PEP TALK

One of the major reasons Ashland schools was awarded a PEP (Carol M. White Physical Education Program) Grant was the percentage of the elementary students who are overweight or obese. Based on the most recent BMI's (Body Mass Index) for every Ashland elementary student calculated by the school nurse in September, 40% of the students are overweight or obese. This is an alarming statistic because the eating habits your children pick up when they are young will affect their lifestyle when they are adults.

The grant has provided for more physical activity each day along with teaching students about the role of nutrients in the development of healthy bodies. Another facet of the grant is providing parents with information about healthy eating habits for their students. One source available to all Ashland families is the Appalachian Partnership for Positive Living and Eating (A.P.P.L.E.) provided through the Ashland-Boyd County Health Department. They provide free of charge nutrition counseling, personal training, family counseling, and gym membership. To qualify, at least one child per family in K-6th grade must have a BMI at the 85th percentile or greater. 40% of all Ashland elementary students would qualify for the APPLE program. 2nd NINE WEEK'S P.E. ACTIVITIES

This nine weeks elementary PE students have been busy with physical fitness testing and using pedometers. Additionally, K-2 activities have included bounce & catch, dribbling, volleying, striking, straddleball, beanbag exploration; twist & turn, hoop exploration, and ribbon wand exploration. 3rd -6th grades have been passing & receiving drills, pitching drills, flag pulling drills, zone football, ball-handling drills, pivoting drills, grid passing, shooting drills, and basketball skills. Walking, jogging, running, and dancing have also been incorporated.

Hager STLP members have also been developing their project: Study Buddies. Every Thursday after school STLP members work with primary students on their homework and classroom skills. STLP 5th and 6th grade members presented their project on December 9 at Morehead State University.

Hager's STLP received a spectacular score of 98/100! Students will continue to improve their project and attend the state competition in Lexington later this year.

Students at Hager Elementary were given opportunities to participate in the Frozen Fest Art/Music Festival on December 16. Hager families were invited to attend an evening full of activities including opportunities to create art. Artwork created during art class and outside of the school day was on display and many students entertained us with acts involving dance, drama, and music.

Students prepared self-evaluations in their homeroom's and shared the information with their parents in student-led conferences. 
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Lego League
