Bond Refinancing Saves District Nearly \$2 Million

The Canton Local School District Board of Education has refinanced its 2014 School Improvement Bonds for the second time since their issuance, saving District taxpayers nearly

\$2 million.

The refinancing of the District's School Facilities Construction and Improvement Bonds Series 2014 Bonds was possible due to a favorable interest rate environment in the municipal bond market. The District also refinanced a portion of its Series 2014 Bonds in October 2016.

In aggregate, the two refinancings will save District taxpayers \$1,980,548 in gross debt service savings over the life of the combined issues.

Ross, Sinclaire & Associates, LLC served as the District's municipal advisor and Stifel, Nicolaus & Company, Inc. served as underwriter.

The \$9,054,972 Series 2017 Refunding Bonds will save District taxpayers approximately \$626,834 in gross debt service savings over the life of the issue, reducing the District's cost of funds from 4.23 percent to 3.29 percent, a reduction of 22 percent.

The previous \$8,399,600 Series 2016
Refunding Bonds saved District taxpayers
approximately \$1,353,714 in gross debt service
savings over the life of the issue, reducing the
District's cost of funds from 4.96 percent to
3.26 percent, a 34 percent reduction.

The Board of Education, Superintendent Milano, and Treasurer Schatzel want to take every opportunity to reduce taxes to the District's constituents. The two refinancings provided a great opportunity to save money for the community.

Staff will also be provided with professional development in the use of these new materials prior to and during the 2018-2019 school year. Children need to be at least four years of age by September 30, 2018 to apply. The program includes free breakfast, lunch, and transportation to and from preschool. Class sizes are limited. Staff Continues Learning During In-service Days

All certified staff continued their professional learning at the district's January 12 in-service day. Career Technical Education (CTE), math, English

language arts, science and social studies departments spent time on a variety of topics including looking at item analyses of Ohio's State Tests; developing and revising curriculum maps; improving student career readiness goals; continued learning about Safari Montage (a digital resource for all content areas); and best practices in literacy instruction.

The PE/Health department planned for health curriculum implementation that includes opioid awareness and prevention. Guidance counselors, CommQuest support, and school psychologists worked with Carole Vessely from the Stark County Crisis Intervention & Recovery Center to review and edit the district's plan for Suicide Awareness and Prevention. While each building is already doing great work in educating both staff and students on this important issue, the goal of this team is to further improve services by aligning the delivery of information about suicide awareness and prevention across the district. Overall, January 12 was a productive day that allowed time for staff to work on issues relevant to both their course work and community concerns.

Register For Kindergarten

Children who are 5 years of age or older by September 30 living in the Canton Local School District are invited to register for kindergarten at Walker Elementary School on Thursday, March 1, 2018 from 4:00-6:00 p.m. Children need not be present for registration. It will take approximately 20-30 minutes to complete the necessary paperwork. Appointments are not necessary.

To complete registration, parents must bring:

- 1. Child's birth certificate
- 2. Child's social security card
- 3. Immunization record
- 4. Proof of residency (utility bill, rental/purchase agreement, etc)
- 5. Custody papers (if applicable)

Counting Snow Days by the Hour

Instead of requiring schools to complete a minimum number of days per school year, the state now requires schools to fulfill a minimum number of hours



per school year. Schools may schedule "excess" hours above the minimum number. Hours missed above the minimum do not have to be made up.

According to information from the Ohio Department of Education, if a school closes enough that it will fall below the minimum number of hours, the school must extend its scheduled year. Like Canton Local, school districts plan their year longer than the minimum amount of time, so it builds in a cushion of hours in the event of a particularly harsh winter.

The Canton Local School District scheduled well over 1,000 school hours (see graph), and under the state rules, Ohio requires a minimum 910 hours for students in kindergarten through 6th grade and 1,000 hours for students in grades 7-12. The district would only have to make up hours missed beyond the state minimum.

Canton Local School Hours

The district has 178 student days on the 2017-2018 school calendar. The state requires a minimum of 910 hours K-6 and 1,000 hours 7-12.






Middle Schoolers Organize Successful Food Drive







Canton South Holds Mental Health Day

This has been a tragic year for Stark County teenagers. While many area teens have struggled with their own mental health concerns, in addition to those of their families, this year we have witnessed teens taking their own lives.

Two student groups, Canton South Social Justice group and the Aultman Ambassadors, along with two senior Sports Med students, took on the challenge of addressing mental health awareness with their peers. On Friday, December 15, 2017, these students organized a day dedicated to opening discussion and conversation about methods to address mental health.

There were two main components of the day. First, during the lunch periods, students were invited to browse the Mental Health Fair, which presented information connecting to essential oils, healthy snacks, yoga, and even therapy dogs. Kayla Haynam and Hunter Jepsen invited many organizations and people to contribute to educating students on strategies that could potentially improve an individual's mental health.

New Training Burn Building Completed


In 2017, the fire department was awarded a grant by FEMA under the Assistance to Firefighters Grant program to purchase a live fire tactical training building. The grant covered 95% of the cost up to \$290,993. The fire department was responsible for the remaining 5%.

The building was constructed in Phoenix, Arizona by Fire Training Buildings LLC and was shipped to the administration/training facility on 38th Street in December on five flatbed semitrailers. The structure was assembled on site over a four-day period.

The department is currently setting up various training and safety programs and will begin utilizing the facility once the winter weather breaks.

The training building is available to all area departments to train with their members. This building will allow firefighters to train with "live fire" while practicing fire extinguishment techniques as well as ventilation and confined space scenarios.
