and Compline Something for everyone! Dear People of God: On Ash Wednesday we were invited in the name of the Church, to the observance of a holy Lent, by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God's holy Word. (BCP p.265). We gathered together in our church home and received the mark of the ashen cross on our foreheads as a sign of our mortal nature, leading us into Lent and reminding us that we are but dust, and to dust we shall return.

At the same time, when we look beyond the walls of our church, we have seen many images and stories of the people of Ukraine with the ashes of war thrust upon them. A further reminder of the fragile nature of human life but in its midst, a profound testimony of the strength of the human spirit and the enduring nature of the soul. This includes the many thousands of Russian citizens who have stood up in protest of this war and have been arrested for speaking out.

Among those in the throws of chaos is Jesuit Father Andriy Zelinskyy, coordinator of military chaplains for the Ukrainian Catholic Church. He ministered full time with troops on the front in Eastern Ukraine from 2014 to 2018 before taking on his current role. Father Zelinskyy sees his mission as "helping troops protect their humanity." He goes on to say, "I see my role as helping lean heaven toward the soldiers. We must help them choose good, seek truth, promote justice and contemplate beauty. These are all essential for preserving their humanity. We can solve so many problems if we can preserve our humanity, especially in the chaos of war."



While here in Fairhope, we are fortunate to not find ourselves in the same position, however, Father Zelinskyy's words still ring true. We can solve so many problems in our own communities if we can preserve our own humanity. Expanding on Zelinskyy's words, it is for us to choose good and to uplift the good in each other, to seek truth in this world and within one another, to promote justice for all those we encounter, and to contemplate the divine beauty we might see in others: our neighbors, our brothers and sisters in Christ, and especially those with whom we have our differences.

In this Lenten season we will once again gather on Wednesday nights to break bread together and hear from a diverse panel of profound and thought provoking speakers with our overarching theme being "One Lord of All." The goal of our conversations will be to talk about how we-as Christians—can do our part to bring about unity, in our church and in our community, in the midst of a world that leans towards divisiveness and to cultivate a place where it is safe to have those conversations and to grow closer with one another. I look forward to sharing this time with you and am excited for what we might learn together.

May you find this Lent a holy one. May heaven lean towards you, may you lean towards the Lord, and in the name of the One Lord of All, may we lean towards one another.

Lenten Lecture Series



Mr. Bradley Byrne - March 16 Attorney, Former United States Representative

Most people already know Bradley Byrne as a public official - state school board member, state senator, Chancellor of Alabama's two year college system and Congressman - or as a lawyer in this area for over 40 years. But not many know that before he held public office he was an active Episcopalian.

In Mobile he was the Senior Warden at Christ Church where he also was a lay Eucharistic minister and taught a Sunday School series on the history

of the early church. At the Diocesan level he was Chairman of the Wilmer Hall Board and a member of the Standing Committee. At the national level he served on the Kanuga Conferences Board. His wife, Rebecca, was the Senior Warden at All Saints in Mobile, Chairman of the Beckwith Board, and also a Standing Committee and Kanuga Board member.

Bradley's mother was a resident at Murray House in the last years before her death. His son, Patrick, graduated from Sewanee. His daughter, Laura, was married at Kanuga. All of his children were active in St. James' youth programs and as acolytes.

Perhaps it came from his Grandmother, Mary Roberts Byrne, who was an Episcopal church planter in this area; his father, Arthur, one of the

original campers who built the first Beckwith Lodge; or his Uncle Tom, who was a priest in this diocese and whose first assignment after ordination was all of the Episcopal churches in Baldwin County, including St. James.

In Congress he became close to the late Rep. John Lewis, traveling with him to the annual Selma pilgrimages



commemorating the March to Montgomery, and to South Africa, which included a lunch with the late Archbishop Desmond Tutu. Along with his Democratic colleague from Washington state, Suzan Delbene, he participated in a panel at a Kanuga conference on civility in the Church and in the public square. And Bradley developed a close working relationship with Presiding Bishop Michael Curry beginning with his Consecration in 2015.

One thing Bradley learned from all this is that it's far more important to be a servant leader than to be a politician, and that requires listening, understanding - and compromise, even with those with whom you disagree. That is the way of agape love.

As Bishop Curry said in his sermon at the Royal Wedding in 2018: "There's power in love. Don't underestimate it. Don't even oversentimentalize it. There's power, power in love."

Lenten Lecture Series



Captain Tim Kinsella - March 30 Retired Commanding Officer of NAS

Captain Timothy "Lucky" Kinsella retired from the US Navy on January 13 of this year after more than three decades of service in the US Navy. The ceremony was held at the National Naval Aviation Museum in Pensacola.

Kinsella enlisted in the US Navy in 1989. He is a 1996 graduate of the United States Naval Academy, where he earned a Bachelor of Science in Political Science, and is a 2003 graduate of the University of

San Diego, where he earned a Master of Science in Global Leadership. Kinsella was designated a Naval Aviator in 1998 and assumed command of Naval Air Station (NAS) Pensacola in March 2019. During his command at the Naval Air Station in Pensacola, Kinsella led the base through a terrorist attack, a major hurricane, and a national pandemic. In July of 2021, Kinsella won the



John Paul Jones award for Inspirational Leadership from the Navy League of the United States for his outstanding leadership and service to Naval Air Station (NAS) Pensacola. Each year, The Navy League recognizes service members who have exhibited exceptional traits and achievements that uphold the values of the United States Military. The John Paul Jones Award for Inspirational Leadership is awarded to the Naval Officer that has made an outstanding contribution to the high standards of leadership in the Naval service. Kinsella was chosen from over 200 nominees.

Now retired, Kinsella serves his Pensacola community as a mentor, public speaker and community leader.



No one defies stereotypes, generalizations or clichés more than Dr. Bertice Berry. Growing up poor in Wilmington, Delaware, the sixth of seven children, Bertice was told by a high school teacher that she was "not college material." Fortunately, there was another teacher who believed that she was destined for more. Berry applied to several schools without any idea how she would pay the tuition if she were accepted. The day her application arrived at Jacksonville University in Florida, a wealthy benefactor called the Admissions Department looking for a potential student "who could swim if they had the right backing," and might sink without it.

Bertice not only graduated magna cum laude from Jacksonville where she was awarded the President's Cup for leadership, she subsequently earned a Ph.D. in Sociology from Kent State University at the age of 26. Dr. Berry taught sociology and statistics at Kent, and demonstrated that she knew a few things about humor, as well. She became one of the most popular teachers at the university; so popular, in fact, larger lecture halls had to be found to accommodate the ever-increasing number of students. "A colleague said to me, 'You're funny,' and I said, 'No I'm not, I'm a scholar,'" recounts Dr. Berry. It was then that she realized by using humor in her lectures to address such difficult subjects as racism and sexism she was making a more profound impact.

Shortly thereafter, Berry left Kent to become an award-winning entertainer, lecturer and

comedienne. From 1991 through 1994 she won the coveted national Comedian of the Year Award, and was also named Campus Lecturer of the Year and Campus Entertainer of the Year. She had created a niche as both a gifted speaker with a comic edge and a comic with a serious message. Her busy schedule included over 200 appearances a year.

Berry was the host and co-executive producer of her own nationally syndicated talk show, "The Bertice Berry Show," and hosted "USA Live," a four-hour live interview and entertainment show on the USA Cable Network. She's been featured on numerous other television programs, including appearances on "The Oprah Winfrey Show," "The Tonight Show with Jay Leno," ABC's "20/20" and more recently on NPR's "Tell Me More" with Michel Martin.

Dr. Bertice Berry is also the best-selling author of an inspirational memoir, I'm On My Way, But Your Foot Is On My Head, and the hilarious bestsellers Sckraight From the Ghetto, You Might Be Ghetto If and the sequel You STILL Ghetto. Her first work of fiction, Redemption Song, published by Double Day in 2000, is also a best-seller and has been praised by critics for its ability to entertain, inspire and educate. Berry followed Redemption Song, with another bestseller, The Haunting of Hip Hop and took her readers on a journey to the other side. In August 2002, she released her most passionate work ever with Jim & Louella's Homemade Heart-fix *Remedy*, a tantalizing yet spiritual tale that has won several awards. Berry's wit and wisdom shine through in her novel about looking for love in all the wrong places—and with all the wrong people, When Love Calls, You Better

Answer; released the summer of 2005. Her



book, *The Ties That Bind*, bridges the past with the future and is more personal—tracing the history of her family—and was released January 2009.Her latest book, *A Year to Wellness and Other Weight Loss Secrets* is a personal journey of healing and wellness that resulted in a weight loss of 150 lbs."Those who care a lot, carry a lot," says Berry. *A Year to Wellness and Other Wellness Secrets* was released in May 2011.

In 2011, Savannah Technical College President Dr. Kathy Love along with Technical College System of Georgia Commissioner Ron Jackson dedicated a new Student Enrichment Facility and presented Dr. Berry with the Bertice Berry Change & Transformation Classrooms.

Dr. Berry believes that community involvement is not limited to just "writing a check" and has taken a very active role in supporting organizations that benefit those in need. She has graciously donated all of the royalties from the sales of her books to organizations that help families in transition, raise funds for scholarships and provide resource information to low-income families.

Despite all of her honors and achievements, Dr. Berry is most proud of becoming the "instant mother" to her five children and becoming a grandmother in 2015 and again in 2021. She lives in Savannah, GA where she is active in the community. "When you walk with purpose," Berry says, "you collide with destiny!"






