Welcome to the 2019-2020 School Year

Fifteen Schools Set to Welcome 10,750 Students

On Tuesday, September 3rd we will open our doors for the 2019-2020 school year and welcome an estimated 10,750 students. Last year our beginning enrollment was 10,576, which increased throughout the year to a final headcount in June of 10,606 students.

The Mead School District has a longstanding tradition of providing the highest quality learning experience for each and every student. This year will be no exception. A few highlights for the coming school year include:

Shiloh Hills Elementary Remodel

This renovation project, approved by voters as part of the 2015 Facilities Improvement Bond, is now 100% complete and ready for the start of school. We invite you to visit the newly

remodeled facility on Tuesday, August 27th. In conjunction with Shiloh's annual Ice Cream Social there will be an Open House from 6-8 pm with a formal Dedication Ceremony at 7 pm in the school's new multi-purpose room.

6th Grade Center

To address increasing enrollment and provide space to lower class size in grades K-3, 6th graders from Brentwood, Evergreen, Farwell and Midway will join Prairie View 6th graders at the old Northwood building. This 6th Grade Center will operate for one year only (2019-2020). Next fall (September 2020), when both Highland Middle School and Creekside Elementary open, the district's grade school configuration will be K-5 three middle OUT (Northwood, Mountainside & Highland) will house 6-8 grade students. Barb Pybus, the 6th Grade Center principal, will transition to Highland next fall.

2018 Bond Flagship Projects

Construction is well underway on the five flagship projects approved by voters as part of the February 2018 Facilities Improvement Bond. These include the four Market Street Projects (new transportation and new maintenance facilities, new athletic/performing arts stadium and Creekside Elementary) plus Highland Middle School located on Five Mile Prairie. Again, welcome to the 2019-2020 school year. We thank the Mead community for its ongoing support.


Behind the Scenes

Working Together to Equip Students, Inspire Problem Solvers & Create Leaders

Behind the scenes in the Mead School District you will find a number of folks whose work is essential to helping make our school district a great place for kids to learn and grow. One of those individuals is Nutrition Services Director Kim Elkins who, along with Assistant Director Mark Oswalt, oversees all aspects of a department that serves over 267,000 breakfasts and 764,500 lunches each year. We asked Kim a few questions about her life and work.

What is your family background?

I grew up in a small town in Wisconsin and went to college in Dallas, Texas. I moved to Washington to see the West and have lived in the Mead School District for over 25 years.



Following 20 years with Providence Sacred Heart, where I served in a variety of management positions, I was hired as the Nutrition Director for the Nine Mile Falls School District. I joined Mead in 2012. I am a certified Dietary Manager, certified Food Protection Professional and a credentialed School Nutrition Specialist.

What are a few of the biggest changes Nutrition Services has undergone in your seven-year tenure?

Federal meal regulations underwent huge changes my first year at Mead and continue to evolve resulting in updated menus that reflect increased whole grains, lower sodium and more fruits and vegetables. Each year we incorporate student taste tests for new menu items and our Farm to School program allows us to support and partner with local farmers while introducing students to new food items like rainbow carrots with tops.

What do you like about your job and what is most challenging?

The opportunity to work with a great team dedicated to Mead students and the community. All of our nutrition staff are certified nutrition professionals. I enjoy the challenge of essentially running a "restaurant" in 15 different locations where we serve 6,500 customers every day.

What about your "behind the scenes" job might surprise people?

Nutrition Services is a self-sustaining program and receives no monies from the district's state basic education allocation. Therefore, we are very careful and examine every penny we spend to make sure it benefits Mead students.




Celebrating our Kitchen Staff

2015 & 2018 Bond Projects Update

Shiloh Hills Renovation (2015 Bond) - This modernization and addition project is complete! The Shiloh Hills remodel included a total renovation of the original building plus the addition of a multi-purpose room and five new classrooms (14,000 new square feet).

Market Street Projects (2018 Bond) - If the intersection of Market & Farwell in Mead is not part of your regular driving routine we encourage you to take a detour and check out the progress being made on the new Transportation Facility (just north of Zips on the east side of Market), new Maintenance Facility (SE corner of Market & Farwell), new performing arts/athletic stadium (SW corner of Market & Farwell) and Creekside Elementary. Transportation and maintenance will move into their new locations before the first of the year and the new stadium and Creekside will be ready for occupancy next fall (September 2020).

Highland Middle School (2018 Bond) - The walls of the gym box are complete, work has started on the classroom wings, sports fields are well underway and footings have been poured for the kitchen/commons area. Highland will open in the fall of 2020.

Elementary Playground Safety Mats (2018 Bond) - This summer pea gravel has been removed and safety mats have been installed at Colbert, Farwell, Meadow Ridge & Prairie View. Safety mats were part of the Midway and Shiloh Hills renovations. Installation of playground safety mats at Brentwood and Evergreen will take place next summer.

ADD MAINTAIN

Safety, Security & Student Wellness Supplemental Enrichment Levy

On November 5th Mead patrons will be asked to consider a Supplemental Enrichment Levy focused on safety, security and student wellness. If approved, this two-year (2020 & 2021) levy will increase the levy tax rate by \$1/\$1,000 of assessed value and cost the average homeowner \$20/month (\$240,000 assessed value).

Four key areas where portions of the supplemental levy funds will be spent are ADDING safety & security personnel as recommended by the Safety Task Force, MAINTAINING nurses to care for medically fragile students, BRINGING BACK building supervision para-educators lost in recent budget cuts and EXPANDING learning opportunities for non-traditional students.
