Lakota's Innovation Hubs Relaunch, Elevate Personalized Learning

While COVID may have temporarily derailed Lakota's plans to leverage Innovation Hubs for more collaborative learning, the concepts driving the new spaces - personalized, student-led learning - have been as alive as ever the last two years.

"The foundation of the Hubs is the instructional practices our teachers are using to complement the digital tools in these spaces," said **Keith Koehne**, Lakota's executive director of curriculum and instruction. "The strategies our teachers were prepared to apply in the Hub to give students more choice and ownership in their learning have simply been relocated to their classrooms during the pandemic."

But little by little, the spaces are beginning to return to their original purpose. "Hub Hops", as Lakota's team of innovation specialists like to call them, are recharging the spaces and reminding students and staff how they

can be used to take personalized learning to even higher levels.

"It's been really exciting to witness," said **Krista Heidenreich**, Lakota's director of digital learning and professional learning. "Students and staff are rediscovering the space and with the same level of enthusiasm we saw two years ago."


Musical Theater Brings History to Life

East Spark Ears 17th National Pacemaker for Journalism Excellence



East Mock Trial Continues Regional Run Following Rare Feat in Virtual Tournament

For the sixth consecutive year, at least one Lakota

For the 17th time, the Lakota East Spark news magazine staff earned a national Pacemaker, the top publication award from the National Scholastic Press Association (NSPA). The nation's oldest media evaluation and support organization only awarded 25 Pacemakers nationally in the newspaper category.

Judges were reporters and editors from the Minneapolis Star and St. Paul Pioneer press, who reviewed multiple issues of the Spark for coverage, reporting, writing, design, photography, art, business practices and ethical opinion use.

Several staff members also earned individual writing awards, including:
Mia Hilkowitz, co-chief editor - First Place National Story of the Year (COVID-19 reporting online story category)
Natalie Mazey, co-news editor - Story of the Year runner-up (COVID-19 reporting print story category)

East Mock Trial team will continue on to the Ohio Center for Law Related Education (OCLRE) regional competition following the OCLRE districts tournament.

The team prevailed on both the prosecuting and defensive sides of its case. Individual attorneys are judged on preparedness, objections, opening and closing statements and trial procedures. Individual witnesses, who must master a long deposition as well as maintain a fictitious character, are judged on their ability to answer questions on direct examination as well as hold up on cross examination. Trials are judged by practicing attorneys, sitting judges and local magistrates.

In a rare feat, the teams, comprised of all first-year members, combined for three Best Attorney Awards going to Co-Captain **Mary Baron**, Co-Captain **Olivia Rigney**, and **Cara Raiford** as well as three Best Witness Awards going to **Alex Ross**, **Kyle Smith** and **Nisso Sacha**.

Megan Miranda, co-news editor - Story of the Year fifth place (news writing category).

Vi Dao - Design of the Year fourth place (editorial category).

The Spark staff also earned a fifth place “Story of the Year” award in the social justice category for its in-depth report on “Black Lives Matter.”

“The students came together and really excelled,” said long-time mock trial teams advisor **Dean Hume**. “These kids had no experience. They just wanted to take a chance, to try something new, and they hit it out of the park.”
