That's how "Lunch Buddies" was born – an idea that has taken root at Evergreen this year where retirees from several local retirement communities come for lunch. Each retiree is partnered with the same student every time they attend. In addition to reading time, the other benefit of the "Lunch Buddies" program is the special bond that forms between students and retirees.

Rockwood's 97-year old Lawrence Brown has a daughter who lives in California. During their weekly phone conversation, Lawrence often mentions how meaningful he finds the time spent with his buddy Marcus Mahoney. On a recent visit, Mr. Brown's daughter accompanied him to Evergreen so she

H&R Block Budget Challenge Scholarship Winner



Julia Preuss, a senior at Mt. Spokane High School, has been awarded a \$20,000 scholarship through the H&R Block Budget Challenge - a teen financial literacy program that rewards high school students for mastering real-world budgeting and personal finance decision-making. Julia is one of only 66 scholarship winners nationwide!

All students enrolled in Independent Living at Mt. Spokane participate in this nine-week challenge, where they experience activities like paying bills, managing expenses, saving money, investing in retirement, paying taxes and

more, in the safety of a classroom. The program was created to help address the need for more financial education in high schools.

The H&R Block Budget Challenge is free to high school teachers. Participants play classroom against classroom and student against student, competing for \$3 million in grants, scholarships and cash prizes.

NEW! Popsicle Stick Bridge Building Contest



Thanks to a \$3,300 grant from the Washington State Foundation for Structural Engineers, all engineering students at Mead and Mt. Spokane high schools - nearly 350 of them - designed popsicle stick bridges as part of their first semester course work. The students who produced the top 25 designs from each school were then invited to take part in a first for the Mead School District - a bridge building contest that took place on February 7th in the Mt. Spokane High School fieldhouse.

Bridge efficiency (amount of weight the bridge can hold, divided by the weight of the bridge) was the judging criteria. Congratulations to the following winners:

Voters Resoundingly Approve Bond & Levy

The February Bond & Levy election results were validated on February 24, 2015. Final YES votes were 69.67% for the Levy and 64.09% for the Bond! Now the work begins. The board has selected OAC to serve as the Construction Project Manager for the three flagship projects (Northwood, Midway and Shiloh Hills). The next 60 days will see the development of the Master Schedule of Projects plus the first public bond offering.
