County Middle School has received an Arts Inclusion award in the amount of \$1,250.00, funded by VSA Kentucky, a nonprofit organization that provides opportunities in the arts for children and adults with disabilities. This award will fund a weeklong program at Clinton County Middle School with Berea blacksmith Bob Montgomery of the Wolf Gap Mountain Forge. During the project, Mr. Montgomery will work with the entire 5th grade class on a project called Blacksmithing – "Forging" a Connection Across the Curriculum. Mr. Montgomery will set up his mobile forge at CCMS for the weeklong program, which directly incorporates visual arts into the curriculum. While discussing the science, math, and history of metal forging, Mr. Montgomery will show students how to heat a piece of iron and transform it into a functional and decorative hook. Over the course of the week, every student involved in the project will have the opportunity to work in the forge and create hooks of their own. Each 5th grade core content teacher will visit the forge daily with the students and will incorporate the experience into their reading, writing, math, science, and social studies classes. The VSA project at CCMS is scheduled for April 25th – 29th.








White Coat Club at CCMS


