Founded in 1914 as county boards of education with broad oversight of schools, 101 years later these county boards have evolved into ESCs which sell services to school districts who can buy services from other districts, private providers, or any other ESCs.

Since a picture can be worth a thousand words, charts have been added to the special education and instructional sections to display the depth and breadth of MCESC services provided in districts across 13 counties. The Montgomery County Educational Service Center provides high quality services through a cost effective delivery system. Why else would so many districts choose MCESC over other public and private providers? Quality services must be provided by strong, highly trained and dedicated professional staff and support staff. I want to thank all of the MCESC staff members who work so diligently to improve student lives and assist teachers in reaching higher levels in teaching and learning.



EXPERIENCED, DEDICATED EMPLOYEES NECESSARY FOR QUALITY EDUCATION

Experienced and dedicated employees are an important part of the Montgomery County Educational Service Center program.

The Montgomery County Governing Board of Education employed 417 people in 2015-2016, with 233 of them certificated in education. Certificated staff members averaged 15 years of experience in education. (Reported as of October 1, 2015.)

Of those certificated employees, 65 percent had a master's degree, and an additional 4 percent held a doctorate degree. The remainder (31%) held at least a bachelor's degree.

Staff members are encouraged to participate in additional training opportunities such as college course work, workshops, in-service programs, and seminars which apply to their particular area of expertise.

At various times throughout the year, the Montgomery County Educational Service Center Curriculum and Staff Development Office plan workshops dealing with current topics and issues in education. Local school district certificated personnel and teachers or administrators from other area school districts often attend these workshops.

Classified staff members have similar opportunities for participation in workshops which will help to maintain professionalism and update skills used in their jobs.

Certificated and classified employees provide services which support the educational process at the county level, in local school districts, and to other school districts in Montgomery and neighboring counties.

The objective of each employee at the Educational Service Center office is to provide the best services which affect quality education for the students, parents, and communities we serve.

OFFICE OF INSTRUCTIONAL SERVICES

The Department of Instructional Services consisted of Curriculum Supervision, Gifted Supervision, The Dayton Regional STEM Center, AmeriCorps Reading Coordination, Western Ohio Service Collaborative Support, Professional Development Specialists, College and Career Transitioning Services and Shared Services.

Our staff is well versed in an array of topics and skilled in many different components of district leadership. Our staff is tasked with servicing districts in specific capacities, such as AmeriCorps Reading Coordination and district test coordination. However, we are also tasked with providing other resources to support district capacity. Such resources include but are not limited to professional development, technology implementation, instructional improvement facilitation, policy and procedure consultation, Master Teacher facilitation, Resident Educator Coordination, Value Added support, InfOhio support and state training on behalf of the Department of Education.

Our department also took initial steps in building a robust menu of options in response to the state's Career Connection mandates. By building our first product line, "I Can Be Anything I Want To Be, A-Z" we have supplied all Montgomery County Districts with a full K-5 Curriculum aligned with the state mandate. Additionally, we have continued offering online coursework to support career exploration. This aspect of our programming will continue to be developed next year.

Another point of growth in our department was the partnership with Graduation Alliance. This programming allows disengaged students to be re-engaged with their homeschool while completing their education through the Education Option of a Credit Flex Plan. We hope to increase our MC graduation rate with this student option.

The DRSC finished its ninth year. At the end of the year, we were notified we were selected to replicate the quality professional development program in Warner Robins, GA on behalf of the United State Air Force. Additionally the DRSC was awarded a grant to resurrect the Science Saturdays programming, originally produced by Charles Kettering. After five months of programming over 1000 attendee, largely children, had attended the monthly science show held at the Engineers Club of Dayton. DRSC continued to provide materials, consultation and customized professional development to individual educational entities, as well.

This was our second year providing AmeriCorps Reading Tutor Coordination. This opportunity assisted districts in providing reading instruction to K-3 students in an intentional attempt to avoid students being retained in third grade due under state mandates.

This was also our first year of participation in the Western Ohio Service Collaborative. Darke, Preble, Miami, Greene, Clark, and Montgomery County ESCs joined in a collaborative effort to provide professional development, commonly offered in their own county, to a broader regional footprint. Several of our staff members participated in delivering WOSC professional development throughout the year.

2015-16 SCHOOL DISTRICTS SERVED

State and federal laws require Ohio public school districts to provide a variety of services that are specified on a student's Individualized Educational Program (IEP), 504 Plan, etc. The MCESC's highly qualified professionals provide these services to students and districts in a timely and cost effective manner. The breadth and depth of these services are outlined in this section.

MCESC operated classrooms to provide DIRECT CLASSROOM SERVICES at three sites which housed 358 students with emotional disturbances or multiple disabilities in the 2015-16 school year. These students came from 26 school districts in six counties. Students met with highly qualified teachers, dedicated assistants and related special education intervention specialists to meet all educational goals outlined in each student's IEP.

Five students attended a specialized pre-school class for with hearing loss and speech impairment.

This class has a STEP UP TO QUALITY rating of five stars, the highest rating in Ohio's pre-school report card system.

OFFICE OF STUDENT PROGRAMS

The Office of Student Programs provides a variety of direct classroom services to prepare students to meet academic, social, cultural, civic, and employment needs. Each student's educational program is designed to provide an opportunity for independence as adults. The program for students with multiple disabilities had 162 students in twenty classrooms. The program for students with emotional disabilities had 191 students in fifteen classrooms. Five tutors worked with students in the Youth Partial Hospitalization Program. One tutor worked with students at the KBMC Mental Health Program.

Student community activities included several experiences with fine art activities as well as volunteer work activities at many sites. High school MD students participated in a talent show. Such educational field trips help students to learn the independent living skills necessary to participate in social settings. Highlights of the year included the annual MD prom, and MD graduation.

Transition to Work services focused on community training locations including retail stores, restaurants, hospitals, and service companies. Emphasis was placed on developing the skills necessary for the workplace and independent living.

The Preschool Program for students with hearing impairments, located in Kettering, is unique. The program emphasizes teaching verbal communication and accepts students who demonstrate the desire and ability to develop spoken language.

Diagnostic Services The Miami Valley Autism and Low Incidence Coaching Team (ACT)

During the 2015-16 school year Autism and Low Incidence Coaching Team (A.C.T.), was available to serve school districts in the six counties in Region 10: Greene, Darke, Clark, Miami, Montgomery and Preble. The ACT team was coordinated by Lisa Combs, and was comprised of an instructional/behavioral specialist (Ms. Combs), a communication/assistive technology specialist (Carol Dittoe) and a sensory/motor specialist (Susan Aebker). The ACT service model provides traditional professional development along with job embedded coaching on evidence based practices to build the capacity of educational teams in serving students with autism and complex disabilities. The ACT program had a very busy 2015-16 school year, providing job embedded coaching to the educational teams of 443 students in 43 school districts across the 6 counties served by the MCESC. In addition, the ACT program provided traditional professional development sessions to 496 educators from 46 school districts. The ACT program also added 19 administrators, teachers, therapists and paraprofessionals to the A-LIST, which is a community of "Best Practice Providers" who are used as exemplars in the coaching process of new teams. The A-LIST now totals 67 best practice educators across the 6 county region.

Equipment Update

Eileen Epley, MPT, Physical Therap

The OT/PT Department has a broad range of student positioning and mobility equipment, used extensively by our member districts, much of which had fallen into disrepair. This year we acquired 27 pieces of state-of-the-art equipment (mobility devices and standers), as well as assorted vests, seat cushions and supports, slant boards, and educational toys for student/district trial or loan.

Professional Development Opportunities Offered By/Through the OT/PT Department:

- "Speed Training" sessions were offered three times this year in an effort to maximize knowledge
 gained from our staff members attending specialized continuing education courses. In three hours,
 therapists had the opportunity to hear the most salient parts of 12 of the 18 different conferences.
- OT/PT Supervisors provided 4 Crisis Prevention and Intervention (CPI) training opportunities.
- Department Director and an OT Supervisor provided training at Ohio's Summer Institute for OT/PT School-Based Practice – Summer Institute – August 5, 2016 on three topics: OT/PT and the ETR, OT/PT and the IEP, Ohio's Workload Rules and Calculator (Cheryl VanHoose, MHS, PT in conjunction with Charles Carlin, Ph.D., CCC/SLP).

OT/ PT In-Service Training Opportunities Provided for OT/PT Staff Members:

- Timothy Callahan, Psy.D, Director of Mental Health Services for Greene County ESC, provided a half day training on "The Brain Paradigm."
- Susan Aebker, DHS, OTR/L from the Autism Coaching Team, provided a half day training on "Sensory Supports in the School"

Expansion of OT/PT Trainings for Member Districts:

- Upon request, therapists provided multiple in-service trainings for member districts on topics such as Sensory Supports; *Handwriting Without Tears; Loops, and Other Groups*; and *SOLO*.
- OT/PT staff members created and shared pre-referral activities with educators in our member districts.
 These are generally specific activities for teachers to use with a wide range of students. These
 activities include topics such as sensory needs, handwriting, posture and movement management,
 and behavior self-management.

Clinical Documentation System Update:

To accommodate for recent changes in software and server programming, OT/PT undertook the enormous project of updating the department's computerized documentation system. This program is utilized by each of our 74 therapists for clinical documentation, data collection/progress reporting and electronic storage. All of these updates should afford the department and our districts better access to important data, including Ohio School Medicaid documentation.

New Department Brochure - Now Available:

OT/PT Department collaborated with a professional agency to create a new brochure for districts and parents showcasing the extensive services provided by the department.

OT/PT Department Partnerships with Therapy-Related Academia:

- The OT/PT Department continues to provide clinical affiliations with 13 universities/community colleges to educate student interns about the unique field of pediatric school-based practice.
 - o OT- 21 students, including one Capstone Student
 - o PT-7 students
- University of Dayton (UD), Doctor of Physical Therapy Program, Advisory/Curriculum Council
- Edison College, Physical Therapist's Assistant Program, Advisory Board
- Two staff members serve as adjunct faculty for the UD Doctor of Physical Therapy Program and 7 other OTs and PTs participated in pediatric equipment labs and student tutorials.

The Montgomery County ESC Technology Department provides purchasing advice, installation, inventory, and support services for over nine hundred pieces of computer equipment and the associated internal networks that supply them with data from the outside world.
