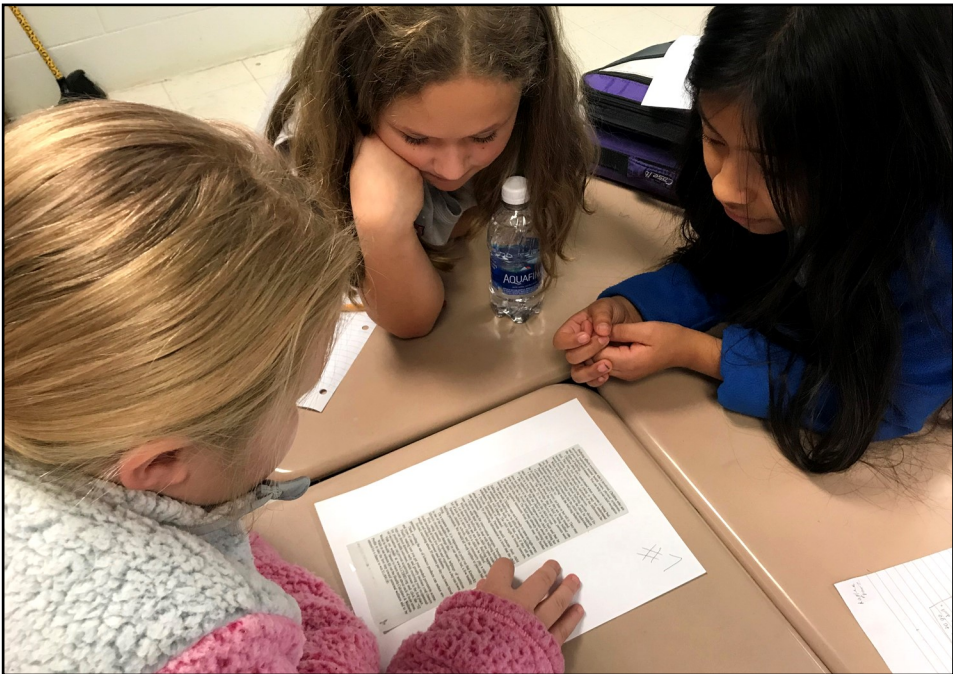
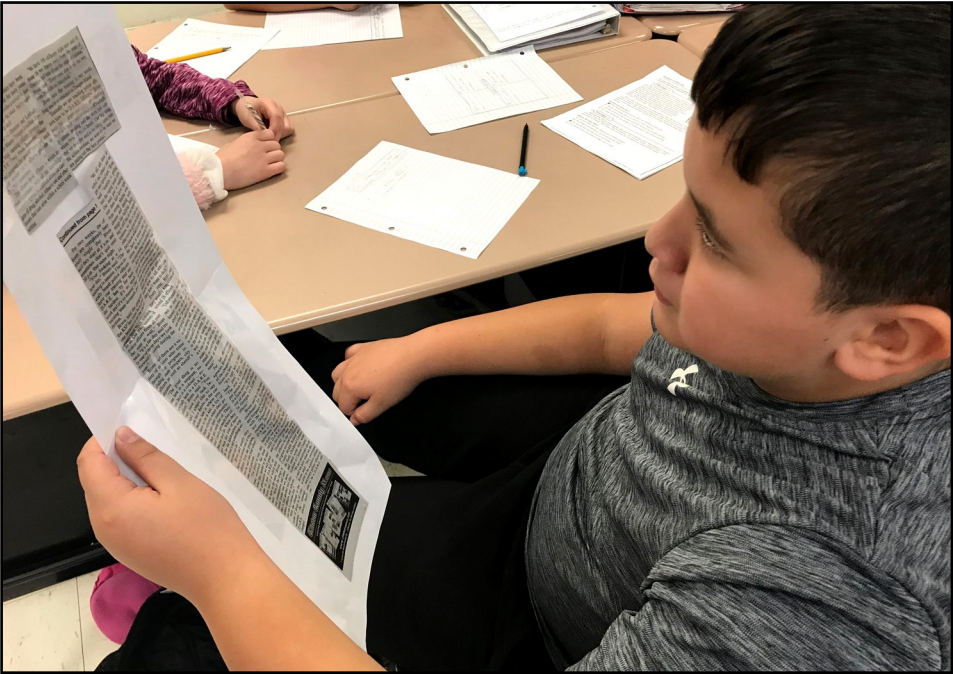
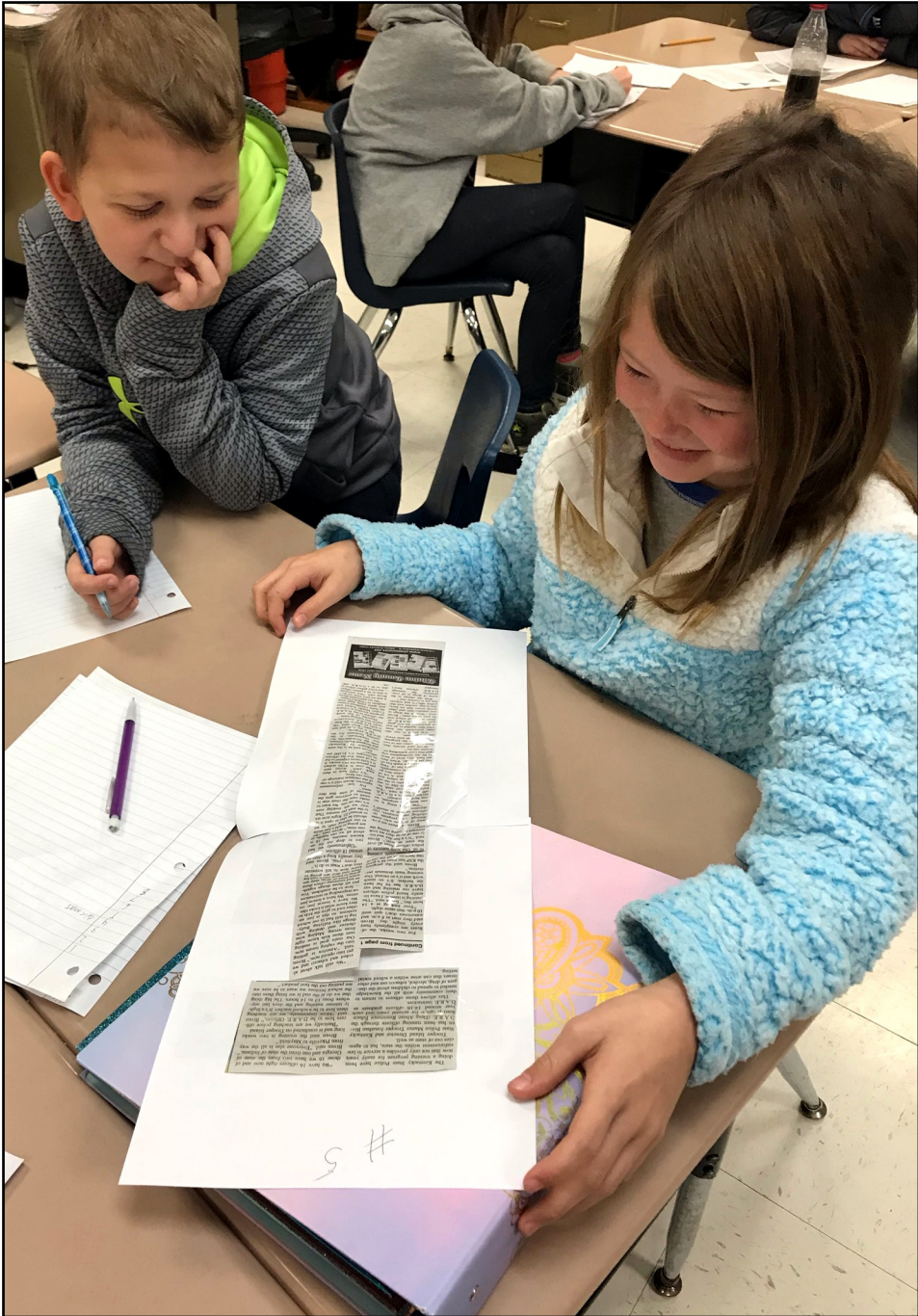


Students Learn Main Ideas with *The News*

community. Students have really enjoyed learning about local events and are doing a great job finding the main idea in our hometown news!

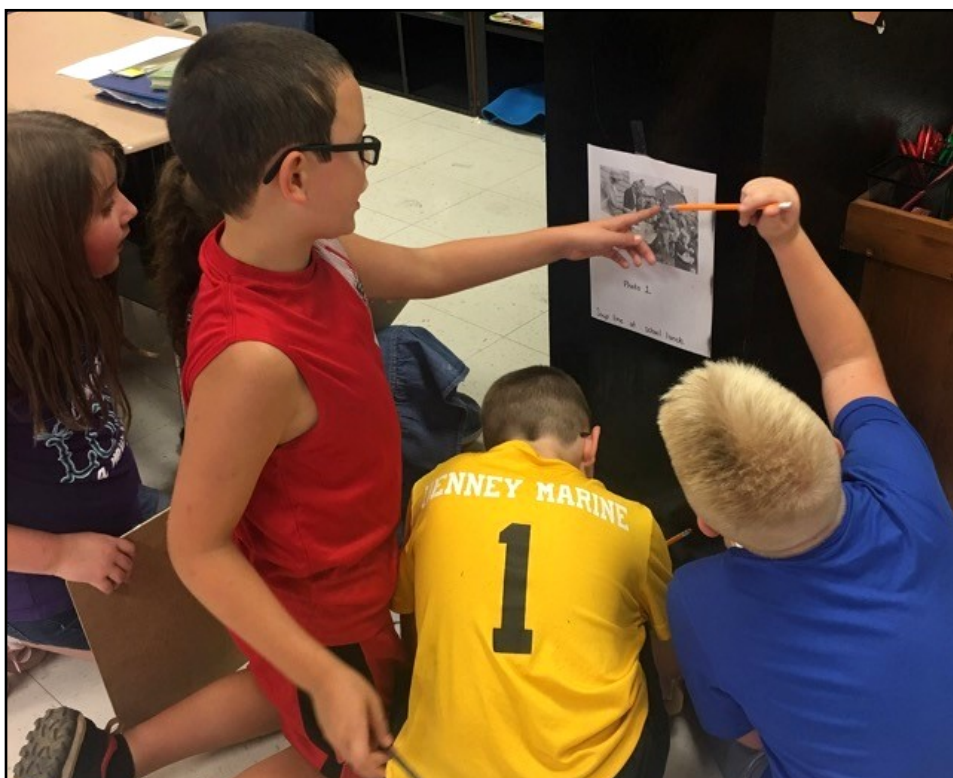
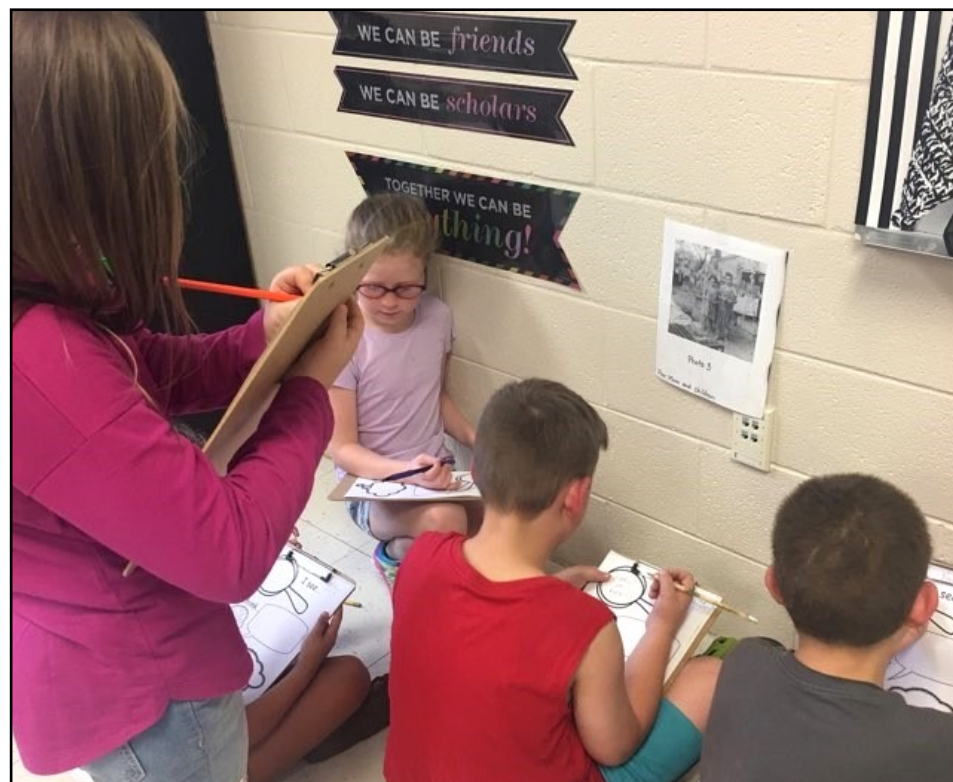
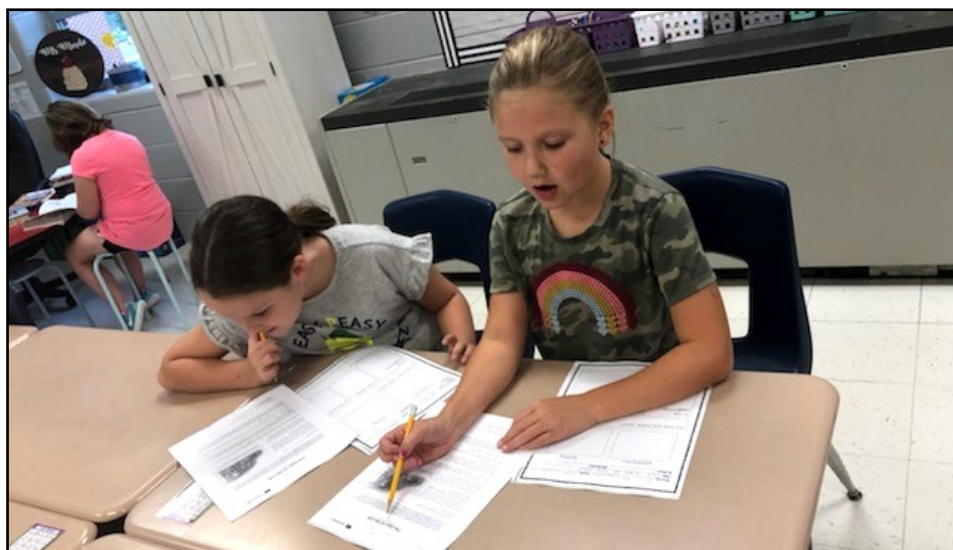


Third Graders Study Great Depression

character from their book. Students did a wonderful job and had some really creative projects!

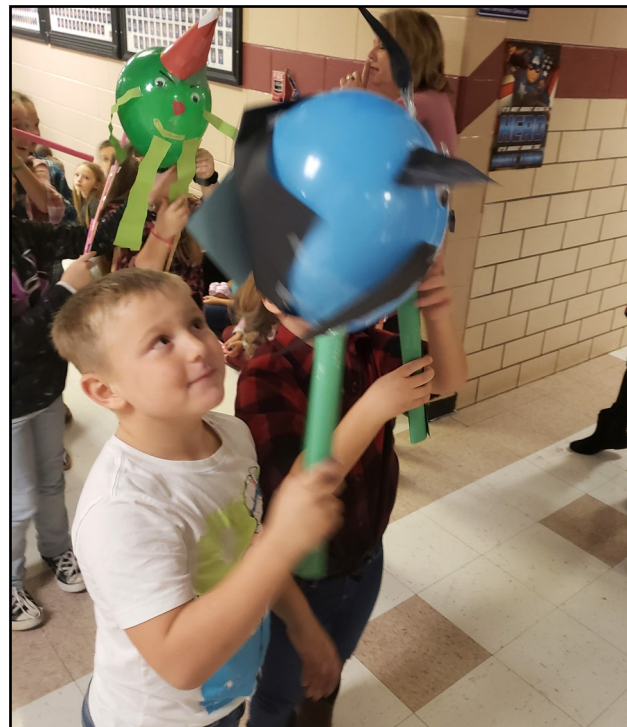
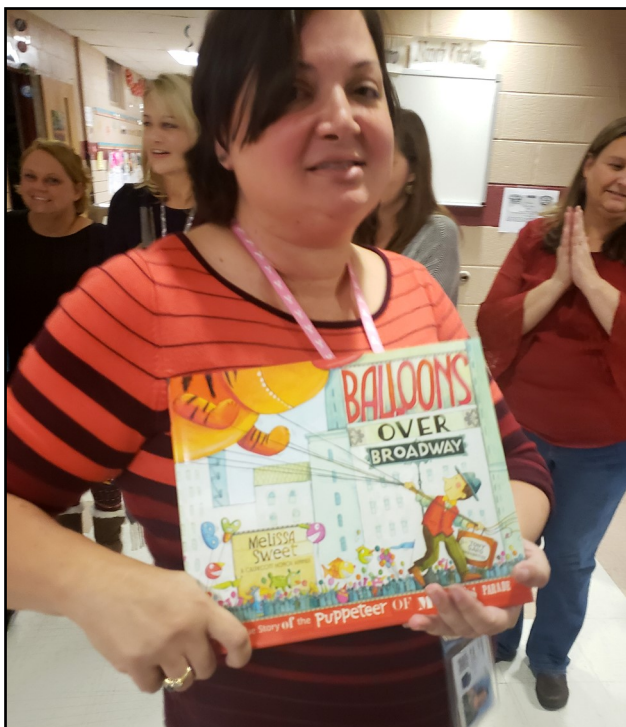
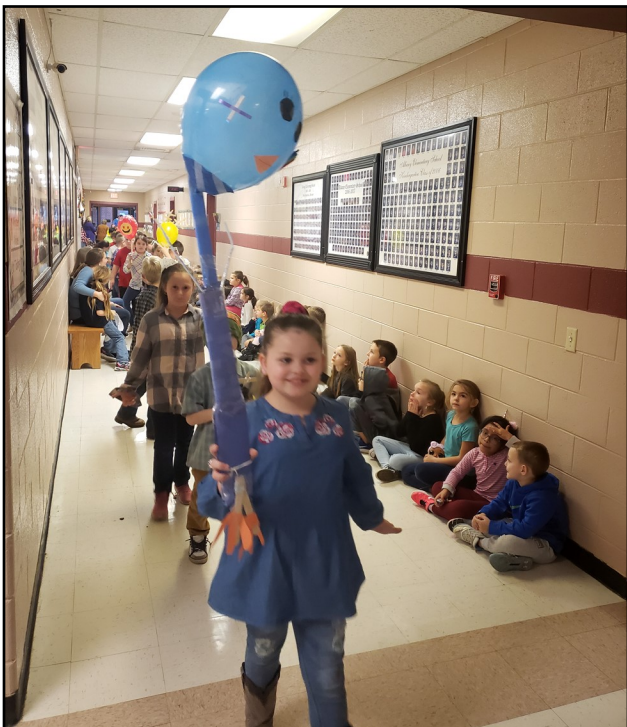
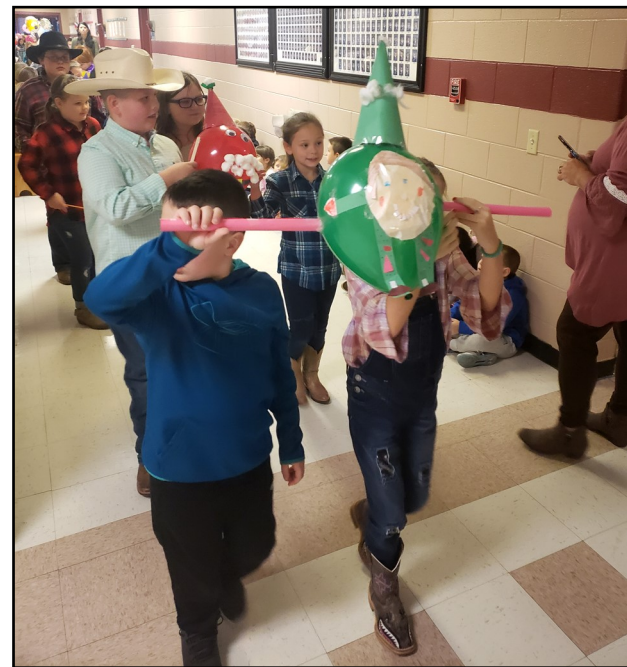
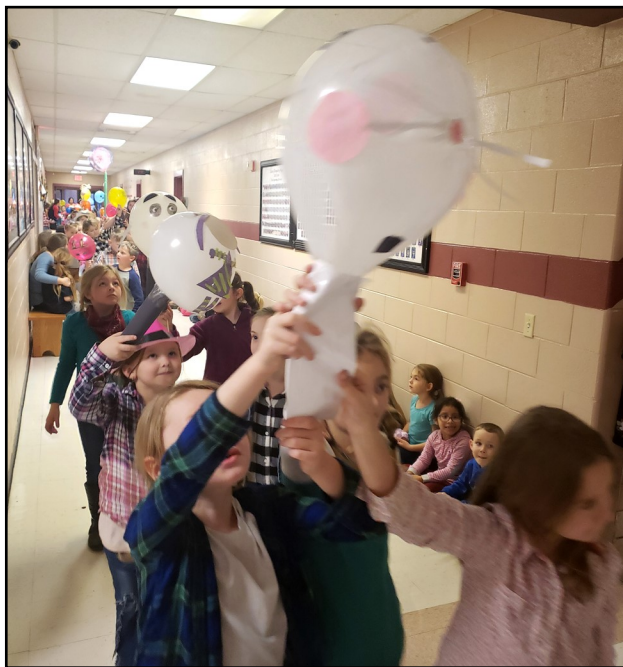
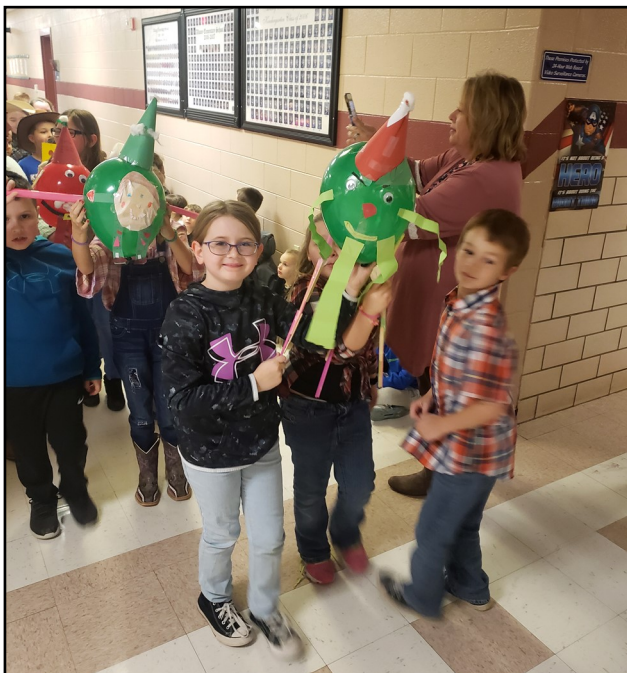


Balloons Over Broadway

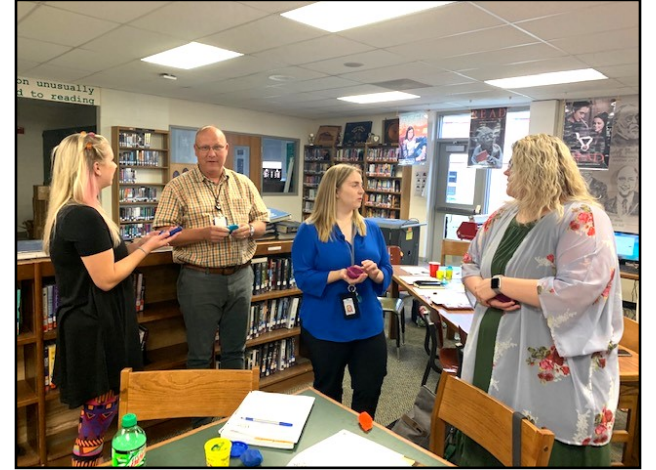
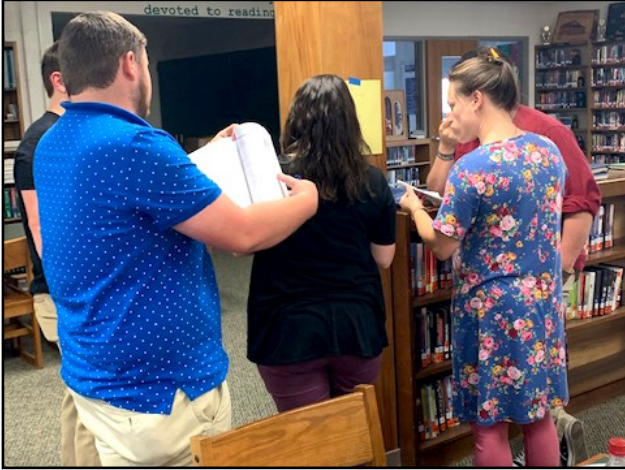


New Teacher Academy

The Kentucky Youth Assembly (KYA) is a 3-day expanded educational opportunity in which students serve as part of a model state government. KYA offers students the opportunity to learn about a wide variety of issues, develop critical thinking skills, and articulate their beliefs while engaging constructively with their peers from around the Commonwealth. At KYA, students participate in one of the Program Areas at the Assembly based on their grade and experience. Each area is led by Presiding and Supporting Officers, with a variety of Delegate Roles available to participants.

The Clinton County Middle School Y-Club attended the Kentucky Youth Assembly Conference in Louisville on November 7th – 9th. Students presented two bills, including a bill to require seat belts on public school buses and an act to provide a study hall period be added into the school day. The students worked extremely hard and received awards for Premiere Delegation, Outstanding Delegate, and Honor Level for their Merit of Service.

entertaining and interactive assembly-style program explored how comedy has (and has not) changed over time.



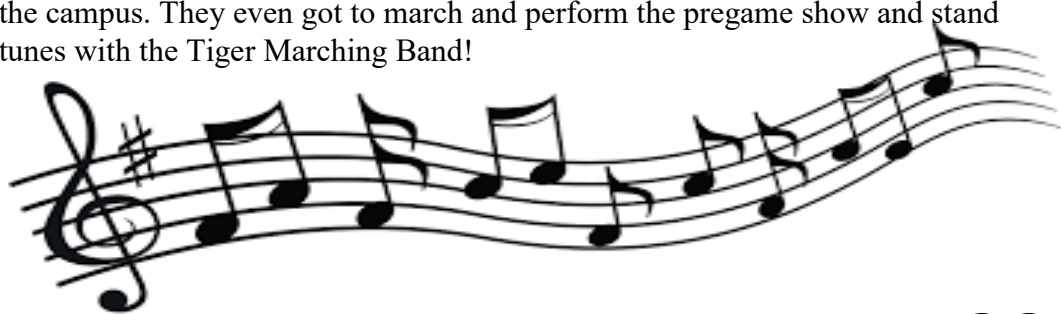
Transition Ready Halloween Party

1-1 tie because they ran out of time at the end of the day. The students enjoyed practicing and preparing for this event, and are looking forward to next year!

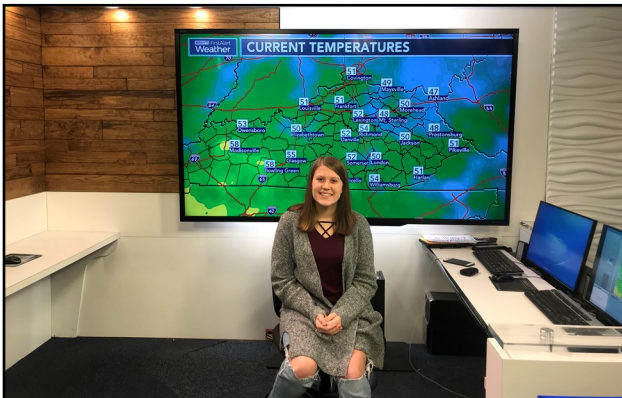
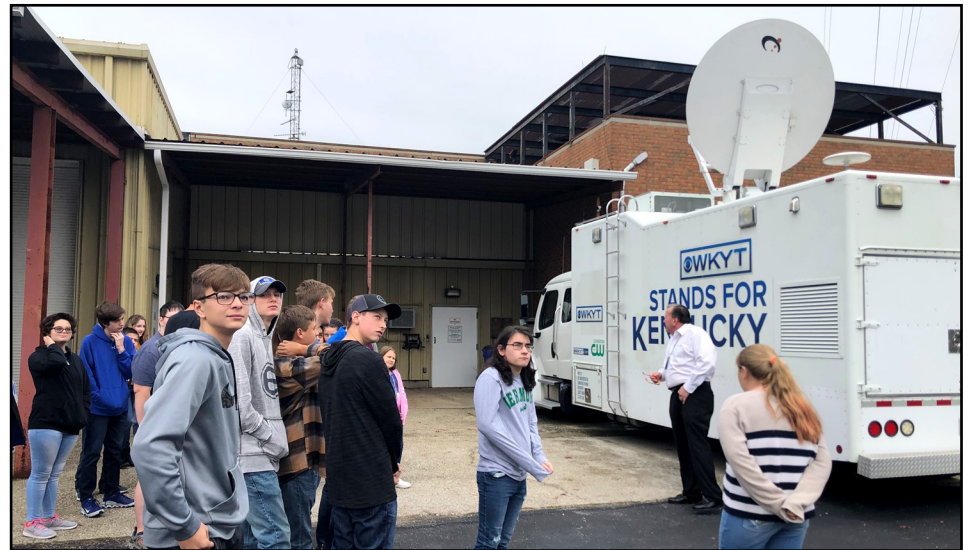


G/T Students Visit WKYT
