Dear McCallie Middle School Families,

Welcome to those of you who are new to McCallie and hello to returning families! At McCallie, we strive to encourage young people to find joy in books and reading. Part of the way that we encourage McCallie students to read is our Summer Reading program, and I hope that you enjoy this year's selections.

This summer, every Middle School student will choose a book from a list of 5 options. During a Homebase meeting in the fall, students will share a creative response to the book they chose. The response can be a number of things, including but not limited to a piece of visual art, a poem or short story, or a video book trailer. You can find more ideas and examples on the Summer Reading Guide linked below.

In addition to the choice book, each grade will have an assigned book. 6th graders will read *The War that Saved My Life* by Kimberly Brubaker Bradley. 7th graders will read *The Outsiders* by S.E. Hinton. 8th graders will read *Just Mercy [Adapted for Young Adults]: A True Story of the Fight for Justice* by Bryan Stevenson. Students will discuss the books in their grade-level curriculum.

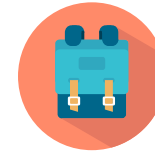

What summer reading materials do I need to bring with me when school starts?

Bring your grade level book with you on the first day for your English class. When we have our summer reading Homebase meeting, you should bring your choice book and your creative response to share. The date will be announced at the beginning of the school year.



What do I need to do for the creative response?

Think of your creative response as a conversation starter. What can you write, draw, or create to show your classmates something about the book you chose from the list of five? You could write a poem, make a poster, create a video or podcast – there are many options! You will share what you create with your Homebase and excellent responses will go on display in the Library.

How many books do I have to read?

Two. You will choose one book from the list of 5 and you will read your grade-level book. You will also prepare a creative response to your choice book to share in a small group setting.

Can I listen to the audio-book version of one or more of my books?

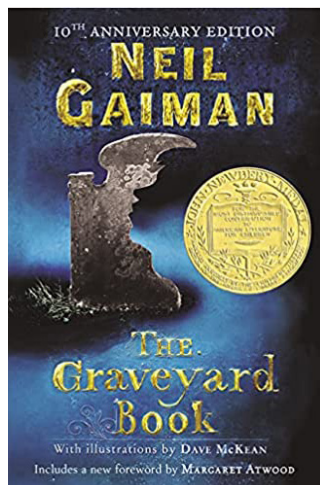
Yes, but make sure to have a physical copy of the grade-level book for class discussions and assignments.

The Graveyard Book

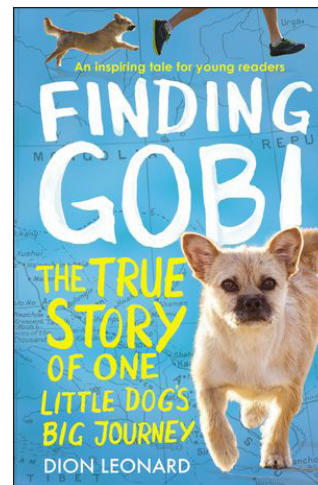

There are dangers and adventures for Bod in the graveyard: the strange and terrible menace of the Sleer; a gravestone entrance to a desert that leads to the city of ghouls; friendship with a witch, and so much more.

But it is in the land of the living that real danger lurks, for it is there that the man Jack lives and he has already killed Bod's family.



Finding Gobi: The True Story of One Little Dog's Big Journey (Young Reader's Edition)

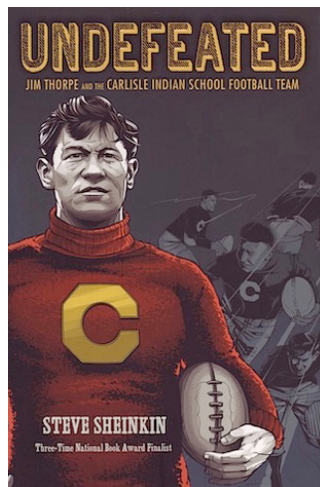

Finding Gobi: The True Story of One Little Dog's Big Journey is the incredible true story of Dion Leonard, an athlete who was befriended by a stray dog while running an ultramarathon through the Gobi Desert. Named for the desert in which he found her, Gobi became Dion's closest companion for 77 miles of the 155-mile race across China. The scrappy little pup ran mile after mile alongside Dion, through treacherous conditions and across raging rivers. He let her sleep in his tent and share his food, and eventually, his focus shifted from winning to the newfound friendship he and Gobi shared.

NOTE: There is an adult version of this book that you are welcome to read. It has more detail and a higher reading level, but is the same story.

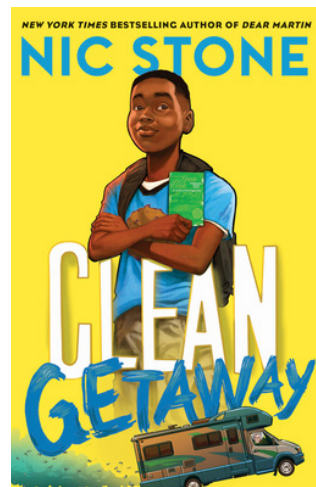

How to Go on an Unplanned Road Trip with Your Grandma:

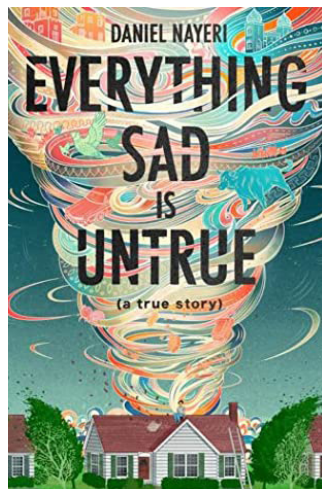
- Grab a Suitcase: Prepacked from the big spring break trip that got CANCELLED.

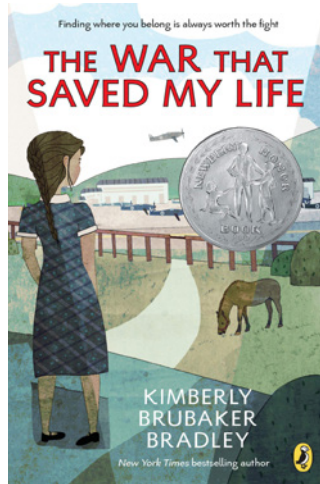

The War that Saved My Life

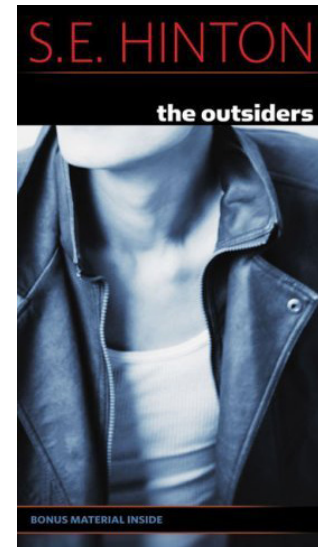

The Outsiders

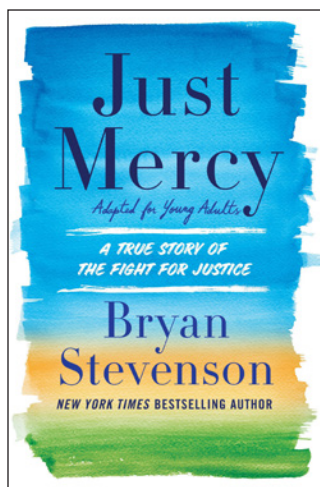
