

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Kindergarten Registration is here again.

This is a reminder that all children registering for kindergarten need to have current and up-to-date health records. Please call Ashland Head Start if you have questions about whether or not your child has all the documents needed to enroll for Kindergarten.

Kindergarten Health Requirements

- Current immunizations (on a KY immunization certificate)
- Physical (dated within 6 months of school start date)
 Dental Exam (dated within 12 months of school start date)
- Vision Exam (by ophthalmologist or optometrist)
- Birth Certificate

Mrs. Cox's class has been celebrating Dr. Seuss this month in honor of his birthday on March 2nd. We have cooked and taste tested green eggs and ham, experimented with Oobleck, designed and graphed crazy socks, measured with turtles and truffela trees, and of course, practiced our rhyming. We are looking forward now to starting our study on animals. The children have been excited to discuss what pets they have at home and what animals they have seen at the zoo or in books.

Mrs. Alger's class has been having a wonderful time learning about buildings for the past several weeks! We have learned about buildings in our community and around the world. We will also learn who builds buildings and what tools they use. We are hopeful that we might take a special trip to see up close some machines that are used for building!



Mrs. McDowell's class has been studying the author Dr. Seuss during the month of March. The students have learned that he made over 40 children's books. He is not a real doctor but wanted to feel

important so he placed the doctor in front of his name. They voted for their favorite book which was <u>Green Eggs and Ham</u>. This might have been due to enjoying green eggs and ham. During our study we made oobleck after reading the book <u>Bartholomew and the Oobleck</u>. The children learned about the study of liquids and solids.



Dramatic Play in Mrs. Dee's Class...

Dramatic play is important to early childhood learning. Children playing in this vital area are learning social skills, how to communicate, practicing fine and gross motor skills, increasing attention span, and developing cognitive skills. When children work together to set a table, plan a shopping trip to the grocery

store, or pretend to take a baby to the doctor, they are learning skills in every learning area important to school and life.

Mrs. Whitehead's Class—We made several rainbow crafts in the art area and read stories about leprechauns. Legend says that leprechauns spend all their time making shoes. They store their coins in a hidden pot of gold at the end of the rainbow. If a leprechaun is caught by a human, they have special powers to grant that human three wishes. Once those wishes are granted, the human has to let the leprechaun go. I asked the children, "What wish would you have the leprechaun grant for you and why?" They danced a leprechaun jig for luck. During the children's outside time, a leprechaun entered the room leaving a big mess of stacked chairs, green footprints, and a gold glitter trail. He had taken their coins and exchanged them for gold covered treats. The children were elated! They had a Fun St. Patrick's Day!

The Middle School students were very involved with our students and participated in playing games and helping with the activity. This was a great way for us to kick off the Spring season. 

Paul Blazer JROTC Team to Compete in National Academic Bowl Championship in Washington, DC

Ashland, KY –March 3, 2016 -- After advancing through two phases of



online competition, the Paul Blazer JROTC Academic Team composed of Keeston Clark, Bryan Lucas, Abby Caines, Mallory Martin, Heaven Wallace, and Trey Caines will compete in person at the Championship event in Washington, DC. The 2016 Army JROTC Academic Bowl Championship will be held on the campus of The Catholic University of America, June 24-28, 2016. This event is sponsored by the Army JROTC and is conducted by College Options Foundation.

Paul Blazer High School JROTC team earned top scores out of the 1,498 Army JROTC teams that competed from around the world. Ashland Independent Schools Registration Set

Registration for Head Start, Preschool, and Primary School (formerly kindergarten and first grade students) will be held in the Ashland Independent School District during the week of March 28-April 1, 2016. Registration hours are 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. daily, Monday through Friday. Evening hours are available on Tuesday, March 29, 2016, from 3 p.m. to 6 p.m.

All students will register at the school in their attendance area for both kindergarten and first grade. Students wishing to attend schools not in their attendance area should request a transfer form from the school of their attendance area when registering.

Students registering for the 3 & 4 year old Head Start/Preschool program should apply at the Head Start office at 1820 Hickman Street, Head Start entrance. Age, residency, and income guidelines apply. For more information, call (606) 327-2715.

Students who plan to transfer from outside the Ashland Independent School District (K-12) should register this spring at the school the child is requesting to attend.

According to Kentucky State Law, a child must be three or four years of age by August 1, 2016 to enter preschool. Students must be five years of age by October 1, 2016, to enter kindergarten. Students must be six years of age by October 1, 2016, and have successfully completed a recognized kindergarten program in order to enter the first grade.

An official copy of the child's birth certificate from the registrar's office in the state the child was born is required for registration. Hospital certificates and billfold size cards are not acceptable. Parents will be provided information regarding physical examination, vision examination, immunization records, and kindergarten screening by the principal or secretary of each school.

Spring Testing

State mandated testing is just around the corner for students in Kentucky's public schools. K-PREP assessments for students in grades 3 through 8 and for high school sophomores and juniors must be administered in the last 14 instructional days of the district calendar. As of now, tests are scheduled to begin Monday May 9, 2016 and conclude Friday May 13, with make-up tests to be administered in the days following.

Each school will set the schedule of testing, following closely to state requirements.

All students enrolled in the high school courses of Algebra II, Biology, English 10 and US History must also complete end-of-course exams. Currently, these assessments are schedule to begin Wednesday May 11, 2016. Remember that the results of these specific tests account for 10% of the students' overall score in these classes.

Additionally, students enrolled in Advanced Placement courses at the high school have the opportunity to take AP tests, which, depending on their scores, may provide college credit.
