



Giving Students a "Head Start"

Students and staff at Clinton County Head Start are happy to be back in school and are off to a great start this year! Located in the Clinton County Early Childhood Center, Head Start serves 40 three and four-year-old students and their families. The Head Start curriculum focuses not only on developing social skills, but on academics as well. Head Start incorporates

all areas of a child's development into fun learning activities. Head Start staff are dedicated to enriching the lives of all students and working toward kindergarten readiness. In a typical Head Start classroom,

there are many different play and learning centers, including: building blocks center, reading/library center, art center, quiet

center, dramatic play/house center, computer center, and science center. During the week, certain activities are set up in the centers that correspond with the weekly theme or lesson. The children are given the opportunity to participate in the activity at some point during the week. The daily curriculum supports and enriches the child's developmental growth physically, socially, emotionally, and intellectually. Parents are also a fundamental part of the programs. Head Start recognizes that parents are a child's first and most important teachers. Parents are encouraged to volunteer in the daily classroom activities and participate in field trips, if possible. 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...Gets Students Moving in P.E.





The Food Pyramid Gets Real

It wasn't the traditional kind of test that freshman students were taking in Ms. Tyonia Sinclair's health classes. Actually, the students were the ones assigning the grades as they "taste tested" a variety of fruits, vegetables, and grains during a unit on nutrition. In this very

"hands-on" approach, students tried samples of pink grapefruit, mango, kiwi, muscadine grapes, key limes, star fruit, and a cantaloupe honeydew hybrid melon, as well as other vegetables and grains. Students looked up the nutritional value of each food on a resource

sheet and then recorded their personal reaction to each sample. It was Ms. Sinclair's goal to expose the students to different and interesting kinds of healthy food options, while allowing them to discover the health benefits of the foods that they eat.









Reducing the Risk Classes at CCHS



Amanda England, Health Educator with the Lake Cumberland District Health Department, is pictured at left in Ms. Tyonia Sinclair's health class, as she introduces the Reducing the Risk (RTR) program to freshman students. RTR an abstinence based curriculum that focuses on avoiding unwanted pregnancy and sexually transmitted diseases and infections. Children having children is a problem with dire consequences for both the young people themselves and for society as a whole. Young people with children have sharply reduced education and employment opportunities and a poorer quality of life. Meeting their needs places a severe burden on both families and public resources. Moreover, sexually active teens are at great risk of contracting AIDS and other sexually transmitted diseases. Helping youth avoid unwanted pregnancies and sexually transmissible infections is a challenge that faces our communities. The RTR resource materials, selected and written for the students, provide factual and up-to-date information concerning these topics and encourages students to make healthier choices.


AP Chemistry Lab at CCHS


























CCATC August Students of the Month


