Dear Fellow Cahillites,



When I was first notified of the incredibly generous \$1 million EITC donation to Roman by Matt Gardner '83, I was overwhelmed with a number of different emotions: elation, gratitude, and pride among them. But when I learned that Matt made the donation in honor of his deceased brother, Chris '77, it struck a familiar sentimental chord with me and the memories of one particular night at Roman came flooding back.

It was several years ago, and Roman was hosting a reception for benefactors and scholarship providers. Many of the students who were recipients of these scholarships were present as well, and most of them were students who had financial need. My family funds a scholarship at Roman for students in honor of our brother, Jack '72, who tragically died shortly after graduation. During the reception, a woman approached me with one of the students. I could tell that the kid was a little shy and he felt awkward, but he still reached out and shook my hand. "This is my grandson," she said. "And I am raising him on my own. I cannot thank you enough for your generosity. Without your help, I don't know what we would do. This is a wonderful place, and I am just so happy that he can be here." It is moments like that when you realize the lasting impact that you can have on a young man's life. Not only that, but donating to Roman's scholarship funds in the name of a deceased loved one is a wonderful way to ensure that their spirit, and the ideals that they stood for, can live on in the students of Roman Catholic High School. For me, it's a symbolic way to turn tragedy into triumph.

I wrote to Matt Gardner upon hearing the news of his remarkable donation and shared my feelings about giving to Roman in honor of my brother, Jack, and how wonderful it was that he was doing the same for his brother, Chris. Matt responded, "It's one of the great joys of my life to be able to honor Chris while helping get access to a high-quality education. He was a passionate, devoted teacher so there's real symmetry in it for me."

If you're thinking of donating to Roman to help our students in need, consider doing it in honor of a loved one. As Matt and I can attest, it'll bring a "smile on the lip, and a tear in the eye."

Recounting Renaissance Hall

Renaissance Hall came into existence in the early days of educational technology. The focal point of the new construction was the Information Center; containing a traditional library, with shelves of books; a research technology center and the digital television studio. This advancement of technology expanded into the classrooms and set Roman Catholic as a model of 20th Century education throughout the Archdiocese.

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The original library existed on the 1st floor of the main building. To relocate the collection of books to their new home, a human chain of students was formed to pass one book at a time, which extended from the 1890 building into the new Renaissance Hall. The construction of Renaissance Hall blocked off the 1890 building and the 1954 building, creating an interior space to be known as the Alumni Quadrangle. This new construction also created an addition to the cafeteria and new bathrooms for the school. In the current cafeteria, condiment tables were created by the support beam column of the 1954 building and the support beam column of Renaissance Hall. Placing cinder block between them and adding the top created these useful spaces.

After many years of planning and numerous months of construction, the entire student body, faculty and many alumni gathered in the parking lot on September 28, 1998 to welcome Cardinal Bevilaqua for the dedication of Renaissance Hall. In normal Cahillite style, the students, faculty, and guests were treated to a cookout following the ceremony. It was a beautiful day which not only brought recognition and gratitude for the accomplishment of this new life breathed into Catholic High, but it acknowledged the foundation which was set to bring Roman Catholic High School to the success and excellence which it enjoys in 2022.

As I reflect on the events and people who were so instrumental in the first expansion of Catholic

High 25 years ago, and the blessing and dedication of Renaissance Hall, I am filled with deep gratitude to the Connelly Foundation, to Dan DiLella and Tom Leonard, Chairman and President of the Roman Board of Advisors respectively at that time, Ed Graham, the Development Director and countless donors who supported our dream.

After completing the Middle States Accreditation and the formation of the Board of Advisors for the school, we assessed our academic, spiritual, and athletic facilities needs and started to develop a strategic plan to address the future of Catholic High. We met with the Connelly Foundation and the members of their Board of Trustees many times over a period of two years and were invited to submit an application for a grant. The construction of Renaissance Hall was a \$4.9 million project. In response to our grant proposal, the Connelly Foundation gave Catholic High a million dollar grant to restore and renovate the original school and offered us a conditional grant for \$2 million, if we could raise nine \$100,000 gifts from major donors and \$2 million from a capital campaign from our alumni.

With that challenge, Dan DiLella, Tom Leonard, Ed Graham and I began a very successful capital campaign. In less than a year, we raised \$900,000 from nine special donors and we raised \$2 million from our dedicated alumni. I remember so vividly the energy, the excitement and the pride that we all experienced as we met that challenge. It was the beginning of the revival of Catholic High.

I am and will always be so appreciative to the Connelly Foundation and to Dan DiLella, Tom Leonard, Ed Graham and our dedicated alumni for giving new life to Catholic High.

for the Arts have enhanced the campus. We, the Roman Community, have so much to be thankful for and can optimistically look to the future as Roman continues to meet the needs of the next generation of Cahillites.

Mr. Thomas McKeever Faculty Member 1968–2020 I was lucky enough to arrive at Roman as its Renaissance was in full swing. The culminating event of this time period was certainly Renaissance Hall. The support of this endeavor from the alumni, faculty, and students was very impressive



to witness. I will never forget the dedication of the addition in the fall of 1998. Gathered in the school yard that day were the entire school community,

political and religious dignitaries, and so many great alums. It truly was a day to remember.

Since that day, Renaissance Hall has grown and changed with the times. The main room has transformed from a library to an information center to a learning commons. Renaissance Hall continues to live up to its name and is continuously reborn to suit the needs of the students at Roman.

Renaissance Hall has certainly planted the seeds from which an amazing school campus has emerged. From the groundbreaking twenty-five years ago there has sprung River Field, McSherry Hall, The Howard Center for the Arts, and hopefully a soon-to-be field house and science center.

I think that Renaissance Hall had a lot to do with my decision to attend Roman. Growing up in Bensalem, I was familiar with more local options for Catholic high school and I remember attending a visitation day at a different school. While I could say nice things about each of those schools, it was hard to call their 2001 look "modern."

Then I had a shadow day at Roman and remember walking into Renaissance



Hall and feeling that everything looked so modern. The classrooms, lighting, and everything else seemed so new, and I remember thinking it was

impressive that in one stride you could go from being in a building built in the 1990s to a building built in the 1890s.

I don't think I realized at the time how important the setting of a school can be. Whereas the other schools I mentioned seemed like little more than schools at the time, Roman felt like you were attending something different with its urban surroundings and architecture. Needless to say, here I am 20 plus years later still feeling like Renaissance Hall stands out amongst the looks of other local schools.

Meet the new Principal of RCHS:

John Curry, originally from the Olney section of Philadelphia and a member of St. Helena Parish, graduated from Cardinal Dougherty High School in 1985. He currently resides in Plymouth Meeting with his wife and three children. His educational background includes: Bachelor's Degree in English – Secondary Education from Gwynedd Mercy University, Master's in Humanities from Arcadia University, and Master's in Educational Leadership from St. Joseph's University.



College/University: Gwynedd Mercy University, Arcadia University, St. Joseph's University

What inspired you to work in education and become a teacher/educator?

As a manager, I enjoyed the training aspect of my job. This inspired me to go back to college and major in education. I always enjoyed my literature classes in school because the stories covered all aspects of the human condition. So when deciding upon a content area, I knew that literature would be the subject that I would enjoy teaching the most.

What is your history as teacher/educator?

I was an academic tutor at Gwynedd Mercy University for two years, and then I taught literature at Mount Saint Joseph Academy (The Mount) from 2007 until fall of 2021.

What was your pathway to Roman and what inspired you to apply for the principal position at Roman?

My pathway to Roman came directly through Assistant Principal Chris Buck. We were both Maguire Fellows at St. Joseph's University, along with Assistant Principal Brian Conroy. Chris informed me about the opening for principal at Roman. He believed I was a good candidate and encouraged me to apply. I already knew about Roman's reputation through my son, who attended in 2010, and my in-laws who are Roman alums. After a lot of consideration, I decided to apply and, fortunately, was given this great honor and opportunity.

In your short time at RCHS, what have you enjoyed most about Roman?

So far, what I enjoy most about Roman are the students. They are an intelligent and lively group of young men who make every day exciting and meaningful.

What do you feel are Roman's biggest challenges going forward?

Going forward, I believe that Roman's biggest challenge is to regain a sense of normalcy coming out of two years of COVID restrictions. Most of our students have not had a traditional high school experience, so providing them with that opportunity is my top priority.

What do you feel makes Roman unique in today's world?

In today's world, what makes Roman unique is the bond of brotherhood shared by students and alums. In a world in which many relationships are transient and transactional, the connection that is felt between Roman men is something sorely missing.

Why do you believe it is important for others to give back to Roman?

I believe that giving back to Roman is important because it shows a commitment to the school's mission, supports our current and future students, and keeps alums connected to RCHS.

What is your vision for the future of Roman?

My vision for Roman is comprised of a few points. First and foremost, I want Roman to be a place where faculty and students live the Gospel values both in and outside the classroom. I truly believe that developing our students into critical thinkers and problem solvers will allow them to be agents of positive change in the world. Also, we should cultivate a "not enough" mindset in advancing the mission of the school. Finally, I want to focus on taking advantage of our Center City location to provide immersion opportunities for our students through internships and by using the city as an extension of the classroom.

What do you feel makes the Roman community unified?

I believe that tradition is an important, unifying factor at Roman. Having been at the corner of Broad & Vine for over 130 years, Roman is an integral part of Philadelphia history. As such, the school traditions that have developed over that time are unique and long-standing. This is the thread that connects and unifies the school community, and it is what makes new students want to be part of the Roman experience. ray to the <u>Annual Control, C. Roman receives \$1 Million EITC Commitment from Alumni, Matt Gardner '83

In December 2021, Roman Catholic High School received a \$1 million EITC (Education Improvement Tax Credit) commitment from alum Matt Gardner, Class of 1983 and Founder/CEO of Patriot Growth Insurance Services, LLC. This was the largest EITC donation in school history. We are pleased to highlight Mr. Gardner's strong love for Roman, what inspired him to make such a generous contribution, and as the newest member of the Board of Directors what he envisions for the future.

Matt Gardner grew up in the East Falls section of Philadelphia and was the fourth boy out of five in his family to attend RCHS. In fact, at least one of the Gardner brothers was at Broad & Vine in every calendar year from 1972 to 1988! Matt was a good student in grade school, and because his family didn't have financial means his parents encouraged him to take the scholarship exams for several other prep schools in the area. Matt refused, knowing that his heart was 100% set on going to Roman. "As a kid, I loved hanging around Cahill Field watching my older brothers' football practices and games, and John Boyce Field in Roxborough for their baseball games; Purple and Gold was in my veins at a young age!"

Upon entering RCHS, Matt got very involved. He played football and was on student council all four years, including being elected Student Council President his senior year. Ever attentive to his studies, Matt was also a member and officer in the National Honor Society. After graduation, Matt earned his BS from Drexel University and a MBA from University of Pennsylvania Wharton School of Business.

What do you remember most about your time at Roman?

Back in the 80s Roman didn't offer Honors Programs and Advanced Placement classes as it does today, but the academic environment was still plenty challenging and prepared us well for college. What Roman really offered to me was a "real-world" education – learning how to commute into the city, building lifelong relationships with a racially and socio-economically diverse student population, developing the confidence to take chances and challenge myself in areas I hadn't experienced previously. I say it often – my friends and teammates from high school are still my best friends, almost 40 years after graduation.

If I had to name one thing that I remember most from Roman it would be the closeness that we developed on the RCHS football team. We really only had one memorable season from a win/loss standpoint (our junior year when we went to the playoffs), but we worked really hard and developed a bond that has turned out to be lifelong. I'd give anything to relive some of those bus rides back to Cahill Field after a victory - no better feeling in the world!

What do you feel makes Roman unique in today's world?

The transformation at Roman over the last 30 years has been remarkable. The school today still offers all the things I mentioned from my time, but now also has much deeper academic offerings (including AP, Honors, College partnerships, etc.) for a wider range of students, and many more athletic, club and philanthropic opportunities. Its Center City campus blends the old and new masterfully, and it doesn't take a backseat to any of the other area high schools in terms of academics, technology, athletics, or the quality of its faculty and administration. RCHS also delivers all of that in a faith-based, caring community that prepares young men to be successful citizens of the world while lifting others around them. Parents can confidently send their children to Roman knowing they will get an exceptional education and will depart four years later as exceptional men.

Why do you give back to Roman and what motivated you make this major gift?

I believe deeply in the role that Roman plays in educating young men in the Philadelphia region, and specifically in its mission of providing a faith-based college preparatory education to young men from inner-city settings that don't have financial means (as was my own situation). My four years at Roman had a huge impact on the person I am, and my experiences at Broad & Vine set me up for success in life. The PA EITC program enabled me to make a gift that will allow quite a few deserving students to experience a Roman education; absent that, these students would likely be consigned to a failing public school system, an experience that would hinder their ability to achieve their full potential. That's what ultimately motivated me – being able to put young men into an environment where they can achieve their full potential.

Please comment on the significance of making the gift in honor of your brother Chris '77.

My brother Chris graduated from Roman in 1977 and was very involved there – baseball, football, Student Council, etc. Fulfilling his dream, Chris eventually became a high school English

teacher and coach in New

Jersey. Yet, he tragically died in an automobile accident

In addition to Skillings (12 rebounds), junior guard Xzayvier Brown scored 16 points and pulled down 10 boards, while Farmer added 12 points and Jackson provided a spark off the bench with 11 points and nine rebounds.

Carton Ball Memories

For many Roman alumni of the 1970s and 1980s, carton ball games in the courtyard were as intense as any games at the Palestra.

BBBBZZZZZZZZ!!! Mr. Hupka's English class is finally over for today. Beowulf can roust more dragons tomorrow; I need to rustle-up some lunch. It's Wednesday, so my favorite item is on the cafeteria menu. I order the "veal parm" with sauce, french fries, and a Coke. Dessert will be chocolate chip cookies, dunked into a thick, vanilla milkshake.

I take a seat at the table with Cahillite classmates John DePaul, Joe Dillon, Dave Cherry, and Jim "Fonzi" Conville. A group of upperclassmen sits at the far end of the table. They allow us to sit at the same table with them, since John DePaul's older brother Frank sits among the group of juniors and seniors.

Father Hanlon says a prompt prayer from the podium pulpit, and we proceed with our gustatory gluttony – confession with Father Poniziak for this sin. Our conversations revolve around Mr. McKeever's trigonometry test, the Andorra Spring's Friday night dance, Father Murphy's percussion punisher, and Hallahan High hopefuls.

After lunch is finished, we place our debris in the receptacles provided and head out into the courtyard. Being a "wise fool" now, I avoid the weeklong cafeteria clean-up chores. The dreaded dab duty of the damp sponge smells fouler than the formaldehyde frogs in Father Paul's biology class.

As we step outside into the city air, diesel fumes from the Septa buses and tractor-trailer traffic tinge our nostrils. The Vine Street Expressway is still a blueprint on a drafting table. To our right, a game is in progress.

Tied up, ties off. Sweat on, sweaters off. The score is 18-18. It's Robert Dobson and William Chestnut, versus Dominic Piperno



and John O'Donnell. This is a six foot and under game...way under! Dallas, Alex, and Abron don't play in this league. Basket to basket is only about twenty feet. The "rim" is only about six feet high; the height of the fire escapes in the courtyard. Lunchtime fans watch on the perimeter; distracted students sneak glances from Mr. McMenemin's accounting class. To the courtyard carton ball contestants, this may as well be the iconic, cramped court upstairs. Naismith's ball, now a crunched up iced tea carton, within another iced tea carton, within another iced tea carton, is passed from teammate to teammate. An ersatz (Roman) Russian doll (a Matryoshka mock-up), made from necessity, substituting for a basketball. No dribbling in this game.

Dobson passes to Chestnut for an easy lay-up to go up 19-18, Piperno dishes to O'Donnell to tie the score at 19-19. Dobson picks up the carton and throws it down court to Chestnut for a dunk over Piperno to go ahead 20-19. First team to reach 21 wins this contest. O'Donnell feeds it to Piperno who then dishes it back to O'Donnell. O'Donnell takes a jump shot over Dobson for an easy basket; score tied at twenty apiece. Dobson gives the ball to Chestnut for a long jump shot and...BBBBBZZZZZZZZ!!! Lunch over; game over, off to Mr. Gibson's Business Law class. Another set of carton ball kings will compete during the next lunch period.
