# 5th Grade Wins Middle School Challenge

One hundred sixty students at Clinton County Middle School recently took part in a schoolwide competition called the Middle School Challenge, hosted by South Central Kentucky GEAR UP. In preparation for the event, students received study guides every week for ten weeks. The study guides included a wide range of categories, including American History since 1865, American History to 1865, Geography, Government, Social Studies, Science, Literary Terms, Math Terms, Arts &

Humanities, and Practical Living & Vocational Studies. Questions from each category reflect the Kentucky Department of Education's Core Content for Assessment for Middle Schools. which in turn assist the students in studying for the CATS test (Commonwealth Accountability Testing System).

Students in every grade 5<sup>th</sup>—8<sup>th</sup> at Clinton County Middle School participated in the qualification test and teams of forty students were formed for each grade. The final event

> took place on February 25th their win." in the CCMS gymnasium. Each game consisted of ten rounds, with four students from each grade competing head to head with a buzzer system for five minutes in a quick recall format. The rounds were moderated by **GEAR UP Assistant** Director Allen Burchett. The 6<sup>th</sup> grade team defeated the 7<sup>th</sup> grade team in the first round, 144 to 132. The 5<sup>th</sup> grade team defeated the 8th grade team in the second round, 137 to 122. The 5<sup>th</sup> grade team defeated the 6<sup>th</sup> grade team in the finals, 128 to 118, to become the 2011 Middle School Challenge

champions. Ms. Kim Stonecipher and Mr. Tim Duvall were the coaches of the winning 5<sup>th</sup> grade team. Mr. Duvall said that he was "tickled to death for his students with Ms. Valarie Flanagan and Ms. Holly Pierce were the coaches of the runner-up 6th grade team. Ms. Flanagan said she was "extremely pleased with the performance of her team." The winning 5<sup>th</sup> grade team from

Clinton County Middle School will play the winning 8th grade team from Wayne County Middle School at the Clinton County Learning Center this spring in the Middle School Challenge Multi-County Championship.



"In the business world everyone is paid in two coins: cash and experience. Take the experience first; the cash will come later," quoted Harold Geneen. This quote describes the 8<sup>th</sup> grade E-Discovery Challenge which took place on Monday, February 14, 2011 at Clinton County Middle School. The mission of the E-Discovery Challenge is to allow students to gain an understanding of the real business world. Team collaboration, marketing, and advertising are focal points of this simulated real world experience.

A winning attitude was an essential part of our overall team collaboration process. Leaders were appointed to manage the overall team, and each team member was assigned a task to complete. During this process, the teams were responsible for making key business decisions. Teams worked together to market a product, to create, to manage their expenses to maintain a profit margin, and to create an advertising method that attracts buyers. Good teamwork was the way



to ensure a positive entrepreneurship experience.

The business term "marketing" was effectively explained to all of the teams, and our little businesses began to emerge. As entrepreneurs, we evaluated a target market by conducting research, and then we developed marketing strategies to sell our products or services. The ultimate goal was to track the

expenses and determine a reasonable profit.

Advertising was the next important step in the E-Discovery Challenge. All teams worked together to create catchy elevator pitches for advertisements. Many posters were displayed around the school as a marketing strategy to grab the customer's attention. Competition highlights the best in products or services; therefore, our E-Discovery teams were motivated to make a good profit and satisfy the customer. Our teams learned the products or services are better sold when successfully advertised.

The Clinton County Middle School's young entrepreneur program was again a challenging, yet rewarding experience for

Facilitated by SAFE-T Project Director Charlotte Bernard, School Safety Coordinator Kevin Groce, and Emergency Services Director Lonnie Scott,

participants reacted to a scenario involving an earthquake. In a Tabletop Exercise, participants have the opportunity to react and respond to a simulated emergency or crisis situation. This type of exercise allows participants to explore the available community resources, clarify roles and responsibilities of
