The third grade students at Albany Elementary School visited Clinton County Care and Rehabilitation Center just before the holiday break to share a little Christmas cheer


were dressed as reindeer, elves, and even Santa and Mrs. Claus as they filled the halls, singing Christmas carols. Students also brought gifts

On December 7th & 8th, Gifted and Talented students from AES embarked on an exciting weekend of discovery in Gatlinburg, Tennessee. Students enjoyed visits to the Rainforest Adventure Discovery Zoo and Ripley's Aquarium of the Smokies before watching the annual Fantasy of Lights Christmas Parade through downtown Gatlinburg. At the Discovery Zoo, students entered the rainforest to discover venomous snakes, giant tortoises, ring tailed lemurs, and vibrantly colored birds. Over 600 live animals representing over 130 species were housed in this facility. At Ripley's Aquarium, students were treated to several hands-on learning opportunities, including a dive show in Stingray

Bay and Creature Feature—one on one time with an animal. Meals were served in the aquarium in-house restaurant Feeding Frenzy. Students were challenged to complete a scavenger hunt on a self-guided tour of the aquarium. After long day of learning and play, students set up camp in a tunnel in Shark Lagoon and got to sleep under the shark tanks.






8th Grade EXPLORE Results...

Clinton County Middle School eighth graders exceeded the national average on the EXPLORE test in English, reading and science. Scores were only a tenth of a point below the national average in math and were actually a

tenth of a point higher nationally on the overall test (15.6 compared to 15.5). CCMS staff and students celebrated this success on Wednesday, December 19, 2012. Eighth grade students were treated to ice cream and cupcakes while


The next ride was the bouncy slide. Now, its name was pretty much self-explanatory because you did slide, but you were also

The students enrolled in the Emergency Procedures class at the Kentucky Tech - Clinton County Area Technology Center taught by the Health Sciences Instructor Billie Frye, RN participated in a mock disaster in December. The students were given the opportunity to practice and demonstrate the many life-saving

skills they learned in the course. The students performed the following skills: CPR, rescue breathing, bandaging, caring for a person during seizure activity, care for a person experiencing anaphylactic shock, Heimlich maneuver, treatment for an amputation, care for a stroke victim, treatment for a person during a

myocardial infarction, and care for a nose bleed. This mock disaster gave the students valuable experience to practice and use the many skills they learned. At the completion of the course, the students received their CPR and Safety First Aid certification through the American Heart Association.
