Despite many challenges, our students are thriving and having a wonderful school year. Our successful return to a more normalized school experience required the commitment and dedication of many, our extraordinary faculty and staff, our dedicated principals and administrators, our school board, and as always our community standing arm in arm embracing and supporting our students. In so many ways the District's priorities remained unchanged: to ensure the health, safety, emotional well-being and academic growth of our students. Our students, your children, were resilient, generous and provided us with inspiration and pride.

The preparation of the 2022-23 School Budget sustains the District's commitment to providing an enriching education to all students and adapting to their unique talents and needs. Children thrive when provided opportunity and support borne out by our ongoing and unprecedented student success. The budget maintains class sizes, expands the International Baccalaureate Program to all four elementary schools, supports the needs of special education and ENL students, and ongoing facility, security, health and safety upgrades. The District will continue our expansive summer programs that support learning gaps, provide enrichment, and build community and connection among students. Once again the 2022-23 budget remains within the tax levy cap and includes the following initiatives and programs:

- Maintains class sizes (target of 22 students K-12) and programmatic choices amidst increasing enrollment & participation
- Strengthens instructional continuity K-12
- Sustains International Baccalaureate Diploma Program (DP) and Middle Years Programs (MYP)
- Introduces International Baccalaureate Primary Years Program (PYP)
- Continues funding IB and AP testing fees for all students at HHS
- Continues expansive summer programs to address identified learning gaps, provide enrichment, and opportunities for community building/connection support learning gaps, provide enrichment, and a summer high school program to support credit recovery
- Maintains rigorous Professional Development programs for faculty and staff
- Continues Health and Safety improvements District-wide
- Sustains capital project budget for long term district-wide improvements: ADA compliance, expansion/upgrades of security cameras, classroom renovations and improvements
- Remains within allowable Tax Levy Cap

Since the adoption of the mandated tax levy cap by the New York State Legislature, the Harrison Central School District tax levy has been at or below the cap. The proposed 2022-23 Budget reflects a tax levy increase of 2.85%, within the New York State Tax Levy Cap.

The Board appreciates its many partners: parents, community members, PTAs, District PT Council, and the Harrison Educational Foundation. We thank the Citizens Budget Advisory Committee for its valuable feedback during the budget development. We especially thank the Harrison community for consistently supporting high-quality education for the children in Harrison.

EXPLANATION OF BUDGETARY LINE ITEMS

1010 <u>BOARD OF EDUCATION</u>

Expenses which are specifically related to the operation of the Board of Education itself appear in this section of the budget.

1040 <u>DISTRICT CLERK</u>

The expenses for the district clerk, as an officer of the Board of Education, and other expenditures of the clerk's office are recorded here.

1060 <u>DISTRICT MEETING</u>

Compensation of inspectors, advertising, printing, and all other expenditures of school district elections are charged here.

1240 CHIEF SCHOOL ADMINISTRATOR

The Superintendent of Schools is the Executive Officer of the Board of Education and the Chief Administrator of the School System. The Superintendent is responsible for implementing all School Board Policies and for directing the operation of the district.

1310 <u>BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION</u>

Funds for the administration of the financial and business operations of the district are budgeted in this section.

1320 AUDITING

All expenditures incurred for internal and independent auditing services are recorded here. These shall include all payments for professional accounting and auditing services.

1325 <u>TREASURER</u>

The compensation and other expenditures of the treasurer's office are recorded here.

1345 PURCHASING

The District Purchasing Department is under the jurisdiction of the School Business Administrator. The Purchasing Agent and his staff direct the operation of the purchasing program to insure that all materials and equipment are procured in proper quantity, amount and price in a timely manner.

1420 LEGAL

Expenses which are specifically related to all legal matters of the Board of Education.

1430 <u>HUMAN RESOURCES</u>

The Office of Human Resources coordinates all district-wide hiring, the monitoring of staff overtime, teacher and staff improved training, notifications of accumulated sick days and vacation, and maintenance of personnel records.

1460 RECORDS MANAGEMENT

Expenses incurred for the maintenance and retention of Archival Records.

1480 <u>PUBLIC INFORMATION AND SERVICES</u>

This code includes costs relating to the preparation and dissemination of information to the community and staff. This is done through newsletters, notices, press releases, informational brochures and special publications. Also included here are the costs of the District's public notices.

1620 <u>OPERATION OF PLANT</u>

Charged here are costs associated with keeping the physical plant open and ready for use. Also recorded in this area are costs for utilities and equipment required to maintain operations of all buildings.

1621 <u>MAINTENANCE OF PLANT</u>

Budgeted here are funds for full-time maintenance mechanics and equipment necessary for district-wide maintenance services.

1670 CENTRAL PRINTING AND MAILING

Included here are the expenditures of operating a central printing and mailing established for all functional units.

1680 CENTRAL DATA PROCESSING

All costs of the central data processing unit which acts as a service unit for several functions are charged here.

1910-1981 <u>SPECIAL ITEMS – CONTRACTUAL EXPENSE</u>

This section of the budget includes unallocated insurance, school association dues, assessments on school property, refund of real property taxes, and BOCES administrative charges.

2010 <u>CURRICULUM DEVELOPMENT AND SUPERVISION</u>

This category of the budget funds all costs associated with the general coordination of curriculum development and supervision on a system wide basis.

2011 <u>TECHNOLOGY – DISTRICT WIDE</u>

Recorded here are expenses for the management and oversight of district-wide technology.

2020 <u>SUPERVISION – REGULAR SCHOOL</u>

Budgeted here are the salaries and expenses of building principals, their assistants and supervisors of the instructional program within a school building, subject area or grade level.

2022 <u>SUPERVISION – SPECIAL EDUCATION</u>

Budgeted here are the salaries and expenses associated with the oversight of the Special Education Department.

2070 IN-SERVICE TRAINING – INSTRUCTION

Recorded here are the expenditures of activities that increase the professional competence of instructional personnel.

2110 <u>TEACHING – REGULAR SCHOOLS</u>

The costs of teaching regular school are recorded here and include salaries of teachers, teaching assistants, instructional supplies, equipment and textbooks.

2250 PROGRAMS FOR STUDENTS WITH DISABILITIES

All expenditures for teaching students with disabilities and for the District Committee on Special Education are included in this budget area.

2280 OCCUPATIONAL EDUCATION

Vocational training such as nursing, auto mechanics, landscaping, culinary arts, etc., provided through BOCES is budgeted here.

2330 SUMMER SCHOOL & OTHER SUMMER PROGRAMS

The costs of teaching summer school and other summer programs are recorded here and include salaries of teachers, instructional supplies, equipment and textbooks.

2610 SCHOOL LIBRARY AND AUDIO VISUAL

Included in this section of the budget are funds for operating the school libraries including library teachers, equipment, library books, materials and supplies.

2615 AUDIO VISUAL

Included in this section of the budget are funds for audio visual equipment, materials and supplies.

2620 EDUCATIONAL TV

Expenditures for providing educational television programs as part of the instructional program of the school district.

2630 <u>COMPUTER ASSISTED INSTRUCTION</u>

Included here are expenditures for the maintenance and support of computer equipment and services to support instructional programs.

2805 ATTENDANCE

Expenditures for activities having as their primary purpose the promotion and data base management to improve children's attendance in school.

2810 <u>GUIDANCE</u>

Salaries and expenditures for the provision of guidance services to students are recorded here.

2815 <u>HEALTH SERVICES</u>

Salaries and expenditures for the provision of health services to students in our six schools, students attending non-public schools located in our district, and for services provided to Harrison resident students attending non-public schools out of district are recorded in this budget area. Salaries provide for registered nurses, the district's chief medical officer and health assistants.

2820 <u>PSYCHOLOGICAL SERVICES</u>

Budgeted here are the expenses incurred for psychological services rendered by certified school psychologists.

2825 SOCIAL WORKER

Recorded here are expenditures for personnel who provide social services to students, Student Assistance Counselor services, and the Harrison Youth Council.

2850 CO-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

District expenditures for school related activities are recorded here. Included are yearbook, school newspaper, literary magazine, plays, marching band and various other clubs and activities. The majority of the expenses in this area are the stipends for faculty sponsors to supervise and assist the students in operating each activity.

2855 <u>INTERSCHOLASTIC ATHLETICS</u>

This section of the Budget provides funds for conducting a comprehensive interscholastic athletic program for both boys and girls.

5510 <u>DISTRICT TRANSPORTATION SERVICES</u>

Recorded here are expenses related to the supervision and scheduling of student transportation services.

5540 <u>CONTRACT TRANSPORTATION</u>

Expenditures for the provision of transportation services to students are charged in this functional area. Costs in this budget area include busing for students attending Harrison schools, for Harrison resident students attending non-public schools within 15 miles of their homes and for students with disabilities attending special schools.

5550 PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION

Reimbursement to students for fares paid where services of a public service corporation are utilized to provide student transportation.

5581 <u>BOCES TRANSPORTATION</u>

Expenditures for transportation services provided by Board of Cooperative Educational Services.

9010-9060 <u>EMPLOYEE BENEFITS</u>

All expenditures in this section of the Budget are either mandated by law (teaching and non-teaching retirement, social security, workers compensation), or are in negotiated contracts (health, dental, vision, etc.)

9711 SERIAL BONDS – SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION

This account is used to record the annual principal and interest payments on bonds sold for school construction projects.

9789 OTHER DEBT

This account is used to record any other annual principal and interest payments, inclusive of Energy Performance Contracts.

9901 TRANSFER TO OTHER FUNDS/DEBT SERVICE

This account is used to record the transfer of funds to the appropriate accounts including amounts provided for reserves.

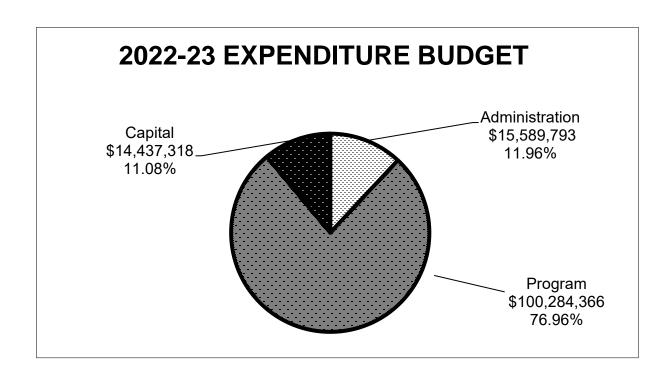

<u>Program Component</u> includes expenses for student instruction including instructional salaries and benefits, computers/software, textbooks, equipment, supplies, library materials, instructional media, special education, vocational, guidance, health, psychological services, social work services; interscholastic athletics; and transportation.

<u>Capital Component</u> includes expenses necessary to maintain all school buildings and grounds. This component includes electricity, gas and oil, telephone service, water and all expenses necessary to operate six school buildings. Sewer property tax assessments, judgments and claims against the school district and debt service are also included in the Capital Component.

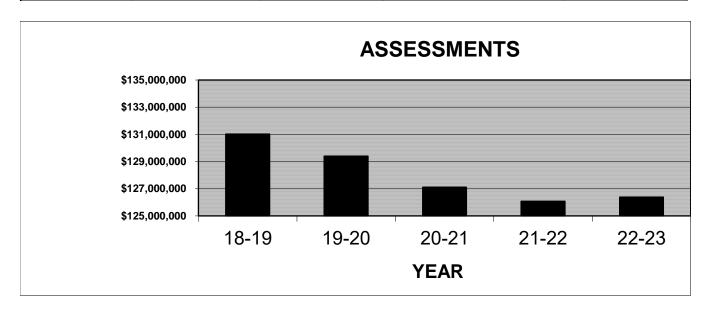

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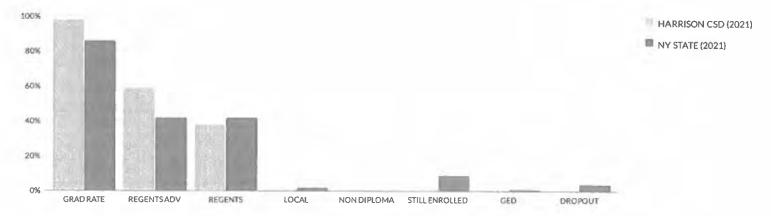

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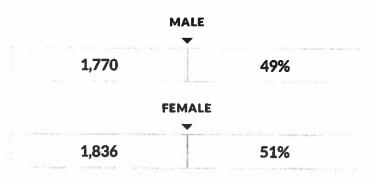

HARRISON CSD ENROLLMENT (2020 - 21)

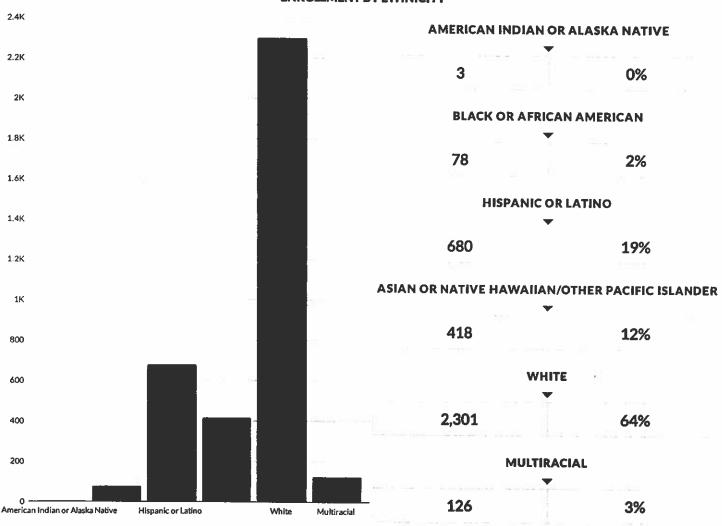

ENROLLMENT BY GENDER

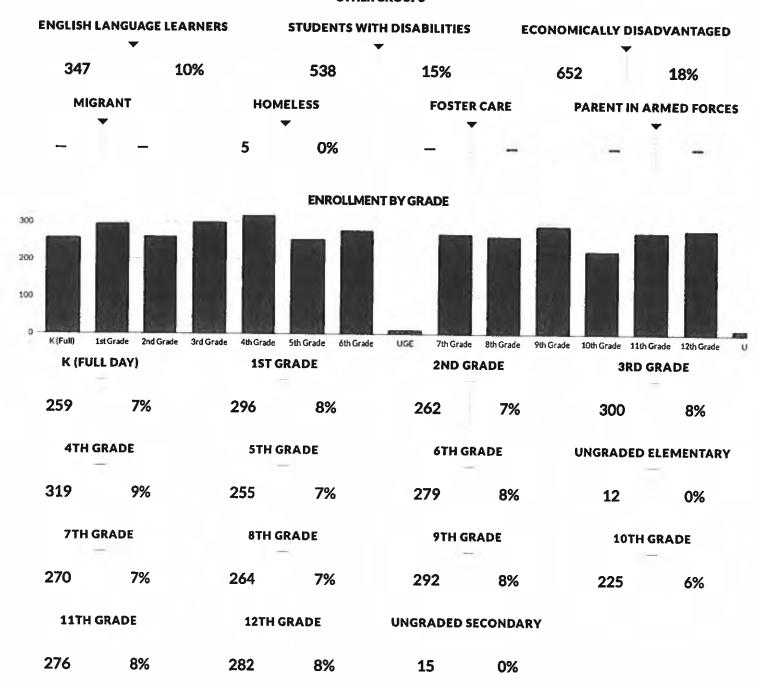




ENROLLMENT BY ETHNICITY

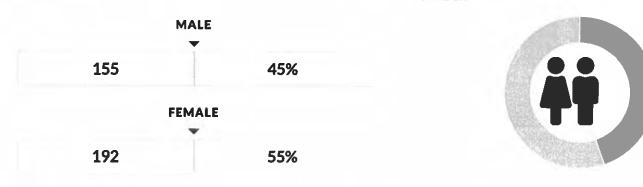
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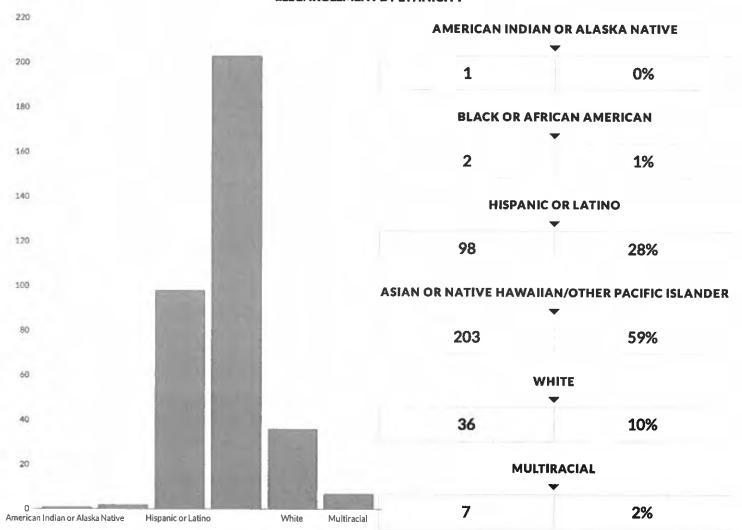
HARRISON CSD ENGLISH LANGUAGE LEARNERS ENROLLMENT (2020 - 21)

ELL ENROLLMENT BY GENDER



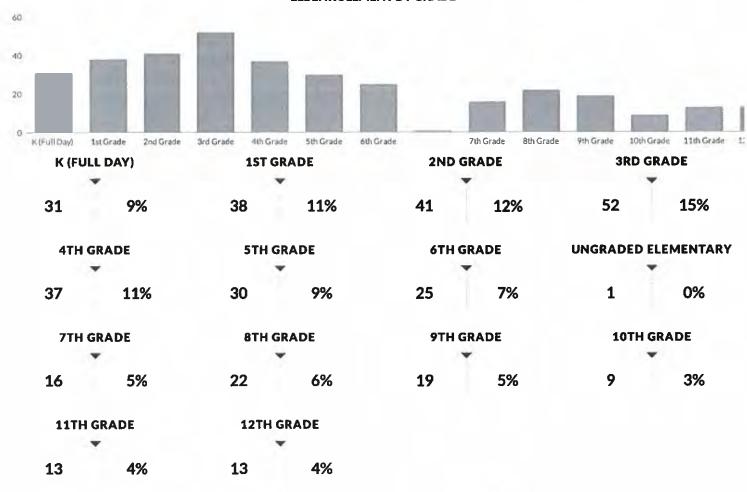
ELLENROLLMENT BY ETHNICITY

United States Department of Education (USDE) Waiver of Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) Accountability and Report Card Provisions for the 2020-21 School Year

Date: June 22, 2021

On February 12, 2021, the New York State Education Department (NYSED or "the Department") submitted a waiver request to the United States Department of Education (USDE) on behalf of all Local Education Agencies (LEAs) in New York State seeking flexibility from federal accountability requirements in the 2020-21 school year. 1

Specifically, the walver request addressed the unique circumstances caused by the ongoing pandemic. The Department argued that even in cases where data could be collected for the individual accountability indicators, in order to make determinations at the elementary/middle and high school levels, there is much concern that such determinations for the 2020-21 school year will be distorted by the disparities across the State in learning modality and device/internet connectivity access. These disparities undermine the Department's ability to make accurate judgements about individual indicators and overall school and district performance, effectively negating the ability to meaningfully differentiate among schools and/or offer appropriate supports.

This memo is to inform you that USDE granted NYSED a waiver of the following requirements of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA), as recently amended by the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA):

- Accountability and school identification requirements in Sections 1111(c)(4) and 1111(d)(2)(C)-(D): the
 requirements that a State measure progress toward Long-Term Goals and Measures of Interim Progress (MIP);
 meaningfully differentiate, on an annual basis, all public schools, including adjusting the Academic
 Achievement indicator based on a participation rate below 95 percent; and identify schools for
 Comprehensive, Targeted, and additional Targeted Support and Improvement based on data from the 202021 school year.
- Report card provisions related to accountability in Section 1111(h) based on data from the 2020-21 school year. These include:
 - Section 1111(h)(1)(C)(i)(l)-(IV) and (VI): Accountability system description, other than the list of Comprehensive, Targeted, and additional Targeted Support and Improvement Schools.
 - Section 1111(h)(1)(C)(iii)(l): Other Academic indicator results for schools that are not high schools.
 - Section 1111(h)(1)(C)(v): School Quality or Student Success indicator results.
 - Section 1111(h)(1)(C)(vi): Progress toward meeting Long-Terms Goals and MIPs.
 - Section 1111(h)(2)(C) with respect, at the LEA and school levels, to all waiver requirements in section 1111(h)(1)(C).

To secure the waiver of these ESSA requirements, the United States Department of Education required New York State to assure that:

- The State will make publicly available chronic absenteeism data, either as defined in the State's School Quality or Student Success indicator, if applicable, or EDFacts, disaggregated to the extent such data are available by the subgroups in ESEA Section 1111(c)(2)², on State and local report cards (or in another publicly available location).
- The State will make publicly available data on student and/or teacher access to technology devices and highspeed internet, disaggregated by the subgroups in ESEA Section 1111(c)(2), to the extent such data are collected at the State or LEA level.
- Any school that is identified for Comprehensive, Targeted, or additional Targeted Support and Improvement
 in the 2019-20 school year (i.e., any school that was in that status as of the 2019-20 school year), except for
 Comprehensive Support and Improvement Schools identified based on low graduation rates that meet the
 State's exit criteria, will maintain that identification status in the 2021-22 school year, implement its support
 and improvement plan, and receive appropriate supports and interventions.³
- The State will identify Comprehensive, Targeted, and additional Targeted Support and Improvement Schools
 using data from the 2021-22 school year in the fall of 2022 to ensure school identification resumes as quickly
 as possible.⁴

ESSA Accountability Implications

Based on the waiver granted by USDE, NYSED will present proposed amendments to Commissioner's Regulations related to accountability and schools in Receivership to the Board of Regents at its September 2021 meeting. Proposed amendments will be consistent with the following actions:

- NYSED will waive all requirements pertaining to participation rate in state assessments administered during the 2020-21 school year.
- NYSED will not make 2021-22 school year accountability status or level determinations based on 2020-21 school year data for any of the indicators used in New York's accountability system: composite performance; academic progress; student growth; English Language Proficiency; chronic absenteeism; graduation rate; and college, career, and civic readiness.
- NYSED will freeze the accountability status of all schools and districts. All districts and schools will have the same accountability status in the 2021-22 school year that the districts and schools had in the 2020-21 school year. Therefore:
 - Any district that was identified as a Target District in the 2020-21 school year will maintain that identification status in the 2021-22 school year.
 - Any school that was identified as a Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI) School or Targeted Support and Improvement (TSI) School in the 2020-21 school year will maintain that identification status in the 2021-22 school year.
 - There will be no progress determinations made based on 2020-21 school year data for identified Target Districts, CSI Schools, and TSI Schools.
 - No schools will be identified as Recognition Schools in the 2021-22 school year.
 - The next list of CSI schools will be created using 2022-23 school year results, consistent with New York State's three-year identification cycle detailed in the State ESSA Plan.
- NYSED will continue to provide supports in the 2021-22 school year to Target Districts, CSI Schools, and TSI Schools and provide interventions consistent with the school's support and improvement plan.
- NYSED will extend established MIPs and Long-Term Goals by one additional year. Specifically, NYSED will carry forward the 2019-20 school year MIPs that were initially extended for use in the 2020-21 school year to the 2021-22 school year. This action will be in lieu of requiring schools and districts to meet the previously set 2021-22 school year MIPs.
- NYSED will waive requirements in Commissioner's Regulations related to the development and submission (if required) of Participation Rate Improvement Plans to be implemented in the 2021-22 school year.
- NYSED will waive requirements in Commissioner's Regulations that any Good Standing school with any
 accountability measure of Level 1 for any subgroup to complete a Level 1 Addendum for the 2021-22 school
 year.

In addition to the actions listed above, NYSED is continuing to evaluate additional modifications to the accountability system that may be needed in future years to address ongoing complications caused by the COVID-19 pandemic. More information about possible adjustments to individual accountability indicators and identification procedures will be shared as soon as possible.

Receivership Schools

Consistent with the proposed actions listed above, the Department will not use the 2020-21 school year results to make Demonstrable Improvement (DI) determinations for schools in Receivership, place any schools in Independent Receivership, or remove the designation of any school as Struggling. Specifically:

- All schools identified as Struggling for the 2020-21 school year shall remain so identified for the 2021-22 school year.
- All schools that are operated under a school district Superintendent Receiver in the 2020-21 school year shall continue to operate under a school district Superintendent Receiver for the 2021-22 school year.

In addition, since the Department will not use the 2020-21 school year results to make the annual DI determinations for schools in Receivership in the fall of 2021, the Department is waiving the requirement for districts to submit the 2020-21 school year results for their DI indicators to the Office of Accountability (OA). Please note that this waiver does not apply to any data that districts must submit to the Student Information Repository System (SIRS) in accordance with annual reporting requirements as directed by the Office of Information and Reporting Services (IRS).

Additional information about supports and resources that the Department will make available for Receivership Schools will be sent under separate cover.

District and School Report Cards

As a result of the waiver, NYSED will not report the following data on the 2020-21 school year School and District Report Cards:

- A description of the State's accountability system
- Information related to the performance on other academic indicator for public elementary schools and secondary schools that are not high schools
- Information related to the performance on School Quality or Student Success indicators
- Information related to progress toward meeting Long-Term Goals and Measurements of Interim Progress
- Information showing how students in an LEA and each school, respectively, performed on the academic
 assessments compared to students in the State and LEA (with respect to all waived requirements).

The USDE waiver requires that all other reporting elements be included on the 2020-21 school year School and District Report Cards.

Board of Regents Acts on Emergency Regulation Revisions to 2021 Diploma Requirements

August 2021 Regents Exams Cancelled

If USDE Waiver is Denied, Only Four June 2021 Regents Exams will be Administered

If USDE Waiver is Denied, Only Session One of the Grades 3-8 ELA & Math Assessments and Only the Written Test

Component of the Grades 4 & 8 Science Tests will be Held

The Board of Regents today acted on a series of emergency regulations to allow for exemptions to diploma requirements associated with the June 2021 and August 2021 Regents Examination administrations. With the COVID-19 crisis still affecting the State of New York and students having varied levels of in-person instruction, the Board and the Department are taking necessary steps to provide essential flexibility for the State's students, families and educators.

These include actions to cancel the August 2021 Regents Exams and, should the U.S. Department of Education deny the Department's waiver request, only four of the June 2021 Regents Exams will be administered; only Session 1 of the Grades 3-8 English Language Arts (ELA) and Math Tests will be required; and only the one-session Written Test component of the Grades 4 and 8 Science Tests will be administered.

"As we continue to see a global pandemic impact our schools and students in every corner of the state, the Board and I are determined to complete this school year in a manner that protects the health and safety of all of New York's children," said Chancellor Lester W. Young, Jr. "While we were disappointed by the USDE decision not to grant blanket waivers for state assessments, we are confident that the regulatory amendments acted on today and other assessment-related actions by the Department provide for the flexibility necessary to meet federal requirements while ensuring the well-being of those in our school buildings."

"The Department continues to engage with USDE in regard to finding the best path forward in offering state assessments for the children of New York," said Commissioner Betty A. Rosa. "In order to inform these discussions, we are engaging with stakeholders across the state to gain insight on the local approaches to student assessment. The regulatory amendments advanced today provide fairness for our students; however we remain hopeful that USDE will provide the necessary waivers to allow our educators to remain engaged in the important work of fostering a safe and healthy learning environment for each child in New York state."

Summary of the Amendments

A summary of the amendments follows. Full descriptions of the changes can be found in the Regents item \boxed{d} .

CDOS Commencement Credential and CDOS Pathway: Commissioner's regulations are amended to exempt students from any unfinished requirements for the career development and occupational studies commencement credential (CDOS) provided that the student is otherwise eligible to exit from high school and has otherwise demonstrated knowledge and skills relating to the CDOS learning standards.

Regents Exam Exemption Eligibility Requirements: Regulations are amended to allow students who have met the standards for the course of study, as locally determined, to be eligible for an exemption to the examination requirements. To qualify for such an exemption to the diploma requirements, students must meet one of the following criteria:

- The student is currently enrolled in a course of study culminating in a Regents Examination and by the end of the 2021 school year, or the 2021 summer session, will have earned credit in such course of study;
- The student was previously enrolled in the course culminating in the applicable Regents Examination, has
 achieved course credit, and has not yet passed the associated required Regents Examination but was
 intending to take the test in June 2021 or August 2021 to achieve a passing score; or
- The student is in grade 7 or 8, is enrolled in a course of study culminating in taking a Regents Examination and has met the standards assessed in the provided coursework.

The Department will also extend exemption eligibility for pathway assessments, alternative assessments, technical assessments, and locally developed tests through the 2020-21 school year.

Mastery and Honors Flexibility: Regulatory amendments will allow for flexibility in the calculations for the mastery and honors endorsement wherein student course grades may be substituted for exam scores in cases where Regents Examination exemptions would preclude a student from qualifying for an endorsement to their diploma.

Science Laboratory Experience: Commissioner's regulations relating to science laboratory experience are amended to:

- Clarify that a student may still be eligible to take a science Regents examination, and therefore be eligible for an exemption if applicable, even if they are unable to meet the 1,200-minute science laboratory experience requirement due to the COVID-19 crisis; and
- Expand the amendment allowing students to continue to meet the laboratory requirements through a combination of hands on and virtual experiences due to the COVID-19 crisis.

Graduation Assessment Exemption Declination: With the cancellation of the January 2021 Regents Examinations, the Department amended regulations to provide parents and persons in parental relation of students scheduled to graduate in January, June, or August of 2021 who have been exempted from a graduation assessment requirement the opportunity to decline such exemption.

Additionally, the amendment extended the time period required by schools to give parents or persons in parental relation notification of the option to decline such exemption from 10 calendar days to 30 calendar days.

USDE Waiver Exemption Requests: NYSED is in the process of surveying districts and charter schools about their local approaches to student assessment. This information will be used to inform NYSED's conversations with the USDE regarding the administration of the federally required spring 2021 grades 3-8 ELA and math assessments, grades 4 and 8 science tests, and Regents Examinations. It is the intent of the Department to showcase the wide range of quality assessment practices that are taking place at the school and district level throughout New York State.

While no final decisions have been made on the Department's assessment waiver request, the Department is planning ahead. Accordingly:

- If USDE grants the Department's waiver request, the State's elementary- and intermediate-level assessments
 and all of its June and August 2021 Regents Examinations will be cancelled.
- Should USDE not grant the waiver request or not respond prior to the scheduled test administration dates:
 - the Department will administer only the Regents Examinations required under ESSA during the June 2021 administration, which are the ELA, Algebra 1, Earth Science and Living Environment Exams;
 - the August 2021 Regents Exams will be cancelled;
 - only Session 1 of the grades 3-8 assessments in Math and ELA will be required, a shift from the standard practice where these assessments are administered in two sessions; and
 - only the written test component of the Grades 4 and 8 Science Tests will be held; the performance tests will not be administered.

USDE agreed to uncouple state assessments from ESSA accountability requirements so results will be used solely as a measure of student learning. The Department will propose the appropriate regulatory amendments related to accountability at a later date.

Timetable for Implementation

The emergency regulations will become effective on March 16, 2021. It is anticipated that the proposed amendment will be presented for permanent adoption at the June 2021 Regents meeting, after publication of the proposed amendment in the State Register and expiration of the 60-day public comment period required under the State Administrative Procedure Act.

2021-22 district and school accountability statuses are the same as those assigned for the 2020-21 school year, except in the case of school openings, closings, mergers, or reconfigurations of grade levels within a school. EM Chronic Absenteeism is the percentage of grades 1-8 students enrolled for a minimum of ten instructional days and in attendance at least one of those days who were absent (excused or unexcused) for at least 10% of enrolled instructional days.

Students Enrolled – Number of students enrolled for at least ten instructional days and in attendance for at least one of those days

Students Chronically Absent – Number of "Students Enrolled" who were absent for at least 10% of enrolled instructional days

Number Graduated – Number of students in the cohort who graduated by August 31st of the prior reporting year Grad Rate – The 4-, 5-, and 6-year graduation rates (Number Graduated ÷ Number in Cohort) x 100

For 2020-21 Report Cards, if the current year's "Number in Cohort" is less than 30, then it is combined with the previous reporting year's data to attempt to achieve a minimum count of 30. If data were combined for a cohort, the "Number in Cohort" value will be followed by an asterisk (*) referring to a footnote indicating two years of data were combined.

Secondary Chronic Absenteeism

Accountability chronic absenteeism data are provided for informational purposes only in 2020-21 and are not used to make district or school accountability status determinations for the 2021-22 school year.

Secondary Chronic Absenteeism is the percentage of grades 9-12 students enrolled for a minimum of ten instructional days <u>and</u> in attendance at least one of those days who were absent (excused or unexcused) for at least 10% of enrolled instructional days.

Students Enrolled – Number of students enrolled for a minimum of ten instructional days and in attendance for at least one of those days

Students Chronically Absent – Number of "Students Enrolled" who were absent for at least 10% of enrolled instructional days

Assessment Data

National Assessment of Academic Progress (NAEP)

The National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP) measures what U.S. students know and can do in various subjects across the nation, states, and in some urban districts. Also known as The Nation's Report Card, NAEP has provided important information about how students are performing academically since 1969.

NAEP is administered every other year to a representative sample of students across the country. The last administration of NAEP was during the 2018-19 school year. Results are reported for groups of students with similar characteristics (e.g., gender, race and ethnicity, school location), not individual students. The next administration of NAEP is scheduled for 2022 – postponed from 2021 due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

New York State and national student results on the NAEP are reported for Grade 4 Reading, Grade 4 Mathematics, Grade 8 Reading, and Grade 8 Mathematics, showing percentages of students performing at each of the NAEP achievement levels: "Below Basic," "Basic," "Proficient," and "Advanced." NAEP achievement levels are performance standards that describe what students should know and be able to do. Students performing at or above the Proficient level on NAEP assessments demonstrate solid academic performance and competency over challenging subject matter. Descriptions of NAEP achievement levels for each assessment subject are available at https://nces.ed.gov/nationsreportcard/guides/scores-achv.aspx. Data in the tables are disaggregated by subgroups: All Students, American Indian or Alaska Native, Asian, Native Hawaiian/Other Pacific Islander, Black or African American, Economically Disadvantaged, Hispanic or Latino, English Language Learners, Multiracial, Students with Disabilities, and White.

NAEP national and state participation rates are also reported in the NYS Report Card for all students and for subgroups of English Language Learners and Students with Disabilities in Grades 4 and 8 Reading and Mathematics.

Civil Rights Data Collection (CRDC) Data (2017-18) updated for 2020-21 Report Card

Accessible via a downloadable Excel Workbook on the NYS statewide report card and all district and school report cards are measures of school quality, climate, and safety, and accelerated coursework to earn post-secondary credit while in high school as reported by schools to the U.S. Department of Education using the Civil Rights Data Collection Survey. Reference: Accountability Subgroups Defined

All Students: All students, regardless of ethnicity, ELL status, disability status, or economic status.

American Indian/Alaska Native: Student reported as having origins in any of the original peoples of North and South America (including Central America) and who maintains cultural identification through tribal affiliation or community recognition.

Asian or Native Hawaiian/Other Pacific Islander: Student reported as having origins in any of the original peoples of the Far East, Southeast Asia, Hawaii, Guam, Samoa, or other Pacific Islands, or the Indian subcontinent, including Cambodia, China, India, Japan, Korea, Malaysia, Pakistan, the Philippine Islands, Thailand, and Vietnam.

Black or African American: Student reported as having origins in any of the black racial groups of Africa.

Hispanic or Latino: Student reported as belonging to, identifying with, or regarded in the community as Hispanic or Latino, regardless of whether the student also considers themselves to belong to, identify with, or is regarded in the community as belonging to an American Indian/Alaska Native, Asian or Native Hawaiian/Other Pacific Islander, Black or African American, or White races.

Multiracial: Student reported as belonging to more than one racial/ethnic group.

White: Student reported as having origins in any of the original peoples of Europe, North Africa, or the Middle East.

English Language Learners: Student who, by reason of foreign birth or ancestry, speaks or understands a language other than English and speaks or understands little or no English, and requires support in order to become proficient in English and is identified pursuant to Section 154.3 of New York State's Commissioner's Regulations. Students who are not ELL in the current year but were ELL in one or more of the previous four years are called "former ELLs" and are included in the ELL accountability calculations. For the 5-year and 6-year cohorts at the secondary school level, a student who is NOT ELL in the reporting year but was an ELL in one or more of the previous four reporting years will be considered a former ELL and will be included in the ELL group.

Students with Disabilities: Student classified by the Committee on Special Education as having one or more disabilities and needs Special Education. Students who are not students with disabilities in the current year but were students with disabilities in one or more of the previous two years are called "former students with disabilities" and are included in the Students with Disabilities accountability calculations. For the 5-year and 6-year cohorts at the secondary school level, a student who is NOT SWD in the reporting year but was SWD in one or more of the previous TWO reporting years will be included in the SWD group.

Economically Disadvantaged: Student who participates in, or whose family participates in, economic assistance programs, such as the Free or Reduced-Price Lunch Programs; Social Security Insurance (SSI); Food Stamps; Foster Care; Refugee Assistance (cash or medical assistance); Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC); Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP); Safety Net Assistance (SNA); Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA); or Family Assistance: Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF). If one student in a family is identified as low income, all students from that household (economic unit) may be identified as low income.

GLOSSARY OF TERMS - GRADUATION RATE DATA

Cohort

A group of students who first entered grade 9 in the same school year. See the SIRS Manual for a more complete definition.

Dropouts

Students whose last enrollment record indicated they dropped out of school.

Economically Disadvantaged

Economically disadvantaged students are those who participate in, or whose family participates in, economic assistance programs, such as the free or reduced-price lunch programs, Social Security Insurance (SSI), Food Stamps, Foster Care, Refugee Assistance (cash or medical assistance), Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC), Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP), Safety Net Assistance (SNA), Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA), or Family Assistance: Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF). If one student in a family is identified as low income, all students from that household (economic unit) may be identified as low income.

English Language Learners

English Language Learners (ELLs) are those who, by reason of foreign birth or ancestry, speak or understand a language other than English and speak or understand little or no English, and require support in order to become proficient in English and are identified pursuant to Section 154.3 of Commissioner's Regulations.

Former English Language Learner (ELL)

A student who was identified as an English Language Learner in any of the four years prior to the reported school year and who was exited from the status because they demonstrated proficiency in English.

GED (HSE) Transfer

Students whose last enrollment record indicated they transferred to an Approved Alternative HS Equivalency Program,

Gender

Gender (Male or Female) of the student being reported, as identified by the student. In the case of very young transgender students not yet able to advocate for themselves, gender may be identified by the parent or guardian.

Graduates

Graduates include students who received a local diploma or a local diploma with Regents endorsement (Regents diploma). All students who received a Regents diploma (with or without Advanced Designation or CTE Endorsement) are included in the number of students with Regents diploma.

Homeless

Student who lacks a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence, including a student who is sharing the housing of other persons due to a loss of housing, economic hardship, or similar reason; living in motels, hotels, trailer parks or camping grounds due to the lack of alternative adequate accommodations; abandoned in hospitals; or a migratory child, as defined in subsection 2 of section 1309 of

the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965, as amended, who qualifies as homeless under any of the above provisions; or has a primary nighttime location that is a supervised publicly or privately operated shelter designed to provide temporary living accommodations including, but not limited to, shelters operated or approved by the State or local department of social services, and residential programs for runaway and homeless youth established pursuant to article 19H of the executive law or a public or private place not designed for, or ordinarily used as, a regular sleeping accommodation for human beings, including a car, park, public space, abandoned building, substandard housing, bus, train stations, or similar setting. Homeless students do not include children in foster care placements or who are receiving educational services pursuant to subdivision four, five, six, six-a, or seven of Education Law section 3202 or pursuant to article 81, 85, 87, or 88 of Education Law.

In Foster Care

Student who is in 24-hour substitute care for children placed away from their parents and for whom the agency under title IV-E of the Social Security Act has placement and care responsibility. This includes, but is not limited to, placements in foster family homes, foster homes of relatives, group homes, emergency shelters, residential facilities, childcare institutions, and pre-adoptive homes. A child is in foster care in accordance with this definition regardless of whether or not the foster care facility is licensed and payments are made by the State, tribal, or local agency for the care of the child, whether adoption subsidy payments are being made prior to the finalization of an adoption, or whether there is federal matching of any payments that are made.

Local Diploma

Can only be obtained by students with disabilities with an individualized education program or section 504 Accommodation Plan. For complete information on the requirements for this diploma see Diploma Requirements.

Migrant

A student is a migrant child if the student is, or whose parent, guardian, or spouse is, a migratory agricultural worker, including a migratory dairy worker or a migratory fisher, and who, in the preceding 36 months, in order to obtain, or accompany such parent, guardian, or spouse, in order to obtain, temporary or seasonal employment in agricultural or fishing work has moved from one school district to another.

Non-Diploma Credentials

This commencement option includes Career Development and Occupational Studies (CDOS), Skills and Achievement credentials, and previously earned Individualized Education Program (IEP) Diplomas. IEP Diplomas were discontinued after the 2012-13 school year.

Parent in Armed Forces

Student with one or more parent or guardian who is a member of the Armed Forces and on Active Duty. The Armed Forces are the Army, Navy, Air Force, 5 Marine Corps, the Coast Guard, or full-time National Guard. Active duty means full-time duty in the active military service of the United States. Such term includes full-time training duty, annual training duty, and attendance, while in the active military service, at a school designated as a service school by law or by the Secretary of the military department concerned.

Race and Ethnicity

Race or races with which the student primarily identifies as indicated by the student or the parent/guardian.

- American Indian or Alaska Native: A person having origins in any of the original peoples of North and South America (including Central America) and who maintains cultural identification through tribal affiliation or community recognition.
- Asian or Native Hawaiian/Other Pacific Islander: A person having origins in any of the original peoples of the Far East, Southeast Asia, or the Indian subcontinent, including Cambodia, China, India, Japan, Korea, Malaysia, Pakistan, the

Philippine Islands, Thailand, and Vietnam; or a person having origins in any of the original peoples of Hawaii, Guam, Samoa, or other Pacific Islands.

- Black or African American: A person having origins in any of the black racial groups of Africa.
- Hispanic or Latino: A person of Mexican, Puerto Rican, Cuban, Central or South American, or other Spanish culture or origin, regardless of race.
- White: A person having origins in any of the original peoples of Europe, North Africa, or the Middle East.
- Multiracial: Non-Hispanic students who are reported with more than one race.

Regents Diploma

Regents with Advanced Designation

Still Enrolled

Students whose last enrollment record indicated they were still enrolled in high school.

The cohort year for students whose last enrollment record has a grade of "14" (i.e., 7-12 ungraded) is identified using the date reported in the First Date of Entry into Grade 9 field. In circumstances where no date has been reported for an ungraded student, cohort year will be the school year the student turned 17.

Aggregations

Aggregations are done at five different levels:

Economically Disadvantaged

Economically disadvantaged students are those who participate in, or whose family participates in, economic assistance programs, such as the free or reduced-price lunch programs, Social Security Insurance (SSI), Food Stamps, Foster Care, Refugee Assistance (cash or medical assistance), Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC), Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP), Safety Net Assistance (SNA), Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA), or Family Assistance: Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF). If one student in a family is identified as low income, all students from that household (economic unit) may be identified as low income.

English Language Learners

English Language Learners (ELLs) are those who, by reason of foreign birth or ancestry, speak or understand a language other than English and speak or understand little or no English, and require support in order to become proficient in English and are identified pursuant to Section 154.3 of Commissioner's Regulations.

Former English Language Learner (ELL)

A student who was identified as an English Language Learner in any of the four years prior to the reported school year and who was exited from the status because they demonstrated proficiency in English.

Gender

Gender (Male or Female) of the student being reported, as identified by the student. In the case of very young transgender students not yet able to advocate for themselves, gender may be identified by the parent or guardian.

Graduates

Graduates include students who received a local diploma or a local diploma with Regents endorsement (Regents diploma). All students who received a Regents diploma (with or without Advanced Designation or CTE Endorsement) are included in the number of students with Regents diploma.

Homeless

Student who lacks a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence, including a student who is sharing the housing of other persons due to a loss of housing, economic hardship, or similar reason; living in motels, hotels, trailer parks or camping grounds due to the lack of alternative adequate accommodations; abandoned in hospitals; or a migratory child, as defined in subsection 2 of section 1309 of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965, as amended, who qualifies as homeless under any of the above provisions; or has a primary nighttime location that is a supervised publicly or privately operated shelter designed to provide temporary living accommodations including, but not limited to, shelters operated or approved by the State or local department of social services, and residential programs for runaway and homeless youth established pursuant to article 19H of the executive law or a public or private place not designed for, or ordinarily used as, a regular sleeping accommodation for human beings, including a car, park, public space, abandoned building, substandard housing, bus, train stations, or similar setting. Homeless students do not include children in foster care placements or who are receiving educational services pursuant to subdivision four, five, six, six-a, or seven of Education Law section 3202 or pursuant to article 81, 85, 87, or 88 of Education Law.

Humanities Alternative Pathway

Students who satisfied the requirements for a Regents or local diploma by passing an Department Approved Alternative assessment in ELA or social studies (after completing a course in the subject) as their +1.

Humanities Pathway

Students who satisfied the requirements for a Regents or local diploma by passing a second Regents exam in social studies (either Global Studies or U.S. History) and after completing a course in the subject as their +1. This is considered the traditional pathway that most students use to meet the requirement for a local or Regents diploma.

In Foster Care

Student who is in 24-hour substitute care for children placed away from their parents and for whom the agency under title IV-E of the Social Security Act has placement and care responsibility. This includes, but is not limited to, placements in foster family homes, foster homes of relatives, group homes, emergency shelters, residential facilities, childcare institutions, and pre-adoptive homes. A child is in foster care in accordance with this definition regardless of whether or not the foster care facility is licensed and payments are made by the State, tribal, or local agency for the care of the child, whether adoption subsidy payments are being made prior to the finalization of an adoption, or whether there is federal matching of any payments that are made.

Language Other Than English (LOTE) Pathway

Students reported with a Career Path Code of "LOTE" (Language Other Than English). Students who satisfied the requirements for a Regents or local diploma by passing an approved Pathway assessment in a Language Other Than English (LOTE).

Local Diploma

Can only be obtained by students with disabilities with an individualized education program or section 504 Accommodation Plan. For complete information on the requirements for this diploma see Diploma Requirements.

Migrant

A student is a migrant child if the student is, or whose parent, guardian, or spouse is, a migratory agricultural worker, including a migratory dairy worker or a migratory fisher, and who, in the preceding 36 months, in order to obtain, or accompany such parent, guardian, or spouse, in order to obtain, temporary or seasonal employment in agricultural or fishing work has moved from one school district to another.

Parent in Armed Forces

Student with one or more parent or guardian who is a member of the Armed Forces and on Active Duty. The Armed Forces are the Army, Navy, Air Force, 5 Marine Corps, the Coast Guard, or full-time National Guard. Active duty means full-time duty in the active military service of the United States. Such term includes full-time training duty, annual training duty, and attendance, while in the active military service, at a school designated as a service school by law or by the Secretary of the military department concerned.

Pathways (4+1)

In January 2015, the Board of Regents approved regulations establishing multiple, comparably rigorous, assessment pathways to graduation for all students. Under the new "4+1" pathway assessment option, students must take and pass four required Regents exams or Department-approved alternative assessments (one in each of the following subjects: English, math, science, and social studies) and a comparably rigorous assessment for the fifth required exam to graduate.

Also available is the CDOS pathway option, where a student may graduate with a high school diploma if the student meets the graduation course and credit requirements established in section 100.5 of the Regulations of the Commissioner of Education; passesfour required Regents Exams or Department-approved alternative assessments (one in each of the following subjects: English, mathematics, science, and social studies); and meets the requirements to earn the New York State (NYS) CDOS Commencement Credential.

Race and Ethnicity

Race or races with which the student primarily identifies as indicated by the student or the parent/guardian.

- American Indian or Alaska Native: A person having origins in any of the original peoples of North and South America
 (including Central America) and who maintains cultural identification through tribal affiliation or community recognition.
- Asian or Native Hawaiian/Other Pacific Islander: A person having origins in any of the original peoples of the Far East, Southeast Asia, or the Indian subcontinent, including Cambodia, China, India, Japan, Korea, Malaysia, Pakistan, the Philippine Islands, Thailand, and Vietnam; or a person having origins in any of the original peoples of Hawaii, Guam, Samoa, or other Pacific Islands.

Prior to SY 2017-18, the two STEM pathways were combined into one code called "STEM." Some students who graduated earlier may display in the downloadable file with this code.

Career Development and Occupational Studies (CDOS) - These are students who satisfied the requirements for a Regents or local diploma by either completing all the components of the CDOS commencement credential option 1 (program) or option 2 (Department Approved CDOS pathway assessment) as their +1. Students who received a stand-alone CDOS credential, a Skills & Achievement certificate, or a HSE diploma do NOT get reported with a CDOS pathway; they are reported with a code of "NONE" (see below).

Career Technical Education (CTE) - These are students who satisfied the requirements for a Regents or local diploma by successfully completing a Department Approved CTE Program and passing an approved CTE Pathway Assessment as their +1.

Humanities (HUM) - These are students who satisfied the requirements for a Regents or local diploma by passing a second Regents exam in social studies (either Global Studies or U.S. History) and after completing a course in the subject as their +1. This is considered the traditional pathway that most students use to meet the requirement for a local or Regents diploma. Even if the student passed one or more other exams (e.g., in math or science), HUM should be used because that student did not need to take advantage of the flexibility the multiple pathways provide.

Humanities Alternative (HUMALT) - These are students who satisfied the requirements for a Regents or local diploma by passing a Department Approved Alternative assessment in ELA or social studies (after completing a course in the subject) as their +1.

Languages other than English (LOTE) - These are students who satisfied the requirements for a Regents or local diploma by passing a Department Approved pathway assessment in LOTE as their +1.

STEM with a Concentration in Math (STEMMATH) – These are students who satisfied the requirements for a Regents or local diploma by passing a Regents math assessment or a Department Approved Alternative assessment in math (after completing a course in the subject) as their +1.

STEM with a Concentration in Science (STEMSCIENCE) - These are students who satisfied the requirements for a Regents of local diploma by passing a Regents science assessment or a Department Approved Alternative assessment in science (after completing a course in the subject) as their +1.

Students classified by districts as "pre-first" are included in first grade counts. Ungraded students are those assigned to a class that is not organized on the basis of grade grouping and has no standard grade designation. This includes both regular and special classes that have no grade designations. Such a class may contain students of different ages who are identified according to level of performance in one or more areas of instruction, rather than according to grade level or age level. The definition of 'Ungraded' does not include out-of-school youth, preschoolers, or children who are not yet school age. Ungraded Elementary includes ungraded students who are age equivalent to students in Kindergarten through 6th grade. Ungraded Secondary includes ungraded students who are age equivalent to students in 7th through 12th grade.

Homeless

Student who lacks a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence, including a student who is sharing the housing of other persons due to a loss of housing, economic hardship, or similar reason; living in motels, hotels, trailer parks or camping grounds due to the lack of alternative adequate accommodations; abandoned in hospitals; or a migratory child, as defined in subsection 2 of section 1309 of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965, as amended, who qualifies as homeless under any of the above provisions; or has a primary nighttime location that is a supervised publicly or privately operated shelter designed to provide temporary living accommodations including, but not limited to, shelters operated or approved by the State or local department of social services, and residential programs for runaway and homeless youth established pursuant to article 19H of the executive law or a public or private place not designed for, or ordinarily used as, a regular sleeping accommodation for human beings, including a car, park, public space, abandoned building, substandard housing, bus, train stations, or similar setting. Homeless students do not include children in foster care placements or who are receiving educational services pursuant to subdivision four, five, six, six-a, or seven of Education Law §3202 or pursuant to article 81, 85, 87, or 88 of Education Law.

Migrant

Student who is, or whose parent, guardian, or spouse is, a migratory agricultural worker, including a migratory dairy worker or a migratory fisher, and who, in the preceding 36 months, in order to obtain, or accompany such parent, guardian, or spouse, in order to obtain, temporary or seasonal employment in agricultural or fishing work has moved from one school district to another.

Race and Ethnicity

Race or races with which the student primarily identifies as indicated by the student or the parent/guardian.

- American Indian or Alaska Native: A person having origins in any of the original peoples of North and South America
 (including Central America) and who maintains cultural identification through tribal affiliation or community recognition.
- Asian or Native Hawaiian/Other Pacific Islander: A person having origins in any of the original peoples of the Far East,
 Southeast Asia, or the Indian subcontinent, including Cambodia, China, India, Japan, Korea, Malaysia, Pakistan, the

Gender

Gender (Male or Female) of the student being reported, as identified by the student. In the case of very young transgender students not yet able to advocate for themselves, gender may be identified by the parent or guardian.

Grade

Instructional level for the student, as determined by the school district. Pre-Kindergarten counts include half- and full-day students. Students classified by districts as "pre-first" are included in first grade counts. Ungraded students are those assigned to a class that is not organized on the basis of grade grouping and has no standard grade designation. This includes both regular and special classes that have no grade designations. Such a class may contain students of different ages who are identified according to level of performance in one or more areas of instruction, rather than according to grade level or age level. The definition of 'Ungraded' does not include out-of-school youth, preschoolers, or children who are not yet school age. Ungraded Elementary includes ungraded students who are age equivalent to students in Kindergarten through 6th grade. Ungraded Secondary includes ungraded students who are age equivalent to students in 7th through 12th grade.

Migrant

A student is a migrant child if the student is, or whose parent, guardian, or spouse is, a migratory agricultural worker, including a migratory dairy worker or a migratory fisher, and who, in the preceding 36 months, in order to obtain, or accompany such parent, guardian, or spouse, in order to obtain, temporary or seasonal employment in agricultural or fishing work has moved from one school district to another.

Data based on all students who participated in a particular year. When multiple years are displayed, the results reflect all students who participated for each of the years and does not match a student from one year to the next.

Rules for including students

- All students who were tested on the assessment and received a valid score. Rules for determining eligibility for receiving a valid score can be found in the Student Information Repository System (SIRS) Manual.
- Students must have a regular enrollment record as defined as:
 - Code 0011 Enrollment in building or grade
 - o Code 0022 Foreign exchange student enrollment in building or grade
 - o Code 5544 Transferred in under the NCLB Title I "School in Improvement Status" transfer
 - o Code 7000 Transferred in under the NCLB "Persistently Dangerous School" transfer option
 - Code 7011 Transferred in under the NCLB "Victim of Serious Violent Incident" transfer option
- Students are enrolled anytime between April 1, 2014 and April 8, 2014 for ELA, or April 30, 2014 and May 7, 2014 for Mathematics.

Cross-Sectional vs. Cohort-Group View

Cross-Sectional - Assessment results for students in a particular grade compared to students in that same grade the prior year (ex. 4th grade results in 2012-13 compared to 4th grade results in 2013-14). These data are unmatched.

Cohort-Group - Assessment results for students in a particular grade compared to students in a prior grade for the prior year (ex.3rd grade results in 2012-13 compared to 4th grade results in 2013-14). These data are unmatched.

Data are populated with the performance level that is returned from the contractor after scoring.

- Level 1 sum of students who received a standard achieved code of "21"
- Level 2 sum of students who received a standard achieved code of "22"
- Level 3 sum of students who received a standard achieved code of "23"
- Level 4 sum of students who received a standard achieved code of "24"
- Total Tested Sum of students receiving a valid score on the assessment listed and received a performance level of Level 1, Level 2, Level 3, or Level 4.
- Mean Score average of scale score based on students who received a valid scale score. Mean Scores can only be seen when you filter on a specific grade level. It will not show for all 3-8 assessments combined.

Suppression

To ensure student confidentiality, the Department does not publish data for groups with fewer than five students or data that would allow readers to easily determine the performance of a group with fewer than five students. When fewer than five students in a group (e.g., Hispanic) were tested, counts and percentages of tested students scoring at various levels are suppressed for that group and the next smallest group.

For schools, districts, and charters when there is suppression of the performance levels the total tested count will also be suppressed. This applies when a subgroup total equals the all students total, a subgroup total is fewer than five, or all members of a subgroup are in the same performance level.

County, district and other aggregations may vary from other data sources due to various business and suppression rules.

Economically Disadvantaged

Economically disadvantaged students are those who participate in, or whose family participates in, economic assistance programs, such as the free or reduced-price lunch programs, Social Security Insurance (SSI), Food Stamps, Foster Care, Refugee Assistance (cash or medical assistance), Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC), Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP), Safety Net Assistance (SNA), Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA), or Family Assistance: Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF). If one student in a family is identified as low income, all students from that household (economic unit) may be identified as low income.

English Language Learners

English Language Learners (ELLs) are those who, by reason of foreign birth or ancestry, speak or understand a language other than English and speak or understand little or no English, and require support in order to become proficient in English and are identified pursuant to Section 154.3 of Commissioner's Regulations.

- Newcomers ELL students receiving ELL services through an ELL program for a duration of less than or equal to 3 years
- Developing ELL students receiving ELL services through an ELL program for a duration of 4 to 6 years
- Long Term ELL students receiving ELL services through an ELL program for a duration greater than or equal to 7 years
- SIFE Students identified as having Inconsistent/Interrupted Formal Education.
 - English Language Learners who have attended schools in the United States (the 50 States and the District of Columbia)
 for less than twelve months and
 - upon initial enrollment in such schools are two or more years below grade level in literacy in their home language;
 and/or
 - are two or more years below grade level in math due to inconsistent or interrupted schooling prior to arrival in the United States (the 50 States and the District of Columbia).

English Language Learners Programs

- English as a New Language program where ELL students learn to speak, understand, read and write English with a teacher who is specially trained in English as a New Language theories and strategies. The student's primary or home language is used as a vehicle to help learn English.
- One Way/ Two Way Dual Language programs offer ELL students the opportunity to become bilingual and bicultural while
 improving their academic ability. In the One Way Dual Language program model, students who come from the same primary or
 home language and/or background are provided instruction in both English and the home language simultaneously. The Two
 Way Dual Language program includes both native and English speakers; teachers provide instruction in both languages.
- Transitional Bilingual Education Program programs offer ELL students of the same primary or home language the opportunity to learn in English while continuing to learn content in their home language. Students' primary or home language is used to help them progress academically in all content areas while they acquire English. Instruction begins with a minimum of 60% instruction in the student's primary or home language and 40% in English; over time, instruction in English increases until the student has acquired the mandated level of English proficiency.

Former English Language Learners

Students who are not identified as English Language Learner (ELL) in the current school year but who were identified in at least one of the previous four school years are considered "Former ELL."

Gender

Gender (Male or Female) of the student being reported, as identified by the student. In the case of very young transgender students not yet able to advocate for themselves, gender may be identified by the parent or guardian.

Grade

Instructional level for the student, as determined by the school district. Pre-Kindergarten counts include half- and full-day students. Students classified by districts as "pre-first" are included in first grade counts. Ungraded students are those assigned to a class that is not organized on the basis of grade grouping and has no standard grade designation. This includes both regular and special classes that have no grade designations.  NYSED-operated programs.
- Prekindergarten students are not included in ELL enrollment counts by gender, ethnicity, disability status, economically disadvantaged status, Former English Language Learner, and grade.
- When the total ELL students count equals the count in the Students with Disabilities, Economically Disadvantaged
 Students and/or Former English Language Learners category, the data are suppressed. Additionally, when the count of
 English Language Learner students in either the Students with Disabilities, Economically Disadvantaged Students and/or
 Former English Language Learners category, is less than 5, the data are suppressed.
- Counts of ELL students included in the Home Languages, the English Language Learners Breakdown, and English Language
 Learners Programs categories represent those students who were identified as ELL during the school year. Counts in the
 other categories of the report represent those students who were ELL as of BEDS day (first Wednesday in October).
- A frequency table was used to determine the top 5 Home Languages for each district. In the case of a tie between two or more Home Languages for a district in position 5, the tie was broken by selecting the language based on the state level home language ranking.
- The number of years an ELL student has received ELL Services through an ELL program was used to determine English
 Language Learners Breakdown by Category. Newcomers have received services for less than or equal to 3 years.
 Developing ELL students have received services for 4 to 6 years. Long Term ELL students have received services for greater
 than or equal to 7 years.
- The SIFE category includes ELL students identified as having Inconsistent/Interrupted Formal Education.
- English Language Learners Program counts are based on ELL students who were receiving services in the programs at any time during the school year.

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
