
Louisville on March 8th and 9th. The students and their instructor would like to thank the people in our community who were able to donate the much needed supplies.







AES Art Students Make Paper Dolls to Support Kentucky Children's Hospital

Students at Albany Elementary School supported the Kentucky Children's Hospital by making paper dolls for the Children's Miracle Network "Champion Child." One child from each state is honored each year for their brave battle with a serious injury or illness. This year's honor went to a girl named Sydney. When Sydney was 2, she was diagnosed with a

rare cancer. She was cared for at Kentucky Children's Hospital and today she is a happy, healthy nine-year old living with her family in Eastview, Kentucky. Sydney will trek across the nation sharing stories with local children, political leaders, and all those in between. Kentucky Children's Hospital will have a "kick-off" party to celebrate Sydney before she begins

her adventure. The paper dolls will be displayed at Kentucky Children's Hospital during the celebration. "The students were very concerned for the well being of Sydney and really enjoyed decorating the paper dolls to honor her," stated Ms. Vivian Talbott, art teacher at Albany Elementary School.



CCMS Vending Miser Project

Here at Clinton County Middle School we are on our way to making a brighter future for everyone among us. We do this by simple things such as installing a vending miser on one of our vending machines. What is a vending miser, you might ask? A vending miser is a device that you put on a vending machine to reduce the number of kilowatt hours used by that machine. One way it does this is when the halls are inactive for 20 minutes it shuts the lights off inside the vending machine and allows it to warm to a certain temperature.

The CCMS Energy Team decided to experiment with this energy saving device. But first, we needed to find out how much energy the vending machine used without the vending miser. One

vending machine uses an estimate of 238kwh per month, that is an estimate of 2,354kwh per year. After installing the vending miser, the same vending machine used 124kwh in a month for the reduction of 114kwh per month. This would result in a cost savings of \$11.64 for one month. After one year the vending miser would save an estimated 1,369kwh, which is a savings of \$139.64.

So this vending miser is a great thing for the school. Not only does it reduce unnecessary energy, it reduces cost as well. The vending misers will pay for themselves in about a years time. Next time you see an odd thing on top of the vending machine, remember, it's a GOOD thing!!!

Archery Teams Compete








Career Day at CCMS



Gifted & Talented Art Show Winners


The annual Gifted & Talented Art Show was held in April at the Clinton County Learning Center. Gifted and Talented teacher





Students Visit Arnold Air Force Base

Middle and high school students in the Gifted and Talented Program traveled to Arnold Air Force Base in Tullahoma, Tennessee on March 28th to tour the Arnold Engineering Development Center (AEDC). The AEDC has test facilities ranging from large wind tunnels and altitude jet and rocket test

cells to space chambers, ballistic ranges, arc heaters (to simulate the high temperature generated reentering the Earth's atmosphere) to small research test cells. The center's unique test facilities simulate flight from sea level to space and from subsonic to hypersonic speeds approaching Mach 20. Students are pictured

In February 2012, the students in the Emergency Procedures class at the Clinton County Area Technology Center taught by Billie Frye, RN participated in a mock disaster. The students performed activities related to trauma situations such as: shock, uncontrolled

bleeding, choking, respiratory and cardiac arrest, severe allergic reactions, and possible bone injuries. This mock disaster was an excellent opportunity for the students to practice the skills that they have acquired during the course of the Emergency Procedures class.

Upon completion of the class, the students became certified in Professional Rescuer CPR and Safety First Aid. The students did an excellent job demonstrating all of the skills required during the mock disaster.
