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I often get questions about my job; I am pretty lucky to be the Head of such an incredible school, full of such wonderful pupils and staff. My leadership team are the group of staff in the picture. We lead the school together, but I take the ultimate responsibility for what happens across the board, a little like a

football manager!

My job varies on a daily basis and I do not get to spend as much time with large groups of children as I would like now due to the continuing Covid situation because of funny kidneys! But I do get to meet lots of pupils in a range of situations, which includes our virtual assemblies, 'Hot Chocolate with the Head' where we celebrate achievement and your hard efforts, meetings with the PLT and the Head Boy and Head Girl and check ins throughout the day. I meet with lots and lots of grown-ups (staff) throughout the day, often from very early in the morning (sometimes 7.30) until after 6 in the evening.

We have 1090 pupils in our school and over 100 staff and I have lots of ways of 'knowing' what is going on a daily basis and how you are all doing, through from what I see and hear. What my team tells me; what Class Charts tells me; What you tell me; but most importantly what I see in your books and assessments. All of this information helps me to work out how best to support you and staff and change or redirect resources to make sure we do THE BEST JOB POSSIBLE FOR YOU to make sure you can become the best grown up possible - that's my JOB.

We also tried on their uniform (coats) and they spoke to us about the work that they do.


We hope that we never need to use these skills but they are important and valuable. As you can see, we really enjoyed out day!



SCRIBBLERS TOUR



WHAT DOES THIS MEAN?

YSGOL NANTGWYN AIMS TO BE A SCHOOL WHERE CHILDREN'S RIGHTS ARE AT THE HEART OF OUR THINKING AND CULTURE. THE AIM IS TO IMPROVE WELL-BEING AND TO DEVELOP EVERY ONE OF YOUR TALENTS AND ABILITIES TO THEIR FULL POTENTIAL. AS PART OF THIS PLAN WE ARE WORKING TOWARDS RECOGNITION AS A 'RIGHTS RESPECTING SCHOOL', AN AWARD GIVEN TO SCHOOLS ON BEHALF OF UNICEF UK.

UNICEF IS THE WORLD'S LEADING ORGANISATION WORKING FOR CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE AND THEIR RIGHTS. IN 1989, GOVERNMENTS ACROSS THE WORLD AGREED THAT ALL CHILDREN HAVE THE SAME RIGHTS BY ADOPTING THE UN CONVENTION ON THE RIGHTS OF THE CHILD (UNCRC). THESE RIGHTS ARE BASED ON WHAT A CHILD NEEDS TO SURVIVE, GROW, PARTICIPATE AND FULFIL THEIR POTENTIAL.

AT YSGOL NANTGWYN YOU WILL LEARN ABOUT YOUR RIGHTS BY PUTTING THEM INTO PRACTICE EVERY DAY. A RIGHTS RESPECTING SCHOOL MODELS RIGHTS AND RESPECT IN ALL ITS RELATIONSHIPS.



GET INVOLVED!


We are absolutely delighted to have taken delivery of a Big Bocs Bwyd (Big Food Box) in recent weeks. For those of you that haven't seen our new 'installation', we have a shipping container now sited on the grounds on the Gellifaelog side of the estate. The pupils have been really excited to wonder what the box is for but, this week, we are speaking with pupils to explain that we will be opening a 'pay as you feel' shop for a few hours per week to our families and local community. We have been extremely lucky with local supermarkets offering to make donations and, while we will not know what will be available in the box from week to week, we are excited to be able to regularly share the available food. The premise is that people will be able to 'pay as they feel' or pay nothing at all. Over the coming weeks, we are taking delivery of fridges, freezers and shelving and working with many pupils to prepare the area inside and around the BBB so that we are able to open to the local community. As we open, many pupils will have the opportunity to contribute to the facility by helping with the grounds around it, keeping things stocked and checked inside the shop and growing herbs and vegetables to go in the shop.
