## Shawn Woodward - New Mead Superintendent

### Vision Focused Team Centered Leadership

The Mead School District Board of Directors is pleased to announce Shawn Woodward as their unanimous selection to be the district's new superintendent replacing Tom Rockefeller, who is retiring at the end of the current school year. Mr. Woodward's official start date is July 1, 2019.

In accepting the position Mr. Woodward expressed his sincere thanks for the opportunity and excitement to serve as Mead's next superintendent. An extremely personable individual, Shawn is "super excited" and looks forward to beginning the process of building relationships with the entire community . . . students, staff, parents, business leaders, alumni, etc.

First on his agenda will be visiting with a broad, representative crosssection of the community to assess the current reality of the school district. What is going well? What do we need to pay attention to? Hearing about the hopes and dreams of Mead stakeholders will help shape a shared, unified vision of where we as a district want to be five, ten and fifteen years down the road.

Shawn comes to Mead from the Lake Pend Oreille School District in Sandpoint, Idaho, where he has been superintendent for the past seven years. He holds a Bachelor of Arts degree from Washington State University and a Master of Education degree from City University. He earned his principal certification from Seattle Pacific University and his superintendent certification from Western Washington University.

Prior to becoming Lake Pend Oreille superintendent Mr. Woodward was assistant superintendent of the North Kitsap School District (Poulsbo, WA). He began his career in Port Orchard, where he taught for seven years. In 1999 he became a principal in the Burlington-Edison School District, serving at two different K-8 schools over nine years.

Shawn and his wife Michelle have three grown children. Their daughters Mikhaela (linguistics major) and Rainey (elementary education) attend Western Washington University. Their son Sloan graduates from high school this month and will attend Cal Poly in San Luis Obispo in the fall, where he plans to study architecture. In their spare time the Woodward family loves to be outdoors, enjoying the Pacific Northwest.



### **Budget & Boundary**

### A Message from Mead School District Board of Directors

It has been a very busy spring for the Mead School District. We celebrated the hiring of Shawn Woodward as our new superintendent, addressed a \$12 million budget shortfall for the upcoming 2019-2020 school year and started the boundary adjustment process in preparation for opening two new schools in the fall of 2020.

### Budget

It was no small task to approve reductions of nearly \$12 million and at the same time impact the fewest students and programs possible. While all of the approved cuts were difficult, the decision to close both M.E.A.D. and Riverpoint Academy was particularly hard. To explore future innovative learning opportunities for all students the board will, in the fall, authorize a Task Force to study and recommend options for students who do not fit a traditional school setting. Implementation of recommendations will be dependent on funding.

### Boundary

While our original plan was to have new attendance boundaries approved this month, a full year before the opening of Creekside and Highland, recently learning the district has qualified for "state match" funds of more than \$20 million has caused us to pause the boundary change process. This money is available because of a recent revision to the state's "unhoused students" funding formula. These funds, coupled with savings from other capital projects, are essentially enough money to build a 10th elementary school. Utilizing an aggressive design and construction timeline this new school could be ready for occupancy in the fall of 2021.

Prior to making the decision to move forward and build a 10<sup>th</sup> elementary school, which determines the approval of a nine or ten elementary school boundary change, the board must first:

- Confirm budget numbers to determine if the district can, from a staffing standpoint, finance the opening of another new school.
   The cost of non-teaching staff for new schools is approximately \$500,000 and must be funded out of existing district monies.
- Verify fall enrollment numbers (October 1, 2019) to assure anticipated student growth is a reality.

Considering the very real possibility of building a 10<sup>th</sup> elementary school to open in the fall of 2021, the board is delaying the boundary discussion and decision until this coming fall, timeline as follows:

- Early November 2019 Present a nine or ten elementary school boundary proposal, which also includes adjustments to middle and high school boundaries, to the community for feedback.
- January 1, 2020 Finalize a decision on new elementary, middle and high school boundaries no later than January 1, 2020, eight months before the opening of school in September 2020.

We greatly appreciate your continued support as we work together to provide the best possible learning opportunities for Mead students.
