#### **AES "Pulls" for the "House"**

Students from Albany Elementary School recently led a campaign collecting pull tabs to benefit the Ronald McDonald House Charities of Nashville, Tennessee. An overwhelming 483 pounds of tabs from soft drink, soup, and vegetable cans were collected locally. This was approximately 7% of the overall total of 7,419 pounds collected by 74 schools participating in the 2015 Pull Tab Collection Challenge.

Employees of the local McDonald's restaurant attended an assembly held by school staff to celebrate, educate, and show gratitude for the combined efforts of the school and community. The event turned a little more personal when students were shown a video of a child whose family has benefited from having

that safe "home away from home" setting, which the Ronald McDonald House provides. It was also pointed out that several Clinton County families have benefited from the program, and that one was a current AES student participating in the assembly.

Students were challenged to design and build rockets using very specific guidelines based on the S.T.E.M. (Science, Technology, Engineering, & Math) principles. The competition included a head to head single elimination match and greatest distance launched using compressed air.

### **CCHS Receives Kitchen Equipment Grant**

Clinton County High School was recently awarded a \$25,000 grant from the Kentucky Department of Education to purchase new kitchen equipment. The district utilized the same size serving from a fryer. Food, including funds to purchase a new combi-oven and a doublestack convection oven, which will greatly look very appealing, which may encourage improve nutritional value and overall quality of meals served at the high school. First, serving baked, instead of fried, foods, can make a substantial difference in the calories, fat, and saturated fat that children consume. For

example, a ½ cup serving of French fries from a equipment. The new doublestack convection combi-oven will have 17% less calories. 55% less fat, and 34% less saturated fat than the vegetables, prepared in a new combi-oven will children to try and enjoy healthier items that they do not currently eat. Popular "kid foods" like French fries and chicken strips are now available in healthier (and tastier) versions, designed specifically for preparation in this

oven will also mean that food will be fresher when the students receive it, improving the overall quality of the school meals. The Clinton County Food Services Program and the Healthy Hometown Coalition are both extremely pleased with the new kitchen equipment and the positive impact it will have on the high school's food services program.


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#### **CCMS Drug Busters**



including currency, clothing, food, housing, and styles from the countries. The countries represented were Africa, China, Egypt, Germany, Iceland, India, Japan, and Mexico.


















## KY Chautauqua Presents Simon Kenton

The Jack Kent Cooke Foundation Young Scholars Program is one of the most competitive and personalized scholarship and educational support programs in the nation. Recently,

Clinton County Middle School student Dalton Gregory learned that he had been selected for this program, which enables high-ability middle and high school students with financial need to realize their full academic potential. The Foundation assigns each Young Scholar an on-staff educational

adviser who



works closely with the student and his or her family to guide the student and oversee the educational opportunities the Foundation provides throughout high school. Support for each student is tailored to his or her unique goals, strengths, and interests. Program benefits include assistance identifying a challenging high school and a suitable academic course load, summer academic and enrichment programs, college and career counseling, lessons to develop music, art, or other talents, study abroad and community service opportunities, supplemental academic classes, a computer and software, and access to a high-achieving peer community.

Dalton learned about this opportunity with the Jack Kent Cooke Foundation through his participation in the Duke TIP 7th Grade Talent Search Program last year. The highly competitive application process included an essay, interview, and letters of

recommendation. Over two-thousand applications from all over the U.S. were submitted, and Dalton was among the 70 who were selected for the Young Scholars

Program. During his participation in the program, Dalton must maintain grades of A's and B's in rigorous coursework throughout his high school years. He would like to thank CCMS teachers Lonnie Brown, Danielle Hicks, and Debbie Lowhorn for helping him during the application process by writing letters of recommendation. Dalton is the son of Kathleen and Junior Gregory. Dalton's father shared his thoughts, "I think it's great. It's an opportunity that our other two didn't have. It's like hitting the lottery." Dalton's mother commented on the college

preparation aspect, saying, "I think it's an amazing opportunity for him, because he is going to get to visit lots of places and colleges beforehand." 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#### **CCMS Y-Club Attends KYA Conference**

The Clinton County Y-Club students and sponsors were honored at the November school board meeting for their achievements at the Kentucky Youth Assembly (KYA) Conference in Louisville on November 8<sup>th</sup> - 10<sup>th</sup> The Y-Club is a student-run school or community-based organization for Middle and High School students (Grades 6-12) that promotes civic engagement, servant leadership, and social responsibility through model government, service learning, and advocacy. The Kentucky Youth Assembly (KYA) is a 3-

day experiential learning program in which students serve as part of a model state government. KYA offers students the opportunity to learn about a wide variety of issues, develop critical thinking skills, and articulate their beliefs while engaging constructively with their peers from around the Commonwealth.

The Clinton County Middle School Y-Club recently attended the KYA Conference in Louisville and presented several bills, including a bill to require all Kentucky motorcyclists to wear head protection when driving on public roads, a bill to re-enact the Homestead Act, a bill to make all Kentucky playgrounds handicap accessible, and a bill to require ID's for the use of food stamp cards. The students worked extremely hard and received awards for Delegation of Excellence, Outstanding Speaker, Outstanding Delegate, and Merit of Service. 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

"Wow" item—like a doll or soccer ball—other fun toys, school supplies, hygiene items and notes of encouragement.
