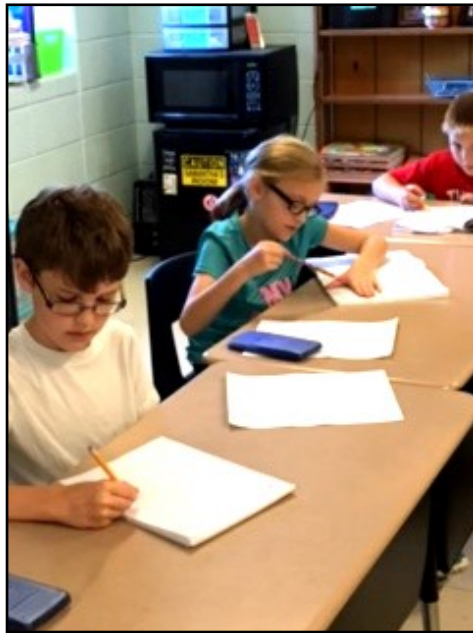
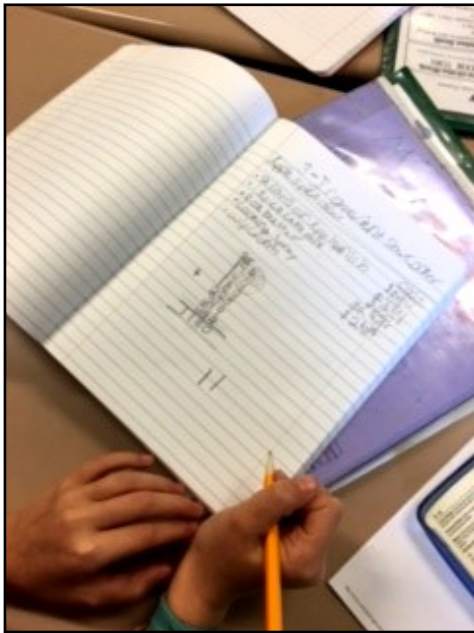


Teaching Sequence with Recipes

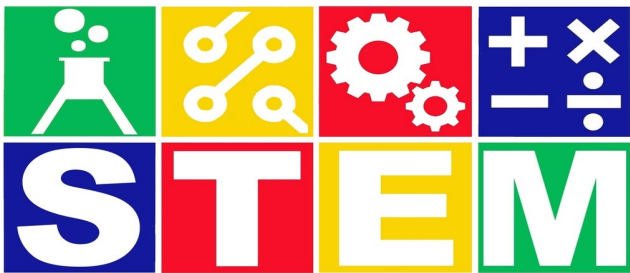
that best matched their interests and needs. Among the numerous presenters at the conference were many local professionals -

At AES, students in Mrs. Samantha Blackaby's 3rd grade class recycled found items after reading about the Goodwillie

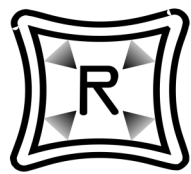
Environmental School located in Ada, Michigan. This school not only encourages recycling and "green-living," but also has many

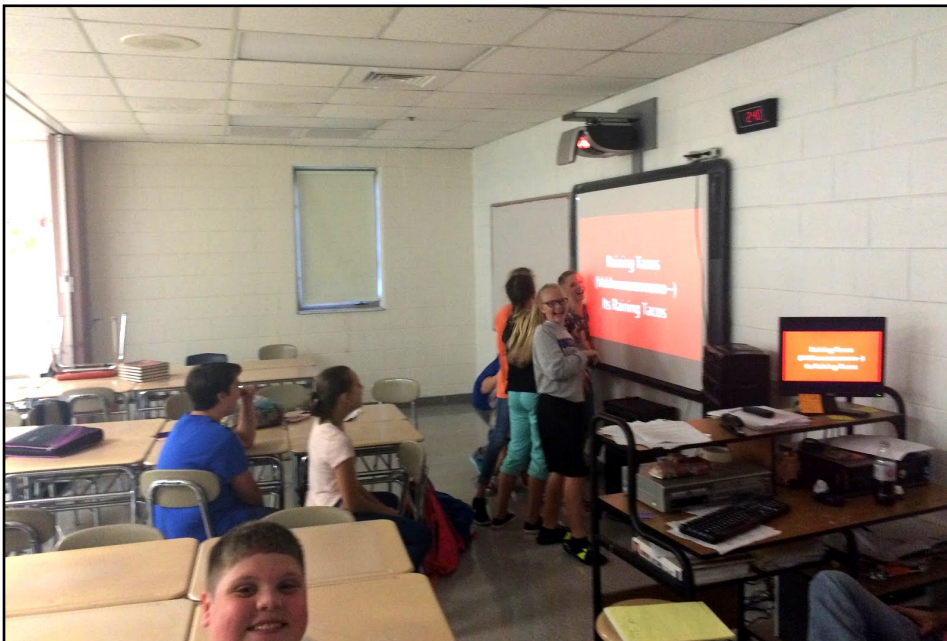
Clubs Begin at CCMS

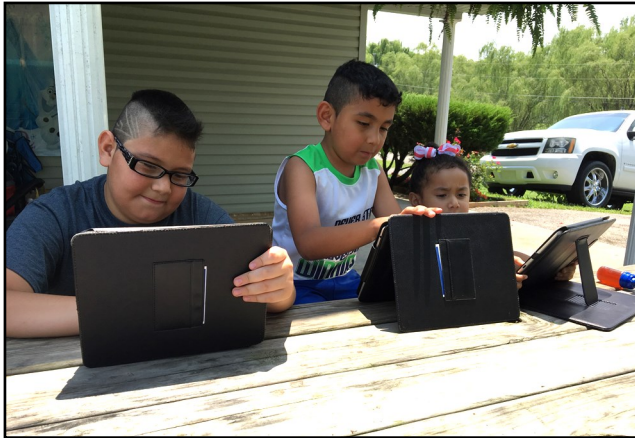


Migrant Summer Program

Cyber School Days Approved



In response to the significant number of absent days in recent years, Clinton County School District has been granted a Non-Traditional School Days waiver which has been designated for Cyber School Days. This detailed plan outlines how instruction will be

delivered for ALL students during a day when school is not open due to unforeseen circumstances. The plan gives teachers the opportunity to refine their online presence for content delivery and provides hard copy content for those students that may not have access to

technology or network resources. The planned result is less loss of instructional time and increased ability to learn new content when school is back in session.



What is a Cyber School Day?

Cyber School Days allow Clinton County Schools to provide nontraditional instruction on days when students are not able to attend school due to unforeseen circumstances. On the designated Cyber School Days, students will have instructional packets that provide review opportunities and application of previous learning or projects. Depending on the student's grade level, the packet may contain lessons from reading, language arts, mathematics, social studies, science, and related arts. Lessons in the packets are supported with online resources but can be completed without access to the Internet.



What are teachers and administrators doing on Cyber School Days?

All staff will be expected to keep a log of activities that fulfill their contractual obligations from 8:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. Principals will discuss with staff prior to the use of any non-traditional days the types of work that will be acceptable. Staff who are able to travel shall report to the school and answer student calls, emails, as well as work in computer labs with any students who might choose to use them. **Any student who chooses to use the school computer lab must be accompanied by an adult at all times.**



Will every snow day be treated as a Cyber School Day?

No, we will not count every snow day, or unforeseen circumstance as a Cyber School Day. Clinton County School District has been approved to utilize up to ten Cyber School Days. Cyber School Days will start after the fourth snow day.



How will I know which day is a Cyber School Day?

Cyber School Days will be announced during the One-Call that is made to let families know that school has been cancelled for the day. Cyber School Days will also be announced on the district's website and the local radio station.



How will students submit their work from the Cyber school Days?

Students will receive copies of the work packets in a **Cyber School Day folder**, which will be distributed to students on January 4th. A One-Call will notify families when the folder is sent home. Please store this folder at home until the student needs to use it. Students should return their work to school on the day they return from the missed day.



What happens if my child misplaces the Cyber School Day lesson?

Cyber School Day lessons will be distributed to students at school. If a student is unable to complete the lesson packet prior to returning to school, he/she will have additional time to make up the missing work by staying after school.

grades K-12 in Kentucky, with hopes of reaching children in all 120 counties.

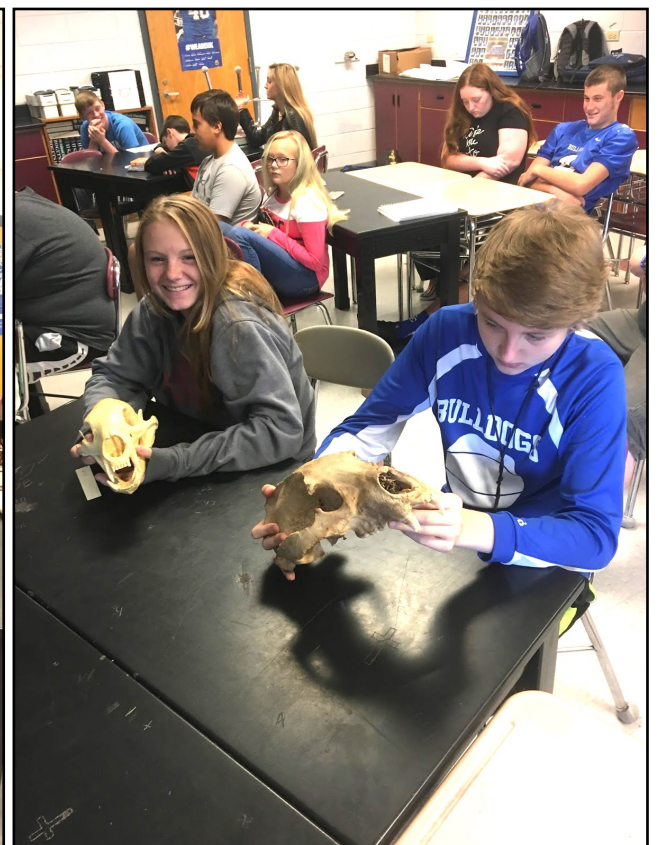
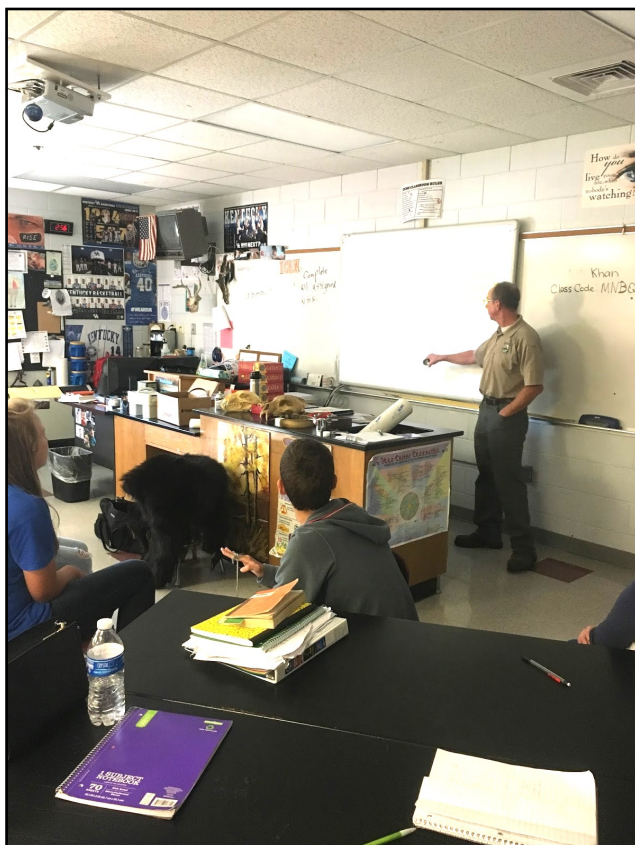
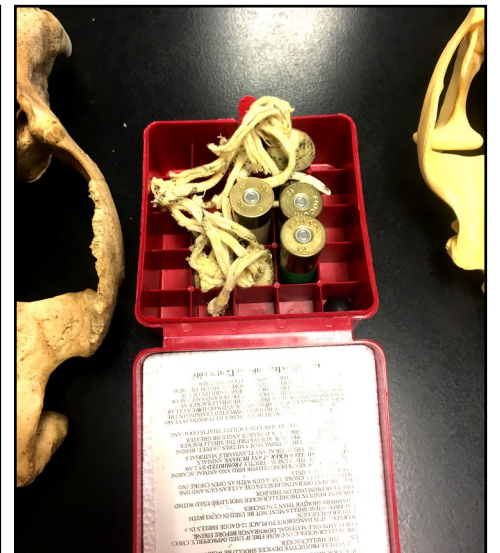
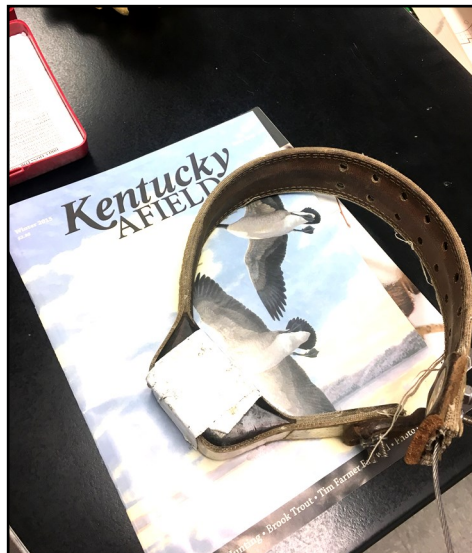


Biologist Visits CCMS

Mr. Michial Conner's 8th grade science class was excited to have a guest speaker come to Clinton County Middle School to discuss career opportunities for individuals interested in the outdoors, and opportunities in working with wildlife, law enforcement, and private landowners throughout Kentucky. Chris Mason, Private Land Biologist for the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife, discussed the

history of the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife, including how it evolved from a Law Enforcement Department only to a Wildlife Division that promotes land and wildlife all over the state of Kentucky. Mr. Mason also discussed the black bear migration from Pine Mountain in Eastern Kentucky and the reasons for this migration. He brought 2 full black bear skulls, a full black bear tanned hide,

ammunition used for black bear nuisance control (non-lethal), and books that went into more detail about the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife. Finally, Mr. Mason talked with students about conservation practices, new areas of revenue for the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife, and new career opportunities for individuals who would like to study the bear population.



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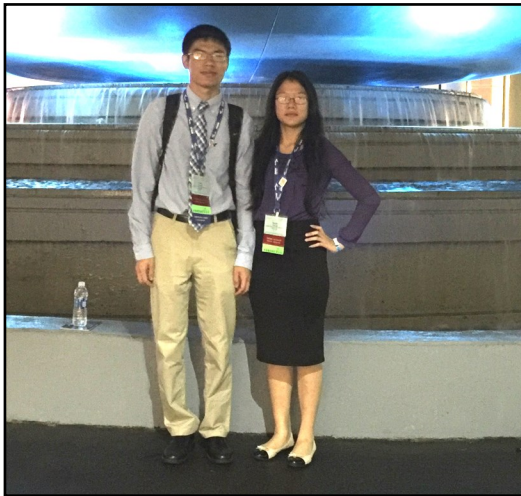

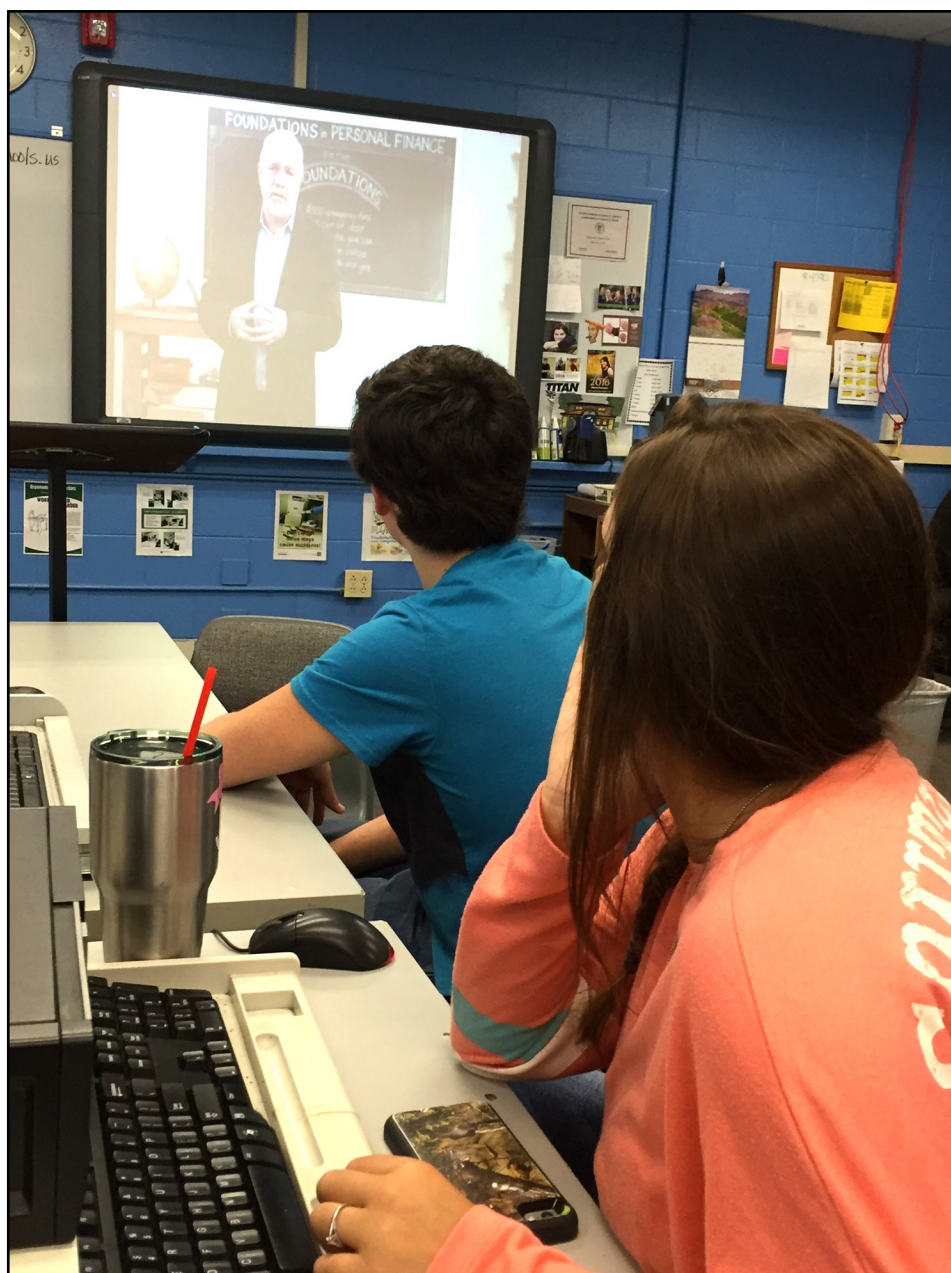
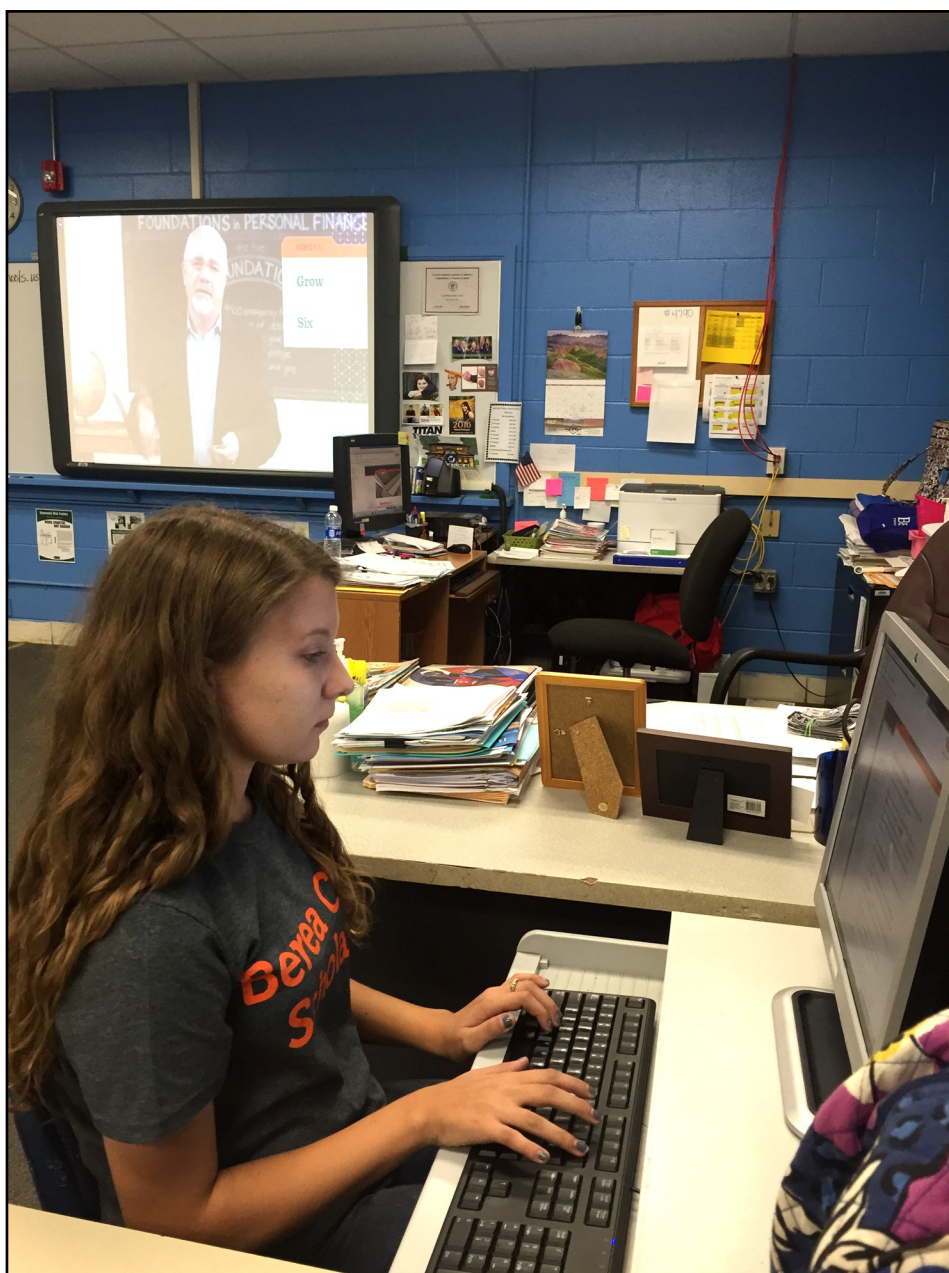
Real World Finance Lessons
