Healthy Hometown Project Receives Phase II IKF Funding

Clinton County Board of Education is excited to announce that the Healthy Hometown initiative has been approved for Phase II funding through the Foundation for a Healthy Kentucky. Phase II funding will bring \$400,000 into the county over a period of three years to improve the Nutrition, Physical Activity, and Health / Wellness in both the schools and in the

community. The Foundation for a Healthy Kentucky has selected six (6) rural and urban communities throughout the Commonwealth for funding through its new Investing in Kentucky's Future (IKF) initiative. This five-year, \$3 million program seeks to test innovative ways to reduce risks of chronic disease for today's school-aged children as they grow into

adults. These initial grants include funding for planning, along with training and technical assistance, so community groups can determine the most promising strategies to launch effective, sustainable models to improve children's health. The Clinton County Healthy Hometown Coalition is thrilled to be one of those six IKF grantees!



April Speck, left, will continue in the role of Healthy Hometown Coordinator for the Clinton County initiative. April is responsible for daily operations of the coalition and the overall attainment of project goals and objectives. Cheryl Boils, right, was recently selected by the coalition to serve in the role of Student Fitness Leader. Cheryl will work for twenty hours per week during the school year to ensure fidelity to the Physical Activity component of the business plan.

Healthy Hometown Project

This next step would not have been possible without the support of the numerous community partners who comprise the coalition. The Clinton County Healthy Hometown Coalition began with a broad mission to improve the health of Clinton County residents. The Healthy Hometown Coalition has realized that our approach to the complex problem of childhood obesity must be a comprehensive one. Our strategies, have

been organized into a multifaceted health action plan for children with three strategic focal points: Nutrition, Physical Activity, and Overall Health / Wellness. Each of these focal points will include both school and community activities. The three goals of the Healthy Hometown initiative are: Goal 1: To reduce childhood obesity in Clinton County by improving school-age children's daily physical activity level and nutritional habits. Goal 2: To

facilitate development of lifetime healthy eating and active living habits among Clinton County children. Goal 3: To make Clinton County a healthy hometown for its residents by encouraging key community policy changes.

Explorium Outreach Program

On December 11, 2014, Gifted and Talented students in grades K—4 experienced an interactive, hands-on activity designed to promote curiosity and encourage higher level thinking Albany Elementary School. The Explorium of Lexington Outreach Program focuses on enhancing growth and increasing awareness in science, social studies,

mathematics, and arts. The students in grades K-2 enjoyed the Math Magic class. Students learned that magicians rely on math to perform cool illusions every day. Using applied math, students also learned how to defy the odds and untangle mystifying math puzzles. They solved word problems, riddles, and more using “math magic!” The students in grades 3-4 participated

in the Mysteries of the Great Masters class. These students had fun while learning about famous artwork in an interactive program. Students explored the timeline of art history through the ages and uncovered the meanings of many famous paintings through drama and class discussion.



Wonder on Wheels Outreach Program

Gifted and Talented students at Albany Elementary School explored the wonders of art and science during the Living Arts & Science Center Wonders on Wheels Outreach Program on January 13, 2015. The Wonders on Wheels program provided creative and unique

opportunities for exploration and education in the arts and sciences for Gifted and Talented students at Albany Elementary School. During the program, students participated in two sessions: STARLAB Planetarium and The Nature of Color. Students had the opportunity

Noetic Learning Math Contest

On November 17, 2014, thirty students from Albany Elementary School and eight students from Clinton County Middle School competed in the Noetic Learning Math Contest. Noetic Learning Math Contest is a national elementary math problem solving contest held twice a year. In this year's fall contest, 19,367 young mathletes representing 1,279 teams across the country competed.

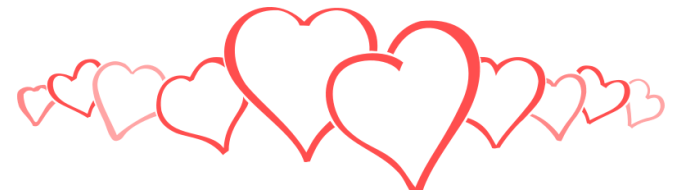

National Duck Stamp Contest

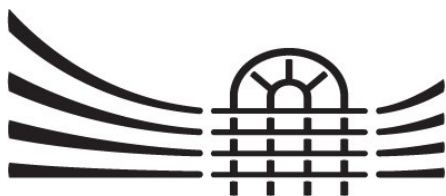

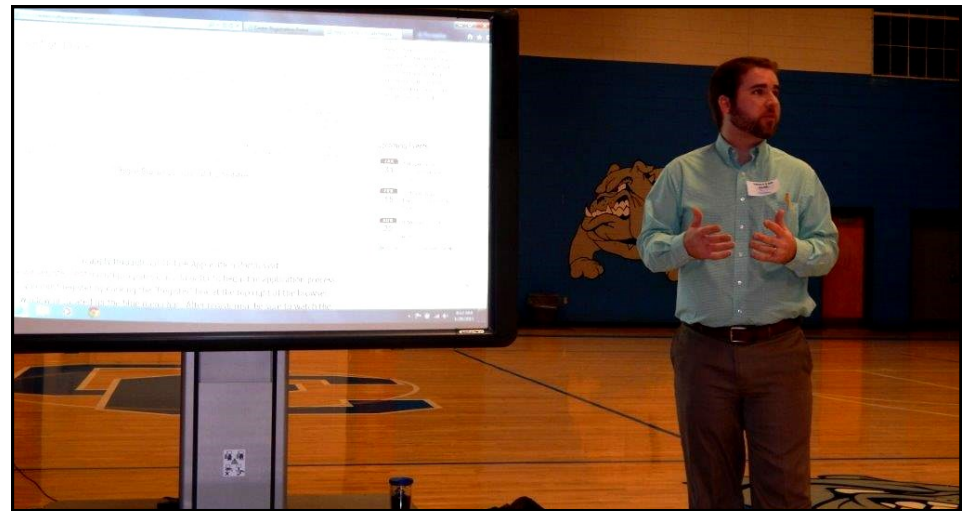


Rogers Explorers

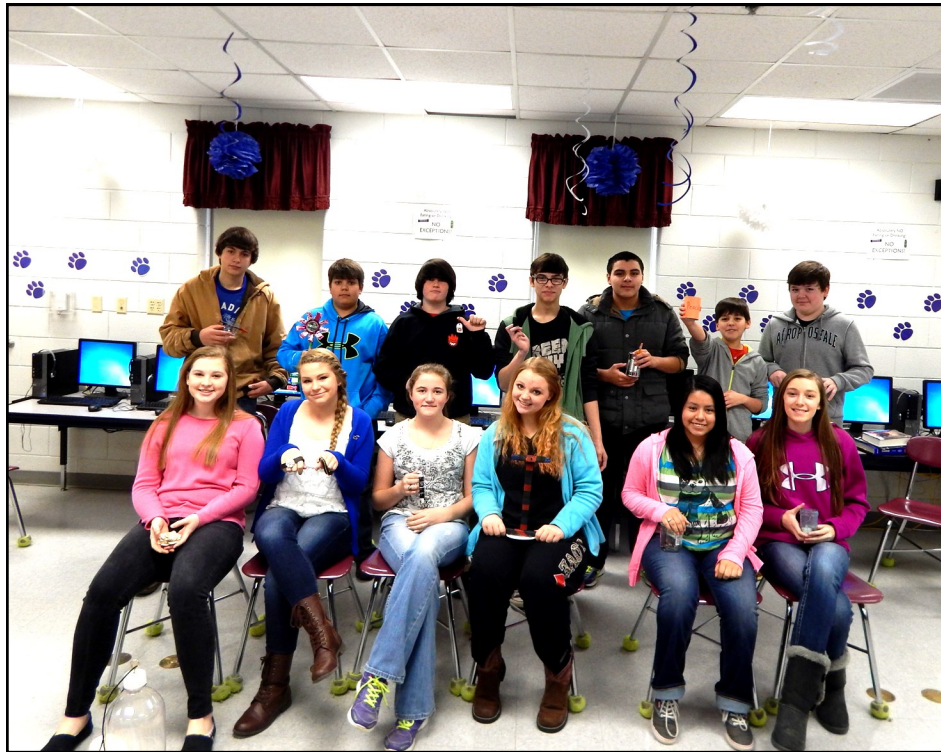


CCMS Reduce, Reuse, Recycle Projects

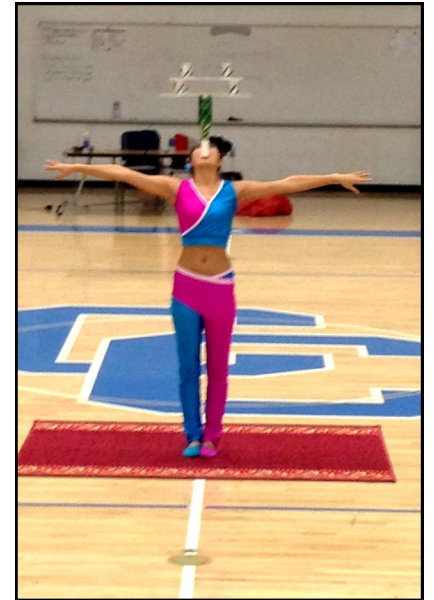
asked to generate examples of how they could reuse varied items that would normally be thrown away. Students brought several examples to class and explained to the class how to reuse the items instead of throwing them

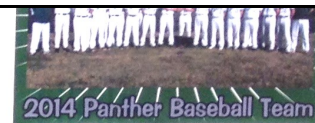
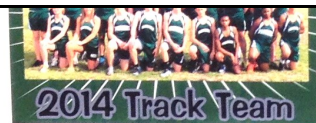
FRYSC Hosts Drug Free Night
