


Staff Spotlight

cian. In this position he also coordinates STLP (19 years) and Samsung Solve for Tomorrow.



Director's Message

The C.A.T.S Academy of the Ashland Independent Schools is a program for the gifted and high potential students in our district. We are located in a beautiful building on Paul Blazer's campus. Students are brought to us each day from all the elementary schools and also from Ashland Middle School. We provide these students with challenging enrichment opportunities in math, science and other subject areas.

C.A.T.S. Walk for Dogsand Cats

In March of 2019, the C.A.T.S. Academy students decided to participate in a service project. After discussing several options, the students overwhelmingly elected to raise money for the Ashland Animal Rescue Fund known as AARF. They raised money by organizing a Walkathon. 


Tomcats Show Strengths on Both Sides of Ball Through Five Games, Ashland Outscoring Opponents 224-35

The Tomcats scored 44 points in their season opener against Bourbon County and haven't looked back. Putting up 50, 54, 41, and 35 most recently against Bell County. Ashland has started 5-0 and locked themselves in for at least a tie in the district. The district win against Russell came as the thirteenth in their last fourteen meetings. While their offense is second in the state (3A) in points per game, they rank first in scoring margin, averaging victories by 37.8 points. Their team defense also stands atop the stat sheet at only allowing 7 points per game. The high-powered offense is led by runningback Keontae Pittman, currently ranked fifth in the state (3A) averaging 134 yards rushing per game while JT Garrett is averaging 85 receiving yards per game, good for second in the state. That



top-ranked defense is giving up just over 60 rushing yards per game and only allowing 113 yards in the air. COVID-19 has caused a numerous changes to the schdule, causing some cancellations as well as alterations to the opponents. Ashland has one more regular season test against Rowan County before moving forward to playoffs in November. The Tomcats will be looking to make another deep run into the playoffs this year, potentially bringing more games back home to Putnam Stadium. While the stadium may look different this year, and the crowds a little smaller, one thing remains the same- the Tomcats have come to play!

After graduating from Blazer in 2005 he earned his Bachelor's Degree in Psychology from Asbury College, then his Master's and Doctorate in Clinical Psychology from Marshall University in 2014. Dr. Bias completed his training at the Federal Medical Center in Lexington, KY and currently works as a clinical psychologist at the VA Hospital in Huntington, WV. Dr. Bias is proud to have a career that allows him to serve veterans who struggle with addiction and Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder. "It'sincredibly rewarding to help America's heroes who have endured more than most can imagine. I think growing up in Appalachia and attending Ashland public schools helped me develop a sense of pride for this area and I am grateful to have an opportunity to give back." Dr. Bias encourages current students not to take this small community for granted. "Continue to seek experiences outside Appalachia, but remember not everyone has the opportunity to grow up in an environment that can be as enriching and supportive as Ashland has been for me."



Online Registration and Parent Portals


