The year began with students, faculty, and staff returning to campus for the first time since March 2020. # **SEPTEMBER**

#### Welcome Back!

After an unprecedented Spring of 2020 due to the international COVID-19 pandemic, UNIS was prepared and eager to welcome students, faculty, and staff back onto campus. With health and safety as our top priority, the school year began in a hybrid learning format, where students alternated between in person and remote learning. Because of this, we had two successful first days, allowing students to enjoy the moment of being back to school for the first time since March 2020. Remote learners were able to livestream into their classrooms thanks to the implementation of new technology and commitment from our teachers on both campuses. In person learning functioned a little differently than normal with an emphasis on mask wearing and social distancing, but the energy and joy of being back in school could still be felt. As a community, the individuals of UNIS collectively took responsibility to

allow for a successful year back to in person learning.



**Diversity, Equity, & Inclusion** In the months leading up to the 2020-2021 school year, UNIS was also forced to look inward and recognize the existence of systemic racism. At UNIS, we are advocates for anti-racism and thus took time to reflect on our past and make changes for the future through the necessary hard work we are committed to. After engaging in honest dialogue on race and privilege with administrators, faculty, staff, students, alumni, and parents, UNIS took action. Dr. Judith King-Calnek became the school's first Director of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion. Dr King-Calnek has been a member of the UNIS community since 1994 and took on the role of Director of DEI head on.

# OCTOBER

#### **Tut House Students Leading**

As students, faculty, and staff acclimated to the Hybrid schedule, Tutorial House students jumped right in and ran their annual Club Fair in a virtual format. The Club Fair showcased over 40 clubs and conferences in the categories of: Academics; Activism, Politics, and Advocacy; Arts and Recreation; Cultural; Media and Publication; and UN Related. The event ran for three days and allowed students to learn about the vast selection of clubs and conferences, and allowed each club to pitch to interested members. It was a successful and impressive event that highlighted our student body's adaptability, leadership skills, and commitment to think and act critically and creatively.



#### **UN Day**

Every October, the UNIS community celebrates our connection to the UN, our diversity, and shared humanity through UN Day as UN Day marks the day the UN officially came into being. Though our UNIS celebrations looked quite different than most years, the celebration of the UN spirit and ideals was not dulled. Tutorial House students learned about the US Electoral College with NYU Professor of Politics and Co-Director of the NYU Center for Social Media and Politics, Joshua Tucker. TH Students also participated in a guided activity around SDG #4: ensure inclusive and equitable quality education and promote lifelong learning opportunities for all. Middle School students enjoyed a special UN Day webinar, while the Queens campus enjoyed both in person and virtual activities including wonderful musical performances by students. Junior School students engaged in their

annual UN Day assembly including the UN Chant and the Message from the S-G. Although we were unable to visit the UN this year, Junior School Mascot Germain had the privilege of taking a tour with UNIS Board member Stephen Margetts in celebration of UN Day.





#### **Respect & Equal Rights**

UNIS students consistently demonstrate their respect for equal rights for all. One instance from October was when Tutorial House students participated in International Pronouns Day in Spanish. The day seeks to make respecting, sharing, and educating about personal pronouns commonplace as referring to people by the pronouns they determine for themselves is basic to human dignity.



# NOVEMBER Poetry



Les parapluies poétiques (The Poetic Umbrellas) is an action where the J4 students offered a poem to listeners and then gave a short explanation of it.


### **Design Thinking**

**Tutorial House students** participated in a design thinking competition organized by the non-profit Hello Future and coordinated at UNIS by The STAR Project club. This opportunity brought together Syrian refugee teens and U.S. teens who worked to develop creative solutions to the challenges of education in the pandemic. Students had to design a prototype, test it, and present the solution. This opportunity allowed for students to work collaboratively, develop their design thinking skillsets, and help raise money for refugee teen educational programming.

The final product is powerful, moving, and a testament of what can be achieved when we work together despite the difficulties of the pandemic. were able to donate 4,000 pounds of food and toiletries! # **Expert Talk Series**

# Collective Responsibility during Holocaust Remembrance

To commemorate Holocaust Remembrance Day, the UNIS PA DEI Committee collaborated with the Museum of Jewish Heritage: A Living Memorial to the Holocaust hosted a webinar featuring guest speaker Briona Brandman, a survivor of Aushwitz. Briona bravely shared her remarkable story with the community. It was an event filled with emotion and reflection as we commemorated the tragedy of the Holocaust and realized our collective responsibility to share the history and lessons so this should never happen again.

#### **Design Engineering**

Throughout the month of January, Junior School Design Engineering students worked on designing their own computer game using the Scratch block based programming language and the CSFirst curriculum. They also used Makey Makey to create a game controller out of everyday objects to be able to play their own games. Students learned about coding, as well as an understanding of circuits, electricity, and conductivity.

The Queens campus received a grant for 3d Gamification and Animation and was able to begin a pilot program that focused on teaching students how to create AR and VR, as well as 2D and 3D game development. This program was a great intro for interactive design and development helping to prepare our students for their futures in a tech heavy society.



#### **Student Leadership**

The Middle School held their Student Council elections in January. Each candidate delivered a speech to their classmates during Community periods. Two representatives from each grade were selected to the student council for the second semester. Our future leaders are already in action!

#### **Milestones in the IB**

As the International Baccalaureate is the capstone of academic

progress at UNIS, we were extremely proud as T4 students completed their extended essays and the projects were submitted to the IB. This is a major accomplishment during the students' senior year. The essays were printed and on display in the library for other students, faculty, and staff to read and enjoy.

### **EIB Leads Mentorship Program**

Tutorial House students in the EIB (Equity and Inclusion Board) started their mentorship program for both Junior School and Middle School students. The first mentorship sessions in the Junior School started with teaching about the Golden Rule: "Do unto others as you would have them unto you," also stated as "Treat others how you would like to be treated." The student mentors taught the younger students about empathy and respect. In the Middle School, the student mentors focused on Understanding Race in Society and focused on the concepts of identity, microaggressions, stereotypes, and racism.



## **Black History Month**

In recognition of Black History Month, the DEI department, in partnership with the PA DEI Committee and the EIB, hosted a Black History Month Speakers mini-series. The speaker series showcased the short film *Scattered Africa* and included a Q&A with filmmaker and anthropologist Dr. Sheila Walker. It also included a talk by our own Dr. Judith King-Calnek on *Abolition and Artistry, Free People of Color in the 19th Century US.* Dr. Kim D. Butler of Rutgers University concluded the series with her talk on *Beyond Victims, Pathologies and Magical Negroes: The Beauty and Transformative Power of Blackness.* This speaker series was powerful and focused on the black experience both historically and currently.

#### **Student Run Concert**

Tutorial House students organized their second MusiConnect concert led by Cadenza, a TH club aimed at utilizing music to share joy with others. The students developed the concert series as a way to raise school spirit during the difficult times of the pandemic and to help the community connect through music. Their second concert was 50 minutes and extremely successful. We are proud of our students who are committed to helping their fellow classmates and understand the importance of mental health and balance.

# MARCH UNIS-UN Conference

The Tutorial House student organization UNIS-UN held their first fully virtual, student-led international conference and it was outstanding. The title of the conference was A Global Catastrophe: The Impacts of *COVID-19.* The two-day conference covered topics such as politics and the pandemic, Coronavirus through the eyes of the media, economic fallout and recovery, COVID-19 and immigration, racial and ethnic disparities, the effects on domestic life dynamics, and many more. The conference featured Keynote Speakers: Dr. Anthony Fauci (& Dr. Michael Phillips for live Q&A), Christiane Amanpour, Sanjay Gupta, Ambassador Burhan Gafoor, and many other guest speakers including multiple UNIS alumni.

We are extremely privileged to be able to engage with leaders from many different facets. Each session was filled with informative information.





### **International Women's Day**

In celebration of IWD 2021, the PA DEI Committee in partnership and collaboration with the EIB, hosted a Fireside Chat with H.E. 

#### The Year that Zoomed By


Multiple JS classes and over 75 members of faculty and staff created the mural "The Year That Zoomed By." The community mural commemorates a special school year spent in the midst of a worldwide pandemic. The 8 ½ ft x 8 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> ft mural, installed on the wall of the landing in the stairwell across from the Junior School library, is made of 256 unique ceramic tiles. Students and their teachers created a painted portrait of themselves on zoom, some appearing to be holding hands from one tile to the other, while staff and faculty wrote hashtags expressing the resilience, memories and hardships of a memorable year. The final design of the mural evokes a close-up view of a QR code, alluding to the virtual communication mode that defined much of the school year, when teaching and learning were taking place remotely through a computer screen.

# In Memoriam: Sylvia Howard Fuhrman ASG, SRSG for UNIS



A driving force in the growth and development of the United Nations International School (UNIS), Mrs. Fuhrman dedicated her life to the world-renowned institution. She was appointed to her position as Special Representative of the Secretary-General of the United Nations for UNIS by Secretary-General U-Thant in 1967. She held that position for 45 years.

Mrs. Fuhrman served as a liaison between governments, often representing each of the six Secretaries-General she served at meetings and events. She welcomed every new Ambassador and met with new UN Families to enroll their children at UNIS. She was instrumental in obtaining UN financial support for the school. Her creation of the Development Fund in 1963 provided much-needed funding through 1983. As the primary fundraiser for the school, she found a seat at the table in boardrooms, in diplomatic circles with world leaders and top-level foundations, always with grace and elegance. She reached out to each of the193 UN Member States in 2007 and secured several large gifts for capital improvements.

Mrs. Fuhrman focused on finding a physical home for the school, which resulted in the creation of a unique learning environment for thousands of children from around the world. She helped curate opportunities for students to meet with world leaders and attend historic events. She made it possible for the 1966 UNIS graduating class to hold its commencement ceremonies in the General Assembly Hall, an event that has taken place every year since then. In 1976, she worked with UNIS students to create an annual student-led conference, UNIS-UN, focused on current global events held in the General Assembly Hall. She was the longest-standing member of the UNIS Board of Trustees, serving for over 50 years.

Well-known and respected throughout the UN Secretariat, she was truly a giant in the lives of so many people. Mrs. Fuhrman is survived by her daughter Leni Fuhrman and son-in-law Charles DeFanti.

# **TREASURER'S REPORT**

**UNIS** is committed to fiscal sustainability and affordability via active and conservative financial management. We are determined to efficiently fulfill our educational mission while providing exceptional academics, arts, and athletics at two campuses in Manhattan and Queens. Our financial health and the generosity of our donors enable UNIS to attract and retain a world-class, committed faculty and an extraordinarily gifted and diverse student body.

For the fiscal year ended June 30, 2021, tuition continued to comprise 90% of total revenue. UNIS's tuition for the 2020-21 fiscal year increased by 2.49%. In keeping tuition increases predictable, we are committed to continuing our efforts to increase non-tuition revenue sources, such as gifts to the Annual Fund.

As a result of the continuing pandemic, we maintained our focus on allocating the necessary resources in making our campuses safe for our entire community. This included utilizing technology to safely test students and staff so our doors could reopen. Our focus remained on technological advances for remote learning, and professional development for our faculty and staff for incorporating hybrid learning into the school year.

Capital projects focused heavily on improving long-deferred building maintenance projects at both campuses to avoid major repairs in the future. Where possible, outside sources of income such as insurance were leveraged. Because of this disciplined approach to cost management and resource allocation, the school once again finished the fiscal year in a firm financial position.

Through the ongoing work of the Investment Sub-Committee of the Board of Trustees, donor restricted net assets increased to \$28.4 million as of June 30, 2021.


UNIS is grateful for the Modern Language Department's ongoing support

Finally, we benefitted from solid donor support among parents and alumni. We hope to continue this growth to reduce reliance on tuition and provide financial aid to those students in need. Financial contributions significantly impact UNIS's ability to innovate and enhance our students' educational experience. The continuing generosity of parents, alumni, parents of alumni, faculty, staff, and friends of UNIS affirms their awareness of philanthropic gifts' vital role. As a result of the school's financial position and through the support of our community, UNIS could continue its \$1.72 million in financial aid assistance to our students.

We are very excited about all the new developments and achievements by UNIS in the 2020-21 academic year. We are looking forward to more to come in the years ahead of us.
