
Spanish Class Trip to Costa Rica



On March 17-25, a group of 17 Wausau East students traveled to Costa Rica to practice their Spanish and to explore the rich biodiversity of the country. Students toured a coffee plantation, took a boat ride down the Río Frío to discover caimans, monkeys, lizards, bats and birds in the natural environment, waded in the hot springs at the base of the Arenal volcano, took a horseback ride, zip lined through the cloud forest, explored the cloud forest from hanging bridges and swam in the warm ocean waters at Manuel Antonio National Park. The students enjoyed experiencing the Costa Rican culture and the diverse wildlife of the country.



Notes from the Director's Chair

Arsenic and Old Lace

The Wausau East End Players (EEP) will be presenting another rare summer production. This will now be our *second annual* alumni production, and we have chosen Joseph Kesselring's classic American comedy, *Arsenic and Old Lace*. Of the 12 plays written by Kesselring, *Arsenic and Old Lace* was by far the most successful. According to Brooks Atkinson's opening night review in *The New York Times*, the play was "so funny that none of us will ever forget it."

The play is a <u>farcical black comedy</u> revolving around the Brewster family. Originally descended from the <u>Mayflower</u> settlers but now composed of maniacs, most of them homicidal! The hero, Mortimer Brewster, is a drama critic who must deal with his crazy family and the local <u>Brooklyn</u> police as he debates whether to go through with his recent promise to marry the woman he loves, Elaine Harper (who lives next door and is the daughter of the local minister).

His family includes two spinster aunts: Abby and Martha Brewster, who have taken to murdering lonely old men by poisoning them with a glass of home-made <u>elderberry wine</u> laced with <u>arsenic</u>, <u>strychnine</u>, and "just a pinch of <u>cyanide</u>"; a brother, Teddy, who believes he is <u>Theodore Roosevelt</u>. He digs <u>locks</u> for the <u>Panama Canal</u> in the cellar of the Brewster home (which then serve as graves for the aunts' victims because Teddy thinks that they died of <u>yellow fever</u>). And, a murderous brother, Jonathan, who has received multiple <u>plastic surgeries</u> performed by an alcoholic doctor, Herman Einstein, to conceal his identity. Now he looks like horror-film star <u>Boris Karloff</u> (which in itself was a <u>self-referential</u> joke, as the part was originally played on Broadway by Karloff)!

Throughout the play, Jonathan is plotting to kill Mortimer; all while Mortimer is struggling to find solutions to rid his family of Jonathan and dealing with Officer O'Hara (who has aspirations of being a playwright himself), so he can keep his aunts safe from his psychotic brother and the police.

As the character Mortimer Brewster says of his family's history: That it is as if " ... Strindberg wrote Hellzapoppin!" Come enjoy this wonderfully dark comedy and help raise money for Theatre Scholarships.

Arsenic and Old Lace performances will be held during the week of July 25; specific dates and times to be announced. All performances will be in the Wausau East High School Black Box Theater. All tickets will be \$15.00 and may be purchased at the door. There is limited seating available!

Sending Your IB Transcripts to a University 2022

Many parents of IB students will want to notify the registrar of their child's IB exam scores which will be available after July 6. This can be done in two ways. First, the student can submit a "Request for Results of Service Form" through the IB Coordinator by May 20.

When exam results are released July 6, they will be made available to institutes via an IB secure website, or will be mailed a paper transcript of grades if the institution does not make use of this electronic service. A candidate's first six requests will be accepted without charge if submitted before the **May 20 deadline**. Of this six, no more than one institution can be selected from Canada and <u>one institution from the US</u>.

After July 5, IB graduates can request that their results are sent to a university directly by completing the appropriate transcript request form electronically or sending it to the address provided on the form. A fee will be charged for each additional request that is submitted regardless of whether any previous requests have been made on your behalf. To submit your transcript request electronically, please visit: rrs.ibo.org Under no circumstances should candidates reveal their PIN to universities or admission centers.


The IB transcript of grades will display the student's full name, date of birth, the name of the school you attended, the subjects which they were registered for and the grades achieved for each subject.

A Message from the Health Office

Summer is the perfect time to schedule appointments for your child's medication refill and check on immunization requirements. Listed below are some reminders for prescription and over the counter medications, where to find needed forms and the Marathon County immunization requirements along with clinic information.

All medication must be kept in the Health Office; this includes:

- Over the counter pain relievers (Tylenol/Advil or generic)
- Gastrointestinal products (Tums, Imodium, etc.)
- Cold products (cough syrup, cold medicine)
- Ear or eye drops (Visine, etc.,)
- Vitamins and probiotics
- Prescription medication



Epipens, inhalers and diabetic supplies may be carried by students. We request that the proper forms be completed. Contact supplies and cough drops may be carried by students.

Please contact the Health Office at 715-261-0678 for the necessary medication administration forms or pick them up during regular office hours. Forms may also be found on the Wausau School District website by clicking here: WSD Health Services. Completed forms can be turned in during schedule pick up, faxed to the Health Office at 715-842-0423 or dropped off at your convenience. Please feel free to contact us with any questions.

Students with Medication at School

Parents: Please remember to pick up your child's medication before the last day of school. Only Epipens, inhalers, or diabetic supplies may be picked up by a student. All other medications must be picked up by a parent/guardian. If your child will be attending summer school, please contact Nancy Peters in the Health Office at 715-261-0678. Arrangements may be made for the transfer of medications. Medications not picked up by 3:00 p.m. on Friday, June 3, will be discarded. Any student who checked out an elevator key from the Health Office must return it by June 3, to avoid a \$20 fee.


